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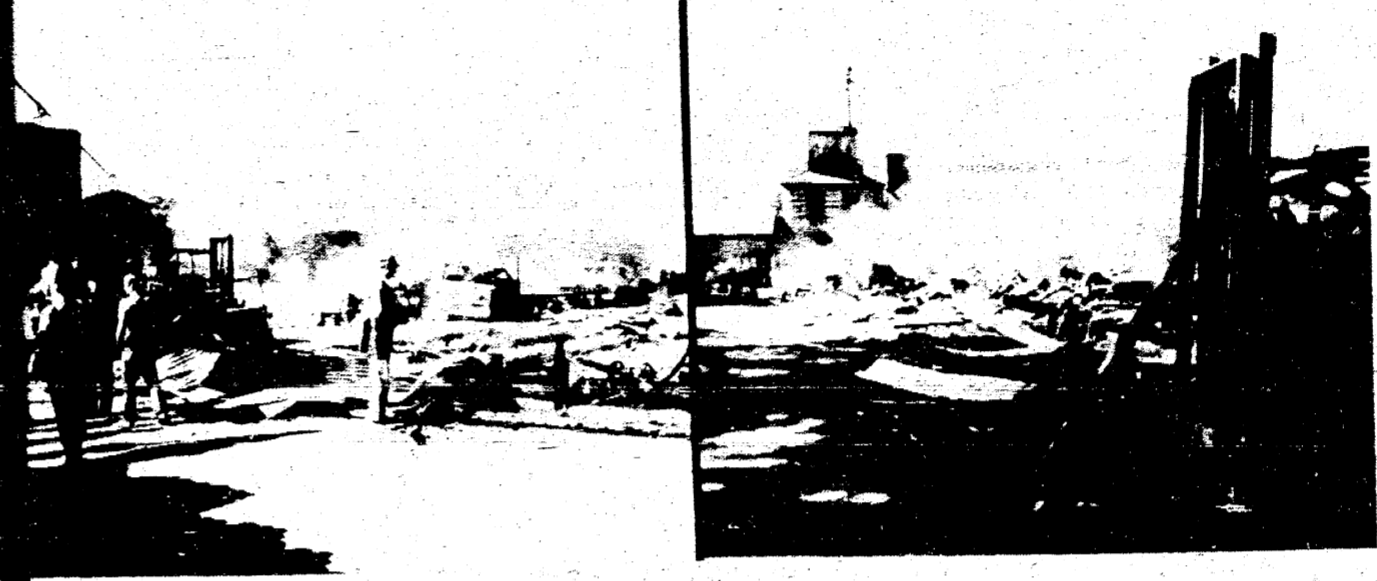

## BRIDGEWATER LUMBER SUFFERS HUGE LOSSES



Four departments battled a roaring pre-m fire today at Bridgewater Lumber mill. Firemen from Manchester, Pine, Clinton and Pittsfield were at the scene for nearly 5 hours. Two large sheds were lost containing thousands of board feet of lumber. Also lost in the sheds were 3 delivery trucks and several lift trucks. Lumber could be seen over a large area as 14 pieces of equipment manned by the 4 departments battled to save burning buildings and the huge E.G. Mann & Sons Mill. No damage estimate was available at press time. Cause of the fire is under investigation.

**SUB COMMITTEE ON HUMAN GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT. NEXT MEETING THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 18TH, 8 P.M.**

**PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS**  
 The committee on Human Growth and Development, composed of Lois Kuntz, Barbara Lund, Fred Munson, Mary Munson, Don Tassie, and Sally Taurialmenmet four times during the late spring and early summer and has the following initial report to present to the Citizens Advisory Committee.

