ALIENS REQUIRED TO REPORT

Armand J. Salturelli, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the follow-

ing classes of aliens are excused from SENIOR CITIZEN'S NOTICE this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats, and (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Mr Salturelli said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.


