

# COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

May 20, 1975

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:10 p.m. Present were Beasley, Deal, Curley, Daniels, Mahony, Scully, absent Fitzgerald and

Mr. Doug Sindlinger was present in conjunction with property he had purchased on Ann Arbor Hill. He indicated that the gas pumping facility would be continued, but on a larger scale. He also intends to have a party store and requested the Village issue a SDM license.

Mr. Sindlinger was advised to contact the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for that. Little suggested that he attend the Village Planning Commission meeting scheduled for June 5, 1975 and at that time submit a letter of request for Conditional Use on the party store aspect of his property.

Enter Mann at 7:20 p.m. Minutes from the May 5, 1975 regular meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Mahony, supported by Beal to approve the minutes as corrected. All yeas, carried.

Daniels reviewed Public Works activities of the previous two weeks. The parks and Village grounds have been mowed, catch basins cleaned, ball field regraded, streets swept, two sewers rodded, and dust control applied on the gravel streets. A complaint was raised concerning people driving on the grass in the parks. Tennis court construction was discussed. A request was received from J. Jacobs for the use of barricades to be set up over five parking places on Main Street, May 25, so that goods to be auctioned could be set out on the sidewalk area without chance of being pushed over by a crowd. Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley that the barricades may be used, but must be picked up and returned to their proper location by Mr. Limpert or Mr. Jacobs. All yeas, carried.

Mann brought up the fact that several accidents had occurred on a section of sidewalk in front of the Union Savings Bank. He was asked by Little to check into the Village's liability in such a case. Moved by Mahony, supported by Mann that the purchase of Village limit signs through the State of Michigan with "Home of the Flying Dutchmen" on them be approved as monies are available. All yeas, carried.

Scully reported that there was quite some concern registered at the last Chicken Broil Committee meeting over the suggested purchase of property for

Chilbro Park. Curley responded that the questions had been discussed at previous meetings with the directors in attendance and that perhaps the committee chairpeople had not yet consulted with the directors on their concerns.

A Public Hearing which was scheduled to approve the proposed budget for the Fiscal Year March 1, 1975 through February 29, 1976 commenced at 3:30 p.m. with no guests present. Moved by Curley, supported by Beal to approve the budget as presented with the millage to be set at 14 mills; 1970 Bridge Bonds and Bond Redemption - 1.2 mills; and 1956 Sewerage Plant Bonds and Bond Redemption - 1.4 mills, spread over a Real Property Valuation of \$8,631,350 and a Personal Property Valuation of \$4,389,100. Total Tax Roll is \$13,020,450 with 14 mills providing \$182,287 to cover the previous listed areas. All yeas, carried.

Scully presented a request from Miss Sandy Waters asking permission to have a party at Carr Park. He was advised to inform Miss Waters that the shelters are open to the public on a first come, first served basis. No reservations are taken.

A letter from the Village Attorney Stanton Roesch, was read in conjunction with the lawsuit of Mr. Joseph Catalana. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully that a check be issued for \$650.00 and statement of employment be written as per Mr. Roesch's letter of May 16, 1975 for final settlement, when funds become available. All yeas, carried.

Scully advised Council that the Fire Phone will be assigned a new number with the former number also answered until six months after the new directory is issued. He was asked to refer the matter to Zsenyuk and to have him check with Kensler so that some publication could be given the change.

Moved by Mann, supported by Beal that the application by Michigan Bell Telephone lines be approved and signed. All yeas, carried.

Mahony indicated that he and Zsenyuk had not yet conferred on a possible fee basis for services provided by the Police Dept. to township areas. He asked that Scully have Zsenyuk set up a meeting when he returns.

A request for a 6000 lumen street light mid-block on Duncan between Morgan and Torrey was considered. Additional locations were also discussed. Moved by Curley, supported by Scully that the Village request 6000 lumen street lights be installed by Consumers mid-block on Duncan Street between Morgan and Torrey

Streets, on Vernon Street between Division and Torrey Streets and at the end of Wager Street with the clerk advising Consumers in writing of such requests. All yeas, carried. Beasley was asked to check further on poor lighting localities and advise Council through Scully or Zsenyuk.

Beal reported on permits for April: Rickelman: Building and Plumbing; J & S Developers; Building; Shors; Plumbing; Norm Walz: Building; Freedom Electric; Electrical; Ronald Whittington: Building; Ted Roberts: Alterations; James Schook: Alterations; Donald Wheeler: Building; A.J. Porter; Plumbing; Jay Lantis: Building; Charles King: Plumbing.

