Unless the Governor and the Legislature are forced by the voters to limit state spending, Michigan could end up in the hole as bad financially as New York City or the Federal Government. The total budget for the State of Michi gan has doubled more than twice in the last 10 years. Currently, the actual budget for the State of Michigan is close to \$6 billion. New programs and increased spending are forced through the Legislature by powerful special interest groups while many out-of-date and wasteful programs are continued. The Michigan Legislature will spend every dollar it can get during the good economic years and then raise additional taxes to go with lower revenues in the bad years. The average citizen is caught between the rising cost of living and rising taxes with the result that he or she has less and less left to spend in their paycheck.






