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TO THE ELECTRIC CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY: NOTICE OF ELECTRIC RATE HEARING and NOTICE OF HEARING ON MOTION FOR PARTIAL AND IMMEDIATE RATE RELIEF

On April 23, 1974, Consumers Power Company filed an Application with supporting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4576, which requests authority to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by at least \$72,159,000 on an annual basis. At the same time, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief which seeks authority, on an interim basis pending final Commission action, to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$54,659,000 on an annual basis. On April 30, 1974, the Company filed with the Commission additional written direct testimony and exhibits regarding its Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief. In its Application, Consumers Power Company has stated that significant increases in the cost of capital, taxes, wages, equipment, materials and supplies have had a serious impact upon the earnings level of its electric business and that it has not been able to attain the level of earnings in its electric business found to be reasonable in the prior electric rate order of the Michigan Public Service Commission. The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled hearings on the Application and Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief in Case No. U-4576 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. The initial hearing in this case shall be held at 9:30 a.m. on June 6, 1974, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, which hearing shall be in the nature of a prehearing conference and shall be held for the purpose of exploring and, if possible, agreeing upon matters which will expedite these proceedings, including, but not limited to, the following:

- 1. Determining the parties to the proceeding, the nature of their appearances and the positions they are taking in the proceeding as well as the facts they intend to controvert or give evidence of, all in accordance with the provisions of Rule 11 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission.
2. Simplifying and defining the issues in this proceeding.
3. Obtaining admissions as to, and stipulations of, facts not remaining in dispute, the authenticity of documents, and matters of public record.
4. Determining the number and identity of witnesses.
5. Specifying the schedule for the exchange of proposed exhibits and written testimony and the reduction of oral testimony to written form.
6. Establishing procedures for the hearing.
7. Specifying a further schedule of dates of hearing.
8. Expediting any other matters that may aid in the orderly conduct of the hearing and the disposition of the proceeding.

B. Public hearings shall be held at 9:30 a.m. and at 7:00 p.m. on June 25, 1974 in the Auditorium of the Law Building, 525 West Ottawa Street, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the special purpose of taking statements and testimony of any interested persons.

C. Further public hearings in this matter shall begin at 9:30 a.m. on July 15, 1974 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of commencing cross-examination of the Company's witnesses and such further proceedings as may be necessary or appropriate. Public hearings shall continue thereafter from day to day or on such adjourned dates as the presiding officer may set until the matter has been fully heard.

D. A public hearing will be held on the Company's Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief at an appropriate time during these rate proceedings following the conclusion of the cross-examination of the direct case of the Company and the receipt of the report of the Staff of the Commission in accordance with Section 6a of 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCLA 460.6a.

E. The Commission, on its own motion, will commence an investigation and hearing on June 6, 1974 into the existing electric rates, charges, revenue deficiencies or excesses, services, practices, procedures and operations of Consumers Power Company, and this investigation and hearing will not necessarily be confined to matters contained in the Company's Application but will include all matters pertaining to the reasonableness and justice of the Company's electric rates, charges, operations and practices as may be necessary to enable the Commission to determine whether the existing or proposed rates and charges are unreasonable and excessive and should be reduced or altered.

F. Any party seeking to intervene, in accordance with Rule 11 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission, shall file with the Commission, at least five (5) days prior to the initial hearing of June 6, 1974, an original and eleven copies of a petition to intervene together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company.

Subparagraph (2) of Rule 11 of the Rules of Practice and Procedure Before the Commission (R 460.21) provides as follows:

"(2) A petition to intervene shall set out clearly and concisely the facts and exhibits supporting the petitioner's alleged right or interest, the grounds of the proposed intervention, and the position of the petitioner in the proceeding, so

as fully and completely to advise the parties and the commission of the specific issues of fact or law to be raised or controverted." (Emphasis added) The Commission will require strict compliance with the above-quoted rule.

G. Consumers Power Company, on or before June 6, 1974, shall serve upon each intervening party a copy of the written direct testimony of its proposed witnesses and its proposed Exhibits A-1 through A-26 as filed with the Commission. Proof of service shall be filed with the Commission on or before June 25, 1974.

H. THE INCREASES DESCRIBED IN THIS NOTICE HAVE BEEN REQUESTED BY CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY. THE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION MAY EITHER GRANT OR DENY THE REQUESTED INCREASE, IN WHOLE OR IN

PART, AND MAY GRANT A LESSER OR GREATER INCREASE THAN THAT REQUESTED FOR ANY CLASS OR CLASSES OF SERVICE.

## Overall School Millage To Be Further Reduced

A memorandum from the Paul V. Engstrom and Company CPA's, the school district's auditor, dated May 16, 1974, indicates that the debt retirement levies for the 1974-75 school year will be 2.54 mills instead of the earlier announced amount of 2.77 mills. This is a total reduction of .73 of a mill as opposed to a .5 mill reduction announced earlier. Therefore, assuming the June 10 millage request of 12.78 mills is approved, the total overall increase in school millage would be ONLY .55 of a mill.

