DON'T RE-USE CANNING LIDS

The Michigan Consumers Council asked the Attorney General today to investigate an ad selling information on how to beat the canning lid shortage. Linda Joy, Executive Director of the Michigan Consumers Council, says: "The information consumers receive by sending \$1 to the company in answer to the ad is completely contrary to home canning procedures recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture and by the Cooperative Extension Service."

"The information advises consumers to re-use flat metal lids and gives instructions on how to remove and treat them so they can be re-used. This is a risky experiment," Joy says.

"Flat metal canning lids have an airtight gasket, often called a rubber or plastic seal, which seals snugly against the mouth of the jar. During the canning process the lids are pulled down by a tremendous sealing vacuum. The pressure cuts deeply into the rubber gaskets, deforming them and making them risky to use again. If a proper airtight seal is not formed, bacteria can grow, causing the food to spoil," Joy explains.

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1-4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 egg
- 1 cup molasses
- 1 cup hot water
- 2 cups 48 bran flakes

Mix flour with soda, baking powder, salt, and spices. Cream shortening, beat in egg. Add molasses and hot water and blend until smooth. Add flour mixture; beat until smooth. Stir in cereal. Pour into a 9-inch square pan which has been lined on bottom with paper. Bake at 325° for about 45 minutes, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 3 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling on rack. Serve warm with prepared whipped topping, if desired. Makes 9 servings.

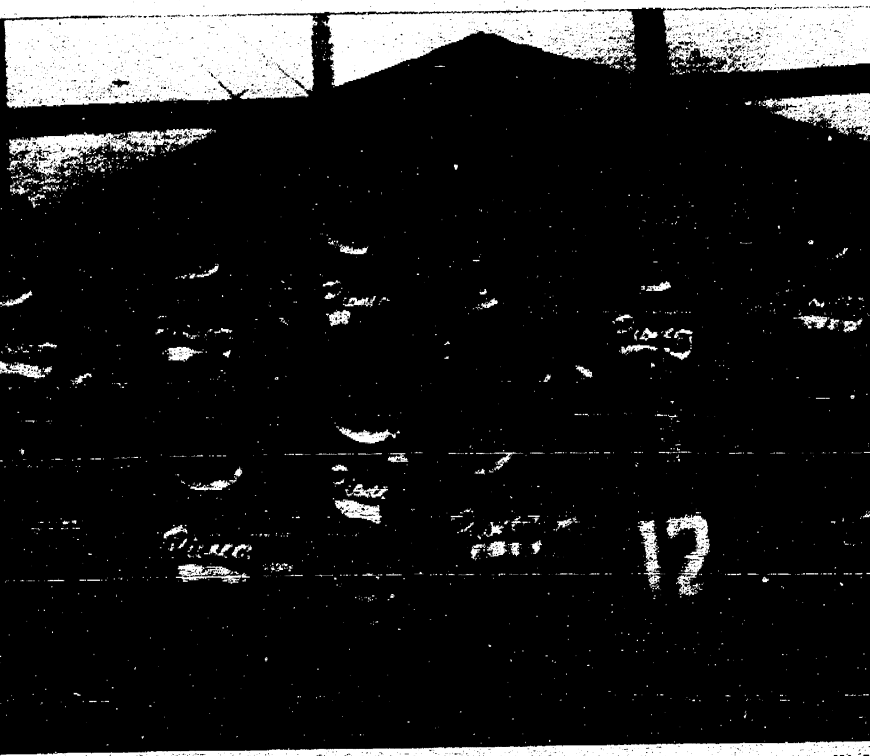
VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER

ORDINANCE NO. 45
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 45 ENTITLED: AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH DISTRICTS IN THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER; TO REGULATE THE USE OF THE LAND AND STRUCTURES THEREIN; TO REGULATE AND LIMIT THE HEIGHT, AREA, BULK AND LOCATION OF BUILDINGS; TO REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE LOCATION OF TRADES AND INDUSTRIES AND THE LOCATION OF BUILDING DESIGNED FOR SPECIFIC USES; TO REGULATE AND DETERMINE THE AREA OF YARDS, COURTS AND OTHER OPEN SPACES; TO REGULATE THE DENSITY OF POPULATION; TO PROVIDE FOR A BOARD OF APPEALS, AND ITS POWERS AND DUTIES; AND TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS THEREOF.

