## Operational Millage Vital To District

The 12.78 mills being requested by the Manchester School District on June 10, 1974 is absolutely necessary for the operation of the school district. Inasmuch as this millage amounts to approximately one third (1/3) of the total budget, it would be impossible to operate the educational program without it. The Board of Education is requesting the absolute minimum needed to fund the projected 1974-75 school budget. The amount requested for the 1974-75 year will maintain programs now in operation, provide cost of living salary increases and additional staff members for the growing enrollment, and take care of increases in the cost of utilities, supplies and services.

Eleven and one half mills (11.5) is a renewal of existing millage and one and twenty eight hundredths mills (1.28) is additional millage for the 1974-75 school year. The proposed levy is for one year. With the decrease of seventy three hundredths of a mill (.73) in debt retirement levies the total overall increase in school millage will amount to .55 of a mill increase.

The Manchester Board of Education, administration and Staff has been working diligently the last few years to improve curriculum offerings in the school district. Many improvements have been made. If the existing program is to continue and to improve, it will need the support of everyone on June 10, 1974.

Budget considerations for the 1974-75 school year dealt with the following factors: \$150,000—Increase in operational expenses, \$85,000—Loss in state aid monies, \$68,000—Repayment of state aid monies (overpayment to district 1971-72), \$303,000—Total amount needed.

The approximate \$213,000 of increased revenue from local sources as a result of the higher SEV and millage increase, plus the projected year end balance will cover the above itemized needs.

Mr. Holland has served for several years in his present capacity at Double A, having joined the organization following initial business experience in the retail sales field. He holds a masters degree in business administration from the University of Michigan and is a graduate of Yale University and Deerfield Academy, Deerfield, Massachusetts.

Mr. Nixon's new responsibilities will commence effective July 1, 1974; his family, which includes his wife, Joan, and three children, Scott, Bradley and Lisa plan to move from England to the Manchester, Michigan area during the summer months.

Similarly, Mr. Holland's wife, Quannah, and children, Nathan and Jennifer, will move to the British Isles at the same time.

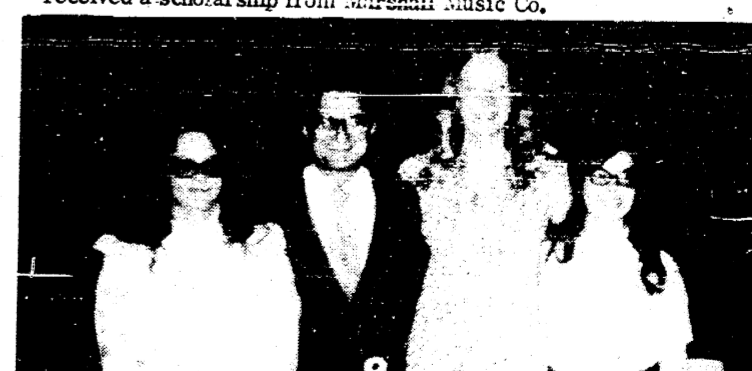

MICHIGAN BELL HOSTS LUNCHEON

Business and civic leaders and government officials from Manchester joined representatives from Michigan Bell Thursday (May 23) in a discussion of the company's service requirements and financial position.

William C. Ferguson, vice president of Michigan Bell's metro area, led the discussion at a company-sponsored Town Meeting at the Black Sheep restaurant. Ferguson said the telephone needs of the people of Michigan are expanding rapidly. Calling volume is up 57% since 1964, and the number of telephones is up 50%.

"It takes an unusually large amount of copper cable, intricate switching machines, specially equipped vehicles and administrative facilities to provide telephone service," said Ferguson.

In fact, he said, it takes about \$235 in capital investment to produce enough telephone service to generate \$100 in revenue.

To keep up with the exploding demand for telephone service, Michigan Bell had to spend \$1.5 billion in the past five years for construction and other capital items, with another \$420 million budgeted for 1974.

It's far less costly to anticipate growth in service demand and build now than it will be to engage in "crash" programs to avoid shortages at a later date, he said.

"Because service is our first responsibility, Michigan Bell will need to attract about \$2 billion in capital dollars for the next ten years—a great deal of money to ask investors to put into a business earning under seven percent," explained Ferguson.

"Thus, faced with rapidly rising costs, bargaining on new labor contracts and poor earnings that are getting worse,

Michigan Bell in April asked the Public Service Commission for a \$111 million rate increase," he said.

