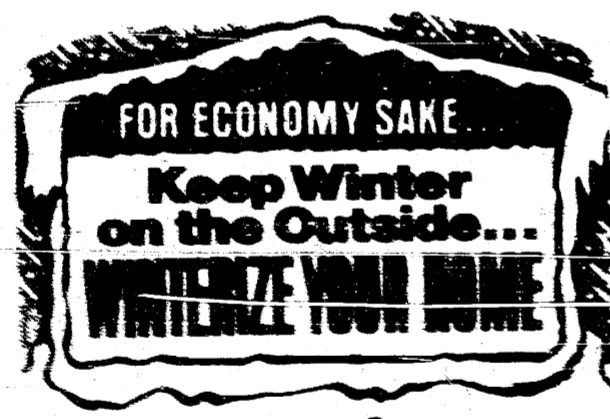
TO THE MANCHESTER AREA

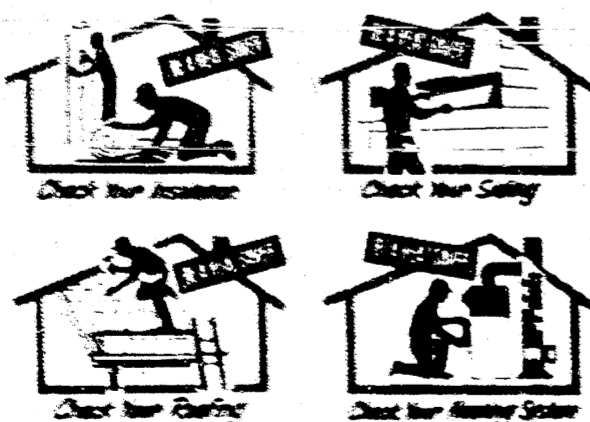
Due to family illness, personal illness, and a number of other things needing doing these past two months, I got way behind in calling around the area for chairpeople. For this I must apologize.

most per pound when buying eggs. Officials of the Michigan Department of Agriculture say a dozen eggs equal one and one half pounds in the shell. If large eggs bring for 90 cents per dozen, that's equivalent of 60 cents per pound. The price a serving of two large eggs costs 15 cents, not bad for a protein food.

Eggs are classified according to standards for quality of individual quality of the white and yolk and shell and soundness of the shell. To determine egg grades, a cooperative federal-state program. The two top consumer grades are S, Grade AA and U, S, Grade A. Food inspectors often re-check for quality when conducting routine more inspections. Samples are taken from the store display cases and are "candled." This process of twirling an egg in front of a light to observe the interior without the shell. Years ago a candle

was actually used, thus the term candling. Today MDA inspectors use a hand candling instrument.

The egg, one of our most versatile foods, need not always play a supporting role in meal preparation. You can make it the soul and substance of your meal. A simple treat of ten forgotten is scrambled eggs. Prepared in butter and seasoned with salt and pepper, they're a culinary delight. Some cooks include a dash of Tabasco or paprika. For lighter eggs, cream, milk or water may be added. To make extra rich eggs, mix in bits of softened butter while scrambling. For more good eating, combine scrambled eggs with chopped, sauteed mushrooms, finely chopped ham or hotdogs, crisp bacon bits, cheese, sausage, herbs, onions or green peppers.

GERMINATION OF ALFALFA SEEDS

Obtain any of the following seeds of beans which have not been treated with chemicals; mung beans, soybeans, lentils, radish, alfalfa, wheat, rye, watercress. Put one quarter to one half cup seeds in a quart jar and soak them for eight hours or overnight. Cover the jar with nylon netting or cheesecloth, securing the cloth with a rubber band around the neck of the jar. Put the jar in a dark place or cover with paper bag to preserve vitamins.

After seeds have soaked, pour off the water, saving it to use in soups. Rinse the seeds and drain them, leaving the jar tilted top-side down, so any excess

moisture will drain off.

At the end of the day, rinse sprouts again in order to remove any fungus which may have started to grow.

