## March of Dimes

The National Foundation-March of Dimes was founded in 1938 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Its original aim: to find a cure for polio. That goal was realized in 1955 with the licensing of the Salk Vaccine.

The foundation then turned its energies and resources toward an even greater task: the prevention and cure of birth defects.

Basic and clinical researchers around the country, funded by the March of Dimes, are investigating the underlying causes of birth defects.

How serious is the birth defect problem? Far more serious than polio ever was. Birth defects are the nation's second greatest destroyer of life, claiming approximately 500,000 unborn babies and 60,000 children and adults each year. Every year some 250,000 American babies are born with birth defects. Birth defects

cause nearly half of all childhood chronic disability. An estimated 15 million Americans of all ages have one or more birth defects which affect their daily lives. All defects are not detectable at birth. Some do not make their presence known until late childhood or adulthood.

Some birth defects can now be prevented. Rh blood can be prevented with a serum. A vaccine against German measles (Rubella), a major cause of birth defects, is now in use. Other defects can be treated successfully with modern medical and surgical techniques if detected early enough.

The National Foundation conducts a separate fund-raising campaign because birth defects are a national problem and thus must be attacked by efforts that are national in scope and conception. If the National Foundation were to participate in United Funds its program activities, now unified under control management, would be subject to control by more than a thousand budget committees in as many different communities. To be most effective in its fight against birth defects, the National Foundation must have freedom to carry out the recommendations of the respected scientists serving on its advisory committee.

The National Foundation has always been able to hold its staff to a minimum because volunteers supply the bulk of man-power needed to operate its 2700 chapters. There are only 852 paid employees for the entire National Foundation of which 166 are at the National Headquarters, 219 in the field and 467 at local chapters.

and all afternoon a steady banging was heard from the fourth graders was,ing pots and pans.

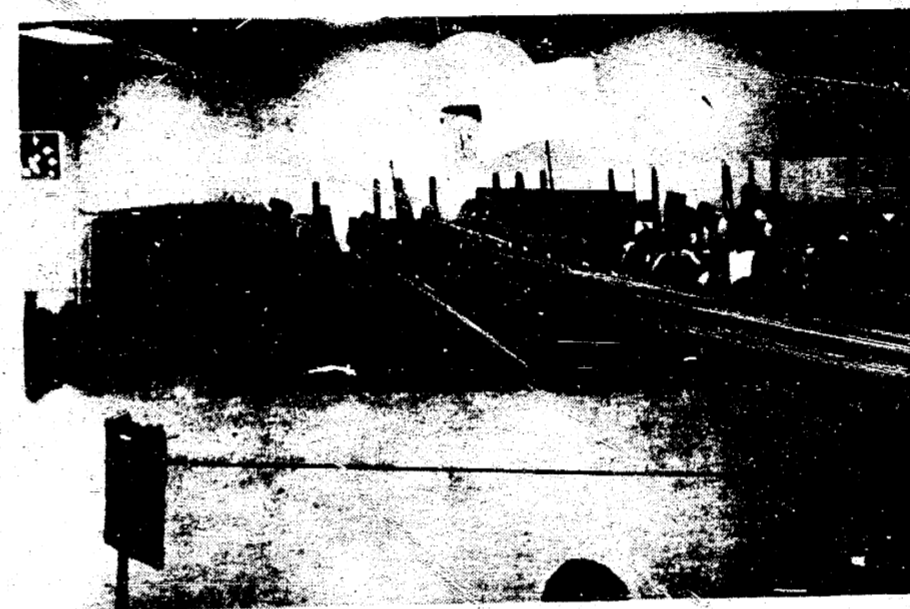
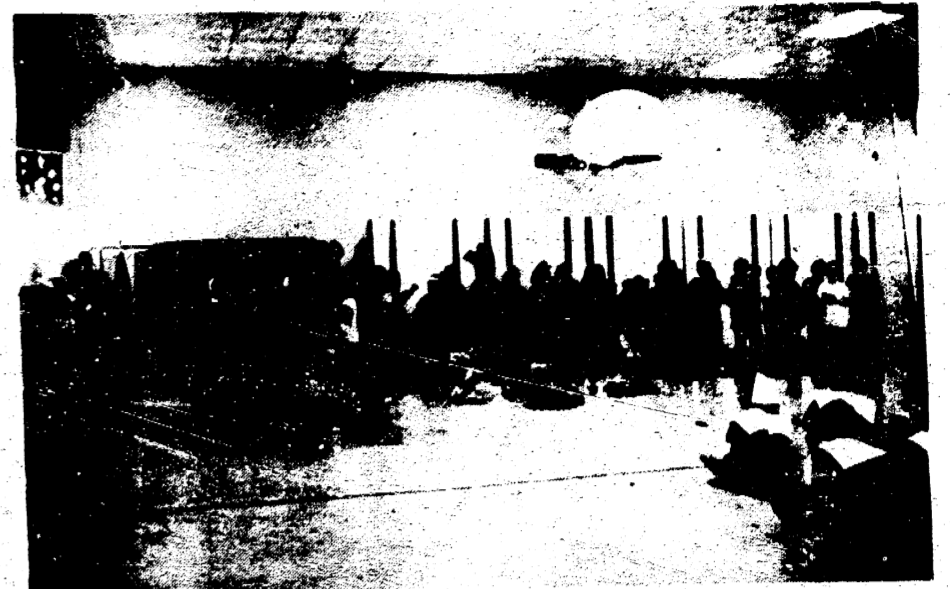

