Fitzgerald reported that he and Scully had not yet conferred on the residency issue and vacation policy, but would be doing so as soon as schedules permit.

Public Works activities for the previous two weeks have included the placement of the Luther C. Klager plaque on the stone at Carr Park, installation of two water services, cleaning of a drying bed at the Sewage Treatment Plant, village grounds maintenance, asphalt placement on Adrian Street, work on the track for the High School, cleaning of catch basin tops and grading of streets. Fitzgerald indicated that the Committee is checking into the possibility of leasing an area for brick, block, brush and plaster fill. Public Works was advised that Mr. Bentschneider had offered help in fixing the paint sprayer so that it would work more efficiently.

Emory Garlick's Deutchgrat Subdivision and related problems were discussed. Since the land is in the township of Manchester and under their jurisdiction, the Village has no jurisdiction over it. Any problems encountered with the County should be handled through the Township. If he intends to acquire sewer and water, Mr. Garlick must extend the system for the subdivision according to our local ordinance.

A joint letter from pres. Little and Police Chief Zsenyuk to Sheriff Postill was read. This letter was sent in answer

to implications in an article carried in the Ann Arbor News regarding small community police departments. A copy was sent to each of the small communities in Washtenaw County as well as the Ann Arbor News.

The DNR (Department of Natural Resources) was called in regard to an oil slick on the river. It was found to be originating at Manchester Plastics. Samples of the slick were sent to State laboratories.

There has been a problem with picketing at the site of the new IGA market, but additional coverage as needed will be supplied by the Police Department. Mr. Lantis has also made protective arrangements.

Scully noted a letter received from the Michigan Chiefs of Police Association designating that Chief Zsenyuk had been appointed a committee member of the Organized Crime Committee.

Curley inquired about the proposed use of Revenue Sharing funds for tennis courts at Carr Park. Nothing definite was settled. More cost information was requested. Daniels indicated that the site work could be done as soon as the asphalt program for this year is complete.

Moved by Scully, supported by Curley to adjourn at 9:02 p.m. All yeas, carried.

Manchester School Board

The Board of Education at its regular September meeting heard a report from George Warren, a roofing consultant from Ann Arbor, and decided to retain Mr. Warren as an advisor to work with maintenance personnel on the school's roofing problems.

Dr. Virginia Rexmierski, Special Education Director, presented a report on a pre-school program for handicapped youngsters. School personnel are investigating possible ways to fund the school's share of this particular program. Actually, it would be a cooperative venture with three other school districts - Chelsea, Dexter, and Whitmore Lake - with the bulk of the funding coming from State and County sources.

The Board adopted the 1975-76 budget upon the recommendation of the budget committee. The 1975-76 budget shows tentative receipts of \$1,628,687 and dis-

bursements of \$1,619,789. The following new teachers were approved by the Board of Education upon the recommendation of the administration: Wesley Gall-Middle School, Sally Gall-Klager School, Donald Kirk-Middle School, Norma Mousburg-Middle School, Dennis Dicks-High School, Wayne Jackson-High School.

Bids were received on borrowing operational monies in anticipation of state aid. The low bid was submitted by Michigan National Bank of Flint, Michigan.

In other business the Board accepted the bid from Office Supply House for 12 Olympia electric typewriters for the commercial department and heard reports on the school opening from the principals.

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
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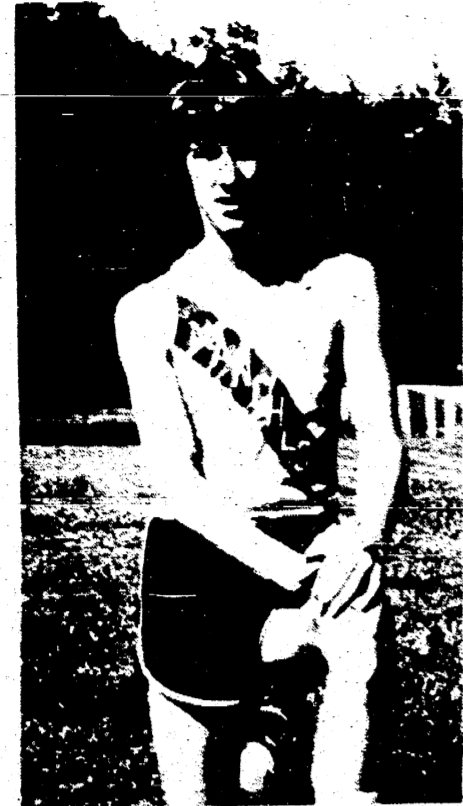

CROSS-COUNTRYMEN PICK UP WHERE THEY LEFT OFF LAST SEASON

Last Thursday our Manchester High Cross-country team picked up where they left off last season, as they crushed 3 non-league foe's in a quadrangular meet at Carr Park.

