

Township Report

The regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board was held at the Village Hall Monday, March 10, 1975 at 8 p.m. The members present were Clarence Fielder, Waldo Marx, Dorothy Burch, Ambrose Lentz and Lyle Widmayer.

The minutes of the regular meeting held at 8 p.m. Monday, February 10, 1975 were read by the clerk.

It was moved by Lyle Widmayer and supported by Ambrose Lentz that these minutes be accepted as read. Motion carried.

The following bills were then presented by the clerk to the township board to be paid.

It was moved by Dorothy Burch and

seconded by Lyle Widmayer that these bills be paid as read. Motion carried.

At the township meeting of January 14, 1975 at 8 p.m. case #2-104-73 was brought up for Manchester Township to vote on a zoning change of property in Manchester Township located on the South West corner of Austin and Grossman Road intersection.

It was decided to deny changing of zoning A-1 agriculture to I-1 industrial and to table parcel to be zoned B-1 General Business for more information. At the March 10 Township Board Meeting it was moved by Dorothy Burch and seconded by Ambrose Lentz that the zoning change of described property on S.W. corner of Grossman Road and Austin Road be approved. The part that had been tabled for more information at the January 14 meeting was now zoned C-C General Commercial.

The motion was passed by a unanimous vote—all five members of the board, Dorothy Burch, Clarence Fielder, Lyle Widmayer, Ambrose Lentz and Waldo Marx voted in favor of the motion. Motion carried.

Lyle Moore the Manchester Township Zoning Inspector reported complaints from the Washtenaw County Health Department about several places in the township where litter and rubbish had been dumped along the roadside. This is against the law and there is no excuse for it because we have a transfer site in our township where citizens can dispose of their litter without charge. All they need is a free permit card obtainable at the township office. There being no further business the

meeting was adjourned.

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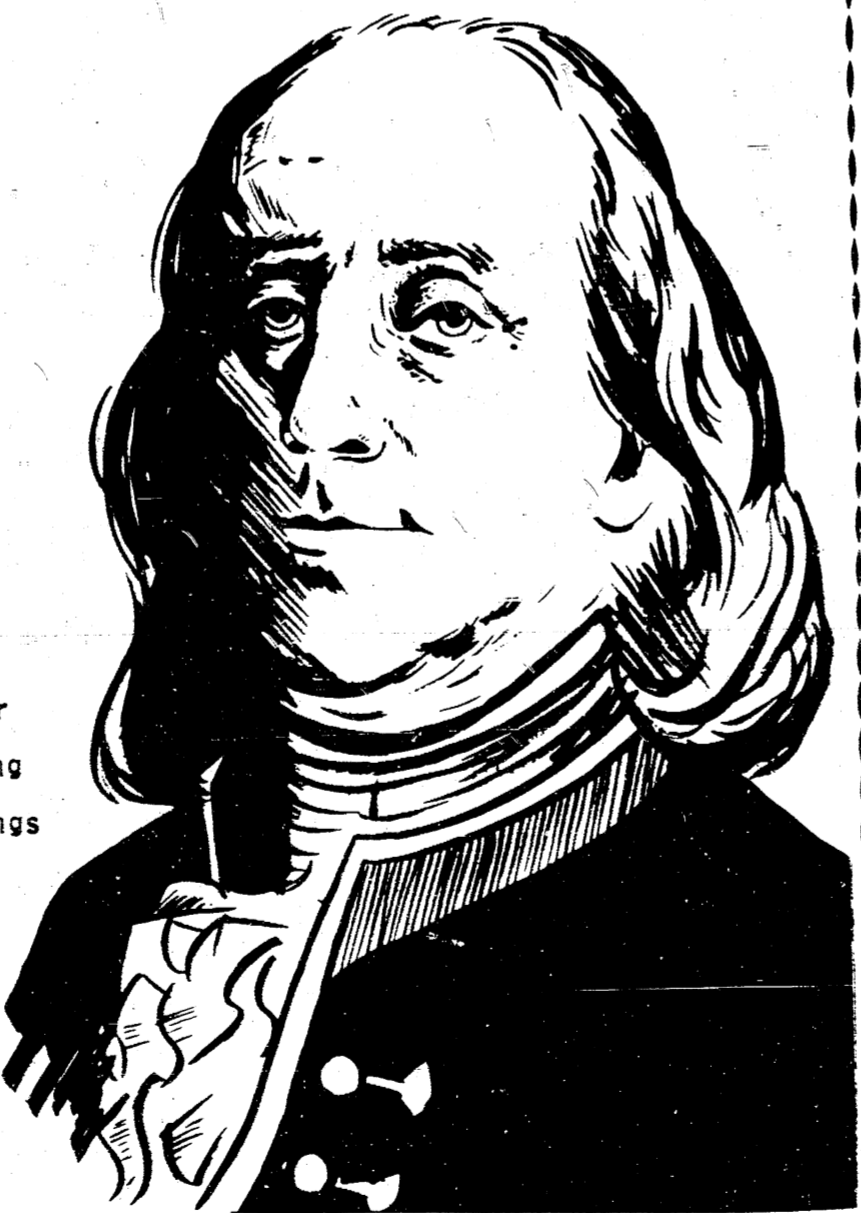

