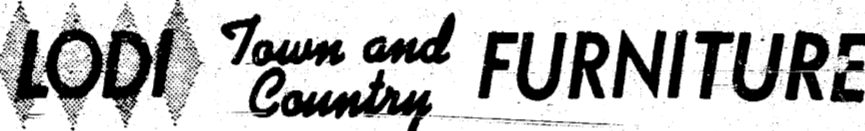
**MARGARET SILKWORTH APPOINTED TO CLEARY BOARD**

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COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

December 16, 1974

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Pro-tem Mahony at 7:15 pm. Present were Curley, Fitzgerald, Daniels, Mahony, Scully and Walton; absent Beal, Little and Zsenyuk. Enter Zsenyuk at 7:21 pm. Minutes of the December 2, 1974 regular meeting were read. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully that the check to Edward Kirk be held until the matter of Chicken Broil reimbursement of funds could be checked. Allyeas, carried. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Curley to approve the minutes of December 2. All years, carried.

Walton requested that a copy of the letter of December 3, 1974 to Gulf Oil Corporation be reviewed by the Village attorney.

Mahony reported that Mr. Gene Snedeker of Consumers Power Company had postponed his meeting with Village officials until February 3, 1975 due to the frame of election dates. Regarding Michigan Consolidated, Mahony reported that the firm is not expanding and is not interested in acquiring Consumers' interests. Zsenyuk reported on the communications grant bids. Motorola did not bid equipment as specified. Zsenyuk intends to talk

further with G.E. and R.C.A. before awarding the bid.

Fitzgerald indicated that a permit had been issued for water system improvements which will cost approximately \$1600 plus labor. Public Works activities for the previous two weeks included cleanup of snow, street salting, water main repair at Torrey and Vernon and street cleanup in addition to equipment repair.

Mr. Roman Foss of 621 Spring Street is in need of a letter from Village Council regarding the distance of sewer from his property and the present inavailability of such to the property. Washtenaw County has to inspect his septic system for mortgage completion and refuses to do so if sewer is available. Fitzgerald and Daniels agreed to take care of the matter.

Some lights on the Christmas decorations are not hooked up, and Daniels agreed to take care of the matter. There is some material on sight for the new building. The drill truck was to start December 17, 1974.

A letter was received from Daniels with wage recommendations for Public Works hourly personnel. He requested the current cost of living wage increase with a review in six months. Further consideration will be given the matter upon receipt of the

Police Dept. recommendations for their personnel.

A letter was received from MSU regarding the potential flood hazard in Manchester. Daniels was requested to check into what result McNamee, Porter and Seeley's inquiry had had on the matter. The Village is now #327 on the Dept. of Natural Resources Wastewater Priority list.

Daniels was requested to invoice Manchester Township for their share on the carpeting and installation, and other improvements made to the Village Hall. Curley reported that the grant application for ChdBro Park has been in three weeks. He questioned plans for ice skating facilities for this winter. Daniels and Fitzgerald replied that the park area across from Wurster Park will be flooded when conditions warrant it. The Athletic Field area will not be flooded due to the constant ice breakage of past years.

Walton reported on the organizational meeting held in Tecumseh for the River Raisin Watershed Area. Regarding the Planning Commission meeting, Walton indicated that Sang Nam's group was confused on the wording for some parts of the ordinance. Leeson has taken down all the corrections and forwarded it to Sang Nam. It is to be corrected for approval at their next meeting. Daniels will contact Leeson regarding the height of the buildings.

There was a discussion regarding the appointment of judges for Christmas decorations. Walton suggested that instead of awarding prizes to residents for home

decorations, the money should be turned over to the school group responsible for the merchants' window decorations, so that the group might be encouraged to continue such a project in following years. Moved by Scully, supported by Fitzgerald that \$50 be donated to the Manchester Schools Window Decorating Contest in recognition of the fine job done. All years, carried. Moved by Walton, supported by Curley to adjourn at 9:25 pm. All years, carried.

