

SECTION 25.05 - FINDINGS OF FACT REQUIRED in reviewing any petition for a zoning amendment, the Planning Commission shall identify and evaluate all factors relevant to the petition, and shall report its findings in full, along with its recommendation for disposition of the petition, to the Township Board, within a period of ninety five (95) days of the filing date. The facts to be considered by the Planning Commission shall include, but shall not be limited to, the following:

- whether or not the requested zoning change is justified by a change in conditions since the original ordinance was adopted, or by an error in the original ordinance, the precedents, and the possible effects of such precedents, which might result from approval or denial of the petition.
- the capability of the Township or other government agencies to provide any services, facilities, and/or programs that might be required if the petition were approved, in effect of approval of the petition on the condition and/or value of property in the Township or in adjacent civil divisions.
- relation of the petition to the adopted development policies of Sharon Township, and of other government units where applicable.

All findings of fact shall be made a part of the public records of the meetings of the Planning Commission and the Township Board.

SECTION 25.06 - PUBLICATION Following Township Board approval of a petition to amend the zoning ordinance, the amendment shall be published within thirty (30) days of such approval in a newspaper of general circulation in Sharon Township.

SECTION 25.07 - REFERENDUM Within thirty (30) days following the adoption of an amendment to the zoning ordinance, a petition signed by a number of qualified and registered voters residing in the unincorporated portion of Sharon Township equal to at least eight (8) percent of the total vote cast for all candidates for governor, not less than eight (8) percent of the total vote cast for all candidates for governor, at the last preceding general election at which a governor was elected, in the Township, shall be filed with the Township Clerk requesting therein for the submission of the amendment to the electors residing in the unincorporated portion of Sharon Township for their approval.

SECTION 25.08 - CONFORMANCE TO COURT DECREE Any amendment for the purpose of conforming to a provision of a decree of a court of competent jurisdiction shall be adopted by the Township Board and the amendment published without referring same to any other board or agency.

COMMENDED STUDENT IN THE MERIT PROGRAM

One senior at Manchester has been named Commended student in the Merit Program by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

Principal Chester C. Kocesk announced that the following student received Letters of Commendation: Thomas N. Opal, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard J. Opal, 11670 Bemis Road, Manchester.

This student is among the 35,000 Commended students named nationwide on the basis of their high performance on the 1974 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT). Commended students represent less than 2 percent of those who are expected to graduate from high school in 1976. Although Commended students ranked high on the PSAT/NMSQT, they do not continue in the Merit Scholarship competition because their scores were just below those of the 15,000 Semifinalists publicly announced by NMSC in September.

