her the request would be granted within ten days after the signed request was received but in no event longer than 45 days as stipulated in our board adopted policy. At this point she angrily departed. I certainly hold no animosity toward Cathy for her anger. On the contrary, I

appreciate and understand a child's frustration in a situation they have little knowledge of or do not understand, I do, however, want to clarify the implication that we are not in favor of revealing the information contained in student records. Years prior to this newly adopted national and state legislation I have shared this kind of information with parents when requested to do so. People in this community can attest to this fact. I also do not object to the legislation which now makes mandatory this sharing of heretofore classified school information. It is now necessary for school authorities to adhere to a prescribed procedure and that was what I was doing, although I am sure Cathy did not fully understand this at the time. Cathy, any other student or their parents following the school's adopted procedure can view their records at any time almost immediately after filing the application.

The charge made by the writer that school personnel will delete or alter vital information is simply not true. The information contained in these records deal with factual and documented evidence relative to a student's overall progress or growth in academic areas, attendance history, pertinent family data furnished by the family, relevant medical data which the school should be aware of and the results of various tests. This information is a permanent part of the CA60, and is never changed. Most of this material has already been seen by the parents in other forms (conference reports, report cards,

The notary public or other officer administering the ooth shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO YOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, wiship, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vore of any person whose name is not registrated in the registration ok of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City of Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the sare he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and practical number and record the new address, ward and precised number on the arigined and deplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration and in proper precised file. Such transfers shall not be made ofter the 30th day next preceding any election or primary election, enteres such 30th day shall fall on a Saturday, Sunday or a legal heliday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 207. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township. City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clark shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new resistance address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The importance of election in charge of the registration records shall compose the signature appropriate upon the application is required. The application for transfer, ofter having signed an application to vote as previded in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for their primary or election only. 


