Summer Program Starts June 24

The dates of the Manchester summer recreation program have been established. The program will begin on Monday, June 24, with activities at both the junior playground and senior playground and end Friday, August 2. This year's program will include such activities as roller skating, basketball, tennis, volleyball, softball, and field trips.

Junior playground will be held at the Nellie Ackerson school again this year and will be open to those children who will be five by December 1, 1974 and up to those who have finished the fourth grade. This year all those children who have finished fourth grade have a choice of either attending junior playground or senior playground. The decision is up to them. The hours for junior playground will be from 9:30 A.M. to 12:00 Noon Monday thru Friday except on those days selected for field trips. The junior playground will be under the supervision of Mrs. Kristen Schick. All children participating in the program should assemble on the small playground adjacent to the Nellie Ackerson building and be picked up promptly at 12:00 P.M. if this be the case. If you have any questions concerning junior playground, please contact Mrs. Schick at 1-423-3588.

All youngsters who have finished the fourth grade and who will not be sixteen years old before August 1, 1974 are welcome to attend senior playground. Senior playground will run from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. Monday thru Friday. This year senior playground activities will be held in the high school gymnasium where a variety of activities will be available to the youngsters. All youngsters who will be participating in senior playground activities are asked to park their bikes behind the high school and to use the northeast door which is right off the parking lot. Senior playground will be under the supervision of Mr. Brian Schick.

In order to get even more youngsters involved in the recreation program we have decided to hold our roller skating activity again this year. Roller skating will be offered twice a week this summer. Arrangements have been made with the Skateadium in Adrian to rent their facilities on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 1:00 P.M. to 2:30 P.M. The total cost for each youngster will be \$1.00 (50¢ admission and 50¢ skate rental). This price would be paid each time a youngster decided to go. Roller skating will begin on Tuesday, June 25. All participants in this program will be required to bring a permission slip signed by his parents. Participation is limited to those youngsters who are entering the fourth grade and up to those who will not be sixteen years old before August 1, 1974. This year the bus will be leaving from the athletic field at 12:30 P.M. and returning at about 3:00 P.M.

Due to the poor turnout for swimming at Wampiers Lake for the past two years and due to the energy crisis the recreation department has decided to drop the swimming program from its list of activities. We feel that this is a necessary move under the present circumstances.

Board of Education To Discuss Millage

The operational millage which was voted down at the annual election Monday, June 10 will mean a loss of over \$650,000 to the school district. This includes approximately \$444,000 in local taxes and over \$200,000 in state aid funds which will be lost to the district by virtue of the amount of millage levied at the local level. With an additional penalty of \$68,000 in state aid being withheld during the 74-75 school year the school district will lose over 1/2 of its operating funds or \$718,000. This would make it impossible for the school district to provide the required 180 days of student instruction for the 1400 students expected in the 1974-75 school year. The Board of Education will meet Wednesday evening to make a decision on a course of action.

Millage Proposal Defeated 312-359

The operational millage requested by the Board of Education was voted down at the annual election held Monday, June 11, 1974. There were 222 "yes" ballots cast, 538 "no" ballots and 4 spoiled ballots for a total of 760. Total population, as reported to the Board was 1,324. Of 522 voters, 522 received 296 votes which gave the proposal a defeat. Ralph Marie Fremont received a total of 245 votes, and Henry Holland, who withdrew from the race prior to the election, received 57 votes.



In the "Letter to the Editor" section of last week's Enterprise, the writer asserted that Manchester High School was not certified and that this being the case our students were not being accepted by colleges for admission. These are false assumptions.

In the first place, teachers are certified, schools are accredited. All teachers must be certified to teach in any public high school in Michigan. Manchester High School is accredited by the University of Michigan and is evaluated in all phases of its curriculum, physical facilities, class sizes, course content, teacher qualifications, etc. to meet its accreditation.

Secondly, a student is accepted by the college of their choice if that student meets the entrance requirement of the college and not whether he went to a North Central or University of Michigan accredited school. Admissions are based on grade point average, rank in class and scores obtained by the student on either the ACT or the SAT. national tests to determine a student's capability. Obviously, some colleges and universities have much higher standards than others and some students are refused admission, but no student has been refused admission to a college because they went to Manchester High School, if that student meets the college's admission standards within their enrollment quota.

