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



Pastor Alan Morris The great Apostle Paul in writing to the Christians at Ephesus reminded them of ormer times when they in the state of 'Having no hope, and without God in the world" (Ephesians 2:12b), I can think of nothing more distressing than the feeling of having nothing to hope for and not knowing or caring how to call upon God. One of the saddest accounts found in the Bible is that of King Saul of Israel.

Saul was a man of great ability and potential but due to self-will and sin became a disgrace to the throne and was removed by God.

Saul evidently recognized the greatness and power of God and on occasions gave outward evidence of submission to God. However, many Bible scholars doubt that king Saul as ever converted. In 1 Samuel hapter 28 poor Saul has hit "rock boftom" and resorted to the ungodly practice to consulting a "fortune teller" to reveal his future. Notice his anguish in verse 15. "I am sore distressed; for the Philistines make war against me, and God is departed from me, and answereth me no more..." Here was a man without hope. 

A veterinary technician who is also a Michigan State University graduate with four years experience will be assisting the Veterinarian.

The clinic was established to provide birth control by spaying and neutering pets at the lowest cost possible to the public, thereby reducing the number of unwanted pupples and kittens. 



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. I understand that interest rates on Government insured mortgages have been lowered recently. Can you tell me what the rate is now and what that means for the average

The maximum allowable interest rate for mortgages insured by the Federal Housing Administration was lowered from 9 to 81/3 % in January. A similar decrease was ordered in the maximum rate for GI home mortgage loans. Of course, that means lower costs for home buyers. For

example, for the person who assumes a \$30,000 mortgage the reduced rate will save \$10.80 on his monthly pay-

When interest rates move down, it generally signals that more mortgage money is available. And that means more people will be able to build or buy homes—which, in turn, provides important stimulus for the economy as a whole. I was so glad that Congress finally did something about pension reform. Where can I find out more about how

these changes in the pension law affect me?

A new 33-page booklet is available that explains the new pension reform law and how it applies to employees, employers, labor unions, banks and other financial institutions. It's entitled "News About the Employee-Retirement Income Security Act of 1974," and you can get a copy free by writing to the Labor Management Services Administration, 234 State Street, Detroit, Michigan 48226.

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