The .73 of a mill decrease in debt retirement funds is made possible by an increase in the school district's state equalized valuation. Shown below is last year's millage and the proposed 1974-75 millage for operating and debt levies. The total millage for 1973-74 was divided as follows:  
OPERATION - a. Voted County Allocation (Set)-11.22, b. Voted locally--11.5, DEBT-3.27. TOTAL MILLAGE 25.99 mills.

Total millage for 1974-75 would be divided as follows:  
OPERATION - a. Voted County Allocation (Set)-11.22, b. Voted locally (11.5 Renewal plus 1.28)--12.78, DEBT-2.54. TOTAL MILLAGE--26.54 mills. 1974-75--26.54, 1973-74--25.99, .55 overall increase.

The extra voted operational millage of 12.78 mills being requested June 10, 1974, is the absolute minimum needed to fund the 1974-75 school year. The small amount of extra voted increase is necessary to help fund the extra costs the district will have relative to cost of living increases for school employees, and escalating costs of materials, supplies and utilities.

## Manchester Fair August 20-24

The Manchester Community Fair will be held between August 20 and 24th this year. The Fair Board is again planning, changing and rearranging to make the 1974 better than ever. We have welcomed to our Board two student representatives Nicki Lentz and Dean Decker. Their youthful input will be very helpful to the planning of the Fair.

The Treasurer and Secretary of the Fair Board attended the Michigan Association of Fairs school in Lansing last month. The state has changed its procedure for reporting premiums paid, necessitating changes in our procedures. Herman Kuebler was asked to contact the Senior Citizens to solicit their help in finding a Parade Marshall for this year.

A letter was sent to all community clubs and organizations asking them to sponsor an activity in the Community Activity Tent. We hoped that someone would look upon this as an opportunity to serve the Fair and raise money for their organization. The response was negligible, and the fate of the tent is in question.

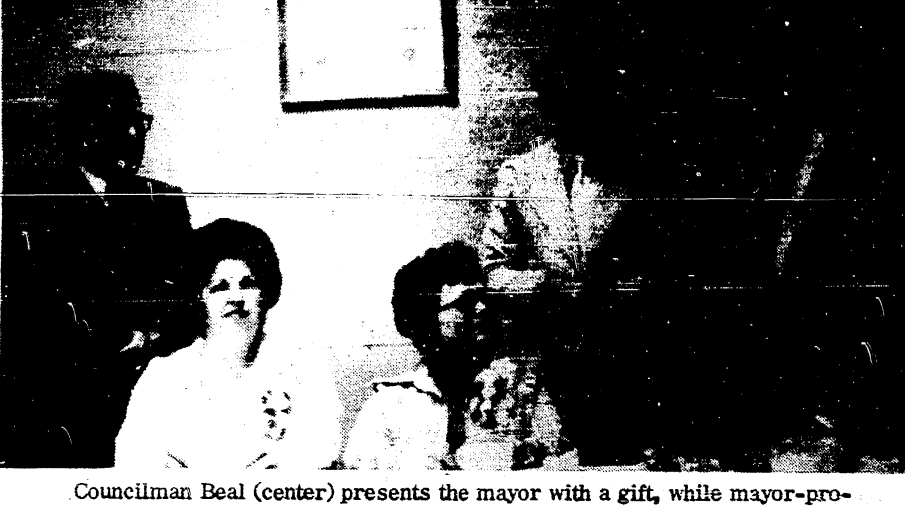
Klagger School was again asked to have a contest for the cover of the 1974 Fair Book. All the entries are in and judging is now taking place.

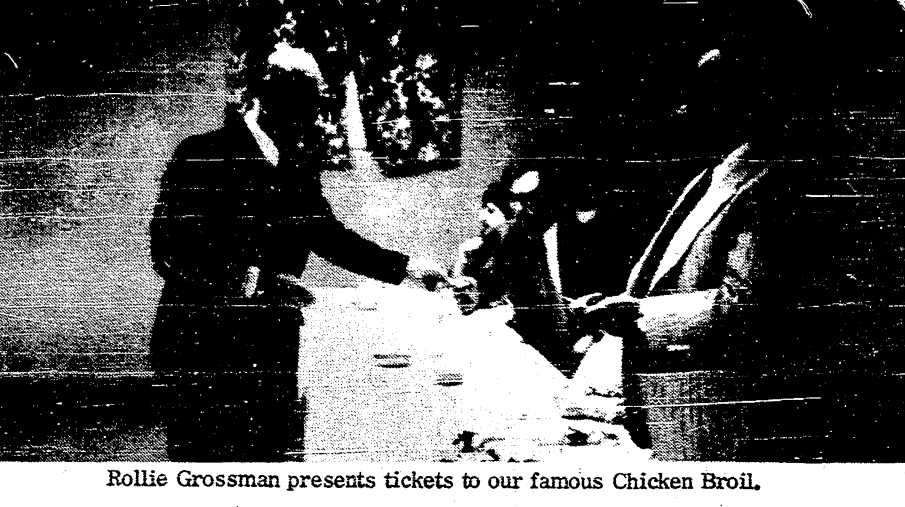
