**SCOUTS ATTEND SUMMER CAMP**

Scouts are attending the summer camps of the Wolverine Council, Boy Scouts of America, in record numbers this summer according to P. Richard Guest, Council Camping Chairman.

Two camps are being operated this summer to serve the ninety troops that will be represented.

Camp Kanesbake, in the Irish Hills near Brooklyns, opened on June 22 for a five week Scout camping season which will be followed by a week of camping for Webelos Cub Scouts.

The Webelos Camp is a pilot project for 10 year old Cub Scouts who normally do not camp overnight on an extended basis without their fathers. This project is in its second summer of experimentation and has been approved by the National Cub Scouting Service of the Boy Scouts.

The demand for the Webelos Camp has made it necessary to double the capacity this year.

Wright's Lake Scout Reservation, near Ewart, will open for its third summer season on July 6. During its six week season, Wright's Lake will specialize in the outdoor skills of Scouting, including wilderness survival, orienteering, pioneering and rappelling.

Both camps have been awarded the coveted National Standard Camp Rating by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America for excellence in health, safety, program and administration.

Berkeley P. Duncan, Council Program Director, will direct both camps and head a staff of 43 adults, college men and senior Scouts. Fourteen of these staff members are graduates of Scouting's National Camp School. Members of the staff represent 20 midwestern colleges and universities.

While most Scouts attend camp with their own troop, under the leadership of their year-round Scoutmaster and committeemen, it is possible for individual boys to attend during the two weeks of provisional camping offered at each camp.

Veteran Scoutmaster John R. Williams, Ann Arbor, will serve as provisional Scoutmaster for these Scouts in both camps. Reservations are still available for Scouts on an individual basis. For more information, call the Council Service Center, 313-663-8514.

I'm a farmer, and I get sick and tired of people trying to tell me that farmers are to blame for high food prices. That's pure baloney! But how can I get my hands on something that sets forth the facts straight?

—S. J. Berries Springs

You'll be interested in a new Agriculture Department booklet entitled, "The Real Facts About Food." It has "ammunition" you can use and points out, for example, that despite recent food price increases, disposable income of the average farm family consistently lags behind the income of the average non-farm family.

Write for a free copy of the booklet to the Office of Communication, Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

I'm writing to you for my son. He made a mistake by not registering for the draft when he turned 18, and now he's scared to death. What should he do, Senator? He thought the draft was volunteer. Haven't others made the same mistake?

—T. C. Lansing

Yes, others have made the same mistake. In most cases, the Selective Service will accept the excuse once a boy realizes his mistake and corrects it by going in to register. So, have your son hot-foot it down to his local Selective Service board right now!

Others should keep in mind that even though there is no draft at present, the law still requires each male to register within 30 days before or after his 18th birthday. This can be done at school, at a courthouse or simply by filling out a "register by mail card" available at any local post office.

