The Clerk shall transmit the application and information to each member of the Board of Appeals within three (3) days of the filing date.

C. Information Required - Each application for a variance shall contain the following

1, legal description, address, and tax parcel number of subject lot.

2, houndary survey, showing all property lines, dimensions, and bearings of angles, correlated with the legal description; all existing and proposed structures and uses on the premises, and dimensions of such structures and their dimensioned locations; lot area and all calculations necessary to show compliance with regulations of the zoning ordinance.

3. name and address of applicant, property owner(s), interest of applicant in the

D. Required Conditions - A variance shall not be granted by the Board of Appeals unless and until all of the following conditions are met: 1. A written application for a variance is submitted, demonstrating:

a, that special conditions and circumstances exist which are peculiar to the land, structure, or building involved and which are not applicable to other lands, structures or buildings in the same district;

b. that literal interpretation of the provisions of this ordinance would deprive the applicant of rights commonly enjoyed by other properties in the same district under the terms of this Ordinance.

c. that the special conditions and circumstances do not result from the actions of the applicant; or

d, that granting the variance requested will not confer on the applicant any special privilege that is denied by this Ordinance to other lands, structures, or buildings in the same district.

2. Any nonconforming use of neighboring lands, structures or buildings in the same district, any permitted nonconforming uses of lands, structures or buildings in other districts, any nonconforming structures shall not be considered grounds for the issuance of a variance.

3. The Board of Appeals shall find that the requirements of Section 24, 12 D-1,

herein, have been satisfactorily met by the applicant. 4. The Board of Appeals shall further find that the reasons set forth in application justify the granting of the variance, and that it is the minimum variance that will

make possible the reasonable use of the land, building or structure. 5. The Board of Appeals shall further find that the granting of the variance will be in harmony with the intent of this ordinance, and will not be injurious to the

neighborhood, or otherwise detrimental to the public interest. 6. In granting any variance, the Board of Appeals may establish appropriate conditions and safeguards in conformity with this Ordinance. Violations of such conditions and safeguards, when made a part of the terms under which the variance is granted, shall be deemed a violation of this Ordinance, and punishable under

Section 20-10, herein. 7. Under no circumstances shall the Board of Appeals grant a variance to allow a use not permitted under the terms of this Ordinance in the district involved, or any use expressly or by implication prohibited by the terms of this Ordinance

SECTION 24-12 - VOIDING OF VARIANCE Each variance granted under the provisions of this Ordinance shall become null and void unless the construction authorized by such variance has been commenced within one hundred eighty (180) days after the granting of such variance and pursued diligently to completion, or the occupancy of land or buildafter the granting of such variance.

If the tenant's name is not known, the term occupant may be used. If the notice is delivered by mail, an affadavit of mailing should be filed with the Planning Commission prior to the hearing. The notice shall be made at least eight (8) days prior to the hearing stating the time, place, date and purpose of the hearing. The Flanning Commission shall also give notice of the public hearing by two (2) publications in a newspaper of general circulation in Freedom Township, the first to be printed not more than thirty (30) days nor less than twenty (20) days and the second nor more than eight (8) days before the date of such hearing. Not less than twenty (20) days notice of the time and place of such hearing shall also be given by certified mail to each electric, gas, pipeline and telephone public utility company that registers its name and mailing with the Planning Commission for the purpose of receiving such notice, and to each railroad operating within the district or zone affected. The notices shall include the places and times at which the tentative text and any maps of the proposed amendment may be examined. The Planning Commission shall also, for any proposed amendment to the zoning map within three hundred (300) feet of the boundary of any adjacent municipality, send by regular US mail a written notice of the public hearing to the zoning agencies of said municipalities and to the School Board of the school district in which the subject property in located, in order that coordination with adjacent zoning ordinances may be promoted. 

To the Taxpayers of Manchester Town-

Michigan statute requires that the assessing officer review the assessments in their jurisdiction as of December 31 annually. It is the legal responsibility of the assessing officer to assess everyone at 50% of market value as of this date.

The County Board of Commissioners, also in compliance with State statutes, reviews the assessment rolls of all units of government within the county. This review is performed by the Board of Commissioners through the Equalization Department. The Equalization Department is required by law to publish tentative factors for all taxing units so they are aware of the adjustments necessary to bring their assessments to 50% of value Daughters will meet at the Methodist as of December 31st. If the County Board Church.

Commissioners does not equate every unit of government to 50% of value, the State Tax Commission adds a value on the county and each local unit of government must then take its proportionate share of this increase. The Equalization Department of Washtenaw County has made a study of both real and personal property in Manchester Township and issued a real tentative factor of 1.06 and personal property factor of 1.05. A factor of 1.00 means an assessing unit is assessing at 50% of value.

Manchester Township's factor indicates that 6% must be added to the real property rolls and 5% to the personal property assessments to bring them to 50% of value as of December 31, 1974. As your supervisor and assessing officer I will, therefore, be required to make adjustments in the 1975 assessment roll. These rolls will be open for inspection by the public at the Township Hall when the Board of Review convenes in March 1975.
