Luther C. Klager Day Saturday, May 17th

May 17, 1975, has by unanimous direction of our Village Council, been named by Mayor David Little as Luther C. Klager Day.

For his friends, an "evening with Ludy" has been arranged at the High School Gymnasium.

Ludy was born in Bridgewater in 1900 where he grew and attended country school, and in those days 2 months of each year, January and February, the children attended church school, which was taught in German.

In October of 1929 he married Margaret Dietle in Fostoria, Ohio, and they had one daughter Janice Klager Little. After attending Woodville Normal, then Capital University in Columbus, Ohio, Ludy worked in a bank in Ann Arbor and for six years he also played a violin in the Fishers Band. Getting into the chicken business Ludy was District Manager for Smith Incubator Co. for a territory covering five states. When his uncle invented the forced draft incubator, Ludy moved into the hatchery business, sitting up the Klager Hatcheries in Bridgewater in 1930, where they hatched a million chicks each year. Luther Klager's record of public service is by any standards extraordinarily impressive. Beginning in July of 1945 when he became a member of the Manchester School Board where he has served continuously since, Ludy has always had the welfare of the children close to his heart. Chairman and co-chairman of the Manchester Chicken Broil, Ludy has watched and guided the growth of this community undertaking and the enormous success of it, not the least of which is the astounding

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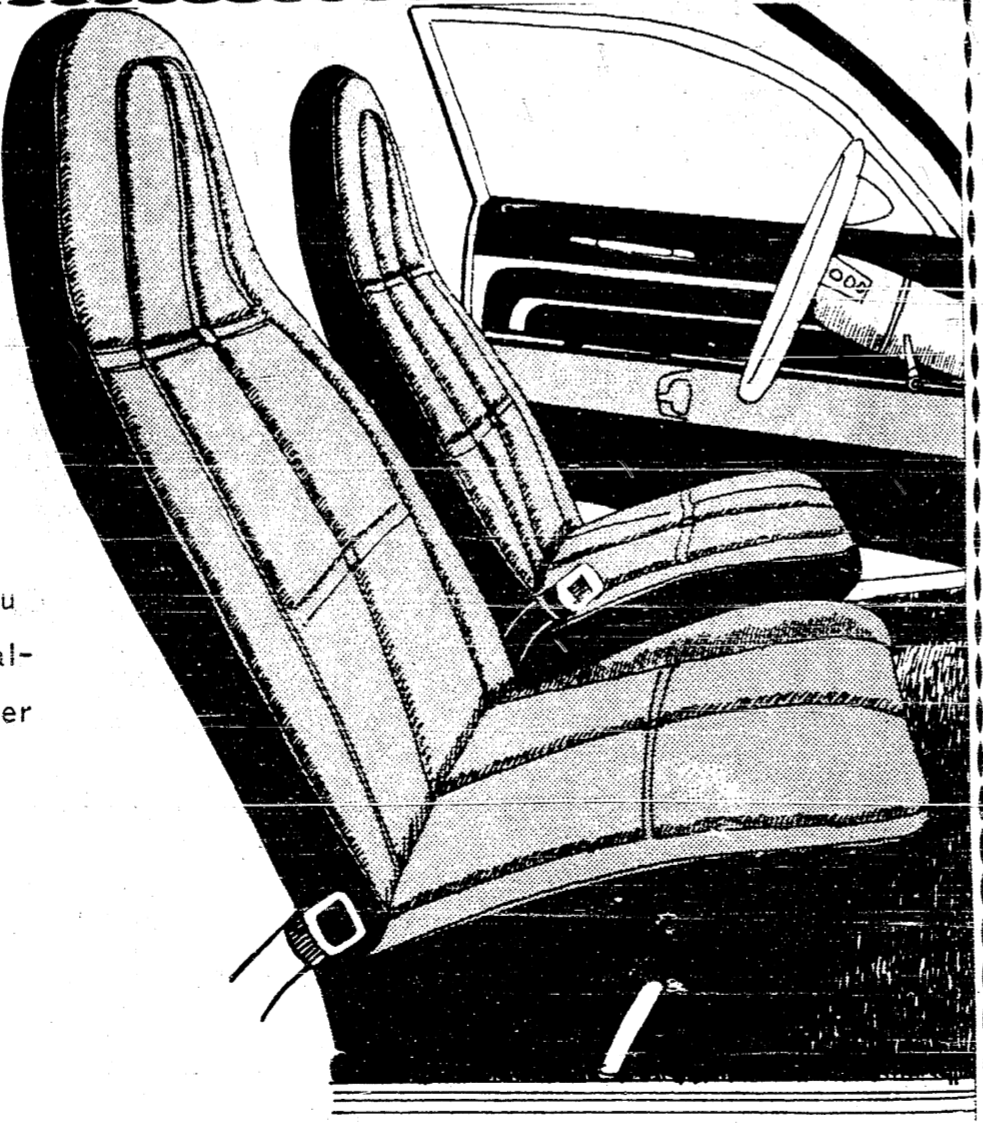
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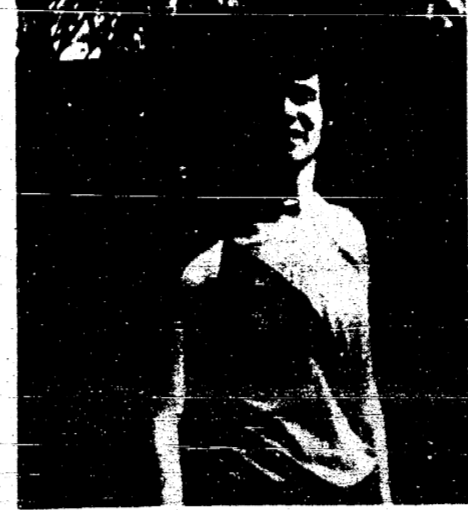

