Summer Recreation Starts June 23

This year's 6 week Summer Recreation Program will begin on Monday, June 23, with activities at both the Junior and Senior Playgrounds. Both programs will run from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. (noon) Monday thru Friday. The only afternoon activity offered will be roller skating at Adrian which will begin on Tuesday, June 24 and will run every Tuesday and Thursday throughout June and July. A bus will leave from the Athletic Field at 12:30 p.m. on these days and will return around 3:15 p.m. Permission slips signed by all those who plan to participate in the roller skating program. Participation in the roller skating program is limited to those youngsters going into the fourth grade next fall and on up to those youngsters who will not be sixteen years old by August 1, 1975. The cost will be 85 cents each time a youngster takes part in the activity.

Junior Playground is open to all youngsters who will be five years old by December 1, 1975 and on up to include those youngsters who will be entering the third grade next fall. This year's Junior Playground will include all sorts of indoor and outdoor activities. Field trips will also be included in the program. Indoor activities will take place in the art room in the Nellie Ackerson building.

Senior Playground will be held at the pavilion on the Athletic Field and will be supervised by Mr. Brian Schick and Mr. Bart Bartels. Different types of outdoor activities will be offered to those youngsters participating in the program. Senior Playground is open to all youngsters going into the fourth grade next fall and on up to those who will not be sixteen years old by August 1, 1975.

**Dear Interested Citizen:**  
 The office of Land Use, Department of Natural Resources, is pleased to provide the enclosed information packet on Michigan's Farmland and Open Space Preservation Act, P. A. 118 of 1974.

It is suggested that you thoroughly review these materials before you begin filling out the application form for entrance into the program.

The packet contains one each of the application forms for farmland, designated open space land and local open space land. Should you need more than one application form to enter your land into the program, please feel free to contact us or local governing bodies for more forms.

**FARMLAND OWNERS** - For those owners of farmland wishing to receive a tax credit for property taxes on their 1975 State income tax return, it is suggested that the application form be filed by September to ensure that the application is processed before the December 31 yearly deadline. If the application is completed and signed in 1975, farmland owners will be able to use their December property tax bill to compute their tax credit when they file their income tax return.

**DESIGNATED AND LOCAL OPEN SPACE LAND OWNERS** - For those owners of open space land wishing to receive a tax benefit on their 1975 property tax bill, it is also suggested that they file the application by September of this year to ensure that the application will be processed before the December 31 yearly deadline.

If at any time there is a problem or a question which is not answered by the enclosed material, please feel free to contact this office for assistance. We are here to assist you in any way we can to make this program work as easily and smoothly as possible.

The Office of Land Use would like to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to you for your patience, cooperation and understanding while we prepared this program for implementation.

IT COULDN'T HAPPEN HERE!

It could never happen here in America, land of the free! That was the general consensus of opinion when people read Swell's shocking "1984."

Yet, while the nation's citizens focus attention on their heritage—Independence, Liberty and all the good things guaranteed by the Constitution—a government agency has launched a nationwide "Big Brother is watching you" informer network.

In a recent Environmental Protection Agency radio news tape, citizens were invited to call toll-free from anywhere in the nation to report the "misuse" of pesticides. You don't have to be a pesticide expert to take advantage of the reporting system, or have any particular qualifications to interpret misuse. Evidently if you think the pesticide your neighbor used on his garden has made your roses wilt, or your squirrel dizzy, you can report him.

To gain the attention of the listening

public, the EPA hangs their announcement on this "hook"—"Hundreds of thousands of farm workers are made ill every year from the misuses of pesticides," and "hundreds of these workers die." Which exposes the new "service" for what it really is—an effort to collect dubious "evidence." The agency's inaccurate, irresponsible claims have been discredited many times—in courts, by scientists, a task force on occupational exposure to pesticides, and departments of health—so now a new approach.

If the informer system would result in the prevention of death or illness from pesticides, it might have some merit. But that's not likely. Use of pesticides is already strictly regulated through federal and state safety measures—plus the user's own value of health and life.

The possible danger of such an approach is the open invitation to irresponsible citizens and "crackpots" to accuse their neighbors of wrongdoing. Government money—not the accuser's—will be spent to investigate and prosecute the accused. Yet the accused (whether he's guilty or not) must spend his own money, time and effort—not to mention the embarrassment involved—to refute the charges.