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

## A PLAQUE OF FROGS

We wish Congress could repeal "Murphy's Law"—that humorous, tongue-in-cheek rule which says, (1) nothing is as easy as it looks; (2) everything takes longer than you think; and (3)—if anything

can go wrong, it will. But then, expecting Congress to tackle Murphy's Law may be expecting too much, for it is in Congress where Murphy's Law seems most deeply entrenched.

Take the matter of inflation control. Since Congressional overspending is a prime cause of inflation, it would seem easy and reasonable for Congress to do something about it. Instead, Murphy's Law takes over. Here are some examples.

Because of inflation, the members of Congress raise their own salaries to solve

that problem for them. Raising the size of the debt limit takes care of those increasing deficits. Instead of seeking new revenue, tax cuts become the political thing to do.

In observing all of this, John E. Sheehan, who returned to private industry last June after three and a half years as a member of the Federal Reserve Board, says the growing federal bureaucracy has become "like the third curse of Moses—a suffocating plague of frogs brought forth from out of where they belong, into the

villages and very houses of the people."

The Wall Street Journal reported recently that 19.3 percent of all employed Americans are government employees. Of course, many of the government's workers are essential to all of us—schoolteachers and policemen, to name just two groups. But there must be a limit to the growth of the government payroll. The basic question is one which a farmer or rancher can understand very easily. It's not how many hired hands would you like to have. Instead, it's how many hired hands can you afford.

Most federal employees are hard-working people whose efforts are useful and productive. This makes it somewhat difficult for congress to limit their number—must less cut it back. But if the Senators and Representatives are ever going to deal effectively with the year-in, year-out growth in the federal budget, they'll have to think about dealing with Uncle Sam's payroll at the same time.

What about the heralded new oral flu-virus vaccine? There's no reason to believe it will be any better than the old vaccine. But it has three points in its favor. It may set up a better defense in the respiratory tract. It will be easier to administer than shots, and there may be less of a side reaction. Dr. Gregg wonders about the advisability of putting a lot of foreign protein into people's bodies. So to we, in fact, we wonder about the advisability of putting any poison or drug into the body, knowing as little as we do about the effects they may have.

He recommends that healthy people shouldn't get the shot. Evidently, either the shot is not very effective, or it is so dangerous to give to healthy people or both. The incidence of side reactions and the potential for adverse long-range effects make the vaccine not a first choice for administrators to healthy people, especially in our program for women and their babies. Obviously, it is now considered that the potential for harm outweighs the potential for good. But look at what he recommends. Through the vaccine it is dangerous for healthy people.