Falling to the host flying Dutchmen were Dexter, Novi, and Ann Arbor St. Thomas, as Manchester came away with a low score of 28 points to 42 for Dexter, 78 for St. Thomas and 98 for Novi.

Dexter's senior star Bruce Vall was first but it was mostly Maroon and Gold uniforms after that as the Dutchmen took 5 of the top ten places. Junior Bob Smith was first for the Dutchmen and second overall with a solid 17:09 clocking, followed closely by senior co-captain Tom Opal (17:18 - 3rd), Dan Heislip (17:29 - 6th),

At Saturday's Stanton "Hornet Run" Invitational 3 Manchester runners won medals in their grade level runs. Over 20 schools took part in the run.

Junior, Dan Heislip ran a very fine Manchester Junior class record 16:37, good for 12th place. Following closely behind Heislip was teammate Jerry Miller, whose 16:40 was also good for a medal (15th). Also running in the Junior Division was Eric Norgaard whose 19:20

was good for 45th in the 60 runner field. In the sophomore Division run Terry Brown was a very strong 7th with a 17:16 clocking. Brown's medal winning performance came despite the fact that he had the flu earlier in the week. Sophomore Keith Moore also ran a fine race as he turned in his best clocking ever with a 18:11 time good for 30th in the days largest field of over 70.

Senior co-captain Dan Schable, had an off day and finished 21st at 17:16 while teammate Dave Guenther, a sprinter in the spring, finished 43rd with a 18:56 clocking.

Kurt Norgaard who has become a varsity runner in his initial Freshman year of running was a strong 17th at 17:58 in his division.

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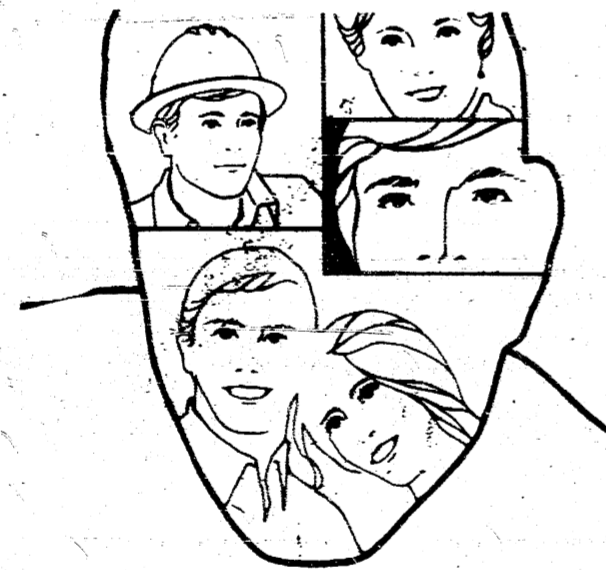
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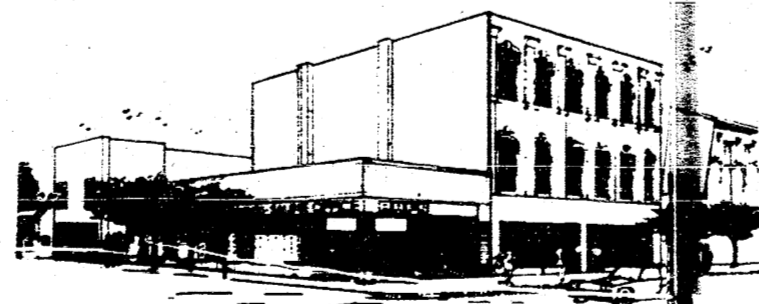
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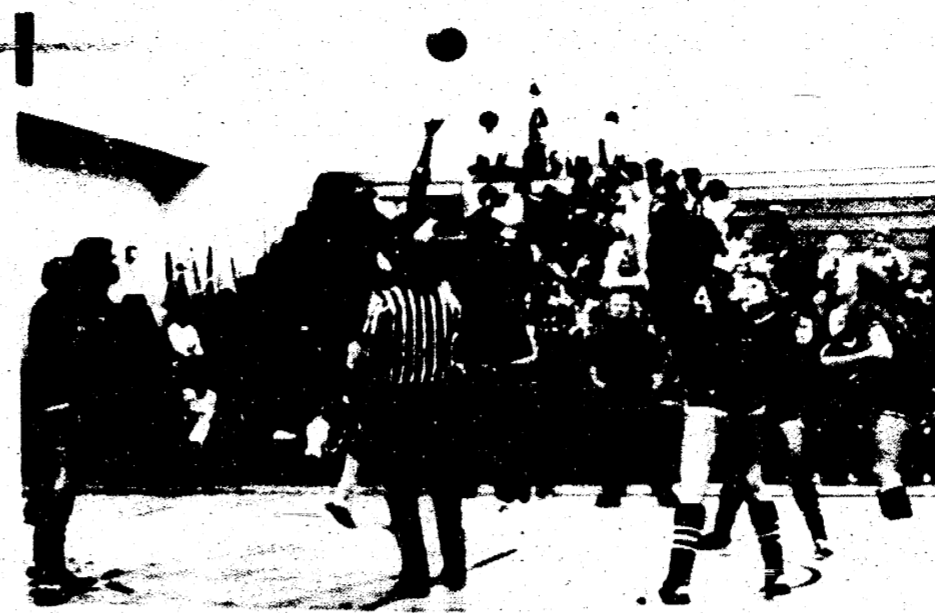

