The ever increasing assessment of property makes me wonder how the school board and the Board of education are spending all these tax dollars for a school that I understand has not been certified and graduates are not being accepted in some colleges. The building program that was proposed by the Board of education was decisively defeated a short time ago. Now they are asking for an increase in millage that they say is only 4c a day for a twenty thousand dollars assess-

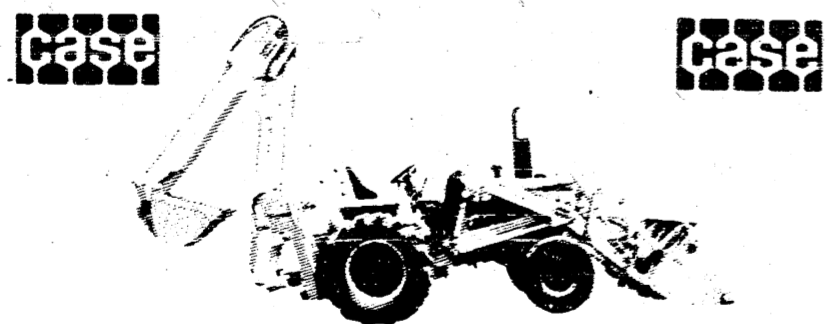

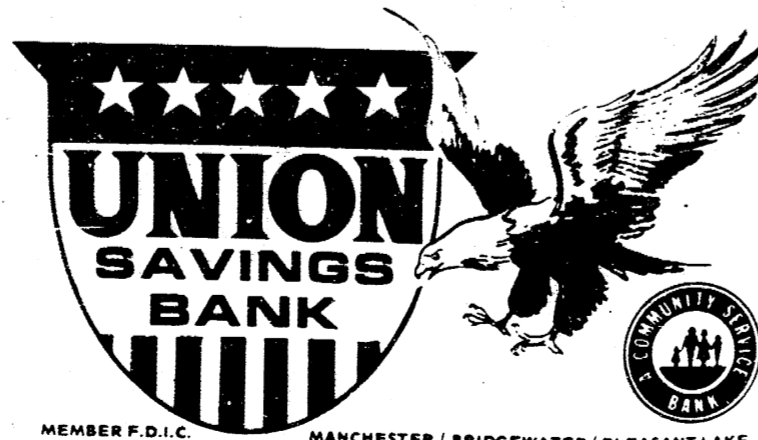
