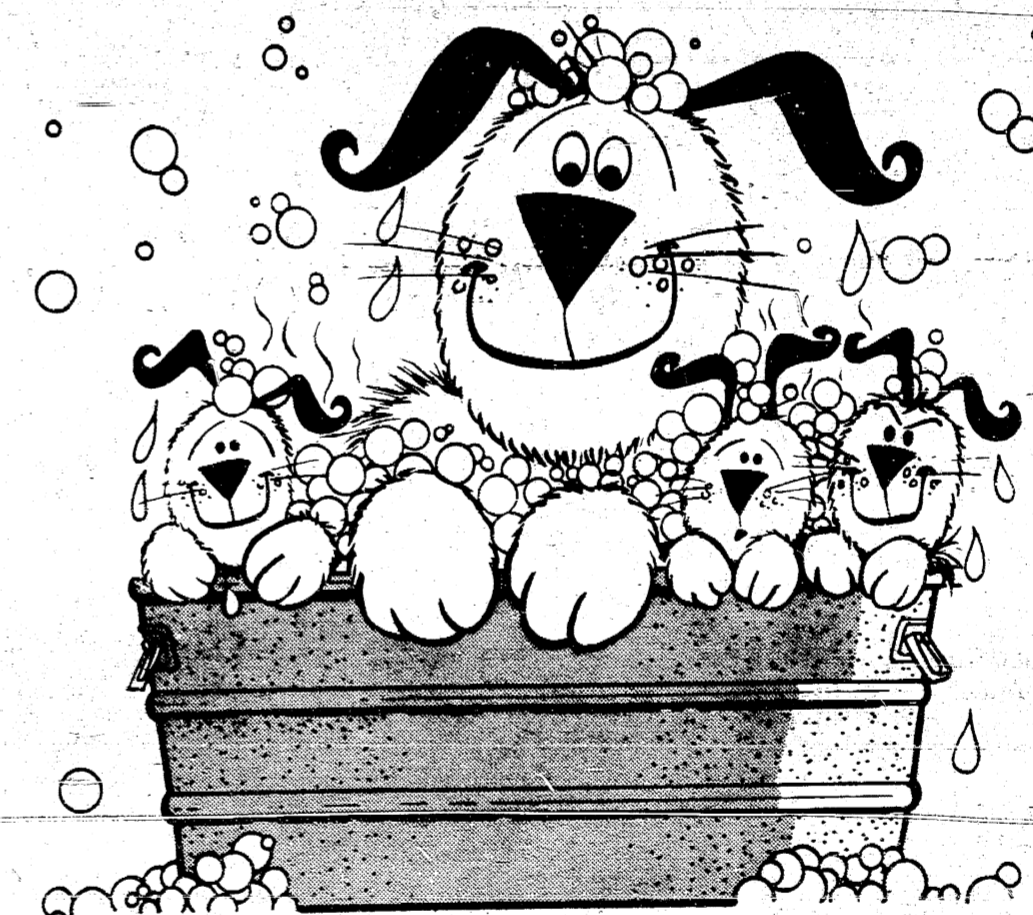

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

The regular meeting of the Manchester Public School District Board of Education was held on Monday, September 22, 1975, at the High School Library. All members were present with the exception of board member Valnowski. Absentees were Superintendent, Mrs. Missner and Principals Koenig, Topping and Tassin.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p.m. by Board Pres. Vogan. The minutes of the previous meeting were read by Andrew Lockhardt and approved as read.

Next, the treasurer's report was presented by Board Treasurer Feldkamp. A motion was made by Westfall and supported by Westfall to approve the report as presented. Motion carried.

The bills were then presented for payment approval. After discussion, a motion was made by Lockhardt and supported by Kessler to approve all bills presented for payment approval. Motion carried.

Mr. George Koenig spoke with the board about the roofing problem in the Manchester School System. Mr. Koenig pointed out that there are some areas where outside contractors must be hired to repair, but the majority of the repair work could be done with local help. He indicated that the cost would be only a small fraction of the cost of previous estimates. The board thanked Mr. Koenig for meeting with them and went on to other business.

