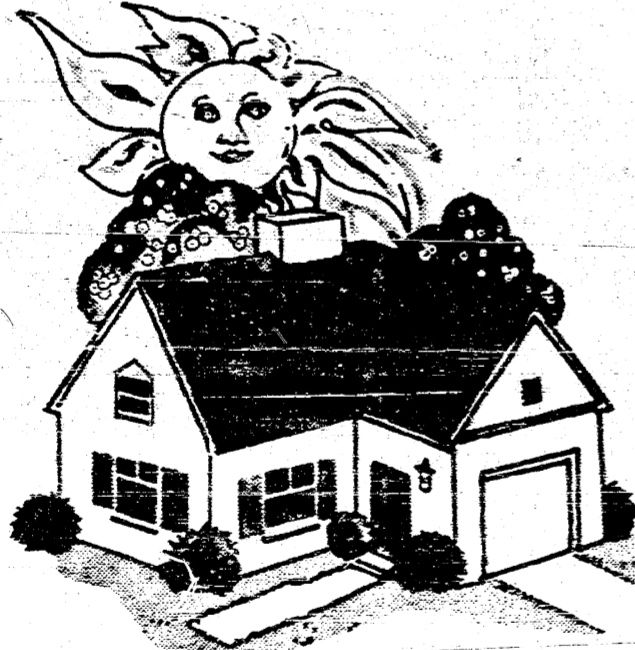

By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. How can I find out how much money is credited to my Social Security account? Some companies say they'll get this information for you if you subscribe to their magazine or buy their products. But isn't there a way I can go directly to the Government and find out?

—L. S. Lansing

Yes. To obtain a statement of your Social Security earnings, all you have to do is to call your local Social Security office. (Listed in the phone directory under "U.S. Government"). Ask to be sent post card form OAR-7004, entitled "Request for Statement of Earnings." When it arrives, fill in the post card, which is already addressed to the Social Security Administration's office in Baltimore, Maryland, put a stamp on it, and mail it in.

We're planning a move, and I want to make sure that the moving company we select is a reliable one. Our family possessions aren't worth much in dollar terms, but they sure are worth a lot in sentimental value. How can I check on a company's performance?

—A. J. Detroit

The Interstate Commerce Commission requires each moving company operating across State lines to file a performance report with the I.C.C., and to provide prospective customers with a copy upon request. The report contains such information as how many shipments the company makes, what percentage of these shipments are late, data about claims filed against the company for loss or damage, together with other information that should provide a good basis for evaluation of the company's reliability.

You may obtain such a report by writing directly to the moving company or by contacting the Household Goods Branch, Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C. 20423.

# Agriculture in Action

## THE CONSUMER PROTECTION AGENCY AND FARMERS

Weber defines a consumer as "one that utilizes economic goods." Every one of us fits that definition. So perhaps it's not surprising that many organizations and Congressmen have decided we need an agency to protect ourselves from one another when we buy something. At the present time, the Federal Government has 39 different agencies and individuals watching over consumer interests in one way or another. In addition, almost two dozen Congressional Committees have assumed similar responsibilities.

But now, there are bills to create a super agency to protect the consumer. Supporters of the legislation contend the present agencies and departments have no real power to act. They say a Consumer Protection Agency would act like a lawyer in government proceedings and could sue in consumer interests.

The establishment of the Consumer Agency, at a cost of 60 million dollars, would not automatically eliminate other offices with similar functions. And doing away with an established government program is next to impossible. They strive to show a need for their existence. Duplication of effort makes for inefficiency in business or government, with the consumers paying the cost.

Farmers respect consumers, but are sensitive to the possibilities of a Consumer Protection Agency. They remember the damage of the beef price freeze. The fear of the consumer agency goes deep.

Agriculture is based on faith in the future. Once crops are planted or animals are impregnated, there is no cutting

back on production. The disruption of the marketing system by the Consumer Protection Agency could make farmers hesitant to make commitments to an unknown market situation. That would certainly have a great effect on food, its supply and price.

## FARMERS URGED TO DEAL WITH LICENSED OPERATORS

To protect the value of their grain, farmers are urged to deal with licensed elevator operators who are bonded and to obtain official warehouse receipts for grain stored.

This is the message from B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. "Official warehouse receipts are required by the Michigan Farm Produce Storage act if the farmers are to be protected by state law," Ball said. "Such 'warehouse receipts' would be honored first should an elevator fail to pay or go bankrupt.

"Some warehouses," the director added, "offer 'price later agreements,' which are not covered by the Farm Produce Storage act. These agreements provide for the sale price and payment between owner and elevator to be determined at a later date. Often," he said, "at the time the owner delivers the grain to the warehouse, there is no agreement to a certain price, although the title in the grain becomes the property of the warehouse at the signing of the agreement."