If you've got a garden this year, maybe you'd better let the bugs have free rein. The guy next door is watching you—and he may use that toll-free number.

It could never happen here in America! Or could it?

## VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER PLANNING COMMISSION

May 1, 1975

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Althouse, Leeson, Krauss, Daniels, Chapin, Tracy and Mann.

Due to the absence of the Chairman and vice-Chairman, Althouse assumed the Chair, and called the meeting to order at 7:50 p.m.

Acknowledgement was made of Council's action in the appointment of Jim Mann as Council Representative on the Planning Commission, succeeding Tom Walton. Also, the reappointment of Bruce Daniels and Laurin Leeson for three year terms. Other members of the current Commission (with year of expiration of term) are Charles Crasswell, 1976, Chairman; Ron-

ald Whittington, 1976, Vice-Chairman, Cecilia (Mrs. Robert) Chapin, 1976; John Althouse, 1977; Harry Krauss, 1977; and Clifford Tracy, 1977. The council also has changed the month of expiration of all terms from January to March, in order that new appointments shall follow Annual Village Elections.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and on the motion by Tracy, seconded by Chapin, were unanimously approved.

It was moved by Chapin that Secretary Leeson be authorized to write a memo to the Village Council appraising that Body of the Commission's acceptance of the new Zoning Ordinance, and Official Zoning Map, and the Commission's recommendation for adoption. The motion was seconded by Krauss and unanimously passed.

There followed a general discussion of several projects and questions to be considered in the near future, including the

establishment of an amended Zoning Board of Appeals; a master plan for future extension of Village limits; possible annexation of certain areas into the Village; and provision of municipal utilities to some locations not now serviced.

It was moved by Tracy that the agenda for the next meeting should include a review and discussion of the Preliminary Subdivision Ordinance (updated version, March, 1974), and study of the August, 1974, Michigan Department of Commerce publication relative to Michigan's "Plant Rehabilitation and Industrial Development Districts Law of 1974". Motion seconded by Daniels, and unanimously passed.

Adjournment was moved by Daniels, seconded by Tracy. The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

# COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

May 20, 1975

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:10 p.m. Present were Beasley, Deal, Curley, Daniels, Mahony, Scully, absent Fitzgerald and

Mr. Doug Sindlinger was present in conjunction with property he had purchased on Ann Arbor Hill. He indicated that the gas pumping facility would be continued, but on a larger scale. He also intends to have a party store and requested the Village issue a SDM license.

Mr. Sindlinger was advised to contact the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for that. Little suggested that he attend the Village Planning Commission meeting scheduled for June 5, 1975 and at that time submit a letter of request for Conditional Use on the party store aspect of his property.

Enter Mann at 7:20 p.m. Minutes from the May 5, 1975 regular meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Mahony, supported by Beal to approve the minutes as corrected. All yeas, carried.

Daniels reviewed Public Works activities of the previous two weeks. The parks and Village grounds have been mowed, catch basins cleaned, ball field regraded, streets swept, two sewers rodded, and dust control applied on the gravel streets. A complaint was raised concerning people driving on the grass in the parks. Tennis court construction was discussed. A request was received from J. Jacobs for the use of barricades to be set up over five parking places on Main Street, May 25, so that goods to be auctioned could be set out on the sidewalk area without chance of being pushed over by a crowd. Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley that the barricades may be used, but must be picked up and returned to their proper location by Mr. Limpert or Mr. Jacobs. All yeas, carried.

Mann brought up the fact that several accidents had occurred on a section of sidewalk in front of the Union Savings Bank. He was asked by Little to check into the Village's liability in such a case. Moved by Mahony, supported by Mann that the purchase of Village limit signs through the State of Michigan with "Home of the Flying Dutchmen" on them be approved as monies are available. All yeas, carried.

Scully reported that there was quite some concern registered at the last Chicken Broil Committee meeting over the suggested purchase of property for

Chilbro Park. Curley responded that the questions had been discussed at previous meetings with the directors in attendance and that perhaps the committee chairpeople had not yet consulted with the directors on their concerns.