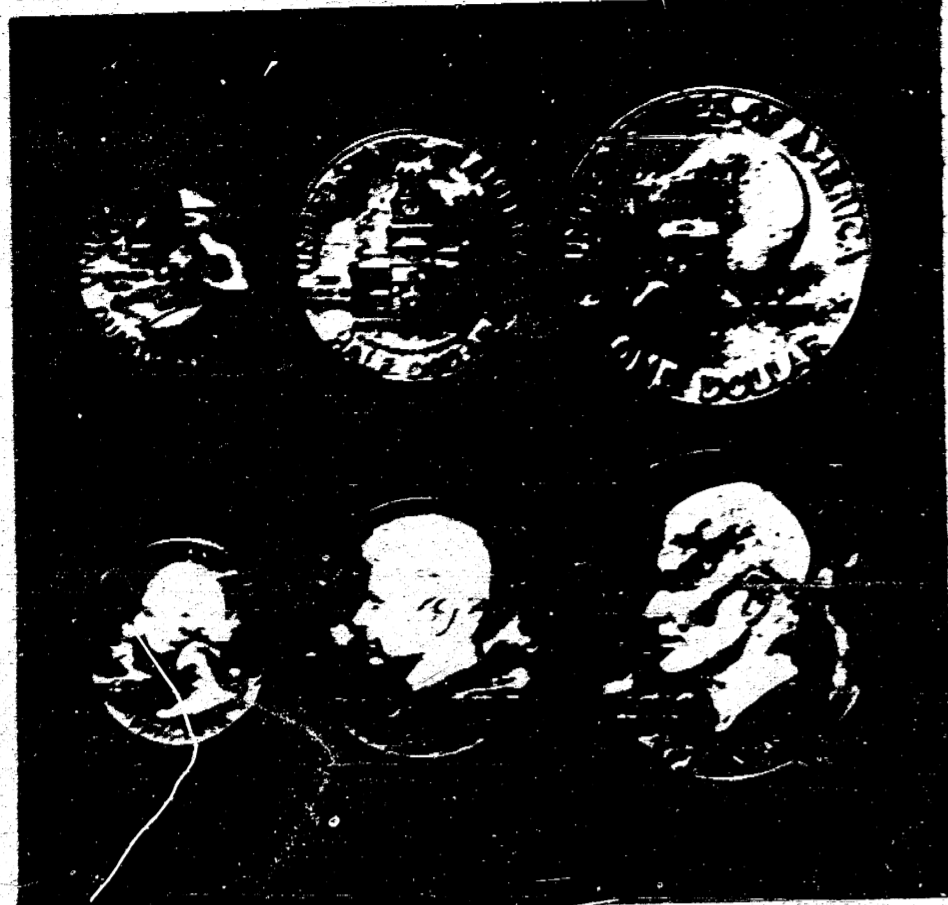

She's our nation's coin designer and says the colonial drummer was chosen in a national design competition to appear on the back of the new Bicentennial quarter. George Washington, she insists, will head the coin over a new date — 1776-1976 — and it was all done to celebrate our country's 200th birthday.

"I know big decisions, like whether or not to walk the dog in the rain, rest on the flip of a coin," Mrs. Brooks says, "and I want to warn the nation's big decision makers about the coming big change in their small change."

In all, the Mint is changing the designs on the backs of three coins in honor of the Bicentennial. Along with Washington on the quarter, those famous faces of Kennedy and Eisenhower, with the new twin date, still head the half dollar and dollar. Again, it's the backs that carry the new Bicentennial designs. Independence Hall won its place on the back of the half dollar. And the moon and Liberty Bell was chosen for the dollar reverse.

By July 7, 1975, your friendly neighborhood bank should begin receiving the first of the circulating Bicentennial coins to be released—the Kennedy-Independence Hall half dollar. Before the end of the year, the Federal Reserve System will have had the time to supply the nation's commercial banks with the newly redesigned quarter and dollar.

"To me, these coins—like all our coins—are symbols of our nation's 200 years of freedom," Mrs. Brooks says. "They are small links with our historical and cultural heritage that will touch the hands of every man, woman and child in America."

### ROSY RHUBARB COBBLER

Makes 6 servings

**Filling:**  
4 cups fresh rhubarb, cut in 1-inch pieces  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 egg, slightly beaten

**Pastry:**  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted  
One-half 10-oz. pkg. (1 cup) Flako Pie Crust Mix  
2 to 2 1/2 tablespoons cold water

Heat oven to hot (400° F.). For filling, place rhubarb and nuts in 1 1/2-qt. shallow baking dish. Combine sugar, flour, salt, egg and butter; spoon evenly over rhubarb and nuts.  
For pastry, empty pie crust mix into bowl. Sprinkle water by tablespoonfuls over mix; stir with fork until just dampened. Form into ball. Roll out on lightly floured board or canvas to fit top of baking dish. Cut design in pastry to allow steam to escape. Adjust pastry over filling; turn edges under and flute. Bake in preheated oven (400° F.) 40 to 45 minutes. If desired, serve with ice cream.