Curley relayed a request from the JayCees for any additional painting projects they might accomplish on park facilities during their scheduled painting weekend, May 31. They plan to paint the new restroom facilities at Kirk Park. The plumbing work is to be finished this week. In seeking information for tennis court and basketball court construction Curley contacted the Norfolk Corporation in Quincy, Mass. and obtained literature on the new materials available. Moved by Mahony, supported by Curley that Revenue Sharing Funds be used for the development and construction of tennis courts at Carr Park. All yeas, carried.

Mann advised Council that a partial payment was needed on Mayor's Day expenses so that the K of C could be paid. Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony that the Mayor's Exchange Day Commit-

tee be paid \$100 to partially cover expenses incurred. All yeas, carried. Mann reported that the Zoning Ordinance is on tape at Washburn Planning Commission and they are sending a copy out. Additional copies will be made. Moved by Scully, supported by Mann that the meeting be adjourned at 9:40 p.m. All yeas, carried.

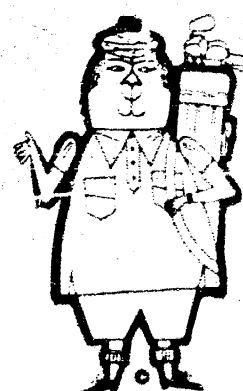
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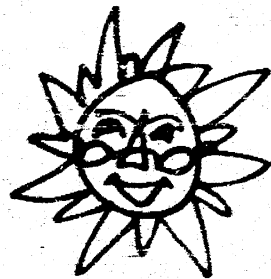

## Musical Youth International To Observe Fiftieth Anniversary



Musical Youth International 1975 Europe-bound tour group is entering final schedule of intensive rehearsal and pre-tour home concerts. The hundred twenty members strong, will concentrate on polishing their repertoire and receiving their briefing sessions to prepare for the weeks tour which will extend through Holland, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, and Denmark.

Thomas F. Steele, 18 year old 1975 graduate of Manchester High School, among the young people of the tour. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed E. Steele of 305 Beaufort Street. MYI is a chartered People to People group who annually visit a diverse area of the world to experience exchange of living at the personal level. Each year one hundred students selected from high schools in the Lakes area to organize a concert band and chorus. Some fifty girls are represented each year their outstanding student citizens,

who bring back to their local communities a personal report of their own experiences. MYI concerts reach audiences in the thousands ranging from schools, churches, and outside recreation parks, to the finest concert halls. MYI has travelled through most of the European nations, including Hungary and Yugoslavia, and the Mediterranean area. The 1973 tour included Venezuela, Belize and Mexico. Japan hosted MYI in 1969 and will again schedule the 1977 tour. Tunis opened the continent of Africa to MYI in 1972. Twice MYI has appeared in selected Canadian cities and has covered the U.S. from east to west, and south to north, including 2 world's fairs.

Mr. Cliff Richards is the 1975 chorus director. Mr. Richards has been director of vocal music at Battle Creek Central High School since 1946.

Intensive rehearsals will end with a banquet in Chelsea High School, when Mr. and Mrs. Perry Riddick of Saginaw will represent People to People International and present each student with his People to People pin. A public concert completes the evening, after which students and staff prepare to meet at Metropolitan Airport, Detroit, Monday, June 30th, for their Atlantic flight.

The 1975 MYI European tour will begin on July 1st in The Hague, Holland, where the group will live in People to People homes and share concerts with the Hague Youth Symphony. They next move to the Saar Valley, Germany and Merano, Italy. They will spend several days in the Alps area, and move to the International Band Festival in Gerstshofen, Germany, where they will be the featured performers. A three-day visit in Berlin follows; the tour climaxes in Copenhagen and vicinity, where concerts in Tivoli Garden and an ancient church in Kogs will be given.

## GOVERNMENT HALTS CREATION

Can you imagine the hassles God would have encountered if government agencies had been in existence when He began creation? An unknown author (probably a farmer frustrated in his efforts to till the earth God created) let his imagination soar and came up with this report from the "Daily Heavenly News."

In the beginning, God created heaven and earth. He was slapped with a class action lawsuit by the Heavenly Protection Agency (HEPA) for failure to file an environmental impact statement with the agency. God was granted a temporary permit for the heavenly portion of the project, but was issued a cease and desist order on the earthly part pending further investigation.

