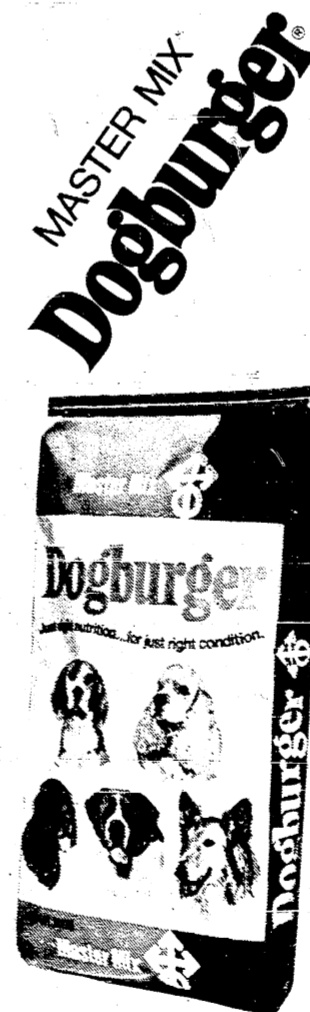

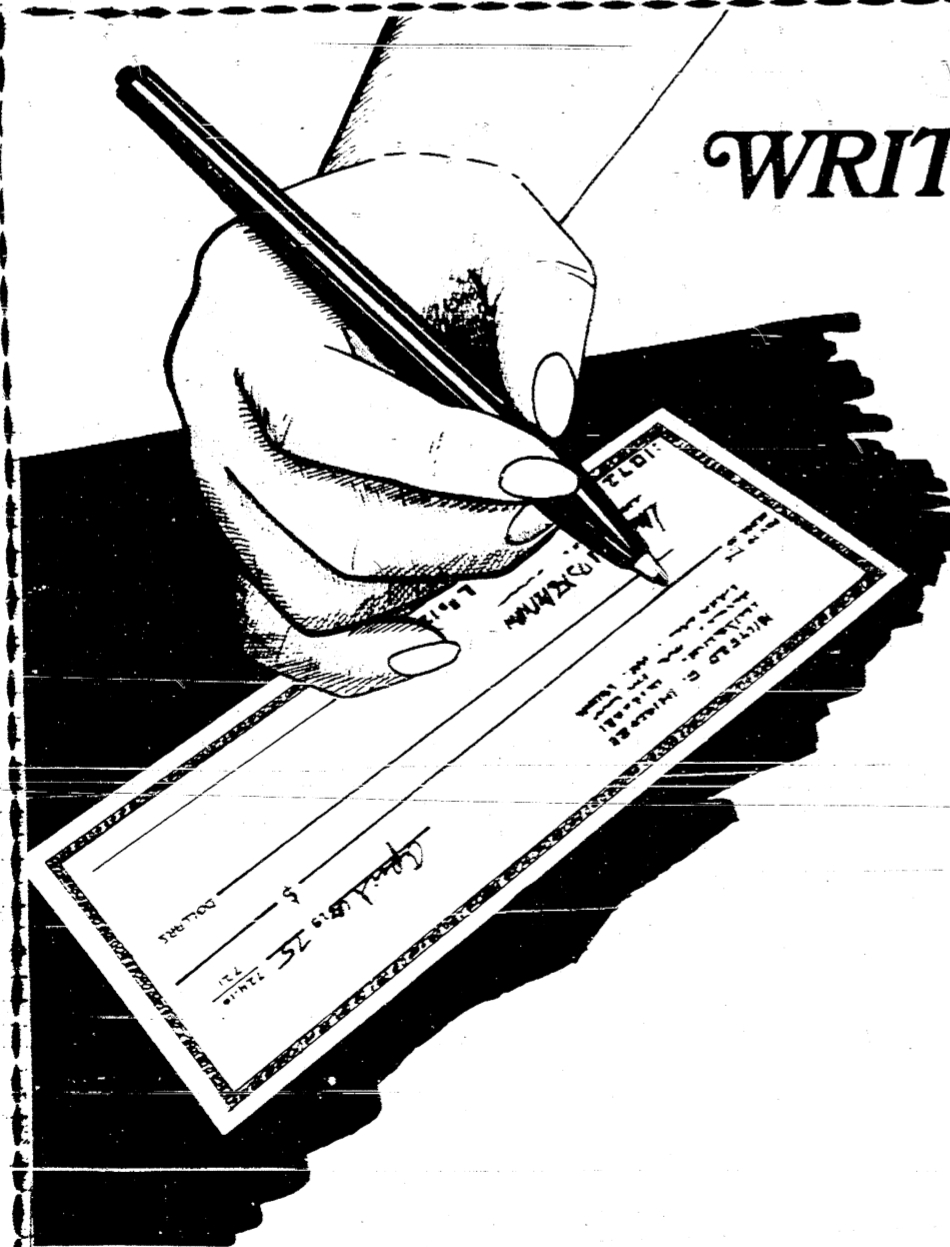

STATEMENT BY CHIEF JUSTICE THOMAS GILES KAVANAGH

I want it known, especially in this instance, I speak for the entire Court. The Supreme Court, at Justice Sanderson's request, thoroughly examined all records and minutes of Court conferences concerning the case in question. All of these records, including the Justices' personal files, were made available to the investigators, and all Justices have responded to interviews concerning the case. The records show that action by the Court in this case, as in all others, was by orders promulgated by the Court as a body, not by personal action of any one Justice. The opinion of the Court in this case was signed by all the Justices.

A charge such as this—even a charge made by a convicted felon—poses a threat to the Court as an institution of government. That is why the Supreme Court, acting unanimously, sought the advice of the highly respected Albert E. Jenner, Jr., as to how we might protect the Court itself from the insinuations of such damaging allegations.

At a time when the people's faith has been shaken in some of their governmental institutions, it is imperative that the integrity of the judiciary be unquestioned. We are confident this matter will be resolved in a manner to maintain the people's confidence in the judiciary.

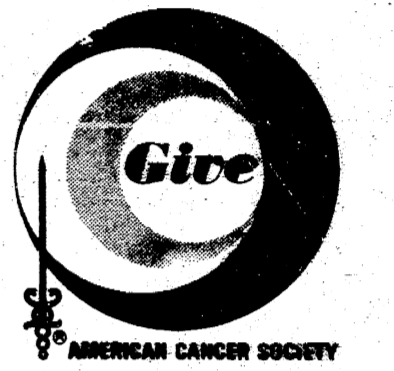

ORDINANCE NO. 9

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING ZONING DISTRICTS WITHIN MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTEAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN."

Section 1. That Section 3.02 of An Ordinance entitled: "AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING ZONING DISTRICTS WITHIN MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP, WASHTEAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN" be, and the same is hereby amended as follows:

Section 3.02 Provision for Official Zoning Map:
The Map entitled Official Manchester Township Zoning Map shall be and hereby is amended to change the designation of premises hereinafter described on said map from AR-Agricultural-Residential District to GC-General Commercial District said property being described as:

Commencing at the N 1/4 post; thence South 0 degree 38' West 440.4 feet on the North and South one-quarter line to the intersection of the centerlines of Austin and Grossman Roads for a Point of Beginning; thence South 0 degree 38' West 233 feet; thence North 84 degree

