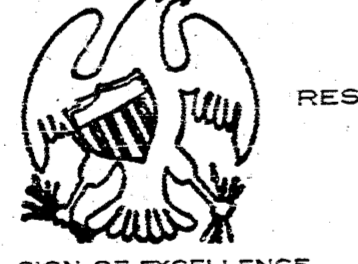

Legion Poppy Days May 16 and 17

The poppy as a memorial flower for American war dead is a tradition which began in the years following the First World War. Veterans returning to their homes in this country remembered the wild poppies which lined the devastated battlefields of France and Flanders Field, and the soldiers of all nations came to look upon this flower as a living symbol of their dead comrades' sacrifice. It was Col. John McCrae, a Canadian officer, killed in WW I who immortalized the flower in his famous poem "In Flanders Fields the poppies blow..."

Today - over 50 years later, that little symbolic flower continues to pay tribute to those who made the supreme sacrifice in World Wars I and II, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict.

However, it is more than a symbol. It is a source of hope and aid for many in our nation. It is a handmade flower - made by disabled veterans as a part of their therapy and to aid their rehabilitation, they receive financial assistance for their work. In addition, the funds from Poppy Day are used exclusively for assistance to veterans and their families in time of distress.

Each poppy tells its own story...no two are fashioned alike. And - similarly, each wearer of this poppy tells a story of Memorial tribute and of aid to someone who needs that helping hand of understanding.

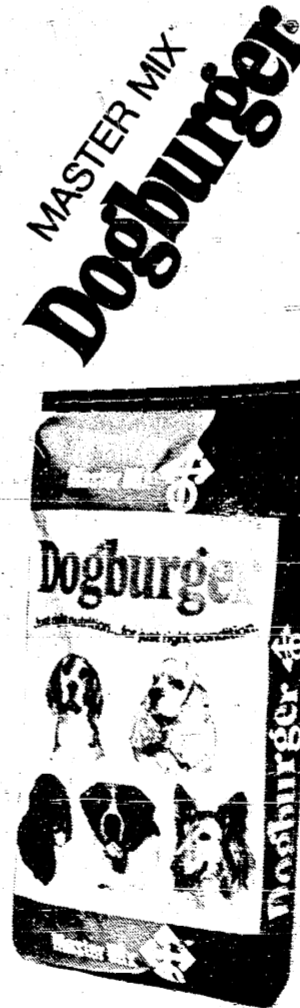

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

April 21, 1975
Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:11 p.m. Present were Beal, Curley, Daniels, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Mann, Scully and Zsenyuk. Minutes from the April 7, 1975 regular meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Mahony, supported by Beal to approve the minutes as corrected. All yeas, carried.

Ron Funches was present with a request for permission to close off Duncan Street from Torrey to Wolverine during the hours of the Softball Tournament sponsored by the Jaycees and scheduled for July 3 through July 6. Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley that the Jaycees be allowed to close off Duncan Street from Torrey to Wolverine Streets with a temporary blockade and proper flares maintained during the hours of the Jaycees Softball Tournament and coordinate activities with Police and Fire Department. All yeas, carried.

Fitzgerald discussed Public Works activities of the previous two weeks. A water problem was checked into on Macomb Street. Fifty-one feet of tile was rodded under the road. He requested that a letter be sent to Mr. Chart and Mr. Gauss explaining what had been done regarding the area of Village responsibility. Invoices totaling \$1,012 have been sent out for reimbursable services in April to date.

Curb cleaning and brush removal have been started. One drying bed has been cleaned at the waste treatment plant. Fill has been placed on the new parking lot adjacent to the Maintenance Building. The wiring is complete and the floor is scheduled for pouring shortly. The rest rooms at Carr Park will be opened next week.

The annual meeting with the township governments was held on April 16. Approximately \$13,000 was spent over the past year for operating costs on the Transfer Station. There were about \$4,000 in improvements made in the same period. One sewer and water tap-in was made on Madison Street for a new home. Paint has arrived for doing the streets.

Zsenyuk reported that the refrigeration units used by the recreation department in Detroit for Hockey rinks were all sold. The portable radio equipment under the Communications Grant is due the third week in May. Mahony relayed some comments to Council from a Village resident who objected to the fact that \$60,000 is spent on the Police Department, but the Village does not receive all the benefits since the officers also answer calls outside the Village. This resident felt that the police work should be confined to the area that is paying for the service. Little requested that Scully and Zsenyuk

meet with Clarence Fielder in conjunction with services that might be provided the township on a fee basis. Zsenyuk informed Council that six officers were enrolled in the First Aid Class to be held at the High School, and he requested that the costs be paid by Council. All were in agreement.