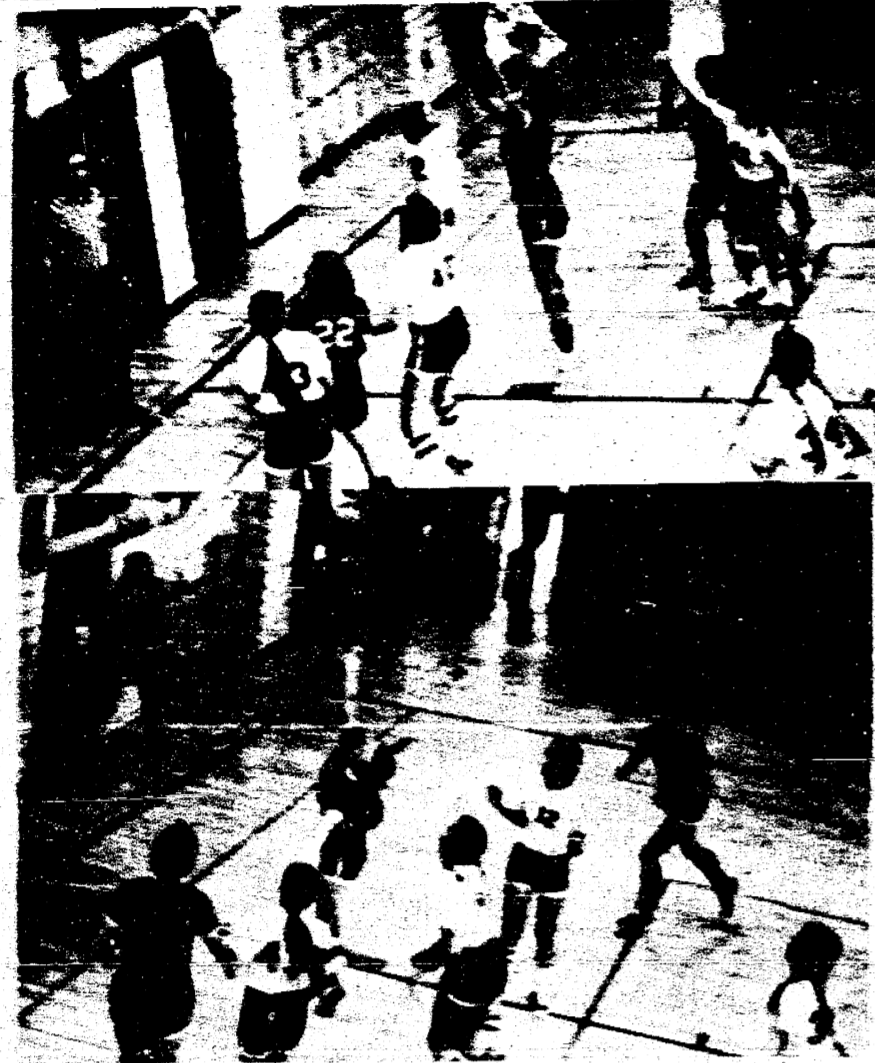

Marketing officials of the Michigan Department of Agriculture say carrots, celery, cabbage and potatoes are only a few of the many

Michigan vegetables in good supply.

Early American cooks used autumn vegetables to make hearty soup dishes that would serve for several meals. They were often accompanied by a variety of tasty hot breads. In those days a fresh salad was unlikely, since fresh greens and fruits were available only during the growing season. Modern cooks have an advantage because our soup dishes can be accompanied with fresh greens or fruit salads all year round.

An easy to fix chowder is made of diced, cooked potatoes and carrots, simmered in milk and seasoned with chopped onion and bacon. Using milk for the liquid instead of water increases nutritional value. Still another is chopped cooked celery combined with hard-cooked eggs and grated potatoes in a seasoned white sauce. Potatoes are basic ingredients in many chowders because they add that rib-sticking quality.

For a high protein chowder cook thinly sliced potatoes in water seasoned with diced salt pork. Drain potatoes and add to a mixture of hot milk, butter, salt and pepper. Heat thoroughly. Just before serving stir in plenty of sliced hard-cooked eggs.

Economical, less tender cuts of meat like oxtail, stew beef and pig hocks, are popular for soup dishes, too. Seasonings and liquids may vary depending on personal preference. Try tomato juice or sauce, dry sherry or apple cider on occasion for a special touch.

"The basis of our government being the opinion of the people, the very first object should be to keep that right, and were it left to me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers, or newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter." Thomas Jefferson penned that opinion when our nation was only a decade old and its truth has stood the test of time. Undoubtedly, he was remembering the immeasurable contributions made by colonial newspapers to the cause of freedom. A court case involving a journalist in 1734 is recorded in history as "the morning star of that liberty which subsequently revolutionized America." John Peter Zenger, editor of the New York Weekly Journal, was charged with printing articles criticizing the royal Governor. Andrew Hamilton, said to be the ablest lawyer in the colonies, came from Phil-

adelphia to volunteer his services in defense of Zenger. His powerful plea to the jury convinced them that their decision involved more than the fate of a poor printer who was fighting for the right to speak and write the truth. You will be deciding the fate of every free man in the British Colonies, he told the jury. When the verdict of "not guilty" was announced, the spectators in the courtroom burst into applause. The principle of freedom of the press had been established.

Since that time, newspapers have been questioning the acts of public officials. This is as it should be. America can stand a lot of questioning; needs it, in fact to keep improving. Any nation that has ever stopped improving itself has ended up an archaic name in historical chronicles. That will not happen in our nation as long as freedom of the press prevails.

Your newspaper will be celebrating its proud heritage during the week of October 5-11. Appropriately the theme of this year's National Newspaper Week is "Newspapers—The Spirit of Freedom." Let's help them celebrate!

If a few courageous journalists had not dared to question the acts of tyranny by the Mother Country, if they had not inspired the colonists to action — it is doubtful we would be celebrating the Bicentennial of the United States of America in 1976.

