Next year fifty Manchester students will be attending classes in the Saline and Milan Schools in subject areas that are not available in the Manchester District. These areas of study include the following: Model Office, Health Occupation, Welding, Machine Shop, Food Services. Auto Shop I and II, Building Trades and Graphic Arts. Manchester will share the cost of the Director's salary, other related costs and transportation costs.

The proposed increased cost for the 1975-76 school year will approximate one hundred thousand dollars. This is approximately the same amount of money which will be available to the school district from the increase in the state equalized valuation of the district.

State aid figures for the 1975-76 year are not available and, in all probability, will not be available until late July or August, so it is difficult to know what state aid monies will be for the coming year. Any increase in local SEV figures will, according to the state formula, decrease the amount of state aid monies
