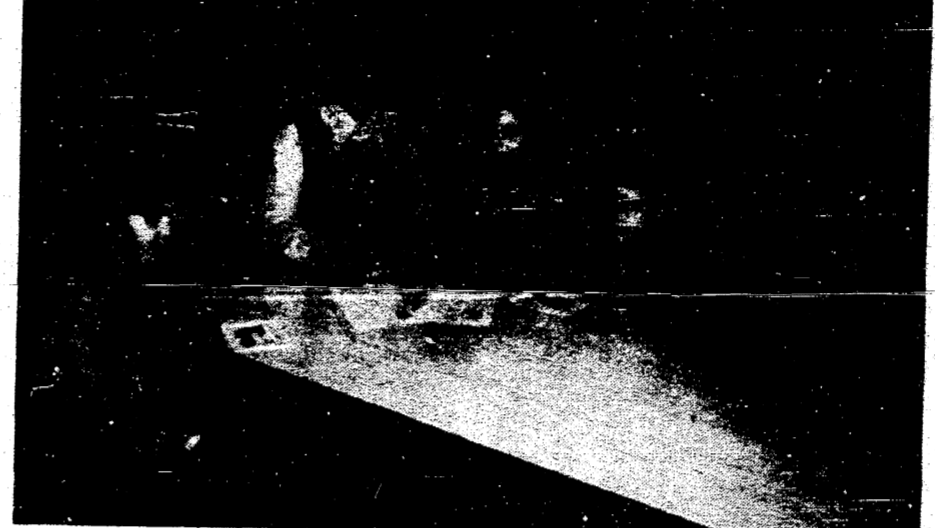

#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Editor, Manchester Enterprise

In an effort to correct an erroneous impression made by the author of a letter to this column last week, I submit the following.

Cathy Schlosser came to my office on Friday, January 17, 1975 with the request that she be allowed to view her school records. I immediately handed her the appropriate application form to be filled out for this purpose with a proper and adequate explanation. Because she is still under eighteen years of age the form required her parent's signature. After receiving the form she apparently became angry because she could not see her records immediately. When she demanded a time she could view her records I told

her the request would be granted within ten days after the signed request was received but in no event longer than 45 days as stipulated in our board adopted policy. At this point she angrily departed.

I certainly hold no animosity toward Cathy for her anger. On the contrary, I appreciate and understand a child's frustration in a situation where he has little knowledge of or do not understand. I do, however, want to clarify the implication that we are not in favor of revealing the information contained in student records. Years prior to this newly adopted national and state legislation I have shared this kind of information with parents when requested to do so. People in this community can attest to this fact. I also do not object to the legislation which now makes mandatory this sharing of heretofore classified school information. It is now necessary for school authorities to adhere to a prescribed procedure and that was what I was doing, although I am sure Cathy did not fully understand this at the time. Cathy, any other student or their parents following the school's adopted procedure can view their records at any time almost immediately after filing the application.

The charge made by the writer that school personnel will delete or alter vital information is simply not true. The information contained in these records deal with factual and documented evidence relative to a student's overall progress or growth in academic areas, attendance history, pertinent family data furnished by the family, relevant medical data which the school should be aware of and the results of various tests. This information is a permanent part of the CA60, and is never changed. Most of this material has already been seen by the parents in other forms (conference reports, report cards, attendance reports, etc.).

It is true, however, that in the transition from elementary to Middle School and from Middle School to high school teacher's work sheets on conferences and other trivia considered superfluous or no longer relevant may be eliminated for the sake of space needs. But these items were in no way meant to be a permanent part of a child's record in the first place. We

have neither the time nor the inclination to change permanent data in order that it might be more acceptable to the viewing parent or student. Our teachers and staff members are highly professional people who only record in these records meaningful and accurate information relative to the child's educational growth and development.

I would also like to point out that any other information requested (financial, statistical, board minutes, etc.) is available to anyone who wishes to see it. This is not a new practice. This is something that has always been done. Every request that has been made relative to this kind of information has been complied with. It is not always possible to furnish a great number of copies to people, but every effort will be made to make any and all information available to persons seeking this information.

YOUR SCHOOLS NEED YOU  
In today's Monitor several leaders in

education state what they think are the major issues facing United States schools and colleges. The list is formidable, starting with problems caused by a lack of money.

However, the underlying issue is not basically money but quality. This is not to underestimate the importance of financing to an adequate educational system. The need of communities to find a wider and more equitable base than property taxes to fund their school systems grows increasingly urgent. But money is only one of the factors determining the quality of education.

We are concerned that a recent study in the U.S. finds some two million children out of school altogether. That publishers of college textbooks say they must "simplify" their books for poorly trained students. That many inner-city minority children are labeled functionally illiterate when they graduate or drop out of school at the age of 16.