**1. Identification of Needs:**  
 There is in fact, a serious weakness in our current educational teaching program. This has become apparent in discussions with parents, school staff, and with students. For example, a brief student survey in the High School indicated a strong desire for more information in areas such as Relationship to Others, What's in Life after High School, and Early Marriage. Moreover, the rapidly changing standards in current novels, TV programs, movies and other source of external education have in fact, created a vacuum which at this point is not being met by the program in this school. The school is properly a carrier of the community values and has an obligation which, as we have noted, is widely recognized as not being met. Our findings would indicate that the following needs do exist:  
 A. Understanding ones normal growth and development both physical and emotional and that of the opposite sex.  
 B. Knowledge of process whereby reproduction takes place.  
 C. Opportunity to explore and define the moral and ethical considerations involved in relationships with other people.  
 D. Preparation for marriage and parenthood.

**2. Recommendations:**  
 A. On the basis of the needs as we have identified them, we recommend that the school board charge the school system with the responsibility for developing an appropriate program.  
 B. It is our belief that such a program should have three divisions corresponding to the K-4, 5-8, and 9-12 educational program in the school.  
 C. The Citizens Advisory Committee further believes that the professional staff is most competent to develop a program to achieve these purposes. In the K-4 segment, many, if not all teachers may be involved because of the need to provide the material in all class rooms. This total involvement may be less true in the Middle and High School, but would also be more intent for those involved.  
 D. The developed program together with an estimate of cost can be proposed to the Board for adoption.  
**3. Immediate Action:**  
 A. The Citizens Advisory Committee has been fortunate to have the involvement of the principals of our two K-4 schools and has also been able to secure samples of programs that cover these grades. Moreover, the K-4 segment is not only the logical place to start such a program (in terms of a K-12 program), it is also one which may be somewhat more time consuming because each will be modifying their teaching material if the program is approved. For these reasons, we urge the Board to move promptly in authorizing the development of this segment of this program.  
 The Human Growth and Development Sub Committee intends to follow up this initial report with one that will address the Middle and High School needs.  
 The Citizens Advisory Committee recognizes it has a continuing obligation to provide any technical information to the staff which it has generated in its inquiry, and far more important, to assist and support the Board and teaching staff in making the importance of this program

**LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

Dear Editor:

Neil Lantis, the owner of the present Manchester IGA store, has done a great disservice to this community by building his new IGA store in Manchester, with a total disregard for the many unemployed Manchester area building tradesmen.

Mr. Lantis did not seek competitive bids from Washtenaw County contractors, who hire area craftsmen. Mr. Lantis hired Design and Build Company, a notorious non-Union contractor from Lansing to do the work. They, in turn, hired "All Seasons", another non-Union contractor, who does electrical, heating, cooling and air conditioning work. Other non-Union contractors are Steinbock Construction of Flushing, Michigan, to do the masonry work, Rod Anderson of Lansing, the excavating work and Western Michigan Steel Erectors of Grand Rapids to put up the metal building. These contractors have their own work force, which they cart around to various job sites in the State. In fact, one of the men on the job last week was driving a truck with Colorado license plates.

These men won't spend their paychecks here, they don't pay taxes here, and don't live in Washtenaw County! Mr. Lantis' callous disregard for the welfare of local residents, who shop in his IGA store should make Manchesterites think seriously about continuing to buy there!