Repeat this process twice a day for at least three days, until sprouts are as long as desired. Then refrigerate in a closed container. Sprouts keep well in the refrigerator eight to ten days. The vitamin C content is actually increased after three to four days of refrigeration.

Mung, soy and lentil sprouts are most palatable when the sprout is one half to one inch in length; alfalfa, wheat, rye, radish and watercress when the sprout is no longer than the seed.

OFFICIAL TRANSPORTATION MAPS

The new Michigan Official Transportation maps are now being distributed and Representative Michael H. Conlin (R-23rd District) has one for you.

The new maps are free, as always, and Representative Conlin will send you one if you write to him at the State Capitol in Lansing.

In addition to the usual information, the 1976 edition of the state map is full of brief historical facts about Michigan and carries a Bicentennial theme.

For example, the map notes the eight most prominent settlements and communities in Michigan during the Revolutionary period and gives a brief description of America's Transportation Heritage on display at Greenfield Village in Dearborn. The document also designates hospital

locations, passenger rail trackage, water ports, airports, bridges and tunnel facilities and their tolls, ferry lines, State Police posts, district offices of the Highways and Transportation Department and an index to cities and villages and their population figures.

It also gives an updated picture of the miles of expressway completed in Michigan and indicates expressway routes that will be completed this year.

