School Board Sets Millage Needs

The Manchester Board of Education at a public informational meeting Monday, March 8, 1976 set the operational millage for the April 13 millage election at 12.78 mills. This is an increase of four (4) mills over last year. Ben Feldkamp, chairman of the budget committee, explained the increased costs the school is experiencing which are attributed to teacher salary increases and rising costs of materials, supplies and utilities. Mr. Feldkamp also went over the state aid projection and explained the two proposals being considered at the present time. The Board indicated that the extra 4 mills is the minimum amount the school district needs to continue the present educational program. Additional information relative to this request will be forthcoming in subsequent issues of the Enterprise and the school newsletter.

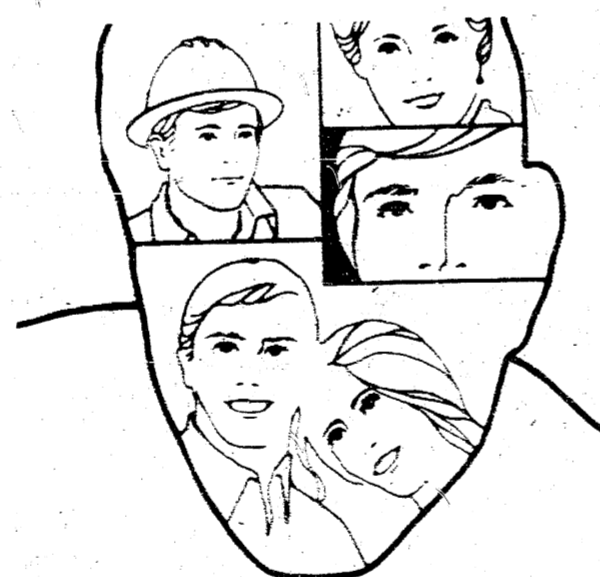

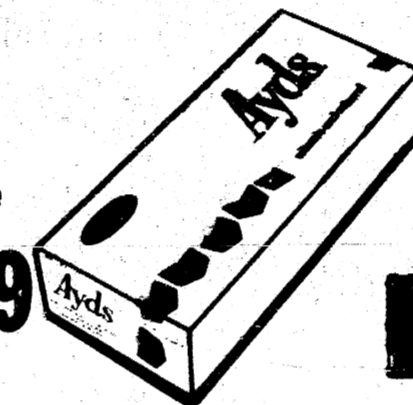

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

February 16, 1976

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Pro-tem Mahony. Present were Beal, Mahony and Scully; absent Curley, Fitzgerald, Little and Mann. Minutes of the February 2, 1976 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Scully, supported by Beal. All yeas, carried.

Beal discussed problems encountered with permits. He felt the situation was not as serious as originally indicated. After investigation he indicated that extenuating circumstances exist on several of the cases brought up previously. He listed permits for January, bldg. H & R Block, alterations - Gebhardt, Steele; plumbing - Gebhardt, Miller, Padley; electrical - Jose, Freedom Electric (415 Riverside), Padley, Kirk (E. Main), Freedom Elec. (C. Main), building - Schaffer, Padley.

Since the preliminary budget was incomplete it was moved by Mahony, supported by Scully that the hearing be rescheduled for March 1, 1976 and be readvertised. All yeas, carried. Mahony brought up the scheduled change in tax basis which resulted in further discussion of tax return money.

The clerk presented Council with the names of proposed Election Officials. Moved by Beal, supported by Scully so

appoint K. Roesch chairman, with M. Tapping, M. Widmayer and V. Schalle as members for the March 8, 1976 annual election. All yeas, carried.

Zsenyuk advised Council on progress with the proposed 24 hour joint Fire and Police dispatch. The Fire Department is presently checking with Michigan Bell to find out the costs of moving it all to the Police Department. There is an Explorer's training session in March devoted to Communications which would be timely if a decision has been made by that time. Zsenyuk also advised Council that Pres. Little had addressed a communication to the townships offering police protection on a limited basis and advising them of the costs. In such a program the Village would handle runs and make reports in the townships as a convenience, but would turn long term investigations over to the County.

Daniels reported that the department had reworked the East Well house and installed another heater. Other activities have included snow removal, salting, opening streets, repairing a pump at the lift station, repairing the gate at the transfer site and cutting trees on Washington and South Macomb Streets.