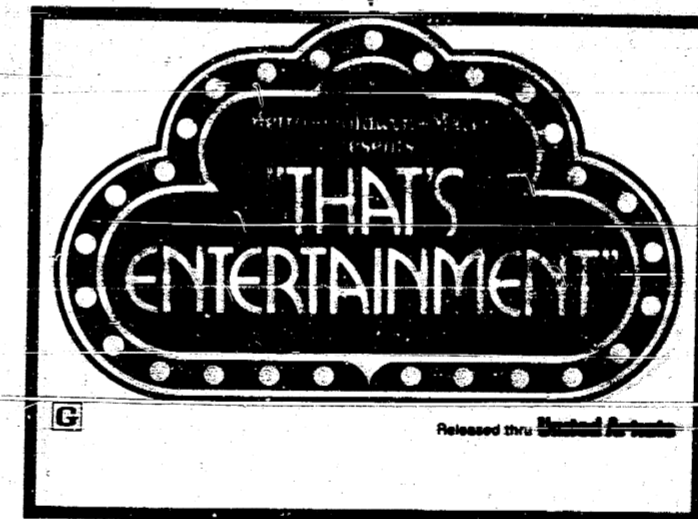

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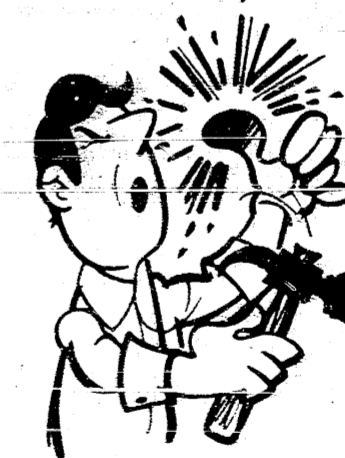
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ATTENDS PRE-TEACHING PROGRAM

Mary Ellen Simmons, 222 Hibbard, Manchester is one of the students involved in the fall and winter term pre-teaching sequence at Grand Valley State College.

A unique special education pre-teaching experience is half complete for 32 students at Grand Valley State College and Calvin College. The 20 week experience is offered to students of both colleges as part of the Grand Valley Educational Studies Institute program for students seeking certification as teachers in special education.

The 32 students are enrolled in an ESI program designed to lead to state certification to teach the trainable mentally impaired and emotionally impaired child. Calvin students participate in the program through a cooperative agreement that allows them to graduate from Calvin, but receive their credentials for certification from Grand Valley.

The pre-teaching experience, along with psychology and methods courses, is required of all students in the "regular track" special education curriculum. It is styled as an aiding program, in which the college students work for five hours each day under the direct supervision of certified teachers in special education situations.

The students now enrolled in the program have completed 10 weeks of the experience, and will return following the holiday recess to finish the sequence. The 20 week pre-teaching experience is listed in the Grand Valley catalogue as Education 349 and Education 350, and carries 10 hours of course credit in both the fall and winter quarters.

The pre-teaching work is designed to be completed in the junior year of college. Candidates for special education certification are also required to complete 10 weeks of regular student teaching.

as well as 20 weeks of actual student teaching in special education situations in their senior year under the Educational Studies Institute program at GVSC. The extensive field work then leads to certification for teaching in at least two areas of disability.

LOCAL STUDENT ATTENDS SEMINAR IN MEXICO

Marguerite E. Munson of Manchester is participating in a Study-Travel Seminar in Cuernavaca, Mexico, this winter. The STS is jointly sponsored by the religion and spanish departments of The College of Wooster.

Meg and 45 other students will study Latin American culture and explore contemporary issues in theology and social change at Cemanahuac Institute in Cuernavaca. In addition, participants with no knowledge of Spanish will be required to take it.

Located southwest of Mexico City, Cuernavaca is peculiarly suited to the Wooster program. Perfect year round weather makes it a refuge from Ohio winters.

More importantly, Cuernavaca has become a refuge for political and religious exiles from Latin America. Institutes to study social and political issues have sprung up and attract students from around the world. The combination gives the village an intellectual, cosmopolitan atmosphere.

Students earn one credit by taking a course from one of two Wooster professors accompanying the group. They earn the remaining two credits by enrolling in mini-courses at Cemanahuac Institute.

I am very concerned what is going on at our School Board meetings. I have been attending these meetings every month since June. The first few meetings I attended, the minutes of the previous meeting and the treasurers report were read. Then they stopped reading the two reports. At the December meeting the minutes were passed around to the board members for their approval. I contend this is not an open meeting. Also correspondence that is unfavorable to the administration is passed around to the board members.

Two matters especially disturbed me at the December meeting. The first was the paying of the bills. Mr. Swartz passed out sheets of paper to each board member which listed the bills that were outstanding. Mr. Evans made a request that this list be mailed to them before the meeting, so they would have time to study the bills. Mr. Swartz said the sheets were not printed in time to be mailed.

