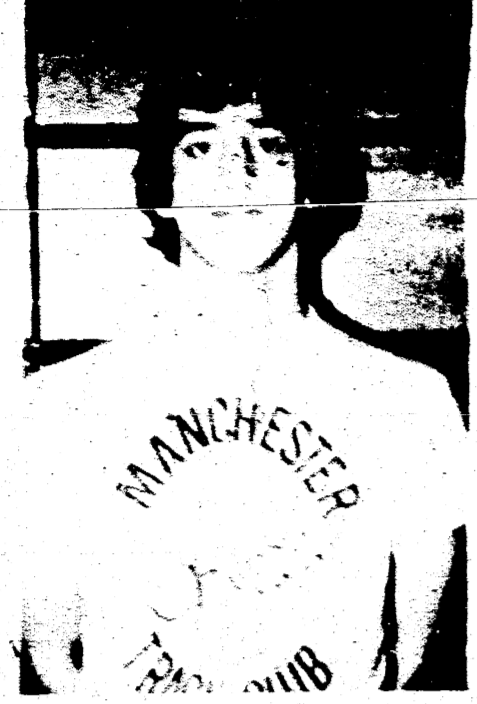

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU
EDITORIAL

BETWEEN THE FARM AND YOUR TABLE

With all the flap, both pro and con, on grain sales to Russia, haven't you often wondered what really happens to food prices between the place it is grown and the place it is eaten?

Let's take a look at the "Big Three" of the more than 500 or so U. S. agricultural products sold overseas—corn, wheat, soybeans. They account for almost 70% of the total value of all foreign exports. The most common criticism of the exports is the price of these farm products is being driven up and thereby increases the cost of food for consumers here at home.

So, just what is the true relationship between the two?

Following the recent announcement of sales of wheat and corn to Russia, features prices of the "Big Three" rose about a dollar a bushel. When all three of these crops rise \$1 each a bushel it means that consumer food expenditures are expected to increase by 3-1/2 to 4-1/2 percent. However, since food accounts for less than 20% of consumers' buying costs, the increase amounts to less than one percent in overall living expenditures. This \$1 a bushel increase in income to the farmer, which repre-

sents less than a one percent hike in consumer living costs, can spell the difference between a year of profit or loss on the farm.

Also, increases in crop prices have to be in effect for some time, usually three months or more, before they have any effect on the retail price of food. In some instances, as much as a lag of a year might elapse before changes in grain prices show up at the retail level.

Let's take the price of bread for example: In mid-1972, the farmer received 2.5 cents out of the price of a one-pound loaf of bread for the wheat that went into it. In mid-1975, the farmer received 2.5 cents of the bread's price for his wheat. Hence—in three years, the farmer was getting only a penny more for the wheat. But—in the same time, the overall price of a loaf of bread, to the consumer, went up 18.3 cents.

Thus, those between the farmer and the consumer received ten times more of an increase than the grower of the wheat.

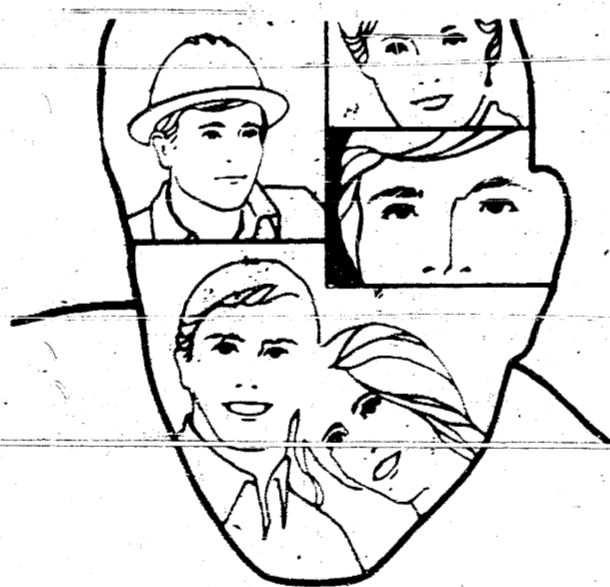

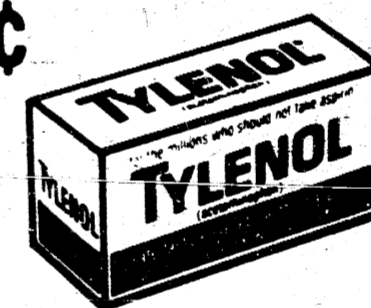

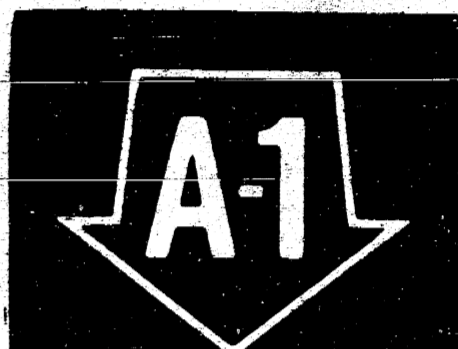

The tree and shrub seedlings range in size from 3-12", and must be ordered in lots of at least 50 of one kind. They can be planted anywhere in Michigan, but must not be re-sold with roots attached.