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TRACKMEN APPEAR STRONGER IN RUNNING EVENTS THIS YEAR



Juniors, Dave Guenther and Randy Bennett are being counted on to score heavily this spring.

A few times last spring our Manchester High trackmen would go into the running events with as much as 30 points (out of a possible 96) from the 4 field events (shot-put, high jump, long jump and pole vault) and yet wind up with only 50 or so points at the end of the 11 running events. Well, this season, Dutch Coach Larry Steeb feels that the team has strengthened itself in the sprints and hurdles the weakest points in the trackmen's attack and hopefully will have more balanced, winning performances.

The hurdles should be much improved this season as last year's top performer, Freshman Pete Tassie, returns and looks to be much improved. Junior Randy Bennett is capable of good times in both the highs and lows but hopefully won't have to run them as much this season if newcomers Dan Hassett, Jamie Galinis and pole vaulter Mike Forner perform up to expectations.

The sprint events (100, 220 & 440 yd. dashes) will return Dave Guenther, and Kurt Kensler, both capable of school record 440 times as well as fine performances in the 100 and 220. Lending support, will be Randy Bennett, Tom Fitzgerald, and 1st year Juniors Matt Little and Dan Coval as well as 1st year Sophomore Dave Hoover. From this group a strong 880 relay should emerge, but by the time the 440 relay rolls around the Dutchmen's lack of depth may be showing.

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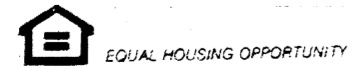

personally feels that Romans 1: 22 was never more truer than when it is applied to those theologians and college and seminary professors that attract the very truth they make pretense to teach. For truly, "Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools."

The Bible is a spiritual book and it will take a spiritual mind to understand it. God reveals the deep truths of His word only to those who have been converted and have had their hearts and minds enlightened and made alive by the Holy Spirit.

The Devil is at work in the heart of the unconverted to keep them from spiritual understanding "But if our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that are lost: in whom the god of this world (Satan) hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them" (2 Corinthians 3: 3,4).

There are many new Bible translations, versions, and paraphrases on the market today. A few are good but most water down the truth. Especially the paraphrases, which are not word for word translations, but give the overall thought of the verse. Regardless of how many of the newer versions people read if the mind is not spiritual then there will be very little, if any, spiritual understanding.

We honestly believe that the King James Version is God's Word for our day. Since the day King James of England ordered its translation and it made its first appearance in 1611, this version has stood the test of time and has proved itself to have the blessings of God upon it. No one will ever go astray if he will prayerfully and consistently stay with this version.

We must not expect Bible study to be easy. It will take all the power of concentration we can muster. And naturally, the illumination of the Holy Spirit.

When the human body acts without intelligent direction from the head we call it insanity. And if follows, that when the church acts without specific direction from its head (Christ, or the Bible) we have spiritual insanity.

