## Twentieth Century Club Meeting

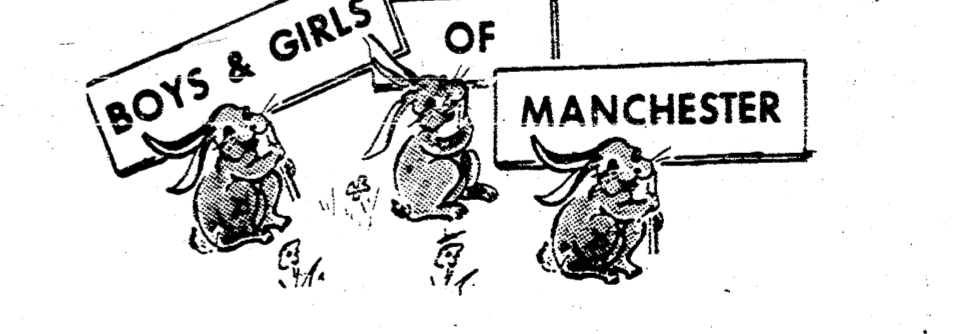
The Twentieth Century Club met Tuesday evening March 18th at the home of Mrs. Ted Tapping with 18 members present.

Minutes from the February 17 regular meeting were read and approved as corrected in a motion by Curley, supported by Fitzgerald. All yeas, carried.

Mr. and Mrs. Clare Fisher were present in conjunction with their request to upgrade the Village Tap license from a tavern license to a Class C license. Zsenyuk reported on his inspection of the premises, and recommended that the Class C license be issued. Moved by Fitzgerald and supported by Curley that the request from Clare J. Fisher, for transfer of classification of 1974 Tavern license to a Class C license, to be held in conjunction with the existing SDM license, located at 237 E. Main St., Manchester, Michigan, Washtenaw County, under Act No. 144 P.A. 1973 be considered for approval. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony that the Village Council adopt a resolution governing the format of the election for Consumers Power Company's Franchise Proposition and the publication of the resulting resolution. All yeas, carried.

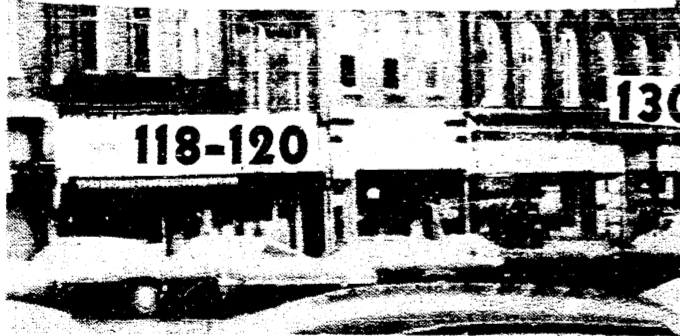

## Track Profile



Senior Track Co-Captains Phil Krzyzaniak and Kurt Kensler



About a decade ago the New York Yankees were enjoying the benefits of the back-to-back power of the MM duo, Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle. Well this spring, Manchester High Coach Larry Steeb is hoping the KK duo of Kurt Kensler and Phil Krzyzaniak will provide the needed punch to propel the Flying Dutchmen to their best season in years.

Kensler has lettered each of the past 3 seasons and has been part of all 3 of the school's record setting relay teams. In 1972 Kurt teamed up with Scott Limpert, Mark Spencer, and Mark Tassie to

set the 46.9, 440 relay mark and the 1:36.8, 880 relay standard. This past year Kurt blazed a 52.9 440 leg on the record setting mile relay team along with Dave Guenther, Bruce Cray and fellow co-captain Phil Krzyzaniak. The teams time was 3:34.4 and as 3 of teams performers return this season chances are that the time will be lowered this spring.

Kurt is not just a good relayist though as he can lay claim to the 2nd fastest 440 yd. dash time in the schools history and hopes to break the record this season. In addition to running the 440 and the relays Kurt will also high jump this spring. Kurt was a member of the Dutchmens fine cross-country and basketball teams already this year.