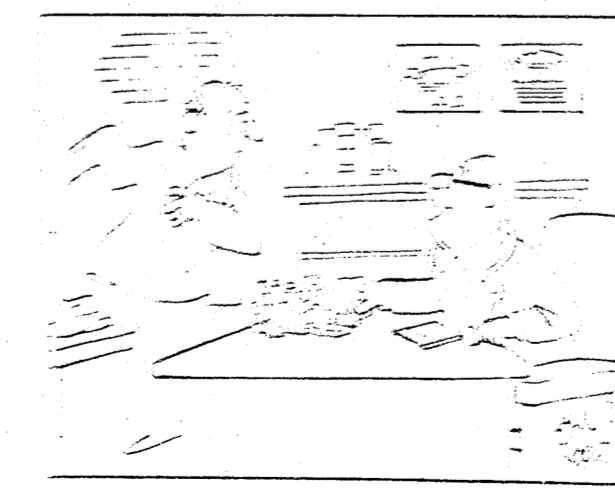
## NEW PILL COMPLICATION

For another rare side effect from the pill, liver adenoma is reported in the September 13 Medical World News. Liver adenoma is a rare and benign tumor that has been discovered to occur in long-term users of oral contraceptives. It produces hemorrhage and therefore is potentially fatal. Dr. Janet Bairn, radiologist at the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Ann Arbor, Michigan, reports that possibly 50 cases involving OC users have been discovered, and the FDA's Division of Endocrine and Metabolic Drugs says it is studying the situation with a possible view toward adding more warnings to oral contraceptive package inserts.

**PEPTO BISMOL**

We don't know what to think of the Pepto-Bismol advertising. In fact, it is hard from their advertising to tell what it is Pepto-Bismol claims to cure. We have no doubts about what it will do to you. Merck's INDEX is very positive about that. The advertising copy sounds like it was written by one of those men in the Gray Flannel Suits from Madison Avenue, NY, while he was just coming in off a prolonged binge. The actor comes on the screen, poll-parroting his lines like a good poll parrot. He starts off with: "Instant coating action that stops stomach irritation at contact... soothing pink Pepto Bismol." Then on the screen comes a personality looking like he hasn't come off the binge, with the advertising copy writer -- yet. The voice says:

Then comes a fake drawing on the screen of some pipe-like gadgets supposed to represent the bowels. It is hard to follow the maudlin "reasoning" of the ad writer, but it looks like he wants you to think that Pepto Bismol is coating both the stomach and the intestines. And if you can follow this maudlin copy you're a better man than Gunga Din and I.

When the Federal Trade Commission and the Federal Communications Commission lets the Norwich Pharmacal Company get away with such dangerous and false advertising matter as this it's time for Congress to abolish all "regulatory" agencies.

Here is the truth about Pepto-Bismol. "Clinical Toxicology" says it is composed of four things -- Bismuth Subsalicylate, Salol, Zinc Phenolsulfonate and Methyl Salicylate. Merck's INDEX says Bismuth Salicylate will give you Stomatitis (inflammation of the mouth) Blue Gums, Buccal Mucosa (trouble with the mouth membrane) Soft Palate, Hepatitis (inflammation of the liver) Gastroenteritis (inflammation of the stomach and bowels), Colitis (inflammation of the colon, renal (kidney) damage, Muscular Pains, Dermatitis (inflammation of the skin) and Peripheral Neuritis (inflammation of the nerves).

(Ed. Note: If, as the apparently drunken advertising writer says, Pepto Bismol puts a "coating" in your stomach, it's no wonder it gives you those things.) Zinc Phenolsulfonate has two uses. Commercially it is used in insecticide formulations. Its only known medical use is as an antiseptic and astringent. The latter is something that arrests discharges by causing contraction of the affected parts. Of Methyl Salicylate, Merck's says ingestion of relatively small amounts may cause severe poisoning and death. And that it also causes: Poisoning, Nausea, Vomiting, Pulmonary Edema (swelling of the lungs), Pneumonia, Convulsions, Acidoses and Death.



"You are looking at a victim of indigestion, nausea, distress in the lower tract. Usually upsets are caused by irritation from acid, food or nervous irritation." Proving that the copy writer is still "under the weather" or is abysmally ignorant of the facts of life. That condition is caused by too much denatured food, too much alcohol, too much late hours or excesses of other kinds. The answer is not to coat your stomach with shellac, enamel, liquid rubber, Pepto-Bismol or whatever you coat stomachs with. It is to act like you have good sense... eat and drink what your appetite calls for and not what some convivial host or friend urges you to.

