Family Memories

Have you ever noticed how close laughter is to tragedy? If the slip on the banana peel is just a slip then it's funny, but if the leg is broken then it's tragedy.

Family memories come times when the fine edge, being too painful to contemplate, but the passage of time dulls the pain and the perspective of distance slips it back from acute misery into the downright ludicrous.

It was a Christmas Holiday time and only a week before the day when the old house was decorated top to bottom and all excited expectancy. This is all small children getting tense and parents waiting for all married and college people to arrive home for the week. The fifth son, Mark, a student at Michigan State, has just been elected President of his Fraternity and is carrying with some seriousness, his new office and arrives soon to tell all and receive approval. Third son, Chuck, is doing intensive research in Maryland and should be showing up for annual gift distribution. Along with the usual fatigue attending these emotional gatherings, you should have a fairly clear picture of the scene. Let me set the opening.

At seven o'clock in the morning, when a good mother tries to wake the young schoolgoers, this one staggers down the hall and knocks on doors, wavers a bit, grips the banister, down the stairs to start breakfast, and all this in splendid finery, the wildly uncombed hair, the scruffy robe and the flopping slippers, when suddenly life gets happy, for there in the downstairs hallway, primly sits a suitcase and Lordy I says, Chuck must have flown in from Washington late last night, and I suddenly am awake and rushing round through the dining room round the corner to the living room where the pullout hideaway is open and she jumps on the bed and grabs his shoulder and rolls him over, "Hello there, it's great to see" --and looking down into the eyes of a young man I've never seen before in my life.

School Millage Vote April 19

Spring is with us and it is time to plant the seeds in preparation for this fall's harvest. The spring is also the time for schools to plan for the coming fall. Voters will be asked to 'plant the seeds' at the ballot box on April 19th for the harvest which will operate the schools for the coming year.

As with many things, the costs of operating our schools have risen considerably. Manchester Public Schools is no different. Manchester's costs have risen too. Schools are a labor intensive industry and because of this salaries form the largest single item in the school district's budget. It will cost an additional 100,000 dollars for the negotiated salary increases which our teachers will receive this coming year. Even though \$100,000 seems quite large, the individual raises are modest.

Utilities will also cost much more for the coming year. Unlike in the past when large users of utilities received preferential rates, schools and other high consumers of gas and electricity pay a higher rate than the individual home owner. It is estimated that it will cost Manchester Public Schools over \$80,000 for utilities for the 1976-77 school year.

Transporting our students to and from school will cost the district more money. Not only have the salaries of the drivers gone up, but the costs of busses and all of the supplies to operate them have gone up as well. The cost for a school bus has gone from \$12,250 in September, 1974 to \$15,871 now. Similar increases have been experienced for gasoline, oil

INSERVICE DAY

Monday, March 29, is Inservice Day in the Manchester Public Schools. This is a day similar to the old Teacher Institute Days when teachers would go to meetings in "far-away places" such as Ann Arbor, Jackson, or Detroit. Now, the local teachers set up their own training sessions through the Manchester Education Association, according to the education needs as seen by the teachers.

This year there are a variety of activities going on. The elementary teachers from Klager and Pleasant Lake Schools plus representatives from the fifth and sixth grade at the Middle School will be attending the Michigan Reading Association's Annual Conference at Grand Rapids. They hope to bring back new ideas sources of materials to improve the reading program.

The rest of the staff will be at the High School attending meetings and workshops put on by personnel from other schools and colleges. These are on topics designed to improve the skills of teachers. Specific activities for parents and children to do together to strengthen the child's weak areas will be included in the results.

On the basis of the results of the screening, approximately twelve children and parents will be invited to participate in the PREP program this Spring.