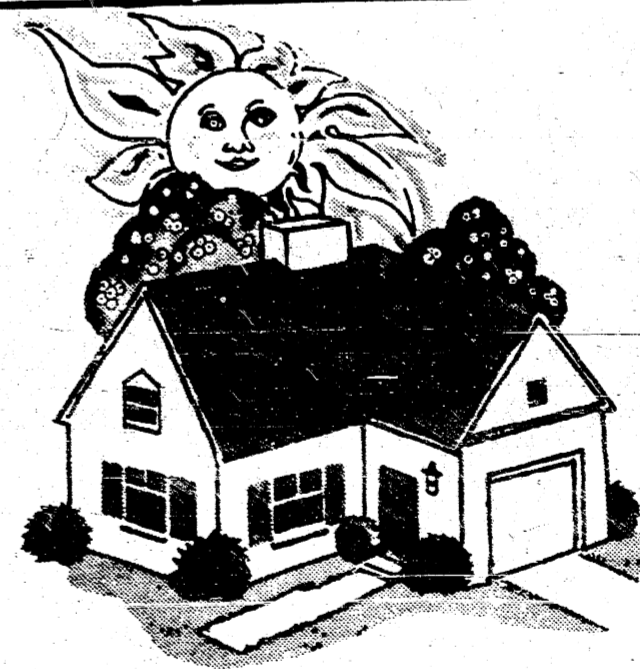

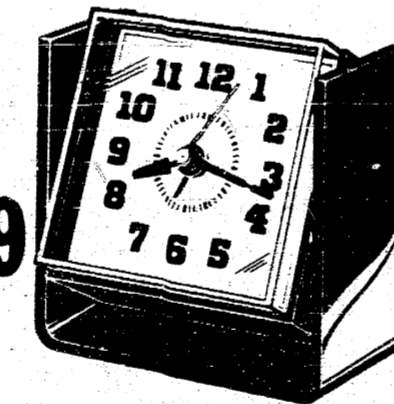

They offered to put in the minutes of their Homeowner's Association that the township would not be liable for any damages done by emergency vehicles on their private road. They also stated that their road is the homeowner's obligation and not the townships or the counties.

James Kensler was present to give a report of the Fire Site Committee's decision. It was a unanimous decision by the Site Committee to purchase the Alber property on Clinton Street. After much discussion, Burch made the motion to accept the report and to thank the committee. Widmayer supported. Motion carried. Minutes of Site Committee meeting 8-5-75 in minutes.

Widmayer made the motion, seconded by Lentz that they negotiate with Alber with option to buy for the next regular meeting. Roll call vote-Fielder, yea; Widmayer, yea; Lentz yea; Burch yea; Marx yea.

The Board will send letters to express their thanks to the Site Committee and tell them that we would like to keep them involved and call on them when further help is needed.

After discussion, Fielder will call the Washwanaw County Rd. Comm. to begin the reclamation of roads.

Carolene Ahrens and C. Chapin gave a very interesting report on the Bi-Centennial coming up next year. They announced there will be a public meeting at Klinger School on Wed. Aug. 27, 1975 at 8:00 p.m. Everyone is welcome and urged to attend. The Board expressed their thanks to the guests and told them they were interested in the Bi-Centennial.

Fielder reported that he has issued building permits for 9 new houses and garages for a total of \$294,000, plus general repairs in the amount of \$17,400 since January 1, 1975.

Fielder also reported that he has gotten complaints from the neighbors that the new Race Track owner has violated the laws. Fielder has been in contact with the owner.

There being no further business, Widmayer made the motion the meeting be adjourned. Burch seconded the motion. Meeting adjourned.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

August 18, 1975

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:10 p.m. Present were Beal, Curley, Daniels, Fitzgerald, Mahoney, Scully, and Zsenyuk. Enter Mann at 7:15 p.m. Minutes of the August 4, 1975, regular meeting were approved in a motion by Scully, supported by Mann. All yeas, carried.

Beal asked if we had sent a letter of recognition to Louis Leeson, as decided at the August 4, 1975 meeting. Little replied that we had.

The Public Works Activities for August 1-17, 1975, were discussed by Fitzgerald and Daniels and reviewed. Much of the work was done with CETA help. A-The Ann Arbor well house was painted and the roof repaired.

B-Liberty Street was graded and graveled using the big roller.

C-The doors were painted on the new building.

D-The lawn was started around the rest rooms at Kirk Park.

E-The valve was repaired on the water main on Macomb Street.

G-The Village grounds were cleaned up and moved.

H-One of the drying beds at the sewage plant was cleaned.

I-The drinking fountain at Carr Park was checked out.

J-Some of the gravel streets in the village have been graded.

K-One broken water service on N. Washington Street was repaired. We have invoiced the Consumers Power Gas Company for same.

