board must designate a depository for school funds. Jim Walkows inquired about the feasibility of naming additional depositories other than the Union Savings Bank for some school funds. This inquiry was in reference to a recommendation by the school auditing firm of Paul V. Engstrom & Co., that due to insurance regulations on specified amounts the school consider other banking institutions as possible depositories. Superintendent Swartz indicated at this point that the Union Savings Bank had always been the depository for general fund monies. NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK

The week of July 25 to 31 has been proclaimed National Farm Safety Week by President Nixon. Leaflets promoting farm safety week and reminding farmers to be safety conscious are being sent to about 2,000 of the State's farmers by the Michigan Crop Reporting Service. This year's leaflets stress Alertness, Balance, and Care; the ABC's of avoiding falls.

All farmers in the State are urged to be safety minded and use extreme caution, whether they are in their fields, barn

yards, or on State roadways. Mr. C.A. Hines, head of the Michigan Crop Reporting Service, notes that many accidents involving farmers happen on the State's highways. Hines urges all motorists and farmers to be on constant alert as Michigan State Police records show 393 farm equipment accidents happened on Michigan roadways in 1973. Motorists need to be alert for slow moving farm vehicles on the highways—while farmers should also use extreme caution when entering roadways.

Accidents involving farm equipment were more common in the heavily farmed

and heavily populated southern half of the Lower Peninsula. Approximately 92% of the farm equipment related accidents occurred in this area. Wayne county, the most urban county in Michigan, also had the oddity of leading the State in number of farm equipment related accidents with 20.

Second in farm equipment accidents were Ionia and Lenawee counties who both registered 16 accidents. Twelve or more farm equipment accidents occurred in the following counties: Berrien, Eaton, Huron, Kent, Monroe, Oakland, Saginaw, Van Buren and Washtenaw. Only 31 accidents

occurred in the not as heavily farmed northern Lower Peninsula and Upper Peninsula combined.

Have you ever played "Antonyms and Synonyms"? It's an effective mixer designed to help get people acquainted as they search the crowd for the match to their words. The challenge of the game is that you don't know whether you're looking for a cat to go with your dog (antonym) or a Snoopy (synonym).
Supposing the word you picked out of

the hat was "consumer." Logically, you would start looking for a "producer." At first thought, you'd tag producer-consumer as antonym. But a closer analysis would raise some questions. Could it perhaps be synonym? Farmers think so.

Granted, they are producers. But before they can be producers, they must first be consumers. In fact, the farmer is one of the nation's largest consumers, using great quantities of steel, rubber, and other products in his food production business.

Take milk, for example. Before milk from the cow reaches the retail consumer, a lot of pasture, feed, fertilizer, electricity and energy must be consumed. When that milk leaves the farm, it must be processed into ice cream, butter, sour cream, cheese, or some other dairy product. Even when it stays in its original form as fresh milk, it must be pasteurized, homogenized and standardized. All this preparation uses up additional energy in the form of labor, electricity and fuel for transportation. Yes, a lot of consuming goes on before milk, or any other farm product, reaches the market.

The consumer of the food the farmer produces is probably the producer of goods the farmer consumes to produce the food the consumer consumes. This makes them both consumers and producers. They have something else in common: both are caught in the same uncomfortable, spiraling inflation that makes it costly to be either a producer or a consumer.

Those who interpret producer-consumer as antonym rather than synonym view the two as opponents, with the supermarket as the battleground. Not so. Producers and consumers are partners in the "game" called supply and demand. Each needs the other to exist; each understands the frustrations the other faces as the value of earned dollars is eroded by inflation.

That they are synonyms rather than antonyms will be proven at election time, when they speak as one voice at the ballot box. Together, they'll send back to Washington only those legislators who are willing to curb massive government spending and inflation—which, by the way, is another synonym.

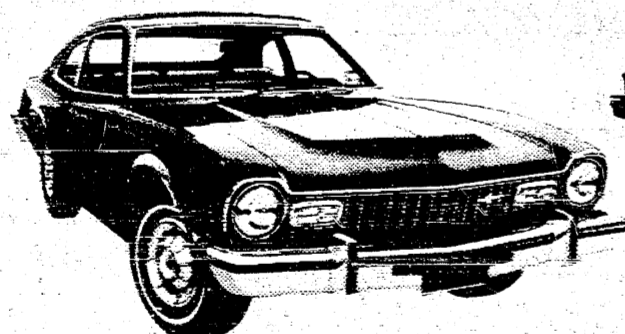

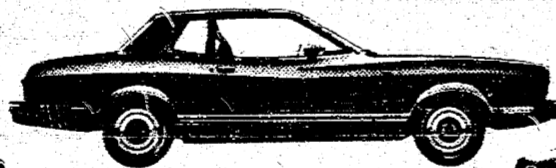

School Operational Millage Named Chairman At Siena Heights Approved By Voters

Voters in the Manchester School District gave approval Monday, July 29, to the School Board's request for 12.78 mills for operational purposes. In one of the heaviest turnout in years a total of 969 ballots were cast with 609 approving the millage request and 355 against. There were five spoiled ballots.

Although 12.78 mills were approved by the voters, it is unlikely due to a recent legislative development that the Board of Education will levy the full amount. The Michigan Legislature in their final session on July 13 made provisions in the state aid act to forgo state aid forfeitures for 1972-73 and 1973-74. The Manchester School District received notification on July 24, 1974 that Section 15, of the 1974-75 State Aid Act stated that "State Aid forfeitures for 1973-73 and 1973-74 resulting from unsuccessful appeals of SEV will not be deducted providing a district does not collect back taxes." Inasmuch as the millage request was predicated partially on this anticipated deduction this recent legislation will now make it possible for the Board to certify a lesser amount of operational millage. The exact amount will be determined after the board has an opportunity to consider other factors such as enrollment and a revised computation of state aid monies. The legislative change did not occur early enough to make a change in the millage request, nor was notification received early enough to notify the district voters. The amount that Manchester was to have deducted was approximately \$68,000. It has been the Board's custom to certify only that amount that is needed to fund the projected budget.

The approval of the millage request means that the Board of Education can fund a full year operation with all services and extra curricular activities. The Board of Education would like to express sincere appreciation to all district voters who voted in the millage election and to the many people in the district who helped in getting out the vote.

Also to the many interested students who participated in the basketball marathon and others who helped in a variety of ways.

This job, like the others listed, requires a sincere desire to help and pays big dividends to the person who can spend a morning or afternoon a week driving a Red Cross wagon, or who can be on call as a substitute driver.

Youth volunteers as well as adults are needed to help staff summer blood clinics throughout the county. The need for blood is even greater this time of year, and volunteers are necessary to staff clinics, RN's and LPN's as well as non-professional volunteers who can spend about seven hours as part of a team of volunteers working with trained personnel make clinic operations possible.

The main purpose of the Friendly Visiting program is to provide friendly support for the elderly or handicapped person who is lonely and homebound. A visitor might read, assist in letter-writing, do occasional personal shopping if desired, talk and listen, and in other ways function as a friendly family member. There are many people in need of this service. Can you help?

If you can help in any of the above programs either as a summer substitute or on a regular basis, please call the Red Cross office at 971-5390. We will be glad, too, to furnish information about the many other volunteer services and programs of our Chapter, but are particularly in need of volunteers for the above three areas of service at the present time.
