Games were played by young and old, and a good time was had by all except it was cold.

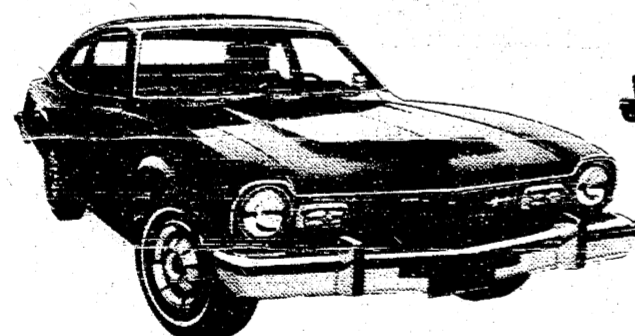

The minutes of the last regular meeting held at 8 p.m., Monday, June 10, at the Village Hall was then read by the Clerk. It was moved by Ambrose Lantz and seconded by Lyle Widmayer that the minutes be approved as read. Motion carried.

RECOVERY INFORMATION FOR FIRE VICTIMS

Disaster by fire may be made a little more manageable for Washtenaw County citizens if they will heed the helping hints offered in a new publication being distributed to local fire departments by the Washtenaw County Red Cross Chapter.

The document, entitled "Recovery Information for Fire Victims" consists of a set of twenty-one cards, each one dealing with a different problem faced by victims of home fires. Such subjects as: "How to Remove Soot and Smoke Odor; To Reclaim Coins & Paper Money; To Replace Records, Legal Documents, etc.; Care of Frozen Foods & Freezers;

First Aid for Walls and Wallpaper; Cleaning Rugs; Mattresses," are only parts of the publication.

Our Disaster Chairman Dale Richards picked up a sample of this item, published by the Minneapolis Red Cross Chapter at a conference he attended, Donald Peak, Executive Director said. "We thought it such a good public information document that we localized it for Washtenaw County use and published it for free distribution to our citizens.

"We have sent samples to all of the Fire Chiefs throughout the County, and to all United Fund Presidents. We want to get the widest possible distribution for the assistance of five victims as part of our ongoing service to disaster sufferers. We know from experience with fire victims that if they can be given proper information and guidance during the initial shock period following a fire, much of their household goods may be salvaged even though it appears to be lost. Whatever we can do to help people in the first days after a fire pays off in salvage," Peak concluded.

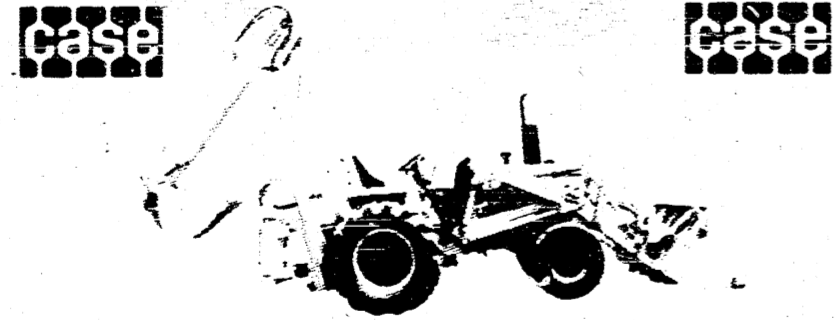

A Message From Your Supervisor

Legislation has been enacted to provide homestead tax assistance for summer taxes billed to senior citizens, blind persons, servicemen, veterans, and eligible widows.

Persons in these groups may request an advance payment of \$100.00 if they received a bill for property taxes during the spring or summer of 1974. The advance payment is \$100.00 no matter what the amount of the tax bill. Request for the advance must be filed by September 15. A return (MI-1040 CR) must be filed at the end of the 1974 tax year and the \$100.00 subtracted from the 1974 total eligible refund. If the \$100.00 is more than the 1974 total the repayment must be made to the state.

A senior citizen is anyone who will be at least 65 years old by December 31, 1974, or the unmarried surviving spouse of such a person. The senior citizen may not have household income of more than \$6,000.00 per year in 1973 and can reasonably expect no more than \$6,000.00 income in 1974.

Blind persons, veterans, servicemen or their surviving spouse must be eligible under the provisions of the "Homestead Property Tax Relief Act" (Act 20, Public Acts of 1973, as amended).