That would add \$1.85 a month, for example, to the basic charge for one-party residence service in Manchester. Ferguson was introduced by Harry M. Kenworthy, Michigan Bell's area manager.

The "Guiding Objectives" adopted by the 50-member Board of Directors at its annual spring meeting here this week included three directed toward work within the United States in cooperation with other national and regional bodies of the two-million-member denomination:

\*To increase awareness on the part of the people of the United States regarding the problems and concerns of Latin America.

\*To sensitize the members of the United Church of Christ to the needs

of the Latin Americans within the United States.

"To help the United Church of Christ to be receptive to the witness of the Latin American churches.

In all relationships, the guiding principles of the United Church Board for World Ministries are: "to share the good news in word and deed in Latin America" and "to assist the liberation of all peoples from all forms of oppression."

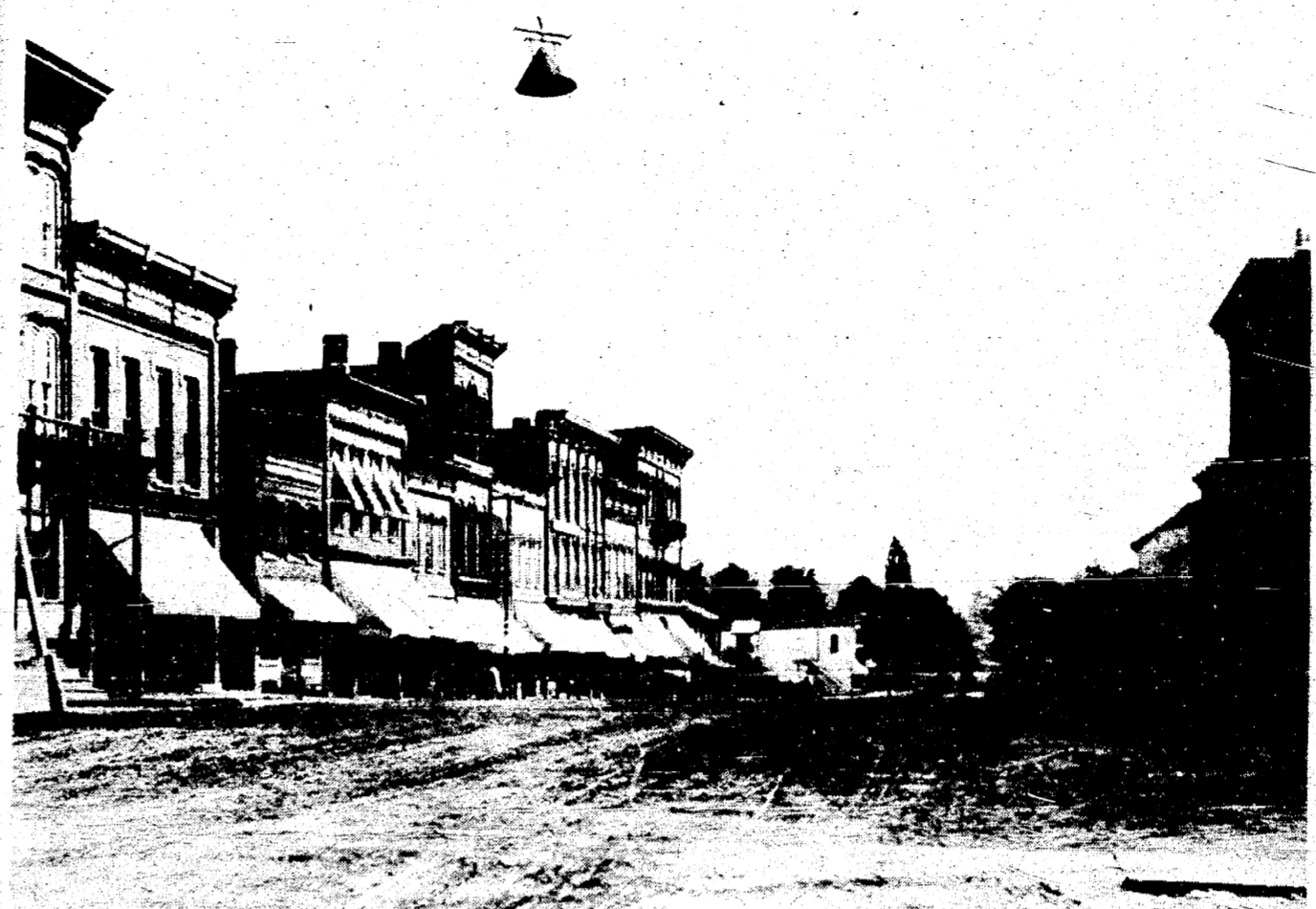

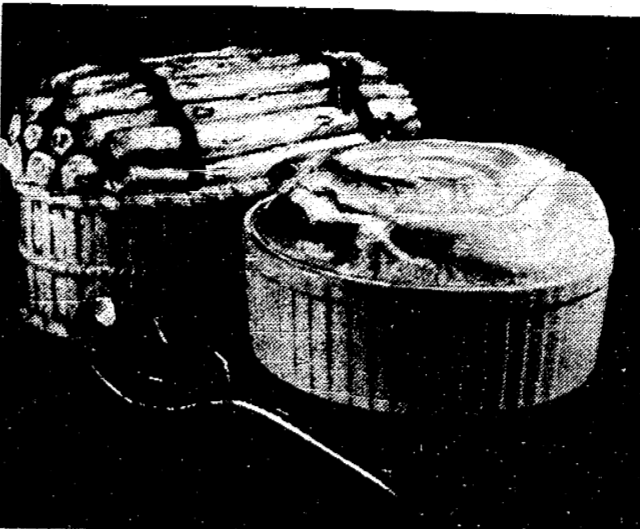

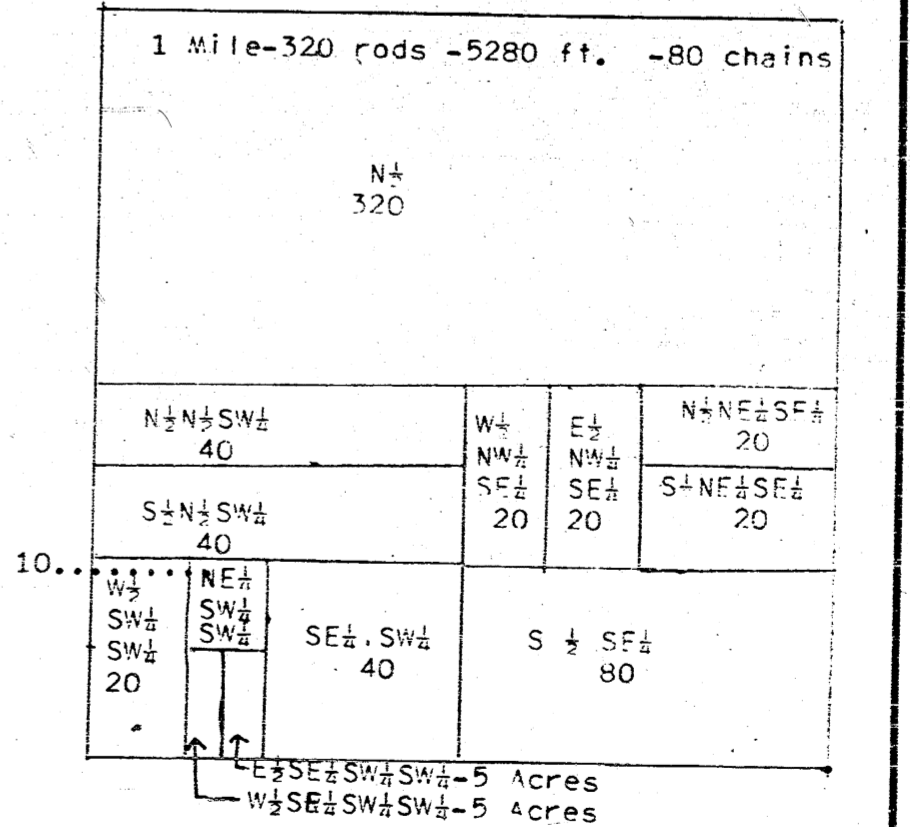

MICHIGAN DRIVERS TO BE FLAG WAVERS FOR AMERICA'S BICENTENNIAL

In 1976, Michigan motorists will help celebrate the United States bicentennial birthday by sporting an eye-catching "Old Glory" license plate, according to Secretary of State Richard H. Austin.

The new plate will show white letters and numbers on a red background, with four white stars on a blue field along the left side, and two wavy ribbons of white across the bottom.

Austin pointed out, "The four stars can be viewed as representing the four flags—French, British, Spanish, and U.S.—that have at one time waved over what is now Michigan."