Zsenyuk recommended a stop sign be placed at Duncan and Torrey. After some discussion, it was moved by Scully and seconded by Fitzgerald to approve the sign. All yeas, carried.

Fitzgerald reported that we have received two quotes on sidewalk repair. D. Helfrich quoted 75 cents per square foot. E. Walz quoted 70 cents for 4", 85 cents on the 6 inch and 1.50 for the curb. Fitzgerald moved, seconded by Scully, that sidewalk replacement contract be given to Edwin Walz, for 1975. All yeas, carried.

Some discussion of the residency issue was made, followed by a decision to table the question.

A suggestion was made to set up a definite vacation policy.

Zsenyuk discussed the police report. The department is preparing for the Fair parade. Would it be possible to use the flag from the Council Chambers in the parade? Approved. Regarding a recent request for an SDM license, Council doesn't have to vote on it. The Liquor Control Commission makes the decision. The owner states that all parking will be in the rear of the building. There will be no beer transactions through the front. That will be strictly gas station business. No other signs will be erected. There was some discussion of the apparent feelings of the community. Some objection was made to the blinking signs, and hope was expressed that the owner could be persuaded to change to non-blinking signs. Zsenyuk stated that he would suggest approval of the license with certain stipulations:

1. Stop blinking lights on sign.

2. Two o'clock sales on Sunday.

3. No signs to front (Alcoholic Beverage Signs)

4. Exterior decor in keeping with village motif.

5. Suitable trash container.

Zsenyuk discussed a newspaper report of a statement by Sheriff Postill regarding politicians and small town police departments supporting criminals. Little suggested drafting a letter in response to Postill's statement, so moved by Mahoney, seconded by Fitzgerald. It was further recommended that a copy be sent to the Ann Arbor News. All yeas, carried.

Public hearing 8:04 p.m. regarding changing the zoning on G. Lehr's Property from R1 to R2. There being no opposition, a motion to approve was made by Fitzgerald with the stipulation that the comply with all building and zoning requirements. Seconded by Mann. Discussion followed. All yeas, carried.

One of the council members was reported to have said "Stockbridge and Manchester don't have sidewalks and they both look cruddy." Council directed Little to write a response.

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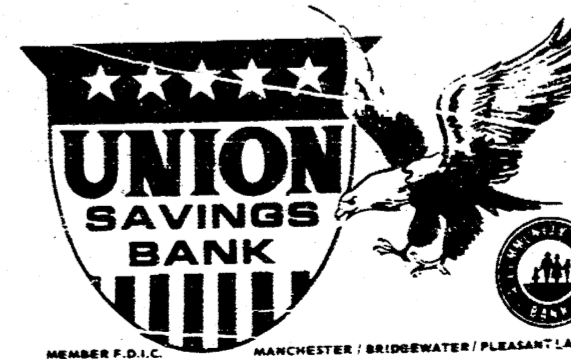