## Test Yourself

This is the first in a series. From time to time, examinations in chiropractic philosophy are given at chiropractic colleges. Students often write responses which can be enlightening to the lay person. The following is a spontaneous response to a question asked in a Philosophy I exam at Sherman College of Chiropractic.

Using your histology course as a basis, try and convince a non-chiropractic histologist of the logic of our Innate philosophy.

As a scientist, you must realize that all our Western thought, and more especially all of Western science hangs on the assumption made by the earliest Greek philosophers that in order for the universe to be intelligible, it must be ordered. No inductive process can be conceived without an assumption of order. Cataloguing the plant and animal kingdoms, for example, presupposes that there are in reality many creatures and plants, some exhibiting certain qualities, others other qualities, such that some are similar to many, and other dissimilar. All rules and scientific laws presuppose that a principle must be able to be applied universally at all times. A cat is not a cat today, and a unicorn tomorrow. The law of gravity does not operate only while we are awake, but while we sleep as well. Were it not so, we would have to continually suspend judgment about everything in the universe. Indeed, we would not have even a concept of the suspension of judgment, since without the positing of intelligibility through order, intelligibility is impossible.

Now, either this order is gratuitous, an accident or good luck, on the one hand; or it is designed, planned, or given on the other. Chiropractic holds the latter of these propositions. We see the order of the universe, the balance in nature, the fact that a tree is a tree and not an elephant, as a manifestation of intelligence. Order presupposes intelligence. Had we never seen a watch before, and we happened upon one on the sidewalk, and we examined it, took

it apart, understood how it worked etc., we would likely assume that someone designed it to perform a certain purpose. It manifests or exhibits intelligent design. Likewise with the universe. In fact, our major premise is to us a self-evident truth, namely, that there is a universal intelligence which is in all matter, continually giving to it all its properties and action, thereby maintaining it in existence.

Obviously, this premise can neither be absolutely proved or disproved. Someone may always suspend his judgment on the truth of the premise. However, the order we perceive in the universe takes on the character of strong evidence to support our major premise, and we proceed thus deductively to build our philosophy.

Let's see if we can apply this process to your science. The living cell is a whole, constituted of parts. You study the cell and its parts in terms of structure and function. You start with our assumption that the whole is ordered, and seek answers to questions such as: what is the function of a given part? How does it relate to the other parts? etc. You find that located within the cell is a nucleus which contains still smaller parts which seem to direct and control all other activities in the cell. You notice vacuoles migrating about the cell,

phagocytizing debris, transporting nutrients etc. You call the mitochondria the power plants of the cell, producing energy used by other parts of the cell. Other parts - ribosomes, lysosomes, Golgi complex, endoplasmic reticulum - have known or theorized functions, all known or assumed to be coordinated for the efficient operation of the whole, which itself is part of a larger whole and has a function of its own. The appearance of functions constituting the signs of life on this microscopic level is directly analogous to the same signs on a macroscopic level. The cell takes in nutrition, grows, moves, expends energy, protects itself, reproduces, and excretes waste. I have a question. Is all this organization just good luck? "Of course not," you may say. "It's all controlled by the DNA. I have another question. What orders the DNA? From where comes the energy that the cell requires? From the mitochondria? Does it not take motion and energy in order even to do the work that produces the energy for the cell?"

We hold that all this organization in living things is a result of intelligent control - that there is an inborn intelligence which exists in living things which nurtures and protects them. This intelligence is part of the universal intelligence we spoke of earlier, and accounts for the fact of order in structure and function in living things.

