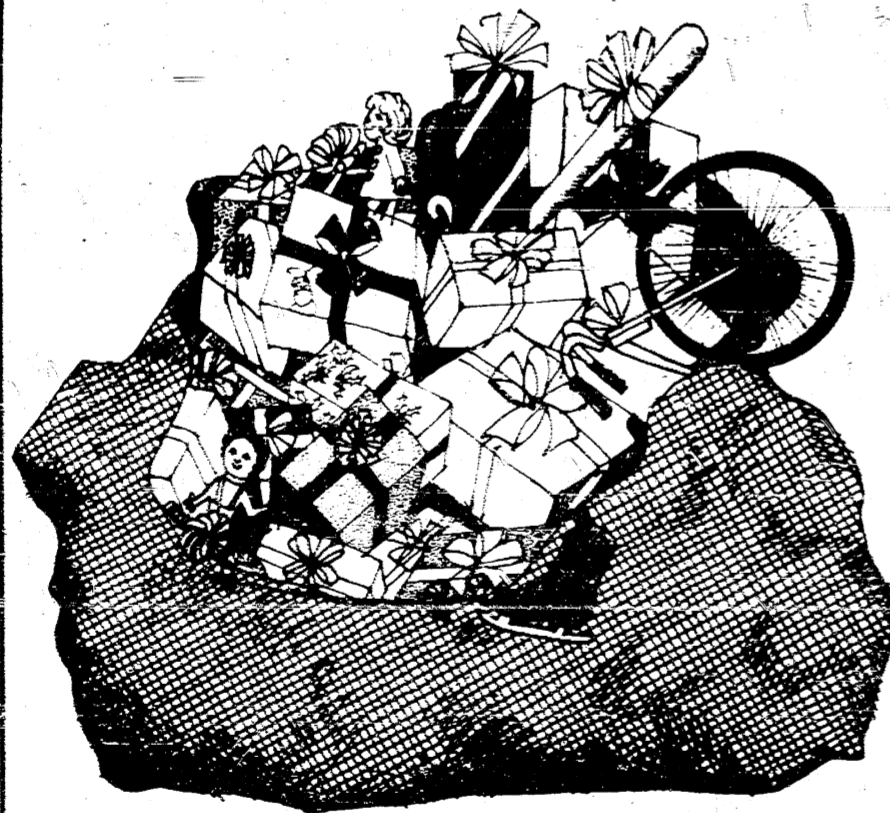

Michigan State Police Service Trooper, one of 46 recently added to departmental ranks, interviews motorist at vehicle check lane. Service Troopers are assigned various duties freeing troopers for other field work.

Since graduation in early September, the first class of Michigan State Police Service Troopers is proving to be an effective work force according to Col. George L. Halverson department director.

"According to reports from our field officers, these young men are doing very well on all their assignments," Halverson said. "We've been especially impressed with their work in the vehicle check lane program where they're playing an active role in aiding team members," he said.

The new Service Trooper position was established in early 1974 replacing the former Cadet position. Halverson explained that his department believed it would

be advantageous to have young people introduced to State Police career opportunities early in their employment experience and expanded the cadet concept to the 17 to 20 year old job market.

Forty-six candidates successfully completed the initial class and have been assigned post duty in all eight State Police Districts throughout the state. Halverson said, "We're monitoring their performance quite closely and, so far, it appears they're turning in a first-rate job." He indicated that future positions would depend on program evaluation and subsequent appropriations.

Following satisfactory service, these

officers who range in age at enlistment from 17 to 20, will become eligible for regular trooper training when they reach 21. Their civil service 05 level position has a beginning pay of \$8,143 annually. In addition to their check lane work, duties include various clerical and other non-law enforcement type duties at posts, districts or other department operations. Their uniforms are the same as those for regular troopers except for insignia and other emblem material.

I know it's tough to get a mortgage these days, but I get the feeling that I am being discriminated against just because I'm a woman. Now, I'm no Gloria Steinem type, but I'm sure there must be laws against that kind of thing, and I'd like to know my rights!

There is a new U.S. housing law that bans sex discrimination in such matters as getting a mortgage or buying or renting a house or an apartment.

The law also stipulates that a lender must count the incomes of both husband and wife in determining whether a couple qualifies for a loan.

## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

November 4, 1974

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:04 pm. Present were Beal, Daniels, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Curley, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Walton. Minutes from the October 21, 1974 meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Beal to approve the minutes as corrected. All yeas, carried. Enter Walton at 7:15 pm.

David Miller and Gerald Grossman were present in conjunction with a water billing master. After explanation of the complaint by Mr. Miller, it was recommended that he contact Bruce Daniels at his office since all water and sewer billing records are kept there.

Mr. Miller also entered an explanation to council on a complaint received by Mahony concerning the reduction of post office hours. As an economy measure two employees reduced their hours from 40 to 36 per week. The US Post Office in Manchester is restricted somewhat by the US Government itself, and the reduction of hours was chosen when an economic cutback was required, rather than eliminating Saturday service.

Fitzgerald reported that the Public Works recommendation on a building contractor was Charles Howerton of Jackson with a total bid of \$20,500. Moved by Scully, supported by Curley to accept the recommendation and award the job to Charles Howerton, contractor. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Mahony to reject the bids of Steeb Dodge, Tom Marshall Ford and Tirb Chevrolet submitted September 18, 1974 on a 1975 dump truck due to the bids being beyond budgetary allowances. All yeas, carried.

Fitzgerald advised Council that McLravy has the plaque for the bridge on Main Street. Fitzgerald indicated that he would contact Mrs. Alber and Mrs. Grossman concerning the total plan for the facing of the bridge before making any further arrangements on the plaque.

Public Works activities for the previous two weeks included two sewer and water tap-ins, planking and asphalt placed at the transfer site, installation of a 10" sewer at East Main for the overflow of the lake, patching of service holes with asphalt, repair of a sewer service on Hibbard Street, leaf pickup, and motor grader repair. Leonard Ahrens was hired as a Village Public Works employee.

Zsenyuk read a letter received from the Washtenaw County Community Mental Health Center, sent in appreciation for services rendered in Manchester at their request. The officers who did such an outstanding job were Officers Scott, Smiley and Townsend.

Communication grant bids have been sent out and are due in December 5, 1974. A new siren and interior shield have been installed in the new police car. Many compliments were received from business people regarding the police coverage Halloween night. One bid has been received for the old police car; however, the ad has not yet appeared in the Enterprise, so it will be held until such time as sufficient publication has been achieved.

AAA has requested the State to make a more thorough study of the Main Street 52 intersection. A traffic survey is available from AAA at no cost as a guide to upgrading the posting of traffic signs in the Village. Zsenyuk reported that he would request the survey.