RULES TIGHTENED FOR ISSUING NEW SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS

Obtaining a Social Security card may not be as simple and speedy a procedure as it once was. People may now be asked to prove their age, identity, and citizenship when applying for the first time, according to Robert A. Kehoe, District

Manager of the Social Security Office in Ann Arbor.

Required under a 1972 amendment to the Social Security Act, proof of age can be readily established with a birth or baptismal certificate, while a driver's license, or other evidence with a picture or at least a signature will verify identity. Nativeborn U.S. citizens can usually establish citizenship with the same documents; however, foreign-born applicants must show evidence of either naturalization or, in the case of aliens, Immigration and Naturalization service identification showing legal entry into this country.

People applying for duplicate Social Security numbers because they've lost their card or changed their name generally won't be affected by the new requirements. Kehoe explained that since the Social Security number is now used for so many purposes other than the collection of taxes and payment of benefits, and the application for a number may be obtained from so many sources other

than a Social Security office, the proof requirement was enacted to help prevent people from obtaining more than one number, either accidentally or on purpose, or using a Social Security card under a false identity. A fine of up to \$1,000, a year in prison, or both, may be imposed for fraudulent use of Social Security numbers to hide true identity or to get benefits from a Federally funded program.

Your Social Security number is yours alone and remains the same for life, Kehoe said, regardless of how many times you change your name, address, or job. You build retirement, as well as survivor and disability protection for yourself and family by your work and Social Security contributions. Using more than one number could mean you're not getting full credit, which could adversely affect your future Social Security payments.

You should apply for a number several weeks before you really need it, Kehoe said. All applications, whether for new or replacement numbers, must be screened against Social Security central files in Baltimore and the cards are issued from there. This can take from 4 to 6 weeks. Sometimes school registration or an initial paycheck can be delayed awaiting a Social Security number. Applications for numbers can be obtained at Post Offices as well as the Social Security Office. Processing can be speeded by being sure the application is properly and completely filled out, and by submitting the required documents in person or by mail to Social Security when presenting the application.

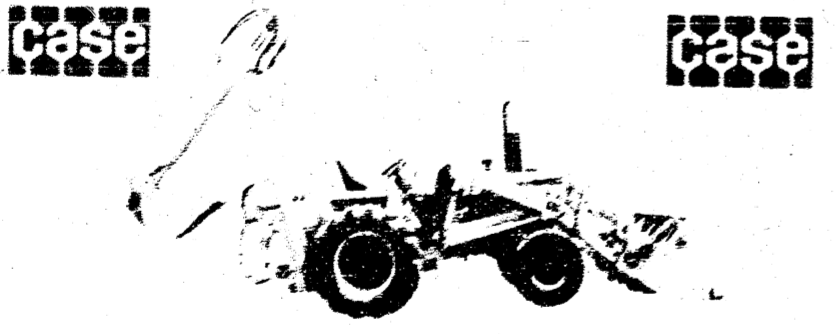

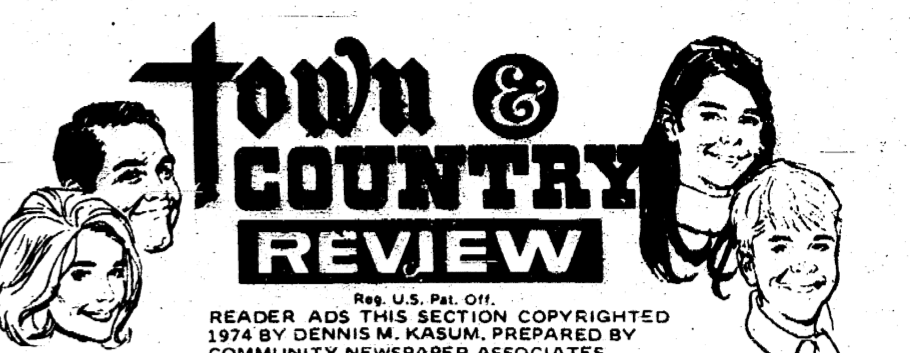

(g) The counselor grades each senior on scholastic achievement and not on athletics.

