Every living thing eats on something else. We are born to be eaten, one way or another. A little reflection will show that it could not be otherwise. Without adequate nutrition all organisms would soon cease to be.

Most of the life on earth depends upon the ability of green plants to manufacture food. At has been estimated that plants produce annually about two million, billion pounds of sugar, starches, fats, proteins, etc. Over 80% of this is made by microscopic plants called diatoms. Diatoms are born to be eaten. The same is true all up and down the food ladder. Robert Claiborne in his book "On Every Side of the Sea states:

Eating and being eaten do not constitute disease. On the contrary, it is part of the original plan of Universal Intelligence for achieving the balanced and repeated cycles necessary to maintain living things in coordination with each other and with the rest of the universe. Death and disintegration are as much a part of the life cycle as

birth and growth. Dead and dying cells. like empty beer cans, must be continuously recycled. otherwise they would pollute the body of the host with deadly necro-toxins. Such cells are the natural food for germs. Germs

QUOTE:

"...If one were to take the same 100 students and expose them to an identical dose of Type 3 pneumococcus, some would suffer no obvious ill effects at all, some would develop a mild or moderate illness, and some (without proper treatment) would die. This lack of exactness, so disturbing to some students, must be accepted."

COMMENT:

In the first sentence of this quote, the author admits that each individual reacts differently, symptomatically or virtually asymptomatically, to an identical dose of the same

type bacillus. Yet, the medical profession continuously state that certain diseases are "caused" by a bacillus. This is very contradictory to the meaning of this quote. If it were true. that Ibacilli; "cause" disease, there would be no room for such a statement as the quote, in a

medical textbook The reason being quite simple: if a specific dose of a bacillus "causes" harm in one individual, then that exact same amount given to any other individual would "cause" equal harm.

In the last sentence, the author states, that "this lack of exactness..... is disturbing to some medical students, and that it must be accepted.

In actuality, the lack of exactness is not in the fact that the bacillus will react differently with different individuals. That is exact-that will happen every time; different results on different individuals, because every person alive has a different body chemistry. And different compounds will never react the same way to a controlled chemical introduction.

As for bacilli oreven anti-biotics, vaccines, and any other type drugs, no matter what the dose, the body's reaction to them will all be different, unpredictable, because every body maintains a different level of resistance than that of any other body. This resistance level is even subject to change from minute to minute within one individual. Yet medical beliefs persist in presupposing that a drug will do the same job on every unfortunate individual taking it.





Test Yourself

This is the first in a From time to time, examinations in chiropractic philosophy are given at chiropractic colleges. Students often write responses which can be enlightening to the lay person. The following is a spontaneous response to a question asked in a Philosophy 1 exam at Sherman College of Chiropractic.

Using your histology course as a basis, try and convince a non-chiropractic histologist of the logic of our Innate philosophy.

As a scientist, you must realize that all our Western thought, and more especially all of Western science hangs on the assumption made by the earliest Greek philosophers that in order for the universe to be intelligible, it must be ordered. No inductive process can be conceived without an assumption of order. Cataloguing the plant and animal kingdoms, for example, presupposes that there are in reality many creatures and plants, some exhibiting certain qualities, others other qualities, such that some are similar to many, and other dissimilar. All rules and scientific laws presuppose that a principle must be able to be applied universally at all times. A cat is not a cat today, and a unicorn tomorrow. The law of gravity does not operate only while we are awake, but while we sleep as well. Were t not so, we would have to continually suspendjudgment about everything in the universe. Indeed we would not have even a concept of the suspens-

is impossible. Now, either this order is gratuit ous, an accident or good luck, on the one hand; or it is designed, planned, or given on the other. Chiropractic holds the latter of these propositions. We see the order of the universe, the balance in nature, the fact that a tree is a tree and not an elephant, as a manifestation of intelligence. Order presupposes intelligence. Had we never seen a watch before, and we happened upon one on the sidewalk, and we examined it, took

In fact, our major premise is to us a self-evident truth, upon which th rest of our philosophy is built, namely, that there is a universal intelligence which is in all matter. continually giving to it all its properties and action. thereby maintaining it in

Obviously, this premise can neither be absolutely proved or dis-Someone may proved. always suspend his judgment on the truth of the premise. However, the order we perceive in the universe takes on the character of strong evidence to support our major premise, and we proceed thus deductively to build our philosophy Let's see if we can ap-

ply this process to your science. The living cell is a whole, constituted of parts. You study the cell and its parts in terms of structure and function. You start with our assumption that the whole is ordered, and seek answers to questions such as: what is the function of a given part? How does it relate to the other parts? etc. You find that located within the cell is a nucleus which contains still smaller parts which seem to direct and control all other activities in the cell. You notice vacuoles migrating about the cell.

nsporting nutrients etc. You call the mitochondria the power plants of the cell, producing energy used by other parts of the cell. Other parts - ribosomes, lysosomes, Golgi complex, endoplasmic reticulum - have known or theorized functions, all known or assumed to be coordinated for the efficient operation of the whole, which itself is part of larger whole and has a function all its own. The appearance of functions constituting the signs of life on this microscopic level is directly analogous to the same signs on a macroscopic level. The cell takes in nutrition, grows, moves, expends energy, protects itself. reproduces, and excretes waste. I have a question. Is all this organization just good luck? "Of course not", you may say. "It's all controlled by the DNA. I have another question What orders the DNA? From where comes the energy that the cell requires? From the mitochondria? Does it not take motion and energy in order even to do the work that produces the

We hold that all this organization in living things is a result of intelligent control - that there is an inborn intelligence which exists in living thing which nurtures and protects them. This intelligence is part of the universal intelligence we spoke of earlier, and accounts for the fact of order in structure and function in living things.