The Dutchmens other fine captain this spring, Phil Krzyzaniak, will be in a familiar role as he has already been a captain of the cross-country and the wrestling teams. A three sport captain is indeed a rarity and the honor alone attests for his athletic ability and the high regard his teammates hold for him. Phil like Kurt is gunning for an individual track record to go with the record both are after in the mile relay, Phil is a threat to both the 880 and 2 mile records this spring and could easily end his career as a league champion as well.

Phil may well be the most versatile middle distance runner in the area as he is capable of a fine time in the 440, 880, mile or 2 mile runs.

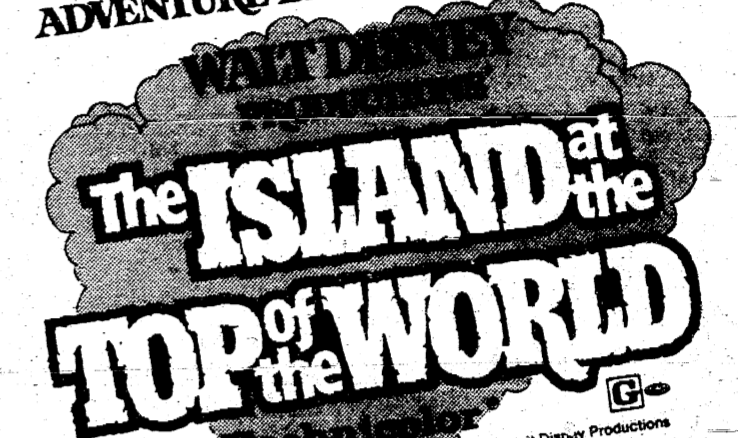
We hope that both Kurt and Phil will be successful this spring in their quest for records and that the punch they provide will help the team to a fine season.

