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Middle School Activity Period

One of the tasks of the Middle School Task Force is letting people know what's happening. These pictures are part of a happening that is called Activity Period.
Some time ago the Middle School teaching staff decided to come up with something to unify the school as it was too much 5th and 6th grades "here" and the 7th and 8th grades "over there." Something to supplement the curriculum was desired as present offerings were limited by space, teaching staff and time. An activities class was agreed upon; the teachers volunteering to offer various activities, realizing all preparatory work would be done by them in addition to regular class work. The space was achieved by using present classrooms and the time necessary for these activities was achieved by shortening the four morning classes by 15 minutes each.
Activity classes were set up to run one hour a week, Wednesday's, for four consecutive weeks. The four one-day-a-week sessions are held three times a year: Fall, Winter and Spring, making up a total of 12 hours a year. The list of offered activities is posted and students sign up for whatever they would like to try.
Activities offered for Winter were Square Dancing, Making a 5-Peg Game Board, Models, Quilting, Flying, Crocheting, Reading for Pleasure, Exploration (Job careers, etc.), Coed Volleyball, Table Tennis, Short Field Trips, Braiding and Lacing, Field and Stream Club, First Aid, Table Games, Chess and Checkers, Banner Making, Blue-jean Embroidery, Sketching, Still Life Art and String Art.
Another important part of this program is the fact that other people of the community volunteer their special skills to the students.
But most important is the fact that the four grades all inter-mix and participate in something that is not only educational but fun.
A display of activity projects is planned at the April 10th Open House. Plan to visit and see what our students are doing.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Being a professional in the field of alcoholism, I must take issue with Pastor Bill Enslin's letter in the March 13 issue of the Enterprise concerning his apparent ignorance of the illness.

First of all, the "X" factor: Not all people who drink become alcoholic, no matter how much they drink, therefore, it is obvious there is a difference in metabolism in some people which makes them prone to the addictive process of the illness. Alcohol does not cause alcoholism any more than sugar causes diabetes. Many people do not "sin" by abuse of alcohol until the addictive process begins and the compulsion is triggered. Once this process has begun, the person cannot control the amount he drinks.

Secondly, alcohol releases the inhibitions wiping out what we call will power. Pastor Enslin will understand this by using

his will power the next time he has diarrhea.

I agree that irresponsible drinking certainly causes many problems in our society, but trying to ban it completely has always been impossible and unrealistic.

The real fact is that if alcoholism was just a moral problem, as Pastor Enslin wrongly believes, then all the alcoholic priests and ministers I've worked with over the years simply wouldn't exist.

I suggest he do a little research into the illness before he presents the opinions he calls facts concerning this illness called alcoholism. I rather doubt that Blue Cross could be forced into paying for a bad habit.

The undersigned has learned that the re-application of THE LITHUANIAN NAVAL NATIONAL GUARD IN EXILE, INC. for a conditional use permit, for the establishment and operation of a rifle and pistol firing range and private camp ground, is based upon the re-locating of their firing points and target butts, so that, instead of aiming and firing their weapons from West to East as originally proposed last year, the applicant parties now intend to aim and fire their weapons from North to South.

This in no manner changes the exposure and hazards which must have been part of the basis for the rejection of the original application in 1974. This does increase the hazard and becomes a source of the gravest sort that could lead to the possible injury and/or death of not only persons resident in the exposed area, including hundreds of adults and children who will be using the Dainava Campgrounds, South of Austin Road, but will now include every person who would be peacefully and legally using Austin Road, which is a part of our established road system.

The writer wishes to point out that the above indicated Corporate group is in no way a part of, or to the best of my knowledge, affiliated with the Dainava

camp group. It is of vital interest to every resident of the Village of Manchester, and residents of surrounding townships, and all persons who do or may travel on our local road system. Therefore, if you are vitally interested and concerned in the welfare and safety of your families and friends please attend the meeting of the Manchester Township Zoning Board when the hearing on the above re-application will be held on Monday, March 24, at 8 P.M., in the meeting rooms on the second floor of the fire hall in village.


Thank you all so much. We hope we got to talk with you all personally to say thanks and living in a community like Manchester we probably will.

Whatever the problem, whether it be difficulty with living arrangements, inability to make ends meet, a need for companionship, health or medical problems, a need for help with odd jobs around the home, or family problems, the Information Referral Service will try to help. The people who work there are friendly, concerned people who have time to talk, who will take the time to give your problem individual attention. Their primary function is to locate and refer you to an agency which can meet your need. But, they won't simply refer and forget you. They are committed to listening to and following-up on whatever problems are presented. Give them a call any working day between 9:00 AM and 4:45 PM at 663-6600, or go to the information and referral desk in the Social Security Office, 2929 Plymouth Rd., Ann Arbor. A helpful volunteer will try to find an agency that can offer a solution to your problem.

Hot Lunches are now being offered in Chelsea as a part of a federally sponsored project for the convenience of seniors. Donations (\$.25 minimum) are requested, but for those who cannot afford to donate, the meals will be offered without charge. These hot lunches are served Monday through Friday at the St. Mary's school at 400 Congdon in Chelsea at 12:00; rides are available for those seniors who need them. Call the Emanuel Church office (428-8359) to arrange daily transportation

to and from Chelsea. It is important to emphasize that the hot lunch comprises only a part of the program; because the lunch is followed by conversation and enjoyable activities each day of the week—bingo, Euchre, crafts, and so on—for those who wish to stay and participate. The Chelsea hot lunch program needs to average 30 participants daily in order to keep their federal grant, but they are now falling short of that number. So, please don't hesitate to help them by helping yourself to some good food at the Chelsea hot lunch program.

The Senior Citizen's Center will be open again this Tuesday, the 25th of March for conversation, refreshments, and Bingo—prizes will be awarded. The Seniors' Center is non-denominational; all seniors are welcome. We hold our activities in the fellowship hall of the Emanuel Church from 1:00 to 4:00 PM. See you there!

Twentieth Century Club Meeting