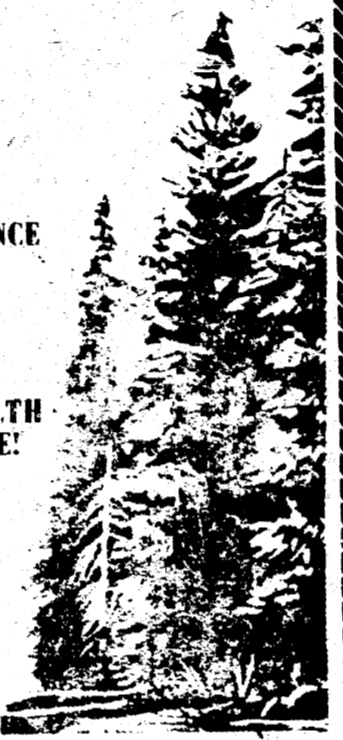

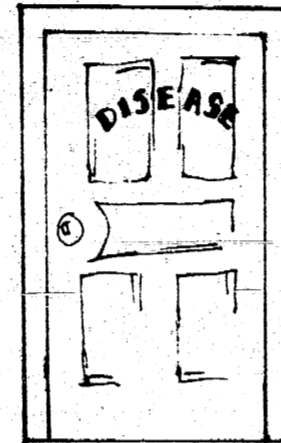

bang shut whenever you come around.

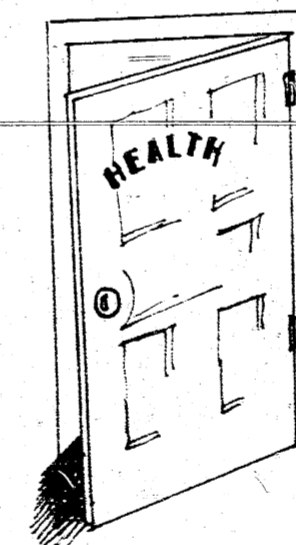
Wait a minute. There is a cause for every effect. Just when did your health problem begin? Was it because of dissipation or some emotional difficulty? If so check on yourself, at back your self-control and closed doors will again open.

On the other hand, did your problem follow some accident or mishap? For instance, a car accident, falling down steps or off a chair, or doing something heavy that may have strained your back? If something of this nature closed the door to health you should consult a chiropractor. Do you ask why?

## I Am (Still) Tony's Tonsils

Hi there. I am Tony's tonsils. I have been with Tony all his life. I have an important job to do to keep Tony healthy. In a way, I guess I'm lucky to still be around.

I am situated here in the back of the mouth toward the sides. I guard the entrance to the digestive and respiratory systems, so if I'm not on the job, all types of poisons can enter the body unchecked. I am the primary defense mechanism of the body. I trap foreign poisons. I identify them, produce antibodies against them, neutralize them, and then filter and remove them. I was especially busy when Tony was a child, because there were always so many new poisons to identify and make patterns of antibodies for. Naturally, I was larger. As a teenager, I had identified most of the foreign poisons that attack the body, so I can do my work a lot faster, easier, and better, so my size reduced.

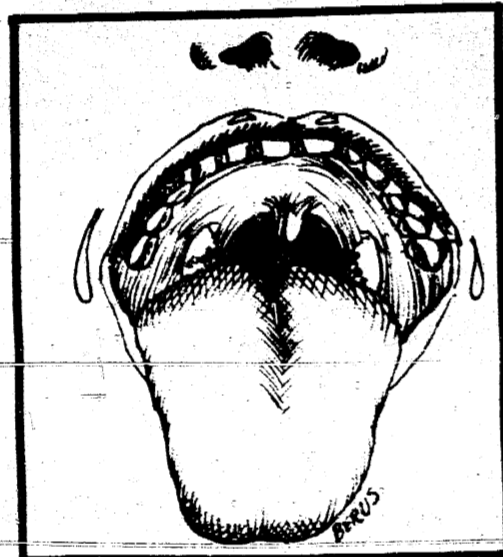
I am somewhat almond shaped and sized. I have a rough outside with deep recesses. If the recesses were magnified, they would look like rough mountains with deep ravines. It is in these ravine-like areas that I trap many bacteria and foreign elements that are poisonous. I am mostly lymph tissue underlying the mucous membrane. The lymphatic tissues detoxify and neutralize poisons. There are a great number of White Blood Cells in me also, which attack and destroy harmful bacteria. So you can see why I am so important.

Now, like every other organ and area of Tony's body, I work by directions. My work can be compared to a gigantic factory making hundreds of thousands of different parts. Every time I make a new antibody, I identify and pattern it and send the pattern up to the main filing office in the brain for future reference.