Enter Mason at 8:12 p.m. The new owners of the Black Sheep Tavern, Chris and Tim Hoover, were introduced and questioned about their plans for their new acquisition. Moved by Scully, sup-

ported by Mann that the request from Christopher D. and Timothy A. Hoover for transfer ownership of the 1975 Class C license with Dance permit located at 115-119 East Main Street, Manchester, Michigan 48158, Washtenaw County, from D.E. Limpert be considered for approval. Yeas: Beal, Mahony, Mann, Scully; nays: None; absent: Curley, Fitzgerald. It is the consensus of this legislative body that the application be recommended for issuance.

Councilman Mann offered the following resolution and moved its adoption. Whereas, Section 13 (e) of Act 51, Public Acts of 1951 provides that such funds are returned under the provisions of this section, that "the responsibility for all street improvement, maintenance and traffic operation work shall be coordinated by a single administrator to be designated by the governing body who shall be responsible for and shall represent the municipality in all transactions with the State Highway Commission pursuant to the provisions of this Act". Therefore, be it resolved, that this Honorable Body designate Bruce T. Daniels as the single (Street) administrator for the Village of Manchester in all transactions with the State Highway Commission as provided in Section 13 of the Act. Supported by the Councilman Scully. Yeas: Mann, Mahony, Scully, Beal.

Exit Beal at 8:30 p.m. Mann reported on Planning Commission matters. The proposed revision of the zoning ordinance regarding previously plotted lots was considered at the February 5, 1976 meeting of the Planning Commission. Unanimous expression of the Commissioners present was that reasoning behind provisions of the Ordinance, including the 90 foot frontage specification, is valid and that the Ordinance should be maintained as is. A variance could be granted. Should a Board of Appeals be needed, Broucek, Tracy and Whittington would serve as representatives of the Village Planning Commission, with Daniels designated as an alternate representative. Moved by Mann, supported by Scully to adjourn at 8:59 p.m. All yeas, carried. Mary H. Wheeler, Clerk

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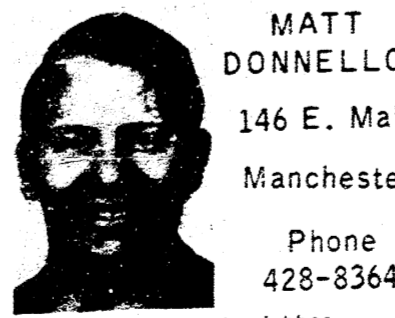

LEARNING DISABILITIES

With the increased awareness of learning difficulties commonly called "Learning Disabilities", in our student population, various programs have been developed to meet these needs.

A Learning Disability refers to a delay or disorder in one or more of the processes involved, in understanding the use of spoken or written language, i.e., speech, perception, behavior, reading, spelling, writing, or arithmetic. A Learning Disability does not include learning problems which are due primarily to visual, hearing, or motor handicaps, to mental retardation, emotional disturbance or to environmental disadvantages.

The child with a Learning Disability usually has average or above average intelligence, but often remains significantly behind his peers, academically.

The child may speak fluently and with comprehension, while performing poorly in assignments that require adequate hand writing skills. Or he may reverse letters and/or numbers. Common examples of letters often reversed are b, d, p, q, u, n, and h. Many are exactly alike except for the position on the page. (Look at them upside down or from the side.) Examples of numbers often reversed are 5, 3, 9, and 6. Reverse order of words and/or numbers are also common, such as (was-saw) (no-on) (26-62) (36-63) etc. A child with these perceptual problems will often avoid the printed page, whenever possible. (Reversals are common in all children to age 6.)

Other students may understand what they see, but have difficulty understanding what they hear. Phonics skills which aid children significantly in obtaining reading and spelling skills are diminished or denied these children. This child is limited to sight word vocabulary, which relies heavily on memory.

Perhaps the most important task for ed-

ucators, including parents (the most significant teacher in the child's life) is to help the child continue to feel good about himself. If during the time when learning difficulties occur, the child receives messages "that he is dumb," he is not likely to gain sufficient self-confidence, even after the learning problems have ceased to exist.

Local school districts vary in Learning Disability program design, depending on that district's needs.

The most common approaches include:
(1) Learning Resource Room - Children leave the regular class room for approximately one hour or more per day, to visit the Learning Disabilities teacher for remedial exercises designed to fulfill specific educational needs. This combined effort of building staff creates a total individualized program.

(2) Learning Disabilities Consultant Program - The Learning Disabilities Consultant prepares specific educational diagnostic assignments which are administered by the classroom teacher.

(3) The least and least used approach is the self-contained Learning Disabilities teacher for the entire day. Here too, each child is taught according to a diagnostic individualized plan.

Through careful evaluation and observation, the school staff, as a team, working with the parents, strive to offer a program where children learn in an environment which includes success combined with challenge, based on each child's unique learning style.
