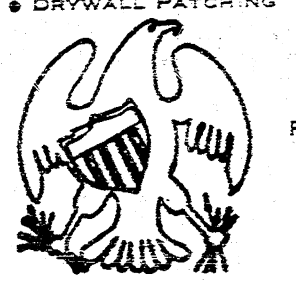

He lives with his wife, Dolores and daughters Karen and Melissa at 19025 Sandborn Road.

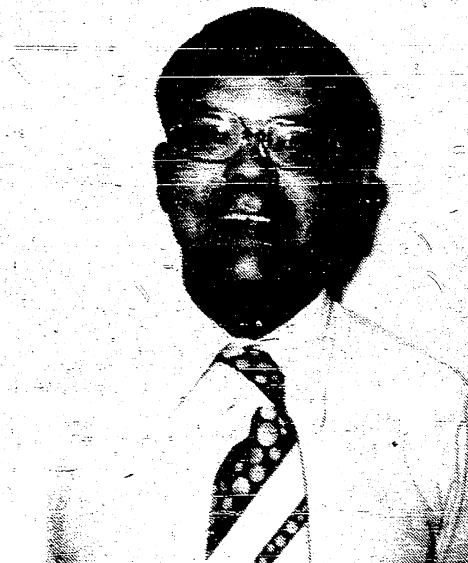

## Manchester Board of Education Requesting Renewal of 12.78 Mills

The Manchester Board of Education is requesting a renewal of 12.78 mills of operational monies Monday, June 9, 1975. This amount of millage is vital to the continued operation of the school district's educational program. The 1975-76 projected budget increase over the 1974-75 school year budget is \$97,713. Included in this amount are improvements in the teacher's salary schedule, increased costs of utilities, supplies and maintenance items.

The increased budget expense is approximately the amount of monies the school district will receive from the increase in the school district's state equalized valuation. Although no state aid formula has been established as yet by the State Legislature, it is a foregone conclusion that less state aid will be available to the school district as a result of the increase in the local SEV.

A total of 24 mills of operational monies is needed to fund the 1975-76 school year. A county voted allocation of 11.22 mills is a permanent allocation of operational monies. This 11.22 mills will bring to the school district \$507,901. If district voters approve the requested 12.78 mills this will be an additional \$578,418. The total state contribution including categorical aids will approximate \$400,000. These three amounts total \$1,486,319. A projected expenditure of \$1,556,144 is required for the 1975-76 school year. The difference of \$69,825 is expected from a projected June 30, 1975 balance of \$50,000 and miscellaneous funds from county and federal sources. The Board of Education is requesting only that amount of millage which is absolutely necessary to fund the 1975-76 school year operation.

## Citizens Advisory Committee

The Citizen's Advisory Committee will hold its next general meeting Wednesday, June 11, 1975 at 8:00 p.m. in the High School Library. The Committee was formulated and held its first meeting April 9, 1975 at which time common areas of concern between the Board and citizen's present were explored. The need for input from the community and implementation of improved methods of communication between the school system and citizen's was emphasized.

First priority of goals set by the committee was that of self-education. It was decided to invite representatives of the Reading Levels Program and Special Education Dept. to present to us three programs and answer questions any concerned citizens might have regarding them. This occurred April 18, 1975. On April 23, 1975, Dr. Southernland Haydn, Area Chairman of North Central Accreditation Committee discussed with us and the general public what North-Central Accreditation is and is not all about. The committee decided at this point to use the Standards for North-Central Accreditation as a guideline for further study of area school system, not at this point actually seeking accreditation, but assessing its value and practicality for the Manchester Public Schools at some future date.

Two sub-committees have been formed, the human Development Committee and the Survey Committee. Citizens in the community will have received surveys which will provide the committee with their input regarding their priorities and concerns in the area of curriculum prior to

request. Voting will take place at the high school between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. Three seats on the Board of Education will also be filled at this annual election.

## E. G. Mann & Sons 35th Year In Manchester



E.G. Mann & Sons has been continuously operating on Main St. powered by River Raisin, and supplying farmers with feed and seed since June 1, 1940. The brothers Earl and Willard with their father Earnest, had been operating the Bridgewater mill since 1938, having formed a partnership they leased, then purchased the Manchester Mill.

Growing up in Bridgewater the boys, Earl and Willard drove a Ford Model A to Ann Arbor High School for four years and were commended at graduation time upon the fact that in all weather conditions they had only missed one day of school and were late but once.

These many years later Earl is gone but Willard with nephews Glen, Vic, and son Ron, continues as E.G. Mann & Sons another generation doing business as usual.