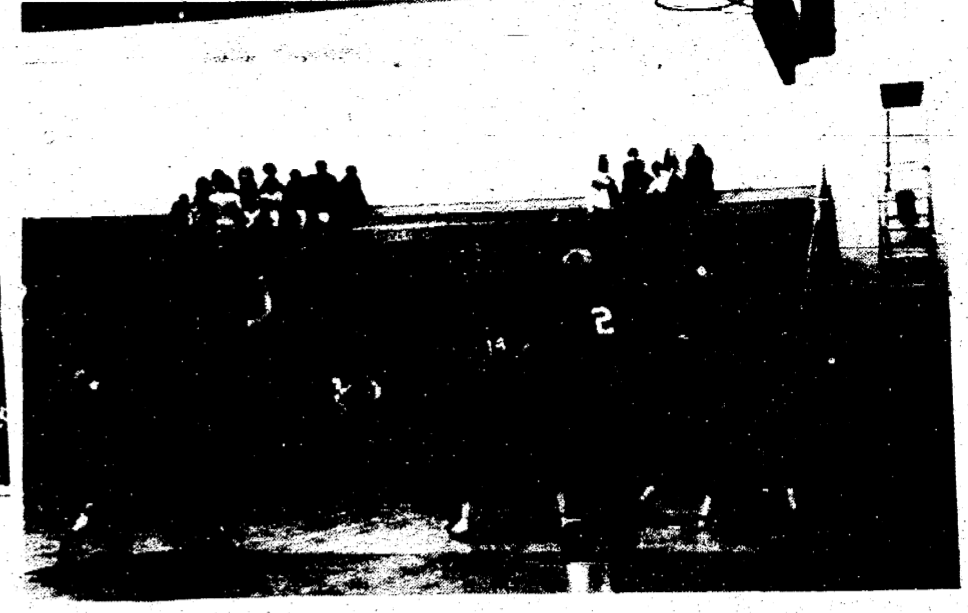


DUTCHETTES SPLIT

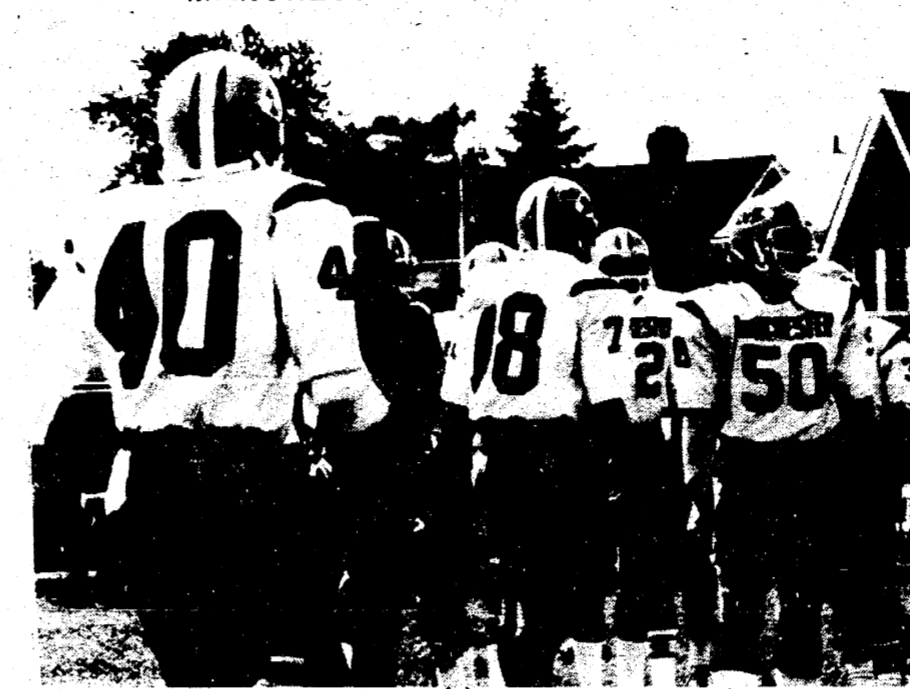
