Operational Millage Vital To District

The 12.78 mills being requested by the Manchester School District on June 10. 1974 is absolutely necessary for the operation of the school district. Inasmuch as this millage amounts to approximately one third (1/3) of the total budget, it would be impossible to operate the educational program without it. The Board of Education is requesting the absolute minimum needed to fund the projected 1974-75 school budget. The amount requested for the 1974-75 year will maintain programs now in operation, provide cost of living salary increases and additional staff members for the growing enrollment, and take care of increases in the cost of utilities, supplies and services.

Eleven and one half mills (11.5) is a renewal of existing millage and one and wenty eight hundredths mills (1.28) is additional millage for the 1974-75 school year. The proposed levy is for one year. ith the decrease of seventy three dredths of a mill (.73) in debt retirement levies the total overall increase in school millage will amount to .55 of mill increase.

The basic State Aid per child in 1973-74 amounted to \$319.32. The basic State Aid per child for 1974-75 will be \$258. 34 or sixty one dollars per student less. This amounts to \$85,000 in state aid which our school district will not get as a result of this per pupil decrease.

The Manchester Board of Education, administration and Staff has been working diligently the last few years to improve curriculum offerings in the school district. Many improvements have been made. If the existing program is to continue and to improve, it will need the support of everyone on June 10,

Budget considerations for the 1974-5 school year dealt with the following actors: \$150,000--Increase in operational expenses, \$85,000-Loss in state aid monies, \$68,000--Repayment of state aid monies (overpayment to district 1971-72), \$303,000--Total amount needed.

The approximate \$213,000 of increased revenue from local sources as a result of the higher SEV and millage increase, plus the projected year end balance will cover the above itemized needs.



MICHIGAN BELL HOSTS LUNCHEON

Business and civic leaders and government officials from Manchester joined representatives from Michigan Bell Thursday (May 23) in a discussion of the company's service requirements and financial position.

William C. Ferguson, vice president of Michigan Bell's metro area, led the discussion at a company-sponsored Town Meeting at the Black Sheep restaurant. Ferguson said the telephone needs of the people of Michigan are expanding rapidly. Calling volume is up 57% since

1964, and the number of telephones is

up 50% "It takes an unusually large amount of copper cable, intricate switching machines, specially equipped vehicles and administrative facilities to provide telephone service," said Ferguson.

In fact, he said, it takes about \$235 in capital investment to produce enough telephone service to generate \$100 in

To keep up with the exploding demand for telephone service, Michigan Bell had to spend \$1.5 billion in the past five years for construction and other capital items, with another \$420 million budgeted

It's far less costly to anticipate growth in service demand and build now than it will be to engage in "crash" programs to avoid shortages at a later date, he said.

"Because service is our first responsibility, Michigan Bell will need to attract about \$2 billion in capital dollars for the next ten years -- a great deal of noney to ask investors to put into a business earning under seven percent." explained Ferguson.

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
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DUTCH THINCLADS 5TH AT LEAGUE

Remember the twinge of guilt you used to feel when Mom used the "hungry child overseas" admonishment to get you to clean up your plate? Age taught most of us two things: that a candy bar before dinner curbs the apnetite for meat, potatoes and vegetablesand that the peas left on your plate will not feed a hungry child overseas.

Yet, there are some national and world leaders who are using the old Momto-selfish-child approach when they suggest that Americans and people of other rich countries eat less in order to feed the hungry in poorer nations. Their concern is admirable: none of us likes to have a hungry or undernourished child anywhere in the world. But their suggested solution would do little to solve the problem. It could, instead, have an opposite effect by sending counter-producing signals to food producers.

World food security is everybody's business and the United States will continue to meet its humanitarian obligations. It was our Secretary of State, in fact, who proposed a World Food Conference this fall to discuss the question of food aid responsibility. For years,

everyone in this country and throughout the world was comfortable in the knowledge that substantial eserves were always available in the U.S., accumulated and maintained at taxpayers' expense. U.S. agricultural leaders believe that other developed countries should share this responsibility.

The old proverb, "Give a man a fish and you feed him for today; teach him to fish and you feed him for his lifetime," expresses farmers' belief that the best way to help people is to teach them to help themselves. They feel that emergency feed relief should have the aighest priority in any foreign aid program, but they counter-balance that thinking with a call for development ssistance programs.

In the end, world food security will epend upon the individual farmer, whether he produces from a rice paddy in the Philippines or a wheat field in Michigan. Throughout the world, economies are signalling to their farm producers that more food is needed. Given the freedom, the encouragement, the incentive to produce-they will respond to that

Farmers could turn the PROBLEM world food needs into an OPPOR-TUNITY. And nobody will have to eat less to make that happen.

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MICHIGAN DRIVERS TO BE FLAG WAVERS FOR AMERICA'S BI-

In 1976, Michigan motorists will help celebrate the United States bicentennial birthday by sporting an eye-catching "Old Glory" license plate, according to Secretary of State Richard H. Austin.

Austin, whose office issues Michigan's vehicle licenses, says 1976 will be the first year for three colors to be used. instead of just two.

The new plate will show white letters and numbers on a red background, with four white stars on a blue field along the left side, and two wavy ribbons of white across the bottom. The design incorporates "Old Glory"--our nation's flag along with reminders of Michigan's role in American history and the official bicentennial logo.

Austin pointed out, "The four stars can be viewed as representing the four flags--French, British, Spanish, and U.S. -- that have at one time waved over what is now Michigan."

Austin noted, "This unique license plate is intended to contribute to Michigan's celebration of a festive occasion and to remind people here and elsewhere of our country's and state's rich and free heritage.

Further consolidation of Michigan's draft boards in June will result in the closing of six more offices, it has been announced by Harold F. Cross, Supervisor of the Ann Arbor Selective Service System Area Office.