Visiting the mill is an exciting experience, giving one the feeling of a glimpse of the roots of our town. A faint rumbling and humming means that machinery is moving, faint farm aromas come from the good smell of grain and fine dust lies everywhere. Willard reminisces and states that when he was a young man nearly all the business was limited to farmers, and nowadays small farmers and gardeners comprise a goodly share of the work each year. Back in the 40's when the grain and feed was tossed on the floor and mixed by hand the first thing he did was install a mber. Come with me for a walk through the store. Everything from a small pill to a 20 ton bulk feed tank is available here, and glancing around we see on the shelves farm and garden seeds, fertilizers, pet foods, rubber boots, wooden walking canes, pitchforks, beverage syrup, horse and steer halters, show sticks for cattle, a horse waterer, egg cartons, a calves nursing bottle with a huge nipple, curry comb, a handy horse sprayer, hoof knife, hood trimmer, plastic fence posts, horse hay feeder, garden planters and shelves of farm supplies, which include medications of all kinds.

There is a great deal of satisfaction in a lifetime of work one enjoys doing and Willard states "I have enjoyed working in Manchester for the past 35 years, and I sincerely mean that. It has been a real pleasure for every day of that time". Congratulations to E.G. Mann and Sons for work well done.

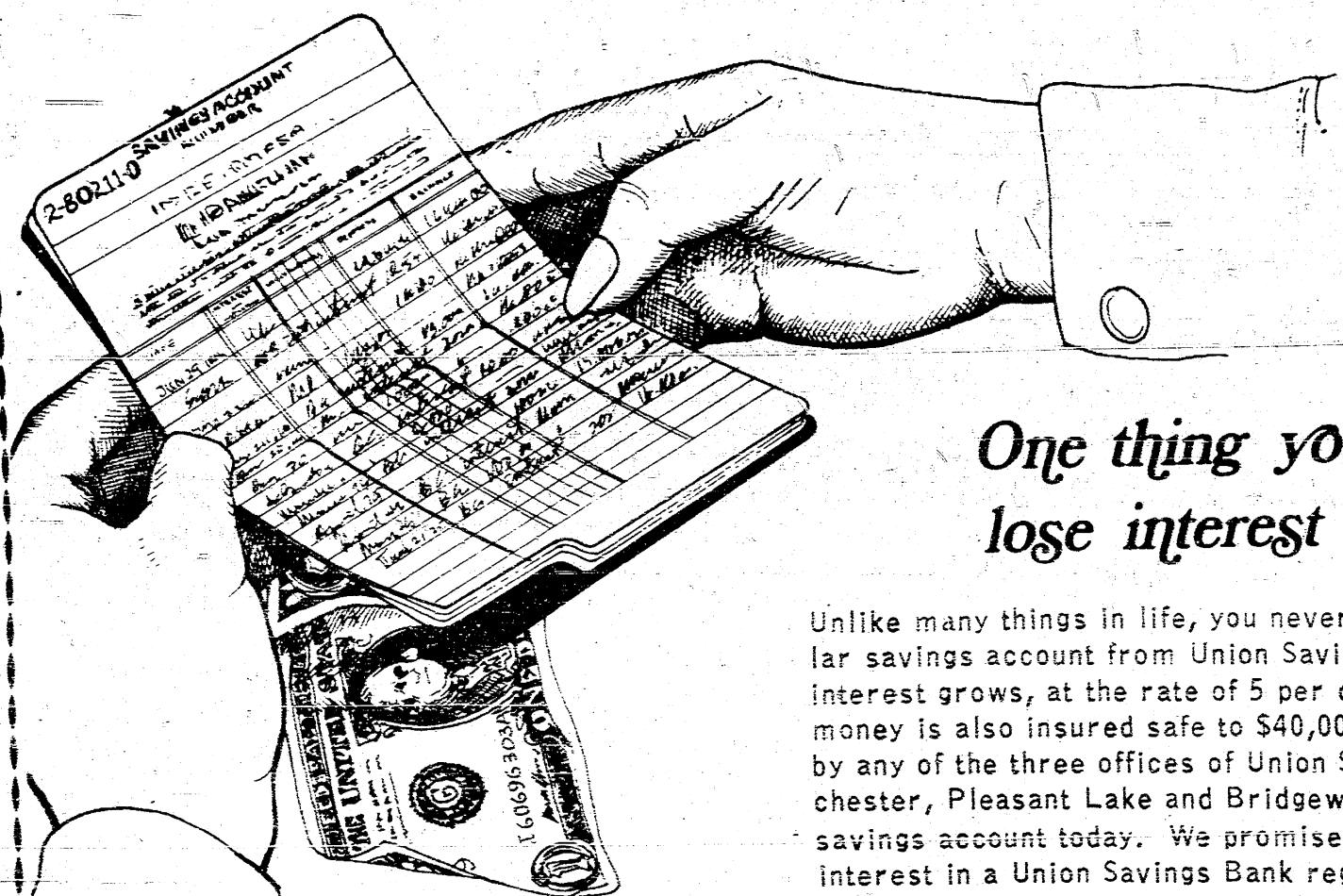

### TOWNSHIP OF BRIDGEWATER WASHTENAW COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 9

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT THE STORING OF JUNK, OLD METAL, OLD AUTO BODIES, TRACTORS, JUNK CARS, FARM MACHINERY, HOUSEHOLD APPLIANCES AND OTHER DISCARDED AND/OR UNUSED PERSONAL PROPERTY IN AN OPEN LOT OR FIELD IN THE TOWNSHIP OF BRIDGEWATER, AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