Back in June or July the list of bills were mailed to the board members. We now have a business manager and things are less efficient. But it didn't really matter whether they studied the bills payable, because Mr. Swartz said the checks had already been sent out. So why even have a board since Mr. Swartz does pretty much as he pleases.

The second matter that disturbed me, proves my above point. A discussion was held, about hiring a new teacher to handle the Study Halls and eighth hour detention. Mr. Evans said he would like this matter tabled until the next meeting, because this was the first he had heard about hiring a new teacher.

The Board voted on some other business, and then Mr. Swartz said the next order of business is the hiring of a new High School Teacher. He then proceeded to present the teachers supposed qualifications. Then Mr. Evans made a motion to table the hiring of the teacher until the next meeting. The motion was supported. Three voted for the motion, three against, and Mr. Klager broke the tie by voting against the motion. Then a motion was made to hire the new teacher. The motion was supported. Three for the

motion, three against and Mr. Klager broke the tie by voting for the motion. This is what will probably happen when Mr. Swartz's contract comes up for renewal. Three against and four for the renewal. The meetings I have attended, four of the members have never voted against anything Mr. Swartz wanted.

I challenge these four members, for once to really consider the students of Manchester, because I am seriously concerned that if Mr. Swartz's contract is renewed, the millage will not pass next June.

Thank you for your letter expressing an interest in the Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act, P.A. 116 of 1974. The Office of Land Use is presently in the final stages of writing administrative rules for use by all persons who will be involved in the program, i.e., applicants, local governing bodies, and the State. These rules must be approved by the Legislature before the program can be implemented by this Office.

We have established a "register" in the Office for those interested in either applying to enter the program or are interested in information on the program. As soon as the administrative procedures have been approved, a packet containing all pertinent information, including application forms, will be distributed to those individuals whose names appear on this register. I have placed your name on that register.

I would like to ask for your patience while we work as rapidly as possible in preparing this important program for implementation. As soon as the applications are ready, a package of information will be sent to you, along with extra copies of the application forms for those people interested in the program.

Those people who would like to be placed on our register can do so by sending a postcard with their name and mailing address and they will be placed on the register to receive the entire packet of information and application forms. 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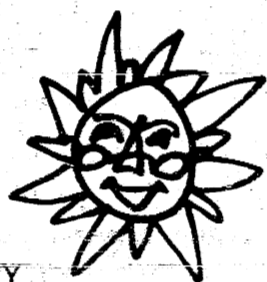

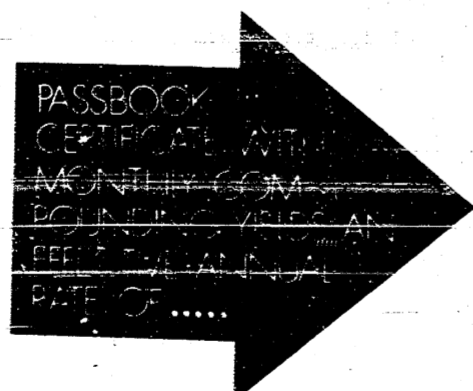

### ALIENS REQUIRED TO REPORT ADDRESSES

Armand J. Saltarelli, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month. Only the follow-

ing classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats, and (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Mr. Saltarelli said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

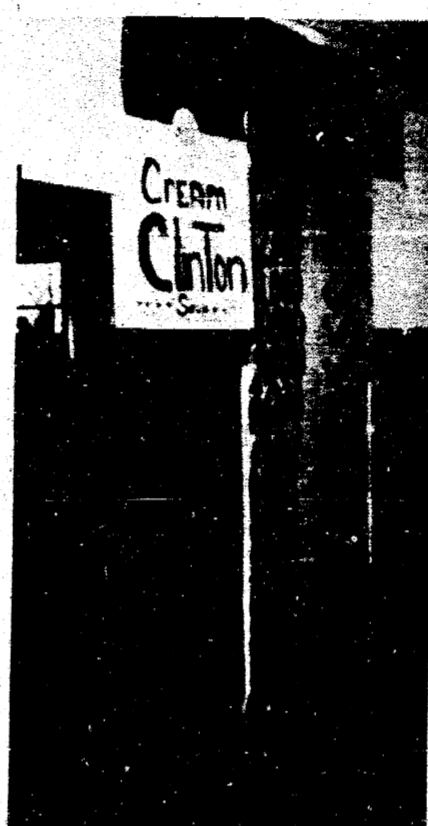
