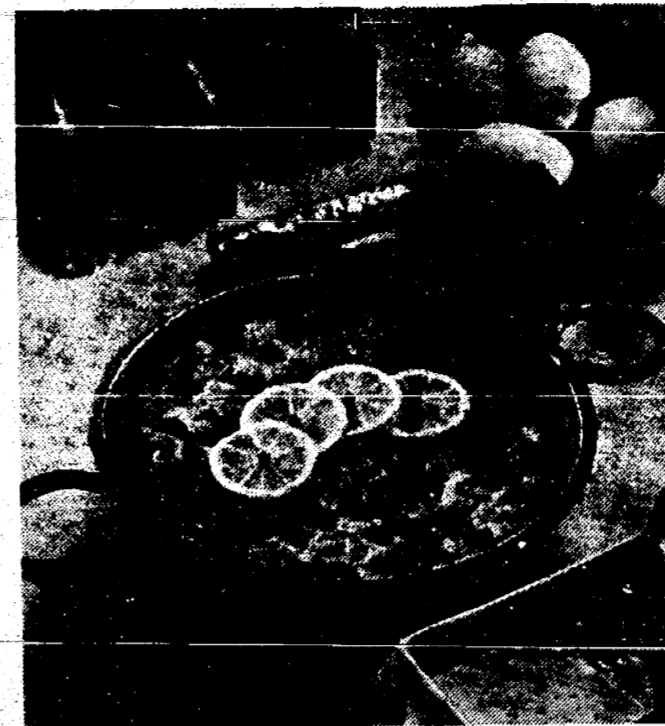
INGRAHAMS ATTENTION

Information wanted on descendants of Lucy Ann (Mosher) Ingraham, and her husband, Deight Ingraham. Coming from Cayuga Co., N. Y., they appeared in Mosherville, Hillsdale Co., in the 1860 census with children Amelia, Walter J., and George A., and one clue indicates there were younger children later, Ida, Belle, and Ben. Only Amelia appeared in the 1880 Mosherville census as Amelia French widow of George French with a daughter Alida. There I lost the entire clan.

I'm trying this area because two of Lucy Ann's sisters, Mrs. Alex T. Kirkwood (Paulina Mosher) and Mrs. Isaac P. Warrick (Sarah Jane Mosher) lived at some time in the Manchester-Sharon Hollow area. I found the Kirkwood graves in the Sharon Town Hall cemetery, but there were no Warrick or Ingraham graves there, though two Warrick children, Mary Isabel and Lewis both died in Sharon Township in 1872. Also county records show that a George and Ann Ingraham of Kansas had a child, that was stillborn, in Manchester in 1878.

Lemon Gold From The West



Remember how good old-fashioned bread pudding tasted on a crisp, cold fall or wintry night? In pioneer days it was considered a rare treat because there was seldom bread "left over" to use for such an elegant dessert. The chance of topping it off with lemon sauce was almost unheard of, except for the lucky California settlers who found that their new homeland was blessed with sun ripened lemons and gold, too!

You never, or hardly ever, find a gold nugget today, but you can find California and Arizona fresh lemons in your market all year round.

BUTTER'S GOLD BREAD PUDDING

- (8 servings)
- 3 cups milk
 - 2 eggs
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 3 cups lightly packed stale whitebread cubes*
 - 1 cup seedless raisins
 - 1 tablespoon fresh grated lemon peel

In medium saucepan over medium heat, heat milk until tiny bubbles form around the edge. Meanwhile, in 1 1/2-quart casserole, with wire whisk or fork, beat eggs, sugar, salt and nutmeg until well combined. Gradually beat hot milk into egg mixture. Stir in bread cubes, raisins and grated peel. Place casserole in shallow baking pan; pour hot water 1 inch deep around dish. Bake at 350°F. for 1 hour or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve pudding warm with Lemon Sauce.

*If you use one of the "soft" brands of white bread, allow 30 minutes longer for cooking. To dry fresh bread, place in oven at 300°F. for 1 hour.

LEMON SAUCE

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 cup water
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh grated lemon peel
- 2 tablespoons fresh squeezed lemon juice

In small saucepan, thoroughly combine sugar and cornstarch. Add water, stirring until smooth. Bring to boil over medium heat, stirring constantly; cook 1 to 2 minutes. Stir in butter, lemon peel and juice. Serve warm over bread pudding. Makes 1 1/2 cups.