The Farm Produce Storage act stipulates that if an elevator fails or becomes insolvent, stocks on hand are used to satisfy warehouse receipts before any other claims are settled. Michigan farmers can protect themselves by making certain they obtain official warehouse receipts.

## WHAT'S COOKING IN MICHIGAN

Soon you'll be seeing an abundance of fresh Michigan celery in the marketplace. The state's celery season is underway and the pale green vegetable will continue in plentiful supply from July through October, according to Marketing officials of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Celery tends to thrive well in Michigan's moderate climate. Our state is third nationally in total production. Usual planting season is about mid-April through June. It's saleable 85 to 100 days after transplanting. Last year 107 million pounds of celery were grown on 2,500 acres centered primarily in Allegan, Kent, Leapeer, Muskegon and Ottawa counties.

Like celery in soups and salads? Consider serving it also as a vegetable dish. It can help you cut down on calories while still providing important nutrients. One

cup of diced celery has about 20 calories. Celery combined with other vegetables gives added flavor and nutritional value. Some suggestions you may want to try are fresh asparagus and celery, brussels sprouts and celery, tomatoes and celery au gratin. Add cooked, diced celery to white sauce and serve over carrots, green beans or peas to enhance their natural flavors. Or saute celery chunks, chopped onions, bell pepper strips and sliced fresh mushrooms in butter for a delicious vegetable medley.

Celery with cheese is another tasty dish. Cut two stalks of celery into 4-inch lengths. Steam until tender, place in flat baking dish, add salt and cover with a cup of grated cheese. Sprinkle with paprika, place under broiler and melt cheese without browning it. It's a great accompaniment for roast beef.

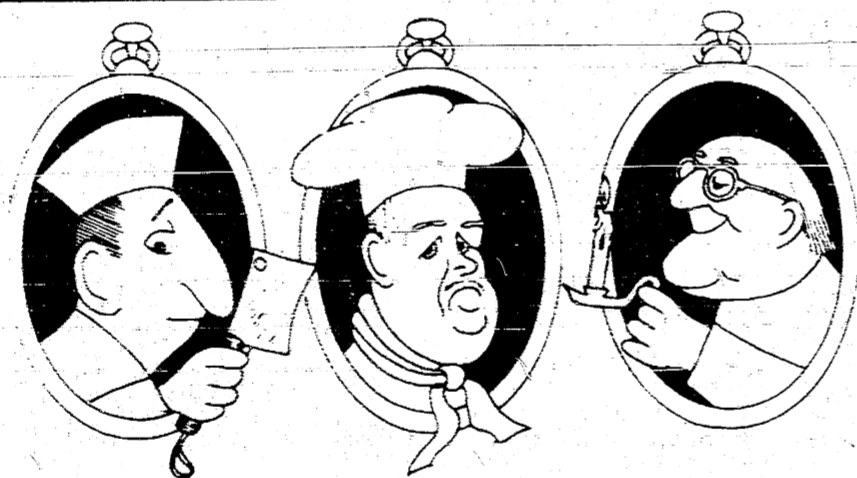

plegics, quadriplegics, some servicemen and veterans and widows of the blind with an income of less than \$10,000.

## MICHIGAN LOTTERY REVENUE

Michigan lottery revenue for the 1974-75 fiscal year reached \$64.8 million about \$117,000 over last year, but Lottery Commissioner Gus Harrison said ticket sales were down slightly. The increased revenue includes interest on revenues generated for the general fund and about \$2 million in unclaimed prize money. Prize money totaled \$64 million throughout the year with gross sales adding up to about \$135.8 million.

Diabetic patients planning to travel through Canada should be warned that production of 80 unit and 40 unit insulin is rapidly drawing to a close, with the 100 unit insulin becoming the standard available in Canadian pharmacies. The Michigan Pharmacist Journal also issued a caution on the potential hazard of using 40 unit or 80 unit insulin systems for the injection of 100 unit insulin. Therefore, the Michigan Journal alerted pharmacists to urge diabetics planning a Canadian vacation to anticipate their insulin and insulin syringe needs appropriately. If in Canada and insulin needs arise, be sure to discuss the necessary dosage and administration adjustments with the Canadian pharmacist if the 100 unit insulin is utilized. This public health message from your pharmacist is part of the state association's continuing Pharmacy Facts series - "Ask for the Pharmacist...for the Pharmacy Facts."

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# COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

JULY 7, 1975

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:04 p.m. Present were Curley, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Mann, Scully, and Zsenyuk; absent Beal and Daniels. Minutes from the June 16 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Mann, supported by Mahony. All years, carried.

