



Every day, in some way, your life is affected by the ICC, FPC, FCC, SEC, FMC, CAB, EPA, OSHA, FEC, CFTC, and CPA.

Most of these agencies were formed. either because of a real need or because of consumer demand for protection against something or other, Many have long outlived their usefulness, butremainfirmly entrenched, refusing to die. The power these regulatory agencies wield is frightening, especially to small business which can be driven to bankruptcy by expenses incurred in meeting government stan-