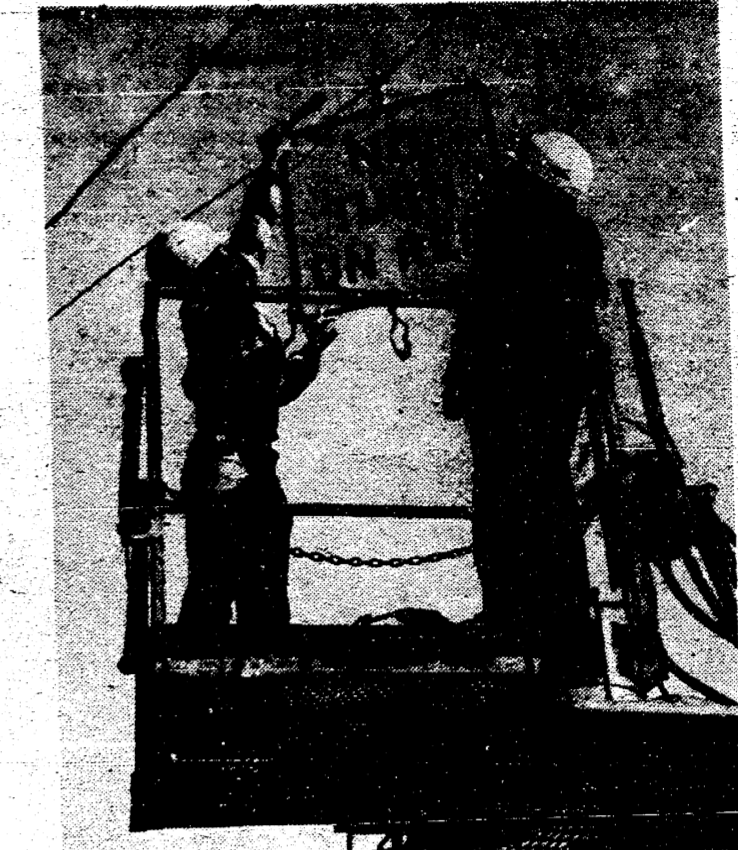

and replacement maintenance parts. All of these increased costs are for the same programs which are currently offered. With no additional course offerings, the costs of operating Manchester Public Schools will go from \$1,645,000 in the current year to over \$1,808,000 in the coming year.

In order to fund the programs which are currently offered at a very modest level, an additional 4 mills must be levied. This will make Manchester Public School District's extra voted millage 16.78 mills, still among the lowest in the county.

Passage of an additional 4 mills for operation on April 19th will insure an adequate harvest of funds to operate Manchester Public School District for the coming year. The voters in the Manchester Public School District are urged to sow their votes well so that the schools can operate as well next year as it has thus far.



MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

BACK TO THE BASICS

Our reflections on our heritage during this Bicentennial Year has prompted a yearning for "the good old days." Somehow, breakthroughs in medical science, even space exploration, lacks the romance and excitement experienced by the colonists and Wild West pioneers. So, in frustration, people search for a taste of those hardships that built the staunch characters of yesterday's heroes. Inexperienced hands build, plant, can, quilt, bake bread, make candles. A garment that has withstood a generation of rainy afternoons still trunk dress-ups in a fashion find rather than an object of ridicule at a society function. Our affluence and high standard of living has suddenly become a source of embarrassment instead of pride to some, and "getting back to the basics" is a current popular trend.

There are even those who advocate a regression from mechanized agriculture to horse and wagon farming. Let's look at what a reversal like that would do to our society.

A total of 61 million farm horses and mules would be needed to demechanize today's modern agriculture. That's 20 times more than are presently available. Even with a crash breeding program, it would take nearly two decades to raise

61 million horses and mules, and they would need 180 million acres of prime farmland just for feed. That's more than half the total farmland now in crops grown for our food.

Today, there are roughly four million farm workers. If horses and wagons were used, it would require eight times as many workers. Many of the 95% of our population which have been freed from the land by an efficient and productive agriculture to seek other vocations would once again have to spend their lives working to fill their basic needs. There would be no time nor energy for inventing, discovering, writing books or music.

A modern combine in an average of eight to nine seconds. To manually cradle and thresh a bushel of wheat would take an hour. If the workers who cradled and threshed the wheat were paid today's union wages...think what a loaf of bread would cost!