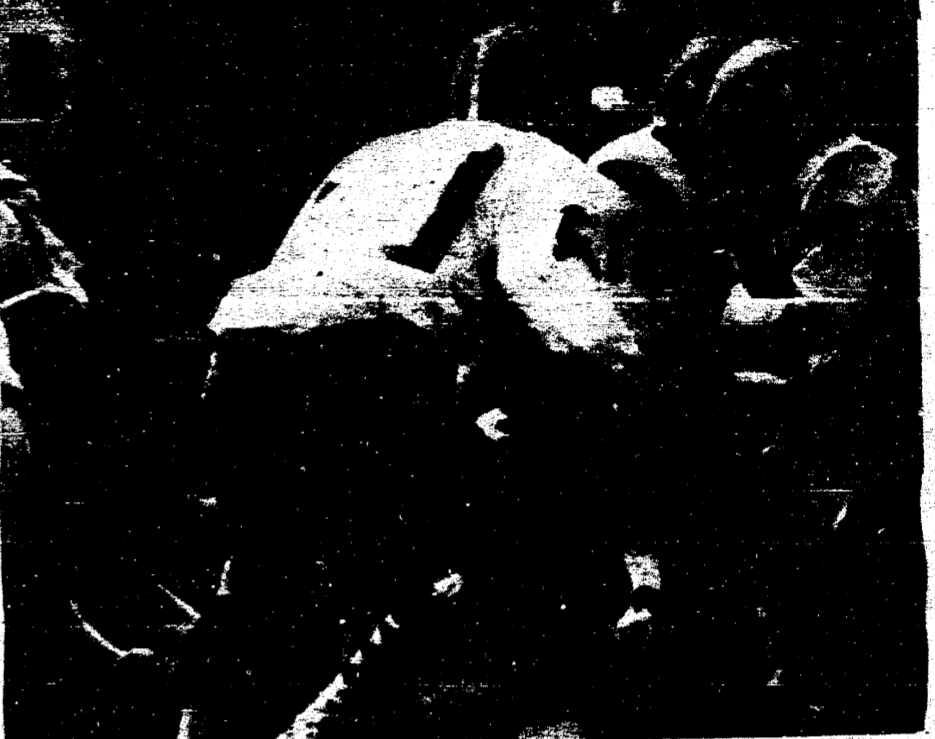

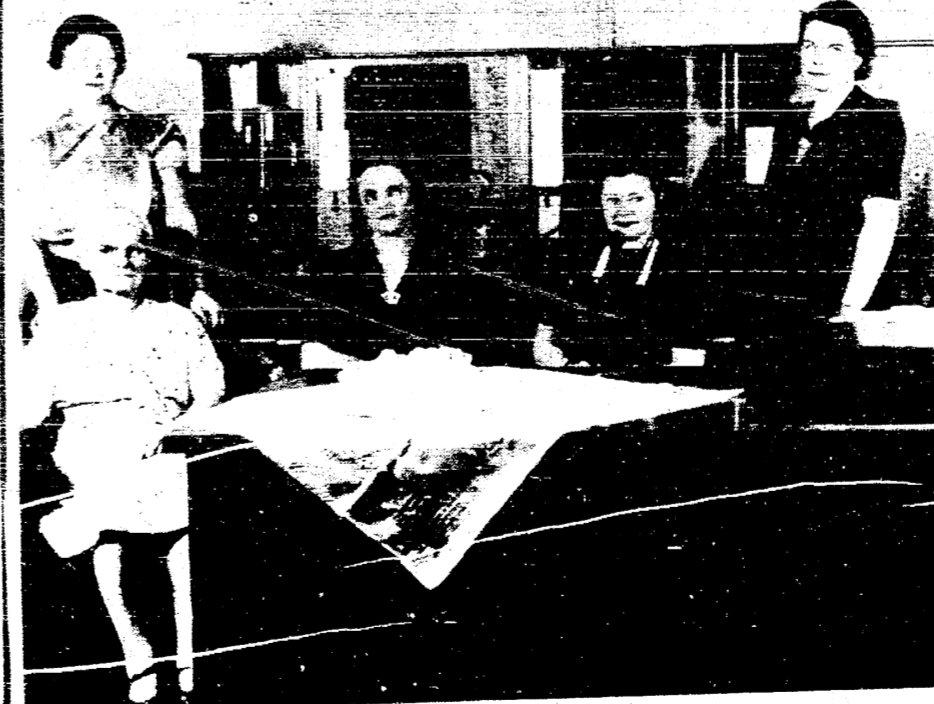
## School Millage To Be Reduced

The total 1975-76 debt retirement school millage will be reduced by .63 of a mill. School districts can only levy that amount of money needed for principal and interest payments in debt retirement funds. Because of an increase in the school district's state equalized valuation a reduction in the three debt retirement levies is possible. The total school millage for 1975-76 will amount to 25.41 mills for operational and 1.41 mills for debt retirement. Last year's total levy was 25.54 mills. The actual 1975-76 total school millage is .13 of a mill less than was levied during the 1974-75 school year.
