DRAFT REGISTRATION BY MAIL PLAN STARTED IN AREA

Young men reaching the age of 18 can now register for the draft by mail in the Manchester area, according to Harold Cross, supervisor of the Ann Arbor Selective Service System Area office covering Washtenaw, Lenawee and Monroe Counties. The "Mailers" are now available in the Manchester post office, high school and police station, and in all high schools and post offices in Washtenaw County. Instructions are included with the "mailer". It can be completed at home, then folded and mailed. It is pre-addressed and needs no postage. Federal law still required the registration of young men at age 18 even though inductions have stopped. Failure to register is a violation of the law and could result in prosecution by the Department of Justice. Individuals may also request a mail registration form by writing to the Ann Arbor Selective Service System Area office at Room 210, First National Building, 201 South Main Street, Ann Arbor, 48108, or telephoning 665-3766.

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Agriculture in Action

Michigan Farm Bureau

People tend to forget that farmers are consumers as well as producers. In fact, in Michigan, they are the largest consumer group in the state, buyers of huge quantities of steel, rubber and other products needed for their farm businesses. There are few industries which have to buy their raw materials, machinery and supplies at retail prices and then turn around and sell their finished products at wholesale. Farmers do.

Food is no exception. Among the women at the supermarket check-out counter who gasp when the weekly grocery bill is totalled are farm wives. The farm wife may gasp with a little more understanding than her city counterpart, but nevertheless, she agrees that food prices are high.

She's familiar with the statistics: food price rises are modest compared with wages, housing, transportation, health care, etc. She knows that American housewives pay a smaller percentage of their families' income for food than any other housewife in

the world. Still, she has a hard time saying with conviction, food is a bargain, when she pays the bill.

When she compares the price of an item in the supermarket with the price she and her family received for the raw product raised on their farm, she's amazed at the spread. Yet, when you consider that an orange is handled 17 separate times from tree to table, with a cost added each time, no wonder the farm price and consumer price are poles apart.

Between the farm and consumer stand soaring union labor costs in the food industry, a troubled railway system which has necessitated shipping food by more expensive truck transportation, and ridiculous government regulations in labeling, packaging and inspection --all of which add millions of dollars to food costs.

The farmer is receiving higher prices for his products and for this there are no apologies. A fairer share of the total income of this nation's prosperity for the farmer was long overdue.

There are two ways to help bring food prices down. One, of course, is to curb inflation caused by excessive government spending. Another is high farm production, encouraged by fair returns, a free market system, and expanded markets.

The goals of moderate food prices for consumers and decent incomes for farmers are not inconsistent.

RED CROSS FISHING SAFETY TIPS

Special hazards of accidents that confront the millions of American fishermen, and that may end tragically if they happen, were cited by the American Red Cross this week as the annual fishing season gets under way.

"Fishing is a sport in a setting in which accidents can and do happen," Dr. Ruth Harris, chairperson of water safety for the Washtenaw County Red Cross chapter, says.

"Our objective is to point out the dangers, encourage fishermen to prepare themselves with water safety and first aid training, and thereby reduce such accidents to the minimum. The local Red Cross chapter gives first aid and water safety training (and also provides instruction in small craft safety)." Especially dangerous to early-season fishermen is prolonged immersion in cold water if they should fall in accidentally or their boat should overturn, she added. Fishermen who fall into extremely cold water will lose body heat rapidly, and this lowers their ability to move through the water and save themselves.

Dr. Harris said, "we advise victims of such accidents to get out of the water as soon as possible, although in more favorable water conditions out advice is to stay with the boat until help comes." She listed these further suggestions for fishermen's safety:

1. All fishermen should know how to swim, know first aid, and carry a first aid kit with them on fishing trips.
2. They should listen to weather forecasts and not go on the water when threatening weather is forecast.
3. Fishhooks can catch anglers as well as fish so fishermen should carry needle-nose pliers, wire cutters and a pocket-knife in tackle boxes. Always keep hooks in covered containers.
4. When casting anglers should make certain there is room to do so without hooking someone else. Always look before casting, and use an overhead cast while in a boat with others.
5. If you go on a fishing trip alone, leave word where you will be and when you plan to return. However, it is much safer to fish with a companion.
6. Stay away from water where there are swimmers, water skiers, skin and scuba divers.
7. Along the shore, wade cautiously to

avoid slipping on hidden rocks or stepping unexpectedly into deep water.

8. Learn how to hold a fish properly while extracting a hook. Many species of fish have sharp teeth or fins that can cause hand wounds.

9. If you snag yourself deeply with a hook, cut off the line, bandage the wound, and go immediately to the nearest doctor or hospital. Don't risk further injury trying to remove a deeply imbedded hook.

10. When fishing in channels or rivers, never tie your boat to channel buoys. It is illegal. These are traffic markers and must be kept clear.