The Village of Manchester Ordains: Section 1. That Section 3.02 of an ordinance entitled: "An Ordinance to Establish Districts in the Village of Manchester, to Regulate the use of land and structures therein; to regulate and limit the height, area, bulk and location of buildings; to regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specific spaces; to regulate the density of population; to provide for a board of appeals, and its powers and duties; and to provide a penalty for the violation of the terms thereof," be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 3.02 ZONING MAP
The "Zoning Map of the Village of Manchester" shall be and hereby is amended to change the designation of premises hereinafter described on said map from District "R-1" One-Family Resident District to "R-2" Two-Family Resident Districts. Said property being described as:
Premises situate in the Village of Manchester, Washtenaw County, Michigan, described as: Commencing at the North 1/4 corner of Section 11, T4S, R3E, Manchester Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan; thence S 88 degree 00' W 1505.00 feet along the north line of said section for a place of beginning; thence S 2 degree 25' E 165.0 feet; thence S 88 degree 00' W 16.5 feet; thence S 2 degree 25' E 165.0 feet; thence S 88 degree 60' W 115.5 feet; thence N 2 degree 25' W 330.0 feet; thence N 88 degree 00' E 132.0 feet to the place of beginning being a part of the NW 1/4 of said Section 11, containing 0.94 acres of land more or less, subject to the rights of the public over the northerly 33.0 feet hereof as occupied by Territorial Road.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after twenty days from its legal publication.

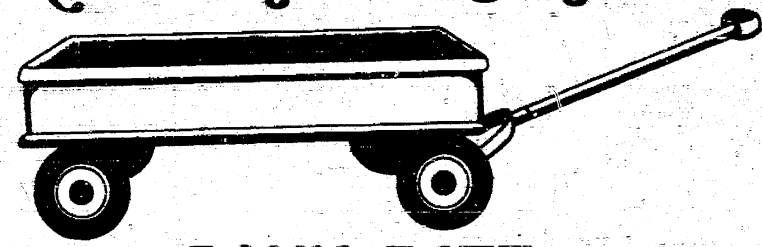

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Manchester School Board Minutes

The organizational meeting of the Manchester Public Schools Board of Education was held on Monday, July 14, 1975 in the High School Library. Board members present were Louis Vogel, Andrew Luckhardt, William Bunney, Harold Walkow, Susan Westfall and Helen Kensler. Board Member Reno Feldkamp was out of town on business. Also present were Supt. Swartz, Bus. Mgr. Mizar and Principals Kocesi and Tassie.

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Supt. Swartz. Mr. Swartz reviewed the agenda for the meeting and went over the various documents which would be acted upon.

The first order of business was the swearing in of new members by Andrew Luckhardt. New members to the board are William Bunney, Susan Westfall and Helen Kensler.

Next, Supt. Swartz asked for nominations for the office of president. It was moved by Walkow that Louis Vogel be nominated for president. The motion was supported by Luckhardt. There were no other nominations for president and Mr. Vogel was elected by a unanimous vote. Mr. Vogel assumed chairing the meeting.

The next order of business was receiving nominations for vice president. It was moved by Bunney that Harold Walkow be nominated for vice president. Andrew Luckhardt seconded the nomination and moved that a unanimous ballot be cast for Mr. Walkow. Motion carried.

Next, nominations were opened for the position of secretary to the board. It was moved by Bunney and seconded by Luckhardt that Andrew Luckhardt be nominated for board secretary. There were no other nominations and a unanimous ballot was cast for Luckhardt.

Mr. Vogel asked for nominations for board treasurer. It was moved by Walkow and supported by Bunney that Reno Feldkamp be nominated for the office of treasurer. Mr. Bunney then moved that a unanimous ballot be cast for Mr. Feldkamp. Motion carried.

The designation of a depository for

school funds was considered next. Bus. Mgr. Mizar recommended that the following banks be named as depositories for school funds: Union Savings Bank of Manchester, Ann Arbor Bank of Ann Arbor, Huron Valley National Bank of Ann Arbor, Citizens Commercial & Savings Bank of Flint, National Bank of Detroit. Board Member Westfall suggested that Michigan National Bank of Flint also be considered as a depository for funds. After some discussion it was moved by Westfall and seconded by Luckhardt that all six banks previously mentioned be named as depositories for school funds. Motion carried.