THE TOWNSHIP OF BRIDGEWATER ORDAINS:

Section 1. Inasmuch as old discarded and non-operating cars, car parts, tractors, machinery, household appliances, old iron debris and other unsightly junk, if allowed to remain in the open, is dangerous to the health of the Township in that it allows weeds, high grass and brush to grow up around it in which rats and other rodents frequent, and is dangerous to the safety of the citizens in that it is an attractive nuisance to children from which children can receive serious injury or possible suffocation and in that it creates a fire hazard because of the dead grass and weeds around and is detrimental to the general welfare of the Township of Bridgewater in that it adversely affects the values of the adjoining properties and detracts from the general appearance of the Township, therefore, the storing thereof in an open field, lot or part of lot in the Township of Bridgewater is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

Section 2. An open field, lot or part of lot is hereby defined for the purpose of this ordinance as any field, lot or part of lot which is not enclosed with a building or a non-combustible fence at least eight (8) feet high so constructed and maintained that rats, mice and other rodents cannot enter or leave and so constructed as to prevent lighted cigarettes, cigar butts or other burning objects from being tossed into said field, lot or part of lot.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any owner, occupant, possessor or any person having control of any open lot, field or open part thereof to allow any old auto bodies, old cars, auto parts, farm machinery, equipment, household appliances or other old metal, debris or other personal property that because of the age, wear and tear, lack of repair or other causes is no longer usable as such in its then condition to be stored or remain in any such open lot, field or open part of either for a period of more than thirty (30) days.

Section 4. Upon complaint from any person of any violation of section 3 of date of its publication, this ordinance, a Township Constable shall make an investigation thereof and if it is found that any of the items mentioned in section 1 hereof have been stored, placed or allowed to remain in any open lot, field

er open part of either for a period of more than thirty (30) days, said constable shall serve upon said owner, occupant, possessor or person having control thereof a written notice to remove the same therefrom within ten (10) days after receipt of said notice; said notice may be served personally or by certified mail with return receipt requested.

Section 5. Any person believing that the notice is not proper or that the removal of said items within ten (10) days would be an undue hardship or who is aggrieved otherwise may appeal to the Township Board of the Township of Bridgewater by leaving a written claim of appeal stating his reasons for appeal with the Township Clerk within said ten (10) days.

Section 6. Said appeal shall be heard by the Township Board at the next regular meeting thereof and said appellant shall appear before the Township Board and show cause, if any, he has, supporting his appeal. Any official of the Township or any resident may also appear and present any facts they have regarding the matter.

Section 7. After hearing the facts so presented the Township Board may uphold the notice as given or may extend the time for removal of the items or may set aside the notice entirely in accordance with the proofs so presented.

Section 8. If a notice be upheld by the Township Board, the appellant shall have ten (10) days thereafter, or such additional time as granted by said Board, in which to so remove said items.

Section 9. Any person who shall fail, refuse or neglect to so remove said items within ten (10) days after said notice is served upon him, or within ten (10) days after the decision on the appeal if any appeal is taken and the notice is upheld, or within such additional time as may be granted by the Township Board on said appeal, then said person shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$50.00 or imprisonment of more than thirty (30) days, or both, for a first offense. For a second or subsequent offense charged as such, said person shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment of not less than ninety (90) days or both, at the discretion of the Court.

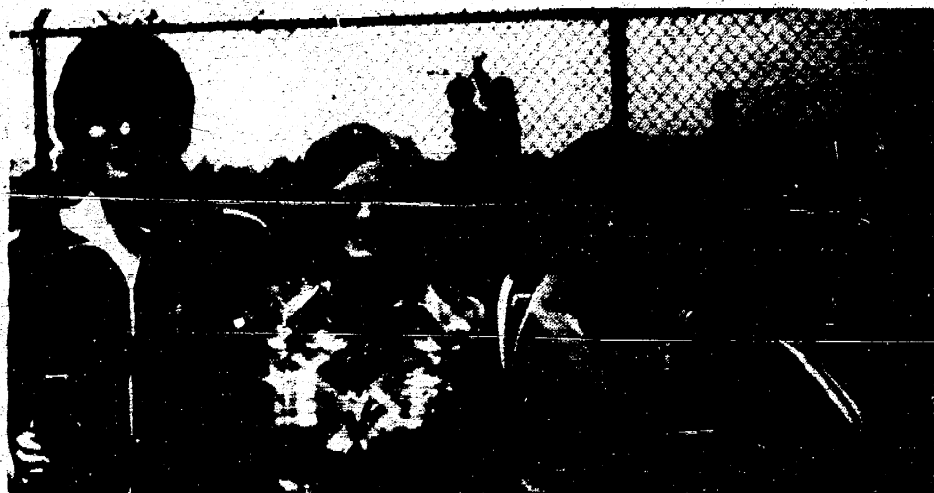