42° West 183.08 feet; thence North 0 degree 38' East 233 feet to the centerline of Grossman Road; thence South 84 degree 42' East along said centerline 183.0 feet to the Point of Beginning, being a part of the northwest one-quarter of Section 10, T4S, R3E, Manchester Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its publication in The Manchester Enterprise.

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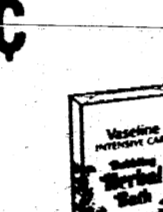

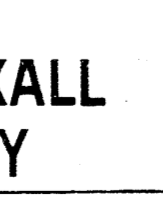
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Huron Valley Girl Scouts

1975-76 School Millage Request To Remain At Last Year's Level

The Board of Education at a special meeting held Monday, April 21, 1975 set the extra voted operational millage for the 1975-76 school year at 12.78 mills. This is the same amount of millage requested the last school year. Last year the Board requested 12.78 mills which was approved by District voters, but actually levied 1/2 mill less than that amount or 12.28 mills. The Board feels that the full 12.78 mills will be needed this year in order to fund the projected budget. They are hopeful that the indicated increase in the local state equalized valuation in the district will provide sufficient funds at the 12.78 lev to meet the rising operational costs the district will meet in the coming year.

The State Legislature is still working on the state aid formula for the 1975-76 school year and it is doubtful that the state aid bill will be forthcoming before July 1, 1975. The school is presently waiting for the school district's total SEV figures which should be available about the middle of May. When these

two factors are known a more realistic budget projection for the coming year can be made by the administration and the Board of Education.

Kindergarten Round-Up

Kindergarten Round-Up will take on a new look this year and will be held on May 14 and 15. In an attempt to help children get off to a good start when they arrive in September we are planning a series of brief activities for children to participate in on these two days. School To Shorten Noon Hour

The Manchester Public Schools will implement a shortened noon hour schedule in the middle school and the high school beginning May 5, 1975. The noon period will be decreased to thirty minutes in the secondary schools in an effort to alleviate or minimize some of the problems now associated with the longer lunch period.