In Ephesians 5, we are told that Christ is the Head, and that the church is His body. Luke 16:15 says "that which is highly esteemed in the sight of men is abomination in the sight of God," in both the New and the Old Testaments we are warned not to take away or add to that which is written in the Bible. God's word gives direction for sane Christian living—we need not err.

Perhaps the most outstanding observation of spiritual insanity is seen in the celebration of heathen holidays, which have been designated as "Christian equivalents" of Bible happenings. (according to Funk's Manual of Church History) in order to make them acceptable to christendom. The only place in the New

Testament where mention is made of "making merry and sending gifts one to another" is in Revelation eleven where God's two witnesses lay dead in the street for three days. Can this be other than spiritual insanity to incorporate this into Christian practice as pleasing to God?

Not only has God not originated these practices, but history reveals where they do come from—right straight out of paganism! Yes paganism, which God consistently condemned and sent his prophets over and over again to warn His people to turn away from such and to "wholly follow after the Lord", but then as now, the people did not hearken, but "walked in the ways of their fathers and did that which was right in their own eyes".

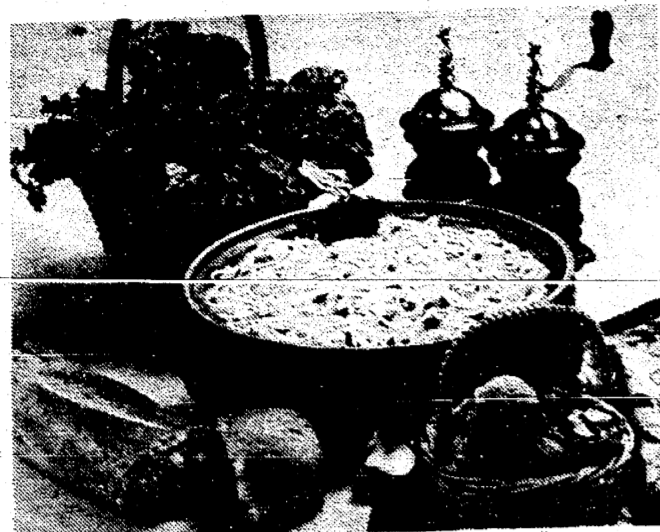

Looking for a royal dish that's easy on the budget? Serve luscious Spaghetti Florentina, a favorite from the cookbook, "Muller's Classic Recipes."

SPAGHETTI FLORENTINA

- 1 tablespoon salt
- 3 quarts boiling water
- 8 ounces spaghetti
- 1/2 cup spinach leaves
- 2 tablespoons parsley leaves
- 1 small clove garlic
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons chopped walnuts
- 2 tablespoons grated Romano cheese
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon basil leaves

Add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. (One tablespoon oil may also be added.) Gradually add spaghetti so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, 9 to 14 minutes until desired tenderness. Drain in colander. Meanwhile wash spinach and parsley, shake to remove extra water, but allow moisture to cling to leaves. Place with remaining ingredients in electric blender. Blend at low to medium speed until vegetables are in tiny pieces. Pour mixture over spaghetti; toss until completely coated. NOTE: Instead of using blender, you may finely chop the vegetables and nuts. 4 to 6 servings.

Nearly all of the 6,000 students received Class Honors, recognizing an undergraduate academic record equal to at least half A's and half B's for two terms (one term for new students) during 1974.

A total of 598 students were named James B. Angell Scholars. They have maintained an all-A record for two or more consecutive terms as undergraduates.

In addition, 308 members of the freshman class received the William J. Branstrom Prize, a book of their choice bearing the U-M seal and a bookplate. The recipients ranked in the top five per cent of their class.

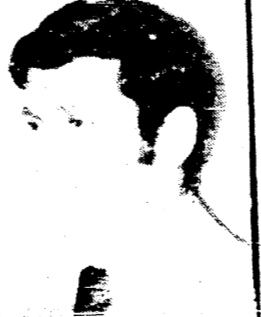