(h) The student council (President and Vice-president) grades each senior on social attitudes, and not on athletics.

(i) The Varsity Club (Pres. and Vice-Pres.) grades each senior on how they view that senior as an athlete.

The school feels that this is a very outstanding athletic award and hopes this will become traditional at each commencement.

The award carries with it an individual plaque presented at commencement and the recipient's names will be engraved on a separate school plaque.

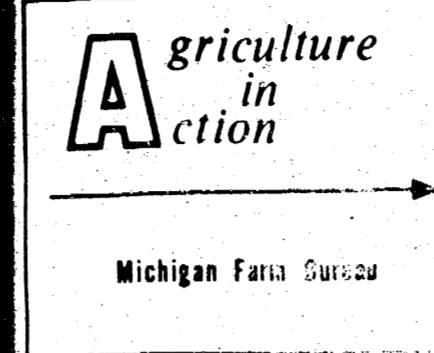

This adventure started a week prior to the farm tour (which also included visits to a beef farm and poultry operation), when the class was visited by two bit-overalled characters from the past. They carried a three-legged stool and milk pail, and talked of hitching horses to the wagon to go into town for salt to make butter. Later, two attractive, young, modern-day farm wives appeared to tell about agriculture today and answer questions from the youngsters—questions like "When you milk by machine, how do you know when the cow is done?"

The farmers of yesterday and today were two farm wives who make up one of 28 teams of the Michigan Farm Bureau Women's Speakers' Bureau. Throughout the state, the women are closing any existing communications gaps between consumers and producers through appearances at civic group meetings and in school classrooms. With

slides of their farming operations, statistics, and personal experiences, they effectively tell the story of food production and food prices.

Whether it's a "Bread and Milk" presentation for an adult group with audience participation in a retail-farm, price comparison—or a "food from farm to you" journey for youngsters—the women's pride in their profession comes shining through. As these agricultural ambassadors of good will visit urban areas and proclaim, "We're proud to be farmers," there's just no doubt about it!

They can be proud, too, that they provided city youngsters with the unique educational experience of dining in a dairy barn.

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

Voters Say "No" To More Than Millage

The amount of operational millage turned down by district voters plus the loss of state aid represents approximately 55% of the school's total operational monies. With the loss of these funds it is impossible for the school district to offer the kind of educational program the district has had in past years. The Board of Education has no alternative but to hold another millage election. The County Special Election Committee has approved an election for Monday, July 29, 1974.

Without the extra voted millage the school district would have to cut the existing program in less than half. Whether this would mean half days for all students, or school for one half year remains to be seen. The Board of Education would make this determination after studying the alternatives open to them. Whatever is done the State Department of Education's requirement of 180 days of school and 900 hours of instruction would have to be considered. If these requirements aren't met then the district would suffer an additional loss of the remaining state aid entitled it under the set millage of the county. In addition to the change in the ac-

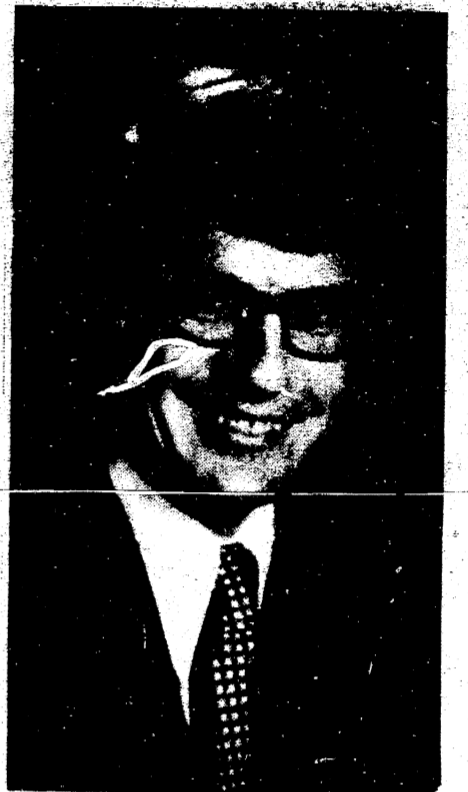