Organized teachers have been preoccupied for more than a decade with improving their financial status and working conditions. That these needed improving there is no doubt. But collective bargaining coupled with tenure laws have sometimes made it all but impossible for school systems to weed out the weak

teachers and promote the strong. Teacher-training colleges are not known to be exciting, dynamic, innovative, top-quality institutions. School principals and central administrators, who should be intellectual lead-

ers, are often chosen because of organizational not academic skills.

While the trend has been to turn the public schools over to paid educators, legal responsibility for running the schools is in the hands of lay boards of education. Hence the quality of schooling any child receives in the public schools of the state in which he resides is the responsibility of these school boards. And because the boards generally reflect the community at large - whether appointed or elected to office - the responsibility for what local public schools are like should rest squarely on the shoulders of every citizen.

In your community, are the teachers poorly trained and the pupils poorly taught? Is the curriculum outdated, the school atmosphere uninviting? Are the playgrounds neglected? Do half the students leave the schools without a marketable skill and unprepared for entrance to college? Do the pupils dislike learning?

If so, the responsibility is in large measure yours. The quality of the local public schools in your community directly reflects the quality of thought you have given these schools and your involvement in them.

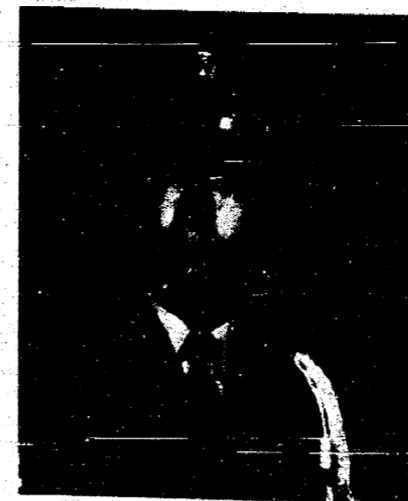

### MANCHESTER PUBLIC SCHOOL'S BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

The regular meeting of the Manchester Public School's Board of Education was held in the High School Library on Monday, January 13, 1975. All board members were present as were Supt. Swartz, Bus. Mgr. Misner and Principals Kocestki, Tapping and McGuire.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Board President Klager. The first order of business was approval of the minutes of the previous meeting. There were no corrections and the minutes were approved.

The payment of utilities to Consumers Power, Detroit Edison and Michigan Bell Telephone was presented next. It was moved by Walter and supported by Vogel that the utilities be approved for payment. Motion carried.

Under communications, a thank you note from Don Tassie was acknowledged. Also, Mr. Swartz read a letter of resignation from Steve Chapman as Assistant Principal. After some discussion, it was moved by Evans and supported by Walkow that the resignation be accepted with regrets. Motion carried.

The results of the meeting held on January 6, 1975 with parents, high school students and board members was discussed. Mr. Swartz read the proposed amendment to the Washington Trip policy. It was moved by Walter and supported by Feldkamp that the proposed amendment be adopted. Motion carried. A copy of the amendment is included.

The proposed changes in insurance coverage were presented by Bus. Mgr. Misner. It was recommended that the valuation of the buildings and personal property, for insurance purposes, be increased to \$5,144,474 and the deductible be increased from \$250 to \$1,000. Also, it was recommended that the burglary insurance be increased from \$2,000 to \$12,000 at the high school and an additional \$2,000,000 liability insurance be purchased. It was moved by Walkow and supported by Feldkamp that the recommended action be taken. Motion carried.

A career Education Counseling Program using "lay counselors" from local businesses and industry was outlined by Mr. Swartz. It was moved by Vogel and supported by Walter that all establishments be contacted for participation in the program as soon as possible. Motion carried. John Korican outlined the requirements for football helmets to be in use by 1978. The Bus. Mgr. was directed to check with other districts to see if any savings could be realized through mass purchasing of helmets before ordering on an individual basis.

Board Member Evans brought a problem before the board concerning Cathy Schlosser's dismissal from the girls' volleyball team. Barbara Lund, School Social Worker, spoke for Cathy. John Korican, Athletic Director, outlined the verbal policy regarding training rules which all participants in the athletic program must abide by. Phyllis Seebach, Girls' Volleyball Coach, also spoke about the policy and Cathy Schlosser's behavior which resulted in her dismissal from the team. After some discussion, it was agreed by

the board members that this was not a matter for the school board. It was moved by Feldkamp and supported by Walkow that the dismissal be referred back to the Coach, Athletic Director, Principal and School Social Worker. Motion carried. Members of the community were given an opportunity to express their concerns. These concerns were in regards to the approval of bills, reading of the minutes of previous meetings and athletic discipline.

Board Member Feldkamp reminded the board that it was time administrator contracts should be discussed. Board President Klager scheduled a meeting for Monday, January 20, 1975. Mr. Klager pointed out that the meeting would be in executive session because personnel were to be discussed.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:00 p.m.