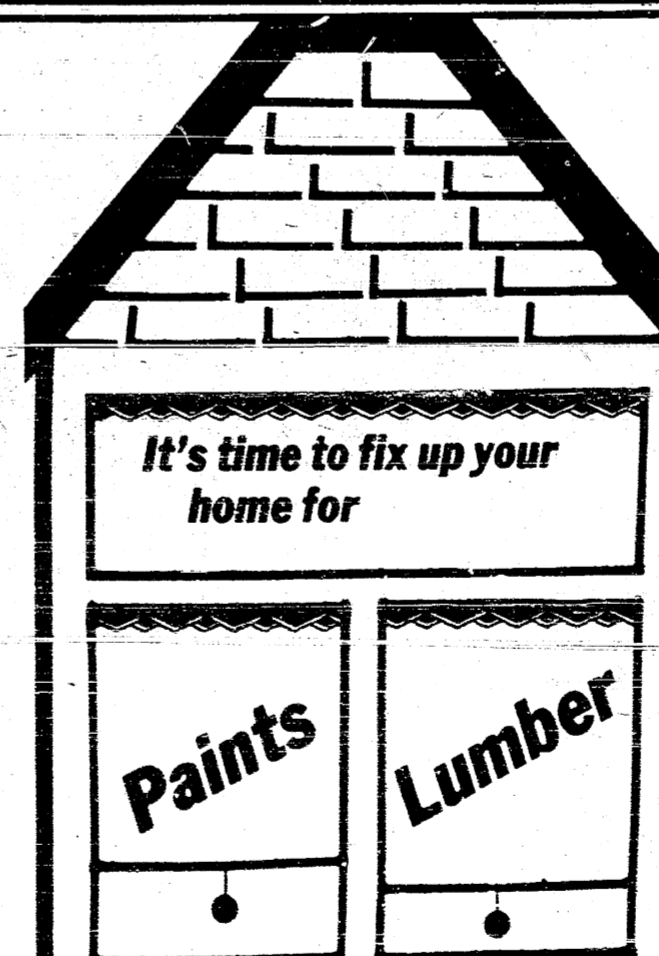

The Michigan Law Enforcement Network (LEIN) system now has the identity and address of every licensed driver in the state computerized. Also, if the burglar is caught with marked goods in his possession, the license number is solid evidence of the possession of stolen goods.

Sliced onion, dairy sour cream dressing and seasonings of salt, sugar, vinegar and prepared mustard are added. It's served on crisp lettuce leaves garnished with chopped green onions.

Still another marvelous potato salad is made with Michigan wine. To prepare: cook, peel and drain five medium potatoes. Slice and cover with 1/2 cup of dry white Michigan wine in a bowl. Turn slices several times. In another bowl, place 1/3 cup Italian-style dressing, 4 finely chopped green onions, 1/2 cup raw cauliflower bits, 2 chopped plumbeaus, 1/4 cup chopped black olives, 1/4 cup stuffed, chopped green olives and a dash of salt. Chill both mixtures well and toss gently together just before serving. If this is to be taken to a picnic site, carry both bowls separately and toss at the last minute. Recipe serves six.

Serve these salads as an accompaniment for barbecued beef, pork or poultry, or as a main dish with bread or cracker, fresh fruits and beverage.