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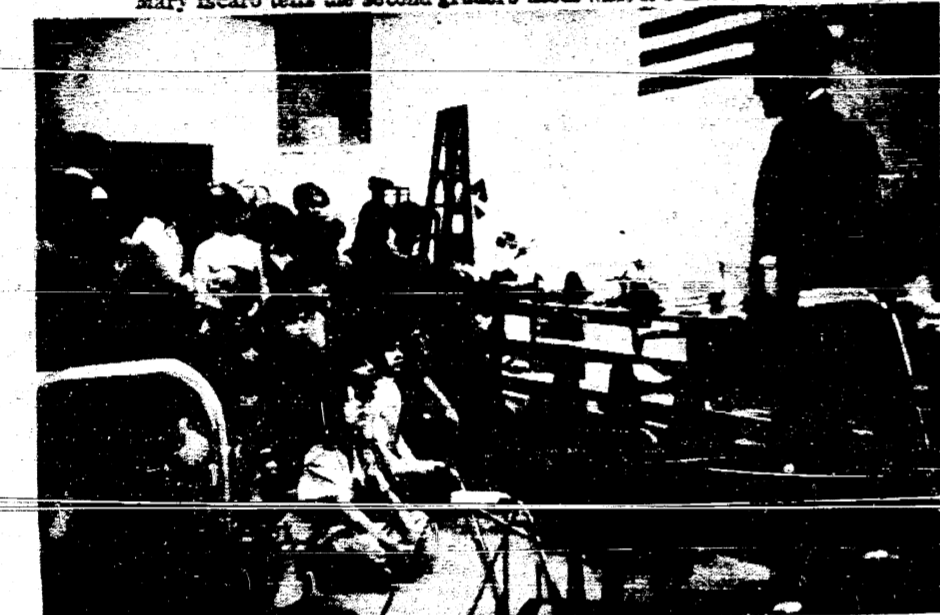

Handicap Unit Broadens Second Graders Knowledge

This year the Klager second grade students have learned what most second graders learn, and then some! Beginning with a unit on self-awareness, students made an assessment of their own handicaps and focused on things they could and could not do.