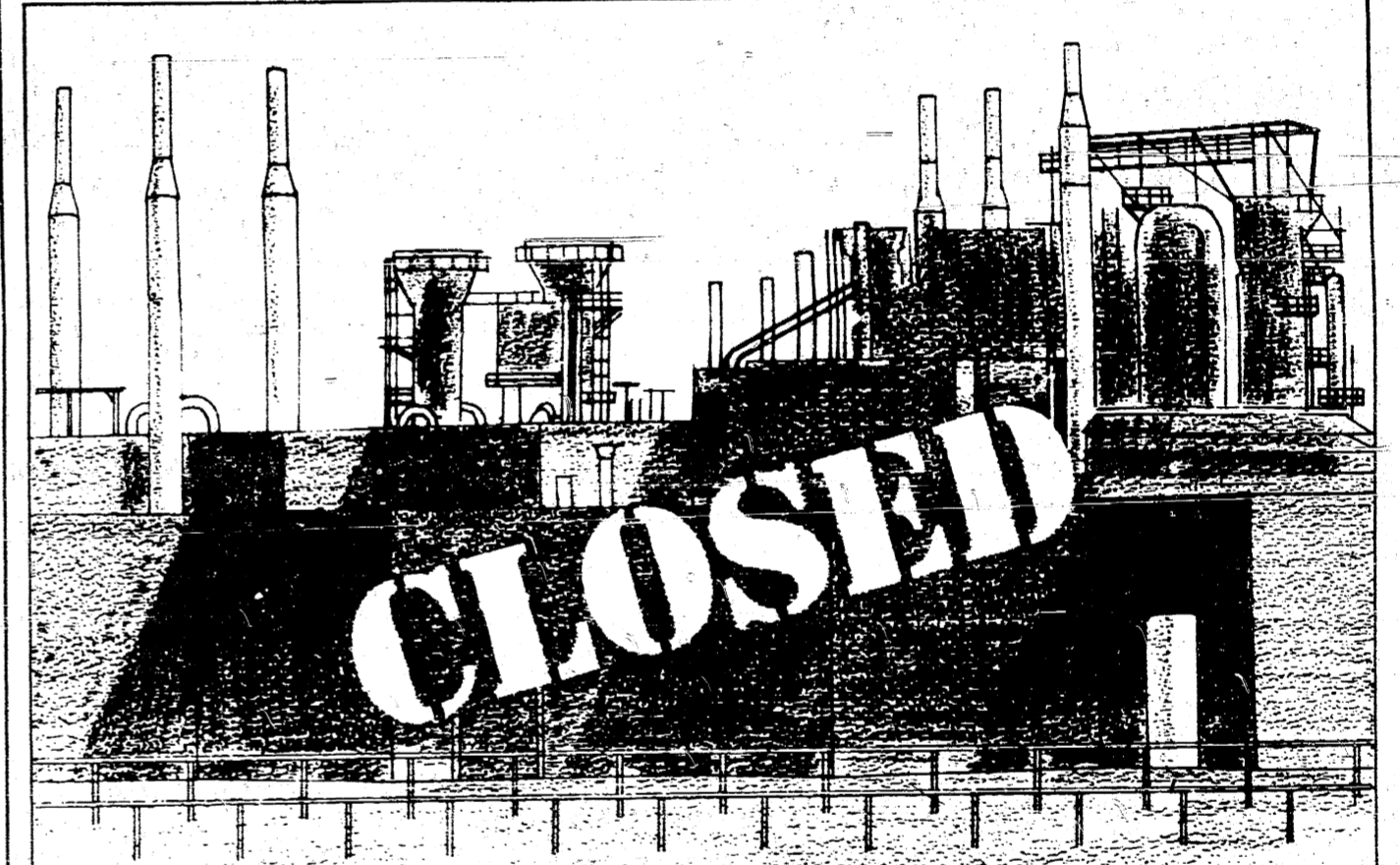

### Manchester School Board Minutes

The regular meeting of the Manchester Public School District Board of Education was held on Monday, March 10, 1975 in the High School Library. All board members were present with the exception of Mr. Walkow. Also present were Supt. Swartz, Bus. Mgr. Misner, Principals Koceski, Tapping, Tassie and McGuire.

The meeting was called to order at 8:02 P.M. by Board President Klager. Visitors were welcomed at this time.

The first order of business was approval of the minutes of the workshop on February 24, 1975. There were no corrections and the minutes were approved as mailed.

The financial report and bills were postponed until the workshop to be held on Monday, March 24, 1975. It was moved by Vogel and supported by Evans that payment be approved for payoff of the \$80,000 balance of the state aid note plus interest amounting to \$4,084.84, and three checks to the senior trip sponsors for \$35.00 each. Motion carried.

A card of thanks was acknowledged from Mr. and Mrs. Brian Schick.

A letter from Lawrence J. Molloy, Program Supervisor, W.L.S.D. was read. Two Manchester High School students, Michael Barker and Micky Lantis, who entered the Washtenaw County Computer

Club contest were praised for their outstanding effort. Both students placed second in the contest.

It was moved by Walter and supported by Evans that permission be granted for installing the concrete pilings on the southeast corner of the athletic field provided a gate is also installed in that corner to cut down on the traffic on the athletic field. Motion carried.

An Administrative recommendation relative to the transfer of dormant senior class funds to a contingency fund was tabled by the Board of Education pending further study. There is available in these funds a total of \$1534.40 from the senior class of 1971 through 1974. Monies in the contingency fund would be used to buy equipment for the food tent and maintain the present equipment used in connection with this activity.

Teacher evaluations were postponed until the remaining evaluations were completed by the principals.

Approval for summer school programs was requested by Mr. Swartz. Classes to be offered include Elementary Reading and Math and High School Band. It was moved by Vogel and supported by Luckhardt that approval be given provided funds are available.