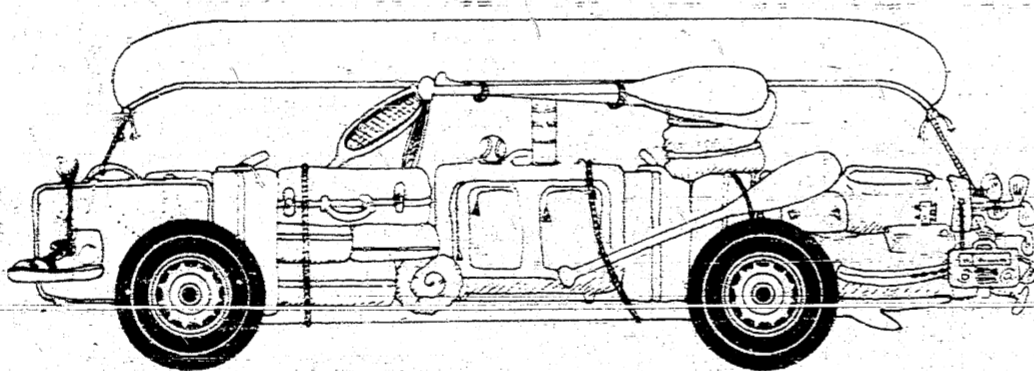



#### YOU CAN'T BEAT THE REAL THING

If you use cream in your coffee, you've probably noticed that many restaurants have switched to non-dairy creamers. Ads touting just how good non-dairy products are have caused many people to shift to these substitutes in their homes, for use in their coffee and even on their breakfast cereal. They have been led to believe that they are getting as much nutrition and less fat.

Not so, says a consumer testing organization. They compared the liquid and powdered "creamers" along with milk and came up with some startling facts. When checked for calories, a teaspoon of the powder contained 16, the liquid had 23, and milk -- only 17. One calorie hardly warrants shifting away from the "real thing".

Some people have eliminated dairy products from their daily diets because they have been misled by the saturated fat propaganda. Yet, of all the non-dairy creamers tested, only three were actually

lower in saturated fat. All the others were suspected of containing coconut oil, which is between 88 and 100 percent saturated fat. (Compare that with whole milk, which is only 57 percent.)

The coffee whippers contain a whole batch of ingredients including sodium caseinate, corn syrup solids, and small amounts of additives such as mono- and di-glycerides, dipotassium phosphate, calcium gluconate, sodium silico aluminate, tricalcium phosphate, artificial flavor and color. Turn on your taste buds?

Whole milk, on the other hand, has less calories, less saturated fats, and you get sizable amounts of calcium, complete milk protein, vitamins A and D, riboflavin, thiamine, niacin, pantothenic acid, vitamins B-6 and B-12, C and E, phosphorus, magnesium and a number of trace minerals. Makes you feel healthy just to read the contents.

As Dr. Jean Mayer, famous Harvard nutritionist, said recently, "There may be a place for 'coffee creamers' aboard an airliner 30,000 feet over the Rockies where milk is difficult to store and to serve. But there should be no place for it in your family kitchen."

Amen, Doctor Mayer. You can't beat the "real thing," for taste or nutritional

**22nd Manchester Chicken Broil Thursday, July 17**

Nesting quietly under elm, oak and maple trees on the Raisin River, the village of Manchester, Michigan is preparing itself for the 17th of July, 1975. On that day this small village of eighteen hundred plays host to over ten thousand people who come from near and far to enjoy the food and the fellowship of the world famous Manchester Charcoal Chicken Broil. The site of this activity, the local athletic field, will contain people from foreign countries and most of the states. Taiwan, Tahiti and Tacoma, Brisbane, Bogota and Brooklyn, Hawaii, Honduras and Hartford have all been logged in the registration book. Truly this original and unique chicken broil plays host to the world and the excitement of this day is a most memorable experience. Sponsored by the Optimist Club and Jaycees the Charcoal Chicken Broil is staffed by over 550 volunteer men and boys whose sole concern on this day is

to serve the best charcoal broiled chicken possible to the hungry guests. Under the personal supervision of Dr. Howard Zindell, head of the Michigan State Poultry Dept. and the man who perfected this system of broiling chickens, this event has grown in the last twenty two years into one of the largest of its kind in the world.

Four charcoal pits, each 100 feet long, consume over two ton of charcoal. Over three thousand tender chicken halves at a time are placed on grids, basted with butter and served hot to eager guests. In slightly over four hours more than ten thousand chicken halves will be served along with over a ton of cole slaw, 1/2 ton of radishes, thousands of rolls, and a truck load of potato chips. Dinners are also available as take outs. Pre-sale tickets are \$2.75, \$3.00 at the gate. Guests are invited to watch the proceedings. Old-fashioned sausage cutters are manned by eager cole slaw makers. The take out line is automated. Buns are sliced and buttered by experts. The chicken halves are buttered with special equipment. Mounted officers from the County Sheriff's Department direct traffic and Radio Station WPAG broadcasts from the grounds.