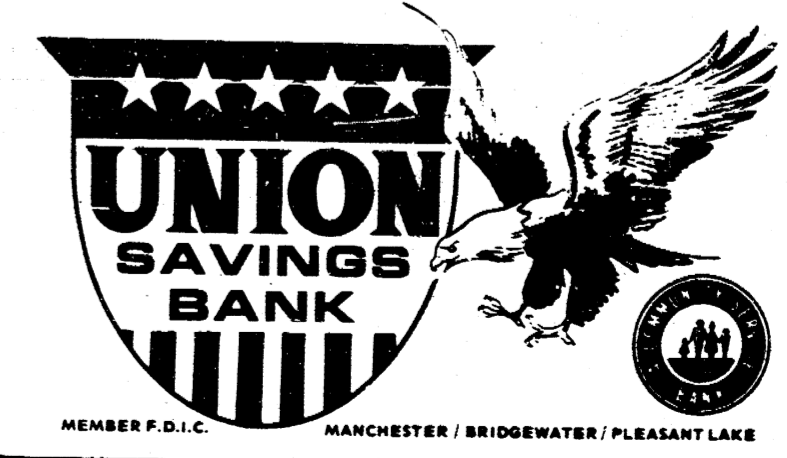

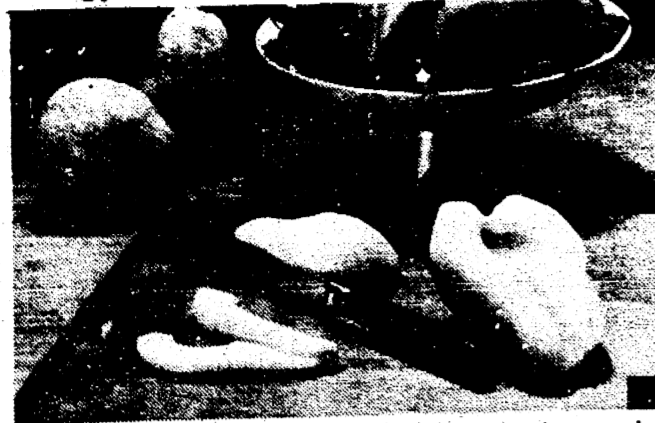

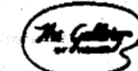

CIVIL SERVICE PUBLIC HEARING

The Michigan Civil Service Commission will conduct a public hearing on September 7 on a recommended 50¢ per hour across-the-board interim increase for state employees. The recommendation came from the Commission's Compensation Advisory Board.

C. J. Hess, Acting State Personnel Director said, "It is the Commission's desire to provide all concerned parties with an opportunity to express their views on this proposal before taking action on the matter."

If the Civil Service Commission acts favorably upon the \$27,500,000 recommendation, the proposal would have to gain majority support in both houses of the legislature.

The CAB recommendation to increase wages on January 1st was prompted by a Civil Service staff report to the Commission which revealed that the past year's actual cost-of-living increases exceeded the projections which

were presented to the Commission last fall when it determined salaries for the 1974-75 fiscal year.

The report stated that the cost-of-living increase during the 1973-74 FY averaged 9% while the data available to the CAB and Commission last year projected a 7% increase. Further, the projections for 1974-75 FY which had anticipated a 5.2% increase have now been revised in light of the experience of the last quarter to forecast a 12% increase.

The CAB consists of representatives of employee organizations and management and functions as an Advisory Board on matters relating to salary and benefits. The Commission rejected a similar mid-year cost-of-living request from the CAB last December and asked for an opinion from the Attorney General to determine if it could legally establish a cost-of-living adjustment plan which would trigger increases at times other than at the start of the fiscal year. That opinion has not yet been released

by the Attorney General.

Last December the Commission did approve a total pay and benefit package valued at \$44,228,000 which went into effect on the 1st of July.

The hearing will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, September 7 in Lansing. (Location: West Junior High School Auditorium, corner of Chestnut and Kalamazoo streets, 1/2 block southwest of the Lewis Cass Building, Lansing).

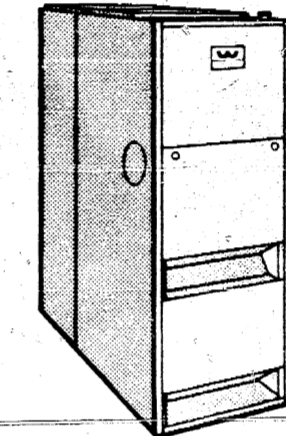

APPLICATION DEADLINE FOR IRS EXAMINATION NEAR

The Internal Revenue Service today reminded tax return preparers who wish to take the IRS' Special Enrollment Examination that they have less than three weeks remaining to file application forms. Applications must be postmarked by Saturday, August 31.

The examination will be given in Detroit on September 23 and 24 at 9:00 a.m. for Michigan applicants.

The application, accompanied by a \$25 fee payable to the IRS, should be mailed to the Director, Audit Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D.C. 20224, Attention: CPA/CIM-SEE.

Anyone needing an application or more information about the examination should contact the IRS office in Detroit, (313) 226-7288.

Social groups maintain that government-held surpluses are needed to feed the hungry people of the world. The American farmer shares their concern; because of his remarkable productivity, he can and will continue to help the U.S. fulfill its humanitarian obligations. But he believes this responsibility should be shared by other developing nations and not shouldered at the exclusive expense of American Consumers and farmers.

Some businessmen would like farm commodities stored by government--at the expense of taxpayers--so they won't have to bear the cost of maintaining their own inventories, or compete in the open market for their needed supplies.

Politicians? Well, think of the points they'd score if--when consumers demanded action regarding high food prices--they could dump reserves on the market to drive prices down. But, in the long run, the consumers they are trying to placate would suffer. They'd suffer because farmers, unable to compete with government for markets,

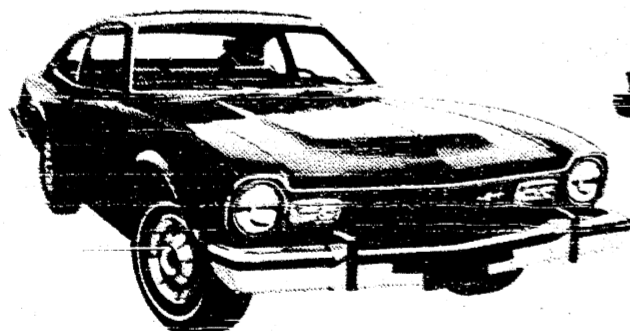