Bids on the station wagon for special education transportation were opened next. The bids were as follows: Tirb Chevrolet Co.-Chevrolet 9 Pass.-\$4,284.12; Tom Marshall Inc.-Ford 9 Pass.-\$4,350.62;

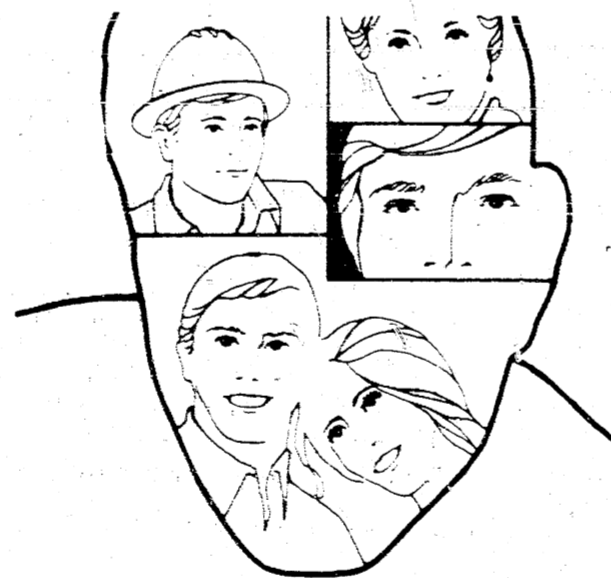

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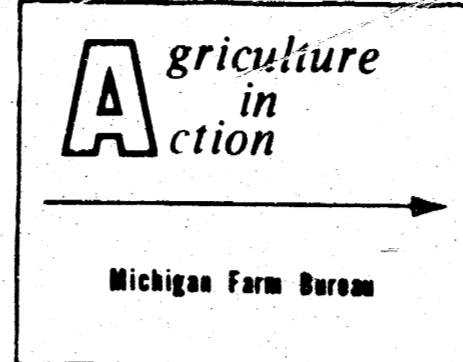

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If the day comes when you're traveling through the countryside and spot a portable toilet trailed behind a tractor as it moves across the field-Eureka! You've just discovered one reason for the rising cost of food.

What does a portable potty have to do with your food bill? Believe it or not—they're directly related, along with many other burdensome, unrealistic, costly regulations hoisted on food producers, and ultimately, on consumers, too.

Current legislation being proposed is the Field Sanitation Act—more commonly known as "The Potty Bill." If passed, it would require farmers to provide suitable, separate toilets for each sex (properly screened, ventilated and kept clean) in any field which is an "unreasonable" distance from a central toilet facility.

"Unreasonable" is subject to interpretation. For some, the distance would be shorter than for others....

Some farmers, where fields or orchards are exceptionally large, presently provide field toilet facilities. Farm workers may work in several different fields during one day, and the installation of permanent toilet facilities in each field would be impractical, costly, and cause unnecessary work for farmers, without providing significant benefits. Portable facilities are also costly, renting for \$50 to \$53 per month, and would have to be moved from field to field.

This legislation appears to be promoted by persons far removed from agricultural field work. M.J. Buschlen, Operations Manager of the Michigan Agricultural Services Association, recently interviewed some agricultural workers to determine if their needs were not currently being met. Those interviewed said they could not recall any instances in Michigan where toilets were not close enough to the fields. One of the workers said, "For Heaven's sake, don't make any more laws...we'll lose our jobs."

Since farm workers aren't asking for field toilets and the passage of such legislation would mean increased food costs and increased unemployment, the only reason for the proposal seems to be that they would be nice to have.

For the benefit of farmers, farm workers, and consumers, the Potty Bill should be "flushed" down the legislative drain.

#### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Act number 261 of 1968, the "Public Meetings Act" (MCLA 15.251; MSA 4.1800). This law requires that school boards conduct public meetings whereat the vote of each board member is publicly recorded in matters such as the hiring or re-hiring of the superintendent of schools. I call this law to your attention because some school boards around the state have attempted to circumvent the law; the courts have held that the Public Meeting Act does apply to any board decision regarding the employment of the superintendent.

Mr. Macomber is also disturbed by the board's apparent unwillingness to make available copies of the board minutes to the public. I think this is an unfortunate situation; it seems to me that the extra effort needed to duplicate a dozen or so copies of the minutes would be well rewarded by having an informed citizenry.

My client does have the right to access to the school board minutes; the law says that this includes the right to obtain a photocopy of the minutes. Mr. Macomber will exercise this right, and I have instructed him to go to the Superintendent's office on the morning of every scheduled board meeting to obtain a copy of the minutes.