The board then discussed dates for the regular meetings during the coming year. It was moved by Kensler and seconded by Westfall that the regular meetings be held on the third Monday of each month. Motion carried.

There were no corrections to the minutes of the previous meeting and they were approved as presented.

Bus. Mgr. Mizar gave a report on the cash and investment balances and financial report as of June 30, 1975. It was moved by Kensler and supported by Bunney that the reports be approved as presented. Motion carried.

It was suggested by board member Westfall that the business manager's authority for early payment of utility bills to avoid penalties be continued. After discussion it was moved by Westfall and supported by Kensler that this authority be continued. Motion carried.

A thank you note from the Klager family was acknowledged.

Mr. Mizar presented quotations on 28 typing desks from McFadden Corp. and Michigan School Service. It was mentioned that three other companies had been contacted for quotations but had not responded. The quotations were \$53.50 each from McFadden and \$63.30 from Michigan School Service. A motion was made by Luckhardt and supported by Bunney to accept the quotation from McFadden Corp. because of the lower price and superior units. Motion carried.

Next, quotations were presented on typewriters. Four companies were contacted and quotations were received on five different brands of typewriters. The quotations were as follows: Office Supply House-

Olympia-\$395, A & D Business Machines-Royal-\$430, IBM Corporation-IBM-\$500, Ambassador Typewriter Service-Hermes-\$562 and Facit-\$548. The Olympia Typewriter was recommended because of their proven durability in other schools, lower purchase price and because they would lead continuity between Manchester's typing classes and the model office program offered through Saline High School which uses Olympia Typewriters. The plans for the new IGA market were approved and ground breaking was scheduled for August 5.

Scully asked if there were some way to provide water at each pavilion at Carr

Park. The matter will be considered and the cost checked into.

John Eppich of Double A Products was present in conjunction with that company's request for the establishment of an Industrial Development District. Resolved by Fitzgerald, supported by Beal that An Industrial Development District under Michigan Public Act 198 be hereby established for the property owned by Double A Products Company of Manchester described as follows: Code 090 00900 MA 7-6 All block I including alley herein Thomas Morgan Addition-in response to the letter request of Double A Products Company dated June 5, 1975 as sole owner of the described property.

The district shall be known as "Industrial Development District No. 1." Ayes: Beal, Curley, Fitzgerald, Mann Nays: none. Abstained: Mahony, Scully. Motion carried.

In the discussion prior to the motion Limperj expressed concern about what the future policy would be on Industrial Development Districts. Fitzgerald answered that he felt each would have to be considered on its individual merits, but that a general policy for consideration would have to be formulated. Fielder expressed a similar concern.

Eppich expressed appreciation on behalf of Double A Products for the acceptance granted on this first step toward the Industrial Development District Number 1.

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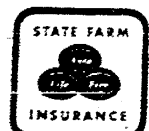

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Khaki Makes the Fashion Scene

Army khaki and olive drab colors are making a big comeback in summer fashions. The clothes—shorts, shirts, skirts, sweaters and coveralls—may come straight from a military surplus store but don't overlook other interesting do-it-yourself alternatives.

The fashion colors can be added to clothing already on hand. White and light colored clothing can be easily dyed khaki or olive drab in the washing machine sink or pot. Except for some polyesters and acrylics, any washable fabric is dyeable.

Use these Rit dye color recipes to color 1 pound (dry weight) or 2 yards of fabric:

Khaki—1 package tan plus 1 package navy. Olive drab—1 package jade green plus 1 package dark brown. Washing machine automatic assures even dye color. Fill washer with hot water and pour in dissolved dye solution. Agitate briefly to mix well, then add wet, unfolded items to be dyed. Set washer for longest wash cycle followed by a cold water rinse.

For a light and dark camouflage look—Before dyeing fabric, crumple it and secure at random with tightly wound rubber bands. Place into khaki or olive drab dye solution. Remove, rinse thoroughly and dry.



Dye a white butcher's apron khaki or olive drab. Complete the outfit with a dyed T-shirt and sun hat.