Dr. Virginia Koenig presented a request for a program for handicapped pre-school children. Inasmuch as the school district cannot afford to participate in the amount of \$2500 at this time the Special Ed Director and John McGee will investigate the possibilities of securing this amount from organizations and civic groups in the district. A report on this will be made at the board meeting at a later date.

Next, the purchase of typewriters was considered. Mr. Missner presented a quotation from Typewriter Sales and Service of Adrian. The prices quoted were \$495 for a Royal 66 and \$275 for an Olivetti 66. Mr. Missner then talked with the board expressing her opinions

and preferences as to which typewriter would be more suitable. Mrs. Wise indicated that she preferred the Olympia typewriter. A motion was made by Kessler and supported by Lockhardt to purchase 22 Olympia typewriters from Office Supply House. Motion carried.

Mr. William Bunnay commented that a policy on purchasing should be developed to insure consistency in buying.

A part of appreciation was received from Phil Niemi.

Under unfinished business, gasoline and fuel oil purchasing was discussed. Mr. Swartz read a letter from Dr. Phillip O'Leary of the Michigan Dept. of Education. In his letter Dr. O'Leary strongly advised against attempting to set for bids and possibly changing suppliers. A motion was made by Bunnay and supported by Feldkamp to rescind the motion of August 18 by Bunnay and Feldkamp which called for obtaining prices from Standard Oil and Gulf Oil. Motion carried.

Next, the hiring of new teachers was considered. Mr. Swartz recommended that the following teachers be approved for employment: Sally Ann Gall, Wesley Charles Gall, Norma Jean Mossburg, Donald Kirk, Dennis C. Dicks, Wayne Jackson.

It was moved by Feldkamp and supported by Kessler to approve the hiring of these persons as recommended. Motion carried.

Next the millage levy was discussed. The levies are as follows: Allocated 11.22, Extra Voted 12.75, 1966 Debt Ret. .33, 1967 Debt Ret. .76, 1970 Debt Ret. .33, Total 25.41 mills.

A crossing guard is needed at Pleasant Lake School for one-half hour in the morning and one-half hour in the afternoon. The cost for the crossing guard

will be approximately \$500. A motion was made by Westfall and supported by Bunnay to hire a crossing guard for Pleasant Lake. Motion carried.

Next, bids were received from three banks on the borrowing in anticipation of state aid. They were as follows: Citizens Commercial & Savings Bank 6.0%, Union Savings Bank 5.2%, Michigan National Bank of Flint 4.9%. A motion was made by Westfall and supported by Kessler to accept the bid from Michigan National Bank of Flint. Motion carried.

Mr. Swartz read a resolution needed to authorize the borrowing of monies in anticipation of state aid. A motion was made by Westfall and supported by Kessler to adopt the proposed resolution. Motion carried. A copy of the resolution is on file.

The roofs were again discussed. A motion was made by Feldkamp and supported by Kessler to retain Mr. George Warren as roofing consultant for all repairs which are necessary. Motion carried.

Each principal gave a report on school opening in his respective building.

A brief progress report on the track and field site was made.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:15 p.m.

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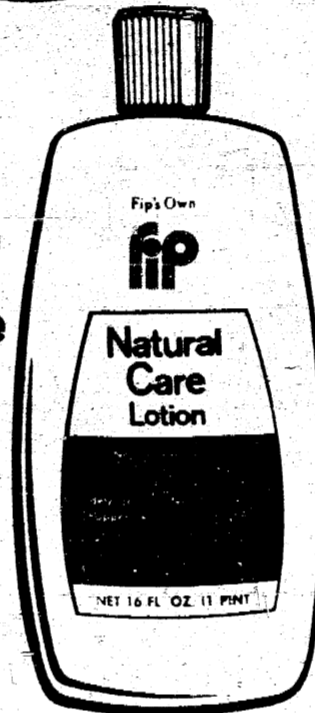
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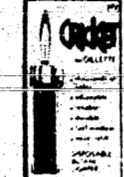


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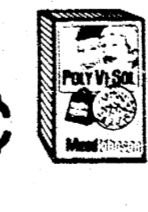
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Hudson Spells Doom For Dutch

Manchester Tool and Die and Manchester Stamping Corporation doubled their percentage for the year. Obviously every church and organization participating in the clinic was very active and the reports will be sent to them in November when the records are returned to the local committee.