The proposed Sidewalk Ordinance was discussed. Moved by Beal, supported by Mahony to adopt Ordinance No. 95, "An Ordinance Pertaining to the Building, Repairing and Rebuilding of Sidewalks Within the Corporation Limits of the Village of Manchester." All yeas, carried.

Beal listed two building permits: Ricklesman, Madison Street, new home and J & S Developers, Schaffer Ct. new home.

Curley related that people have been contacted to complete work on the rest-rooms at Kirk Park, that the rink offered for sale by Chelsea is no longer for sale, and that volunteer help has offered to scrape the field at Kirk Park.

Mann reported that no Planning Commission meeting had been held, but that the Zoning Ordinance is ready for adoption by Council. June 5 was set for the Public Meeting. Mahony requested that all zoning materials relevant to the Zoning Ordinance be brought to the May 5 regular meeting for review. Little, Daniels and Mann agreed to be responsible for the same. Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony that the regularly scheduled meet-

ing of May 19 be postponed to May 20 to eliminate the conflict with Mayor's Exchange Day activities on May 19. All yeas, carried.

Mahony reported that all Revenue Sharing forms had been received in Washington and funds will be sent in July.

Plant Rehabilitation and Industrial Development Districts Law of 1974 was discussed with Mahony explaining what effect such a law could have on different communities.

SEMCOG is offering a workshop May 7, 1975 on Grant Management. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald that the Village of Manchester participate by sending Daniels, Mann, Wheeler and Zsenyuk and paying their expenses. All yeas, carried.

Scully commended Zsenyuk on the training of his men and their resulting safety in dangerous circumstances.

Meeting was unanimously adjourned at 9:20 in a motion by Scully, supported by Beal.

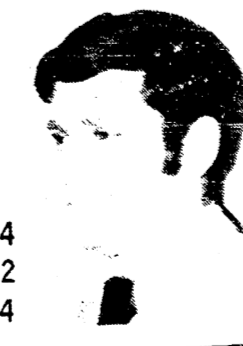

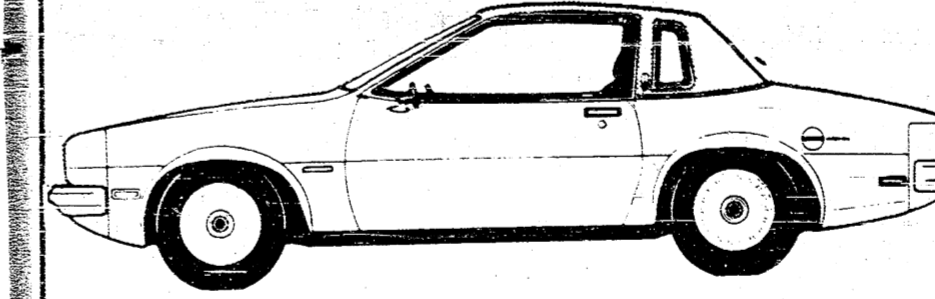

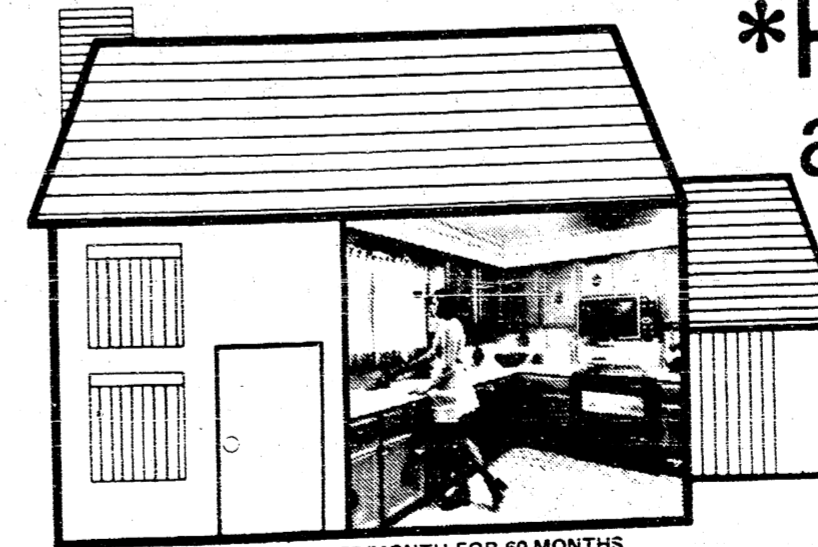