The classes moved on to a unit on blindness in which they were "blind" for a period of time, were introduced to a brailier, and became more familiar with the leader dog program. Mary Iscaro came with her leader dog Tracy and talked to the children about what it was like to be blind.

To experience the loss of limbs, the students participated in an art project without the use of their hands. Painting was done by holding a paintbrush between their teeth. They also became more familiar with the tools of the physically handicapped. School nurse Lis Farsakian along with physical therapist Gloria Fitzpatrick and her student therapist all from the Washtenaw County Health Department, filled the gym with the various equipment and tools used by the physically handicapped. The children had an opportunity to experiment with wheel chairs, braces, crawlers, and walkers. Continuing with the unit on physical handicaps, we were fortunate to have John Hardenberg come and talk to us about his experiences. John also showed us some great slides he took while he was in Chile.

The culmination of the unit came on March 12 when a class of physically handicapped children from Rackham School joined us for a party. Mrs. Sharon Burnham, teacher, Miss Joan Campbell, psychologist, and Ms. Brown, student teacher came with the class. Students from Rackham School were Billy London, Brian Bedella, Mervin Wilkie, Rodney Davis, Matt McLean, Carl Lovely, Sara Olsen, Elizabeth Aldrich, Monica Kessler, and Kim Hamilton.

According to teachers Sue Ediger, Teddy Groeb, and Janice Little who co-ordinated the unit, the object of the unit was to help the second graders gain a better awareness of themselves and of others with handicaps and to show tolerance and empathy rather than shock and ridicule. Was it a success? Here are some words written by second graders: Decide for yourself!

One day somebody came to our school. She was blind. She did some braille writing. She had a cookbook in Braille. Her name is Mary and her dog's name is Tracey. She introduced her dog. She can do lots of things. She can cook by herself. She has special things to help her. I learned that handicapped people are just like us and have the same feelings we do. Jennifer England.

When the children came from Rackham School it was fun. I met a girl named Elizabeth. I liked her. We had a little party. We had ice cream and brownies. We showed them around the school. We showed them the second grade rooms. Lisa Stout.

I liked Sara even though she had a problem talking. Kim was a quiet girl but I really liked her. I learned that some people cannot eat without special tools. Those artificial limbs were neat. I wish I would have been at school when Mary and her dog Tracey came. Lisa Buona.

I liked the children from Rackham School. I hope nobody called them names. I would like the second graders next year to see them too. Wendy Briggs.

I learned about the way some people can eat if they are handicapped. I hope they get well someday. I love the handicaps. Jon Bristol

against them: thou shalt see forth thy wrath which consumed them as stubble" (Exodus 15:7). "If thou, Lord, shouldst mark iniquities, O Lord who shall stand?" (Psalm 130:3) "It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God" (Hebrews 10:31).



Renewal of Operational Millage Most Vital To School Program

The renewal of the 12.78 mills of operational millage being requested by the Board of Education at the June 9, 1975 election is crucial to the continued operation of the educational program. This amount of extra voted millage provides the school with approximately 40 per cent of its operational monies. Without it severe cuts would have to be made in the total school program.

In addition to maintaining the present program the Board of Education must also consider the rising costs in several important areas of school operation including salary improvements in the teacher's salary schedule, rising costs of utilities and materials, and a new commitment to a shared time vocational education program. Next year fifty Manchester students will be attending classes in the Saline and Milan Schools in subject areas that are not available in the Manchester District. These areas of study include the following: Model Office, Health Occupation, Welding, Machine Shop, Food Services, Auto Shop I and II, Building Trades and Graphic Arts. Manchester will share the cost of the Director's salary, other related costs and transportation costs.

The proposed increased cost for the 1975-76 school year will approximate one hundred thousand dollars. This is approximately the same amount of money which will be available to the school district from the increase in the state equalized valuation of the district.

State aid figures for the 1975-76 year are not available and, in all probability, will not be available until late July or August, so it is difficult to know what state aid monies will be for the coming year. Any increase in local SEV figures will, according to the state formula, decrease the amount of state aid monies
