A special meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall.

Resignations from the Planning Commission having been tendered by Edward Curley, David Little, and Stanton Roesch, the Village Council has made the following appointments to fill the vacancies: Mr. Charles Cresswell, Mr. Clifford Tracy, and Mrs. Cecelia Chapin.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p.m., by Chairman Cresswell. Other members present were Whittington, Leeson, Althouse, Daniels, Tracy, and Walton. Former members Curley and Little were also in attendance.

Minutes of the previous series of meetings were read, and on the motion by Whittington, supported by Althouse, were unanimously approved.

It was moved by Daniels that regular meetings be held the first Thursday of

each month, at 7:30 p.m., at the Village Hall, with special meetings to be called when business warrants. The motion was seconded by Tracy, and passed unanimously.

A communication referred to the Planning Commission by the Council, from Emil Jacob Post, No. 117, American Legion, addressed to the Village of Manchester and signed by Morgan Kern, Chairman of Land Purchase, was read by Chairman Cresswell. It is a request for rezoning from Residential to Commercial of the property bounded by Duncan St., Adrian St., Territorial St., and the waters edge of the River Raisin, less the lot which Donald Sutton's home is located.

"Sale of property to the Legion is contingent on the rezoning." A general description of intended uses is included in the communication. With consideration given to Council action and stipulation of October 21, 1974, it was moved by Whittington that we defer recommendation pending a more detailed layout of the plot plan for Block 17, showing exact metes and bounds of the property to be

developed, proposed design and floor plans of the building, location of parking area, driveways (ingress and egress), intention of back-filling if any, and other information which might further describe the proposed project. The motion was seconded by Walton, and by voice vote, unanimously approved.

A communication referred to the Planning Commission by the Council, from Mrs. Anna W. Thorsby, addressed to Manchester Council, was read by Chairman Cresswell. It is a petition to grant her the privilege (sic) of making her house at 114 Riverside Drive into a two family dwelling. A brief description of the intended changes is included. It was moved by Walton that the request be denied, due to the fact that at this time the area in question is zoned Single Family Residential. The motion was seconded by Daniels, and by voice vote was unanimously passed.

A request was made for Member Walton to ask the Council to furnish each member of the Planning Commission with a copy of the loose leaf booklet titled

"Handbook of Michigan Township Zoning and Planning."

It was moved by Daniels that the Village Council be asked to meet with the Planning Commission at the next regular meeting, to be held on December 5, to discuss several items of mutual concern. Motion seconded by Tracy, and approved unanimously.

It was moved by Leeson, seconded by Daniels, that the meeting be adjourned. Unanimously approved. The meeting was declared adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

"IT'S ME, OH LORD."

"Not my brother, nor my sister, but it's me, oh Lord" is a line from the old familiar spiritual entitled, "Standing in the Need of Prayer." In this case,

there is admittance on the part of the singer that he is the one guilty of sin and is in need of forgiveness.

Unfortunately, there are few of us today who are willing to admit that we are the ones responsible for the condition in which we find ourselves, our surroundings, or anything in which we are involved.

We say we are concerned about inflation and want to cut government spending, but we don't want the government to cut out the appropriations for the particular project in our area that we are for.

When we have the opportunity to send representatives to Congress who will hold the line on spending, we do just the opposite and elect the big spenders.

We call for strict law enforcement, but we seldom obey the speed limit ourselves, and when we have the opportunity

to serve on a jury, we find an excuse not to do so.

There is a lot of talk in the food business about where the increased costs are coming from. For example, the retail price of butter has dropped eleven cents a pound since a peak price of last year. However, the estimated net farm value has fallen in the same period by 17 cents. This means that the total marketing margin has risen by six cents, and the farmer's share of a dollar spent for butter is now far lower than it has been at any time since 1957.

But everyone involved in the processing, distribution and transportation of butter will say that he is not responsible for this increase in marketing margins, and each one will have a convincing story to tell to justify his position.

Somewhere along the line, all of us are going to have to decide to accept blame where we are at fault and be big enough to say, "It's me, oh Lord," whether we are farmers, politicians, middlemen, or columnists.