Fitzgerald questioned the results of an item in the minutes referring to zoning changes. Mann is checking further on the legality of the change. The locking of Carr Park was also discussed.

Mr. Charles Burg was present to request a license for a recreational center in the downtown area. He was questioned regarding his background and experience for such a venture. Chief Zsenyuk cited the regulations imposed by some townships for such centers and advised Council that a State law is pending to govern the same. A check on the premises must be run on the individual. Mahony asked Mr. Burg how such a center would benefit the community. He answered that it would keep some of the young people off the street, he could make some money and it would give him a job. Little commented that it would be a commercial use in a commercial district. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Curley to refer the matter to the Health and Safety Comm. requesting that they have a recommendation at the next regular council meeting. All years, carried.

Mann advised Council of actions taken at the last Planning Commission meeting where the group considered the request of Dr. Glenn C. Lehr to rezone the property at 515 Territorial from One Family Residential to Two Family Residential. The Planning Commission requested that Council give the proposal favorable consideration and asked that a sketch of proposed changes and parking provisions also be submitted to Council. Dr. Lehr was present in conjunction with his proposal. Although he did not have any sketches with him he did explain his plan for making the dwelling into a two family rental property. Curley questioned why spot-zoning was being considered. Fitzgerald asked for further time to check into

possibilities other than spot-zoning. Mahony advised Lehr that with re-zoning a revision in the Zoning Map is necessary, as well as the consideration to rezone an entire area, with an accompanying Ordinance to establish a district. Moved by Curley, supported by Fitzgerald to table the request until next meeting, prior to which Council would like a sketch of definite plans. Mahony also asked if Mann would check with the Village Attorney on various matters in which the matter could be handled. All years, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Mann to recess as Village Council and convene as Zoning Board of Appeals at 8:05 p.m. All years, carried. The Board considered the request of Gary Wallace for a variance to allow the removal of his garage to his own property, but within two feet of the existing lot line. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Curley to approve the variance at 124 Torrey Street. All years, carried. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully to adjourn as Zoning Board of Appeals and reconvene as Village Council. All years, carried.

Jay Lantis was present with Neil Quinlan to explain changes in the plan for his new store. He also had requested that some of the neighbors attend the meeting so that any of their questions could be answered. Concerns were voiced about the drainage and fencing.

Ed Rickelman asked about the tap-in fees in conjunction with extending a main. He is proposing a development on East Main Street across from the High School.

Art Williams brought up some complaints on homeowner's permits. He also advised Council of problems relative to a red tag he had placed recently. Little will draft a letter to the owner regarding the matter.

Zsenyuk presented his report for the month of June, 1975. ## Should We Add A Bit Of Salt To The Water?

Goodness what a response! All sorts of people seemed to enjoy our somewhat glutinous account of elbow dripping corn feasts. We have been listening all week to good things about food and one utterly charming gentleman turned up on the doorstep with a gift of fresh corn. We've had a conference and with the staff offering suggestions like "This week talk about beef steak" or "How about money as a subject?" I simply had to quench such frivolous ideas and work with the principle that when a good thing is going—go with it.

There seems to be a variety of schools about the proper enjoyment of corn. Small tender green corn as opposed to large yellow fat kernels. Should the fingers be used or those little skewers to keep the fingertips cool. Should we add a bit of salt to the water or a spoon of sugar? One can buy small brushes to paint the butter evenly, but I have a brother-in-law who maintains stoutly that the only civilized way is to put a pat of butter on a slice of bread and roll the corn in it. Lots of people who don't have either the heart or the bite for it simply stand the cob on end and slice the kernels off with a sharp knife, then butter the plateful and eat while everyone else must stop to butter and sprinkle.

We have taken the ears still in the husks and soaked them in water and roasted on the grill, have done the same roasting with the corn wrapped in foil.

The leftover corn can be sliced off and warmed in milk, for myself though, dried corn is the best way.

The simplest way is to do small portions at a time, usually the few ears that are left after dinner, cut the kernels from the cob and spread on a cookie sheet, slip into the oven door open to let the moisture escape, about one half hour should be enough for the nuggets to turn golden brown and hard as rock. Cool and store in a glass jar on cupboard shelf. Later in the winter, simply soak a few hours in milk and heat gently, serve with a smile, for the corn has a nutty flavor.

Indian maize, staple of the pioneers and early settlers, one of the basic grains of

the world, corn is well worth the trouble of canning. If you can acquire enough lids for the canning jars. However don't despair, for I'm told that President Ford remarked that he was personally going to see about the lid shortage, just before he left for an overseas trip.