A Public Hearing which was scheduled to approve the proposed budget for the Fiscal Year March 1, 1975 through February 29, 1976 commenced at 3:30 p.m. with no guests present. Moved by Curley, supported by Beal to approve the budget as presented with the millage to be set at 14 mills; 1970 Bridge Bonds and Bond Redemption - 1.2 mills; and 1956 Sewerage Plant Bonds and Bond Redemption - 1.4 mills, spread over a Real Property Valuation of \$8,631,350 and a Personal Property Valuation of \$4,389,100. Total Tax Roll is \$13,020,450 with 14 mills providing \$182,287 to cover the previous listed areas. All yeas, carried.

Scully presented a request from Miss Sandy Waters asking permission to have a party at Carr Park. He was advised to inform Miss Waters that the shelters are open to the public on a first come, first served basis. No reservations are taken.

A letter from the Village Attorney Stanton Roesch, was read in conjunction with the lawsuit of Mr. Joseph Catalana. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully that a check be issued for \$650.00 and statement of employment be written as per Mr. Roesch's letter of May 16, 1975 for final settlement, when funds become available. All yeas, carried.

Scully advised Council that the Fire Phone will be assigned a new number with the former number also answered until six months after the new directory is issued. He was asked to refer the matter to Zsenyuk and to have him check with Kensler so that some publication could be given the change.

Moved by Mann, supported by Beal that the application by Michigan Bell Telephone lines be approved and signed. All yeas, carried.

Mahony indicated that he and Zsenyuk had not yet conferred on a possible fee basis for services provided by the Police Dept. to township areas. He asked that Scully have Zsenyuk set up a meeting when he returns.

A request for a 6000 lumen street light mid-block on Duncan between Morgan and Torrey was considered. Additional locations were also discussed. Moved by Curley, supported by Scully that the Village request 6000 lumen street lights be installed by Consumers mid-block on Duncan Street between Morgan and Torrey

Streets, on Vernon Street between Division and Torrey Streets and at the end of Wager Street with the clerk advising Consumers in writing of such requests. All yeas, carried. Beasley was asked to check further on poor lighting localities and advise Council through Scully or Zsenyuk.

Beal reported on permits for April: Rickelman: Building and Plumbing; J & S Developers; Building; Shors; Plumbing; Norm Walz: Building; Freedom Electric; Electrical; Ronald Whittington: Building; Ted Roberts: Alterations; James Schook: Alterations; Donald Wheeler: Building; A.J. Porter; Plumbing; Jay Lantis: Building; Charles King: Plumbing.

Curley relayed a request from the JayCees for any additional painting projects they might accomplish on park facilities during their scheduled painting weekend, May 31. They plan to paint the new restroom facilities at Kirk Park. The plumbing work is to be finished this week. In seeking information for tennis court and basketball court construction Curley contacted the Norfolk Corporation in Quincy, Mass. and obtained literature on the new materials available. Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley that Revenue Sharing Funds be used for the development and construction of tennis courts at Carr Park. All yeas, carried.

Mann advised Council that a partial payment was needed on Mayor's Day expenses so that the K of C could be paid. Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony that the Mayor's Exchange Day Commit-

tee be paid \$100 to partially cover expenses incurred. All yeas, carried. Mann reported that the Zoning Ordinance is on tape at Washburn Planning Commission and they are sending a copy out. Additional copies will be made. Moved by Scully, supported by Mann that the meeting be adjourned at 9:40 p.m. All yeas, carried.

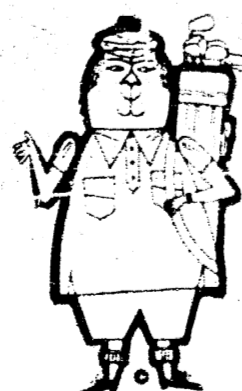

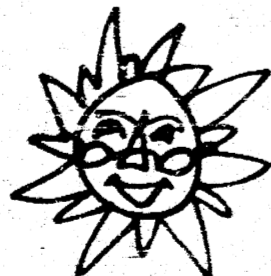

## Musical Youth International To Observe Fiftieth Anniversary



Musical Youth International 1975 Europe-bound tour group is entering final schedule of intensive rehearsal and pre-tour home concerts. The hundred twenty members strong, will concentrate on polishing their repertoire and receiving their briefing sessions to prepare for the weeks tour which will extend through Holland, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, and Denmark.

Thomas F. Steele, 18 year old 1975 graduate of Manchester High School, among the young people of the tour. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed E. Steele of 305 Beaufort Street. MYI is a chartered People to People group who annually visit a diverse area of the world to experience exchange of living at the personal level.