After filing his construction permit application, God appeared before the HEPA council to answer questions. When asked why he started the project in the first place, God said he needed a place to put Man on. One member

of the HEPA council, a woman, asked if he was being a male chauvinist. God said no, he wasn't, because he would make a woman from the man's rib—but that was worse, the woman said.

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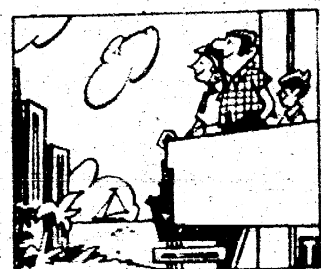

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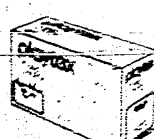

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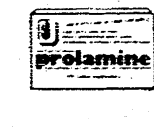
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**NATIONAL CUB PHYSICAL

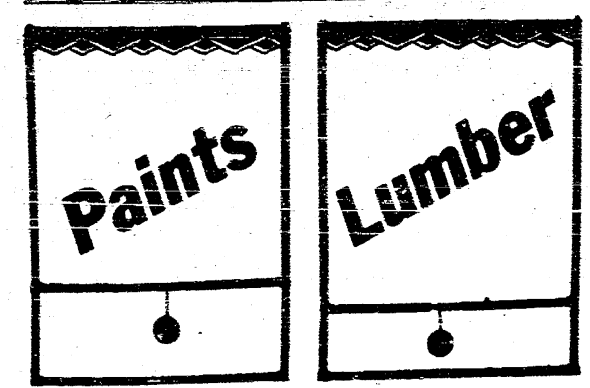

## Fresh Pears In Tangy Salad



As American as corn on the cob is "Cinnamon Cider Mold With Bartlett Pears." This simple but novel gelatin salad is flavored with red cinnamon candies and apple juice. The Bartlett pears are fresh from California. You'll find a good supply of them currently in local markets. Garnish the mold, if you wish, with parsley sprigs and pear slices that have been dipped into lemon juice to prevent darkening. This is an excellent salad for a buffet dinner, especially if you are featuring ham or fowl.

### CINNAMON CIDER MOLD WITH BARTLETT PEARS

- 2 cups cider or apple juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons red cinnamon candies
- 2 fresh California Bartlett pears
- 1 envelope plain gelatin
- Parsley

Combine 1 1/2 cups cider with the candies in saucepan; simmer until candies dissolve. Soften gelatin in remaining 1/2 cup cider; stir into hot mixture and continue stirring until dissolved. Add salt. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Halve, core and cube 1 pear; mix into gelatin and turn into mold. Chill until firm. Invert onto plate and garnish with parsley and the remaining fresh pear; cut into wedges.

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## Ask Senator GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. My daughter is a real Women's libber. She gets very upset with what she calls the "man's world." As her father, of course, I want her to have just as good a chance in life as my sons, and I'm sure that there are still a lot of inequities that ought to be corrected. But just to cheer her up, isn't it also true that in this so-called "man's world," American women outnumber the men, live longer on the average, and own a pretty big chunk of the national wealth?

You're right on all counts. Research by the Library of Congress confirms that 51.2% of the people in America are women. Women live approximately eight years longer than men on the average, and they do control immense portions of the nation's wealth. One study reveals that women in America bring home an estimated \$116 billion in salaries, own some \$10 billion in mutual funds and have about half the corporate stock in this country registered in their names.

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I hate to bother you about something so mundane as home canning jars and lids, but I had a rough time finding any to buy last year. Will they be difficult to come by again this year?

You're not the only one to ask—I've received over 500 inquiries on that subject.

Over 6 million new family gardens were planted last year, and that sent the demand for home canning materials skyrocketing by 170%.

According to the President's Special Assistant for Consumer Affairs, Virginia Knauer, the major manufacturers of canning jars and lids will produce 400 million more units this year. If people buy only what they need, and leave some for the next gardener, there should be enough supplies in all parts of the country for the home canners.

I'm about to start my first job this summer, but I need a Social Security card. How do I get one, and how long does it take? I'm 18 years old.

Go to the Social Security office nearest you—it's listed in your phone book under U.S. Government—and fill out an application card. Anyone 18 or over must present evidence of his or her date of birth.

June 2, 1975

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:08 p.m. Present were Beal, Curley, Daniels, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Mann, Scully and Zsenyuk.