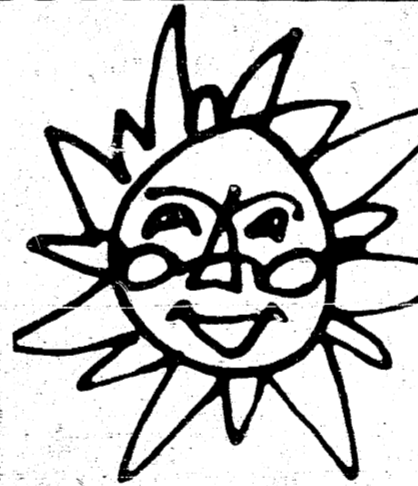

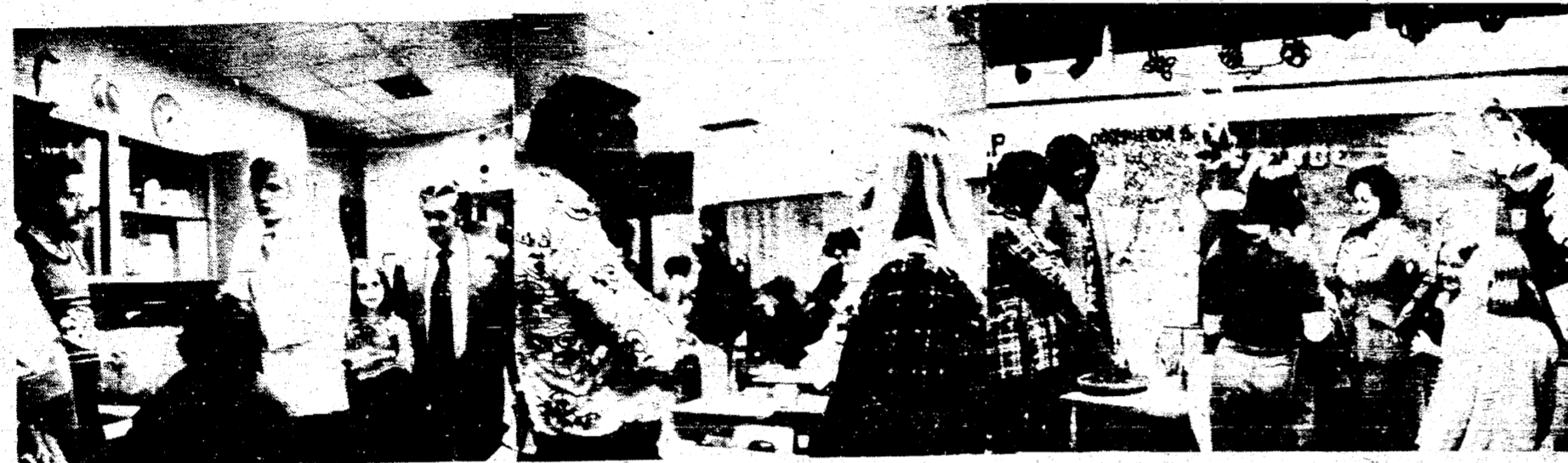

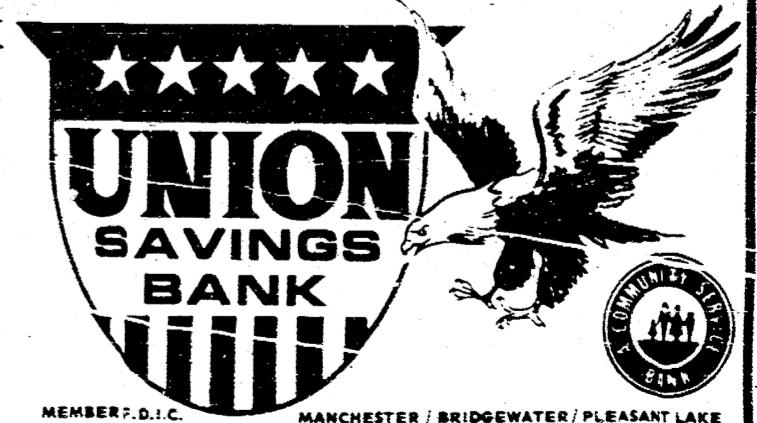