Here are some tips for best dye color results:

1. Before dyeing wash fabric; remove any spots or stains to assure an even color. Fabrics should be evenly wet before placing in dye solution.
2. Use hottest water available when mixing dye solution.
3. After dyeing, rinse fabric thoroughly in cold water to remove excess dye. Dry in automatic dryer or air dry out of direct sunlight. Iron if necessary while damp.

Is there any way to make sure your drinking water is safe? Every so often you see something on TV about bad water in other cities. I would like to know more about the subject.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has published a newly revised booklet that reviews the results of Government research into the problem and tells what progress is being made to improve the situation. You can obtain a free copy of this pamphlet, "A Drop to Drink," by writing E. P. A., Office of Public Inquiries, Southwest Mall, 401 M Street, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20460. The agency requests that you ask for the pamphlet by name and allow several weeks for delivery.

Mr. Senator, I'm confident you can settle this little argument. My wife insists that Senator Hart is called Michigan's "senior Senator" because he has a few years on you in age. I always thought that the "senior," "junior" designations referred to years of service. Who wins this argument?

Chalk one up for yourself. The word "senior" or "junior," as applied to U.S. Senators, refers to their relative years of service in the Senate, and not to their ages. A "senior Senator" may be much younger in years than the "junior Senator" serving the same State. An example would be Senator John Tower, Texas' "senior Senator," who is a few years younger than the "junior Senator" of that State, Senator Lloyd Bentsen. Senator Tower entered the Senate in 1961 while Senator Bentsen began his term in 1971.

In Michigan, Senator Hart is regarded as the "senior Senator" because he entered the Senate in 1959. I did not begin my service in the Senate until 1966, making me the "junior Senator" from Michigan.

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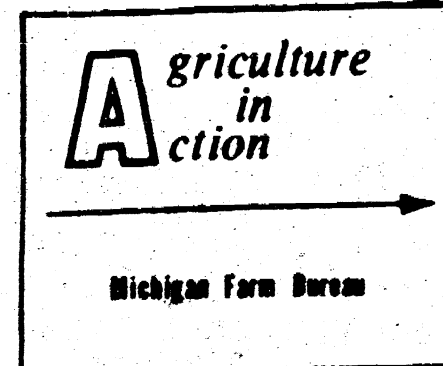
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THE PRICE OF BREAD

"Extral Extral Read all about it! The price of bread is going up because of increased labor, transportation and packaging costs!"

You're not likely to read that kind of story in your local newspaper; it simply isn't palatable to the American public. When the price of our bread goes up, we need someone to vent our anger upon and labor, transportation and packaging are far too impersonal to zero in on.

The Russian wheat sales, on the other hand, and the implications that this would raise the price of bread, are "acceptable" as headline material for eager consumption by U.S. readers, listeners and viewers. It provides them with a specific target for their anger. They can be mad at the Russians for buying the wheat and at the American farmers for selling it. It's emotion, rather than facts, that dictate public sentiment and that's what is so frustrating to farmers. While wheat prices fell a total of around \$3.00 from 1974 to June of this year, the price of bread and cereal continued to rise. Now, the Russian grain sale will provide "justification" for continuing price increases. The gullible public's reaction provides a great vehicle for processors who are looking for something to which to ride into the next election.

Politicians know it's easy to "con" voters—just promise to "protect" them from high food prices by placing restrictions on farm exports. Then sock-it-to-'em in the form of taxes to pay for storing our huge surpluses. At the same time, weaken the value of their dollar by damaging the country's reputation as a reliable supplier in the world market. By the time that happens, they're elected, and most people don't know what balance of trade means to them anyway.

It's not so easy to con farmers. They were urged this year to aim for all-out production. They responded to that encouragement with the result of record crops—enough for domestic needs, plus plenty for foreign customers. In producing these record crops, they also faced record production costs. Now, they're being told that their markets—which they need to realize a return for their investment and efforts—will be curtailed.

If our government does succumb to the pressures for farm export restrictions, we won't have to worry about surpluses in the future. Farmers simply won't produce without the freedom to market. If that happens, we'll be on the other end of the grain sales—if there's any to buy, that will be an open meeting to all western