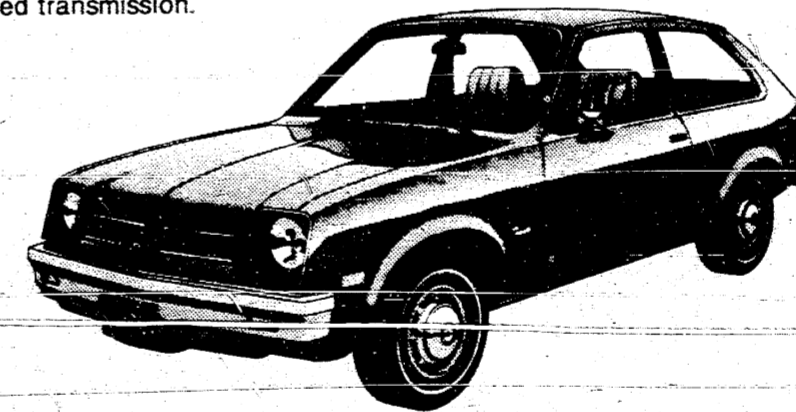

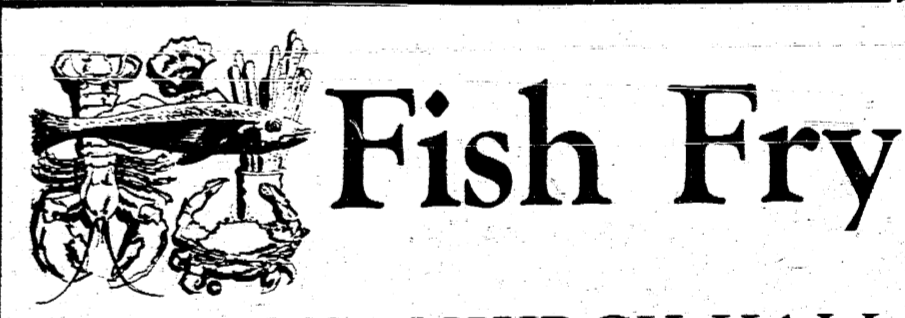

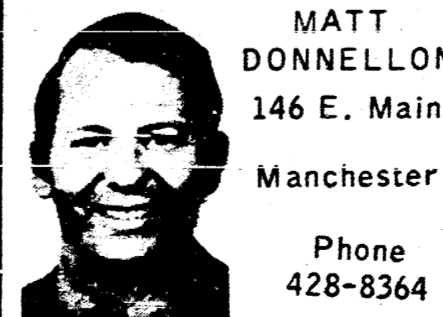

In 1971, when Special Education became mandatory for all school districts, the State also designed a plan for insuring parental voice in the development and monitoring of school programs. 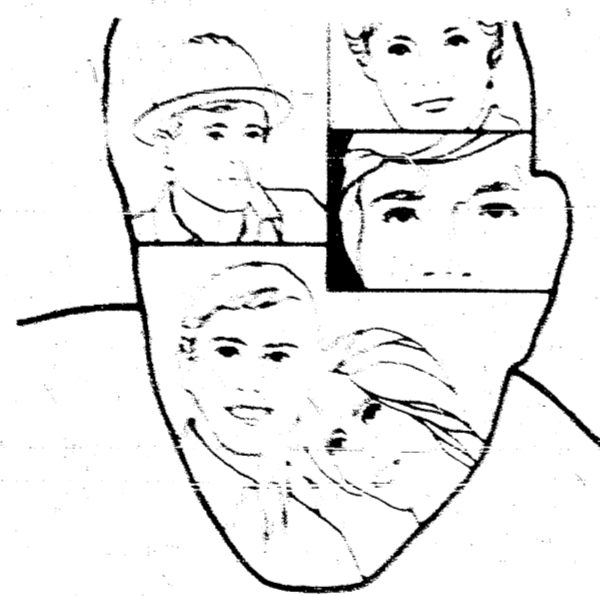

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

"PROTECTION" PAYMENTS ARE HIGH

In the gangster movies, mobsters visited neighborhood business places to collect "protection" payments. If the business people did not pay, they were beaten up or burned out—or both.

In today's civilized society, American citizens aren't beaten up if they don't make their protection payments. Instead, the money is "painlessly" extracted in the form of tax dollars or in the price they pay for goods and services. It's not a voluntary program for which you sign up—you shall be "protected," like it or not, and you shall pay for it.

Your health, safety, environment, economy, etc., is regulated by a multitude of governmental agencies at a cost of about \$130 billion a year—or, personally speaking, about \$2,000 for each American family. Every day, in some way, your life is affected by the FCC, EPA, FPC, SEC, FMC, CAB, EPA, OSHA, FEC, CFTC, and CPA.

Most of these agencies were formed, either because of a real need or because of consumer demand for protection against something or other. Many have long outlived their usefulness, but remain firmly entrenched, refusing to die. The power these regulatory agencies wield is frightening, especially to small business which can be driven to bankruptcy by expenses incurred in meeting government standards.

Farmers are concerned about the growing power of these regulatory agencies and through their organization, the American Farm Bureau Federation, are asking that they be brought under control. First, they believe that Congress should place less emphasis on passing new laws that further restrict the freedom of Americans. Then, in the future, for acts which require creating a new agency or giving new responsibilities to existing agencies, they request the inclusion of a termination date, so the laws—along with the agency—will go out of existence unless Congress acts to extend.

Seems like a sound, money-saving idea. Hopefully, Congress will consider their suggestion rather than heeding the pleas of those who ask for more government regulations, the economic illiterates who believe that protection is free....

through the use of air and space-borne infrared and radar multispectral scanners and photographic equipment, and the use of optical data and extract information.

APPLICATION FOR NEW FARM FEED GRAIN ALLOTMENTS

A feed grain allotment may be established under the 1976 Feed Grain Program for farms which did not have an allotment in prior years and meet eligibility requirements. Mrs. Carolyn Stump of the Washtenaw County SCS Office, announced today.

Interested producers should contact the County SCS Office not later than February 16, 1976, and file an application, Mrs. Stump said.

To be eligible for a new feed grain

allotment, the operator must expect to receive 50 percent or more of his livelihood in the current year from the production of agricultural commodities; must have adequate equipment for the production of feed grain; the land must be suitable for the production of feed grains; and neither the owner nor the operator may have an interest in any other farm for which a feed grain allotment has been established.

A farm for which a new farm allotment is established may qualify for program payments in the event program payments are made in 1976.