And it's doubtful that the environmentalists would want agriculture to get back to the basics, with 61 million horses and mules.

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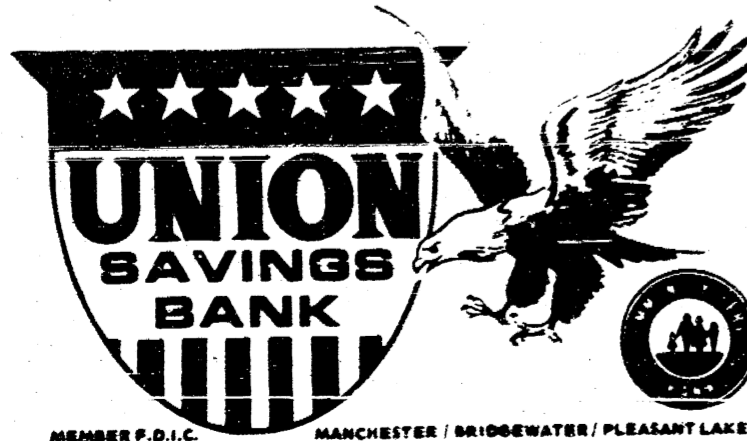

Millage Vital To School District

On Monday, April 19, 1976 the Manchester School District will hold an election with one issue on the ballot. This issue is a request for an additional 4 mills plus the 12.78 mills voted last year for a period of one year to maintain present programs and services for the students of the Manchester School District.

- This request for additional millage is necessitated by the following reasons:
1. Expenditures have increased to a point where they have overcome revenues.
 2. Teacher's salaries have had to be improved to remain competitive. (On the 1974-75 school year Manchester ranked 426 among the 530 Michigan School Districts.)
 3. Increments for non-certificated personnel must be maintained.
 4. Utilities costs have increased dra-

Twenty-five years ago, Stanton Roesch, who was a member of the Washtenaw County Red Cross Executive Board and commander of the Emil Jacob Post of the American Legion, scheduled the first Bloodmobile which included blood replacement for local people as well as for the Korean War effort. Mrs. Rolland Grossman was chairman of the day, Mrs. Robert Huber was in charge of registration, Canten chairman was Mrs. Harry Sutton and Mrs. Roesch was chairman of recruitment. That was in the days when the American Legion Auxiliary called everyone in the Manchester telephone book to explain the meaning of a Blood Club and to sign up donors. The Enterprise reports that the total number of pints received at that clinic was 127.

Two weeks ago at the record Bloodmobile, Mr. Donald Peak, Executive Director of the Washtenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross surprised the clinic workers with a cake to celebrate the anniversary of the Manchester Red Cross Blood Club's beginning.

Historically, Bloodmobiles in Manchester started in October 1942 when the Michigan Department of Health and the Red Cross held the first one to meet World War II needs. Mrs. Raynor Haeussler, who can tell vividly of the experience, was the chairman of this event. It is publicized during the month of October in the 1942 Manchester Enterprise and the summary on November 9th reports 160 attended and 130 pints of blood were received. In 1953 Ann Arbor nurses and aides were replaced with local people and only the Bloodmobile professional unit was from out of town. In that year the local Ford Motor Company combined with the Manchester Club and the Industrial connection was started. In 1954 Mr. Roesch resigned from the County Board and Mr. Franklin Reck became chairman for the next six years.

During the 60's, the Club continued with at least one Bloodmobile a year and Double A Products and Manchester Tool & Die and Manchester Stamping became regular Club members. Mrs. Reck was elected to the County Board and was and is on the local Blood Club committee.

Other members of the releasing committee are Mrs. Rolland Grossman and

This successful conclusion of the previous two year contract is positive evidence of the efforts put in by the Company and the Union to improve the labor relations atmosphere at Double A following the three week strike in 1974.

In the face of a significant economic downturn during the last two years, Double A has attempted to stabilize employment to the maximum degree, building inventory to maintain as many job opportunities as possible. During this period, the Union has cooperated fully and the employees have maintained a high degree of productivity unusual under these circumstances.