All seedlings are intended for conservation plantings such as windbreaks, reforestation, wildlife food and shelter, hedgerows, erosion control and natural beauty.

From 60% to 75% of the cost of reforestation or wildlife habitat improvement plantings may be reimbursed by the Federal Government under the Agricultural Conservation Program. Application for reimbursement must be made before the seedlings are purchased. A minimum of 1000 seedlings of approved varieties must be planted to qualify. Contact the ASCS Office at 662-3908 for information regarding eligibility and other qualifications for reimbursement through the ACP program here in Washtenaw County.

School Social Work Services

School Social Work programs respond to many student needs. In a history class a teacher becomes concerned that one of the students is withdrawn and non-productive; day after day, in a 6th grade, another student becomes absent when asked to read aloud; down the hall a 4th grade student comes in two hours early school has started, clothes rumpled and unbrushed, just as it has been for the last two weeks; and in Physicals, a bright male student just stops coming to class; 10th grader is on probation for running away two weeks ago. Similar situations happen each day in area schools, situations which hinder, do not destroy, the learning process and hinder the educational experiences of students. When such situations do occur it is possible that through a system of referral and a staff review, the students, teachers, and the parents involved, will come in contact with the School Social Worker. For the past 33 years, the Michigan Department of Education has recognized the need for a mental health service in the schools. In 1943 the Youth Guidance Committee was approved by former Governor Kelly. As a result, the visiting teacher program was established and was operation until 1967. At that time the program name was changed to School Social Work Services. In attempting to handle a problem situation, the School Social Worker can choose to operate on any of one or four possible levels. At the primary level, the worker may see the student individual and/or a group with other students who experience similar problems. Group and individual contacts most often are for an hour per week, however, shorter sessions several times a week will often be helpful. A secondary level most often consists of those people who are important to the student and so, therefore, have an effect on his or her behavior. Conferences with the parents, the referring teacher and other teachers, are scheduled not only to gather information about the problem, but also to implement changes which would benefit the student. Often the student's behavior will improve when minor changes are introduced to and carried out by the teachers and the parents. In addition, the strain of the student's behavior may be difficult for the parent teacher to cope with for any length of time. Contact with the Social Worker can also provide a release for the tensions which may in turn reduce some of the student's problems. The third level consists of the school system within which the student must operate. The Social Worker confers with the principal, guidance counselor, school nurse, psychologist, and special education teachers to see if curriculum changes are

Family Service Annual Meeting

Manchester Family Service Annual Meeting showed that 179 persons were assisted by the agency in 1975. Of this number 78 were children and 42 were adults over 65 years of age. Approximately 640 phone calls and related contacts were made and 13 volunteer drivers covered 7695 miles on agency related business. 450 items of clothing, furniture, dishes, bedding, etc., came to the agency and were distributed, often the same day as storage is at a minimum. A list of "Have" and "Need" makes quick turn-overs possible. A major project early in the year was assisting with the University of Michigan Arthritis Project in the area and clinics that followed. At Eastertime 2 hams and 10 turkeys were given by Double A Products for distribution to needy families from Social Services listing. D'Agostino's Florists gave Easter lilies to 43 shut-ins and older citizens in the area. The lilies were delivered by Manchester Family Service drivers.

Referrals to the House-by-the-Side-of-the-Road were given to 7 different families aiding 16 adults and 13 children. For those who are not familiar with "The House", it is located in the Washtenaw County Service Center. The Washtenaw County and Council of Churches Resource Center for used clothing and many other items for the use of referrals from the Department of Social Services and related agencies. They accept donations, are listed in the phone book and one should call them before attempting to make any deliveries or donations. The Christmas Project served 105 individuals in 38 families. These families received boxes of groceries made up from the Scavenger Hunt collection, food or clothing orders based on the Salvation Army standards for the County Christmas Bureau, and their choice of clothing, toys and household items at the Christmas Shop. The Shop was held at St. Mary's Catholic Church Hall and it was set up and repacked at its close by volunteers from Theta Sigma Phi sorority.

Four church groups, The Huron Valley Night Hawks Motorcycle Club and anonymous donors gave \$385 toward the Christmas project this year. A dozen children ranging in age from 3 through 10 were given a Shopping Spree by the Jaycees and Jaycees Auxiliary. This is an annual event given to children of this age who come from families on aid in the area. Three board members were elected to fill three year terms - Mrs. Merle Armstrong, Mrs. Paul Lemon and Mrs. Arthur Jarve. Mr. Merrill Korih was elected to a two year term to fill the vacancy left by the late Luther Klager. This is only a portion of the annual report. Those wishing to receive a complete report may request one from Mrs. Merle Armstrong, secretary of MFS, or they may attend the Annual Meeting of the Manchester Community Chest, 7:30 March 24 at the Franklin Book Library at the Manchester High School. All agencies in the local Chest will be reporting at that time for the public.