As the nation's transportation state, it's particularly appropriate that we use a motor vehicle license plate to help dramatize our part in the bicentennial celebration."

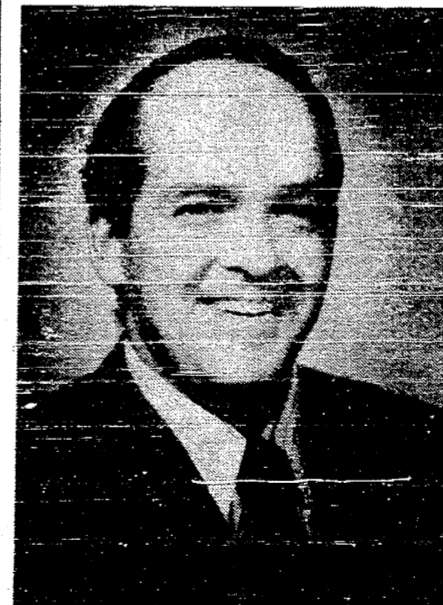

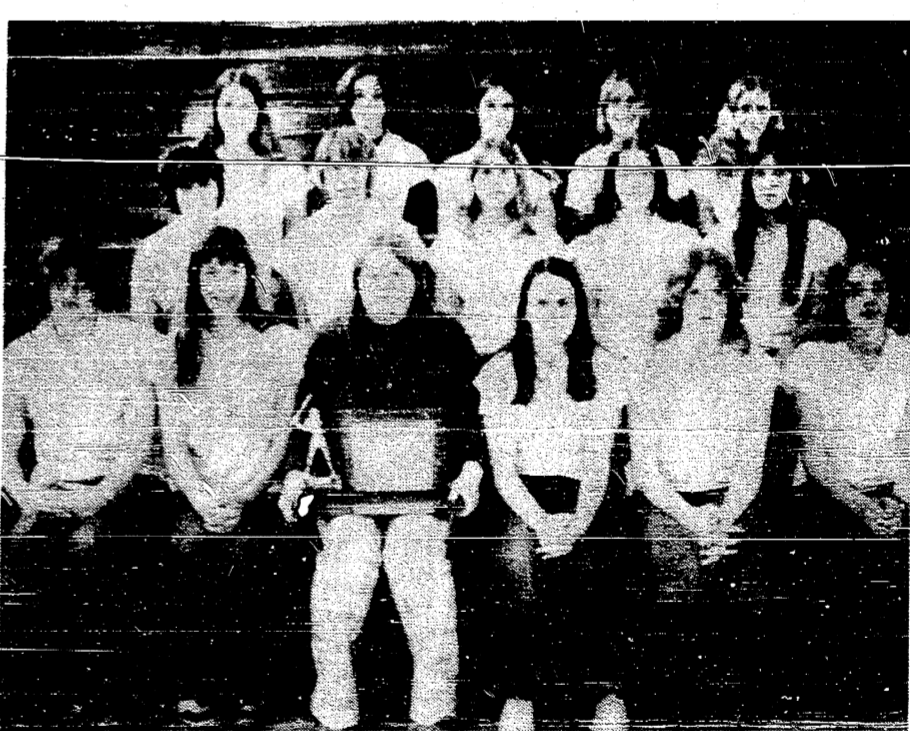

**Should I Spank my Child?**

A. Please don't get me into the middle of the age-old controversy about spanking the rod or vice versa. Just let me tell you about the structure of your little boy's body.  
Remember the song that goes, "knee bone connected to the thigh bone, thigh bone connected to the hip bone, hip bone connected to the back bone", etc. Every parent should keep that song in mind when punishing a child. A severe shock to any part of the skeleton naturally affects the framework of the entire body. With this knowledge in mind, you can see that a severe thrashing could very easily harm a small child's backbone and thus cause pinching of the spinal nerves. A misaligned spinal vertebra can cause dis-ease in any part of the body. Nerves make possible every function of your body. Your child's nerves make it possible for him to see, to smell, to taste, and to hear. Nerves maintain his balance and keep his temperature at 98.6 degrees. Every function taking place in his body is under the control of his nervous system. Remember, too, that a child is always in the process of developing. All of the bones and joints are not completely formed until a person reaches about 25 years of age.  
We spanked our children only a few times while they were growing, and if I had it to do over again, I'd think of some other form of punishment.
