## Manchester School Board Hires Superintendent, William J. Green

## Community Good Friday Services At Bethel Church



It is with a great deal of delight, anticipation, and personal pleasure that I have accepted the invitation of your Board of Education to serve your community as Superintendent of Schools. While I have spent a wonderful three years as Assistant Superintendent of the Gaylor Community Schools, the offer to work and live in your community was one that a professional educator could not turn down or help but perceive as a very real promotion and challenge in education. Three important factors are prominent in my mind as I attempt to introduce myself to you through this medium until such a time as I can get to meet you personally, and those are:

First, you have elected to represent your interests a truly dedicated seven individuals to your Board of Education. They have spent countless numbers of hours working for you to attempt to find a person who will work with you, the parents and children of the community, the staff of the school district, and school administration in working together collectively and democratically toward the continuance of the high quality of education which the

citizenry has every right to expect and maintain in its school system.

Secondly, I have had the opportunity to visit your community, talk with citizens, and to visit your schools. You are to be congratulated in providing excellent facilities in which your children can be educated. I happily found the people friendly and enthusiastic, anxious to be helpful, frank and open about discussing their desires for their children, plus a community blessed with clergymen of multiple faiths anxious to support a base in education that will insure an adult population that will hold certain values, support systems, customs, and beliefs that will lend compassion and solidarity to the society of tomorrow.

Thirdly, and perhaps most important to me, I found an opportunity to work in concert, through a dedicated Board of Education, with a total community in providing each person with the opportunity to become all that he or she is capable of becoming in life. This will be the greatest challenge for me and one I embrace with enthusiasm and motivation. Basic to my personal and educational philosophy is the fact that each of us, as children of the universe and our Creator, whichever form or shape that might take for each of us, have every right to be here.....no one person more than the other. Each deserves from the other the most human consideration that can be mustered from the total resources of the community. Hopefully, we shall find, very quickly, that common ground on which to base our foundation of work toward that ultimate goal. With the dedication of your Board of Education working in concert with teachers, parents, administrators, and the community will continue and renew their traditional support of the educational program of Manchester.

Certainly your Board of Education will wish to introduce me and provide background information relative to my qualifications for the important task at hand so I will not attempt to accomplish that here. I did, however, wish all sincerity wish to let you know how full of anticipation and motivation we are for the coming years in the Manchester Community. Between now and the time I will assume my full-time duties on July 1, 1976, I will be looking forward to meeting many of you.

Dear Editor:

The school board is asking the public on April 19 to vote itself an increase in taxes. The State of Michigan has financial problems. Revenue is down

because of the auto business slump. We can look around for someone to blame, but it won't do much good. Ten years ago the state paid about half of school operating money. Today it's about a quarter, and shrinking each year. Add inflation to the situation and the problem compounds. When state officials raise the valuations, which legally they must, it has the effect of taking money from Manchester, and giving it to backwoods and ghetto communities.

Is it right? I don't think so; not quite, anyhow. But I don't see anyone moving to the sticks or the sums. I'm surely not about to leave Manchester because of it. I'll stay here, pay the extra, grumble a little, and once in a while thank Almighty God that this is where my family is. That's the way I feel, and I hope that lots of your readers feel the same way. **Manchester Township**

We are concerned that some of our commercial and industrial customers as well as industry allies are not fully aware that natural gas service is not available for the installation of new gas equipment. Therefore, this notice is to remind you that Consumers Power Company is operating under a controlled service program which limits new or additional natural gas loads for commercial and industrial customers. Such service can only be provided when a gas permit is obtained in accordance with the Company's gas allocation procedure. This gas allocation procedure was developed by the Company to insure equitable distribution of new supplies of natural gas and was approved by order of the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. L-3590 issued November 26, 1974.

Briefly, the procedure requires the Company to accept applications for service to new and additional gas equipment to maintain waiting lists when gas is not available and to issue permits for new and additional gas equipment when gas is available. At the present time, the Company is currently issuing permits only for residential gas service and is maintaining priority waiting lists for all applica-

**tion for commercial and industrial gas service.**

In the future, you are involved in the planning or acquisition of gas equipment for a commercial or industrial customer of Consumers Power Company, you should contact our Energy Consulting Services Department to determine whether gas service can be provided for such equipment. Failure to do so could jeopardize the natural gas delivery to the customer and we are sure that neither you nor our company want this to happen.



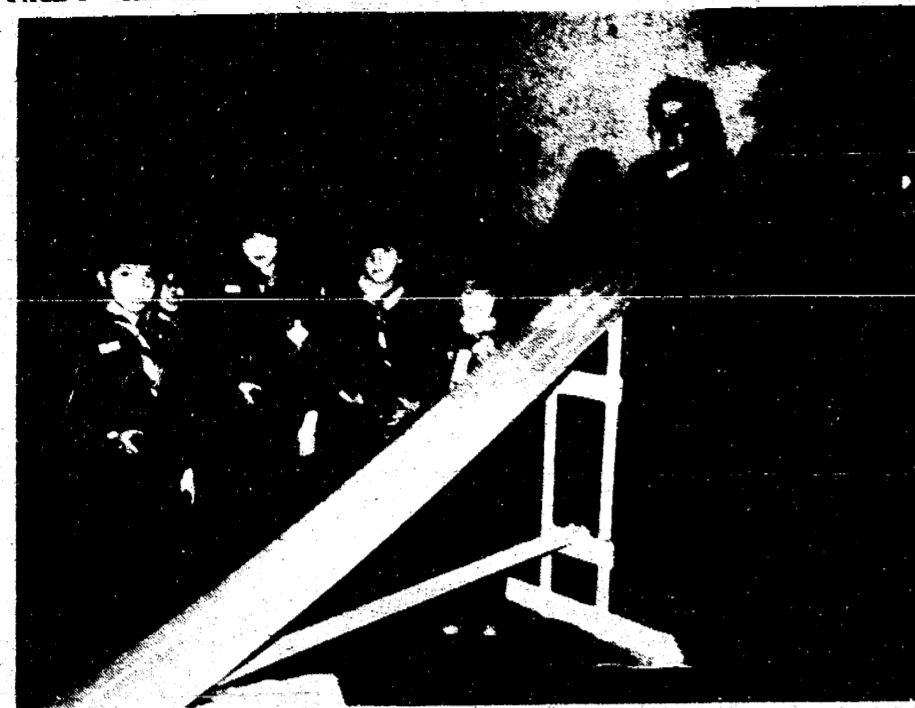

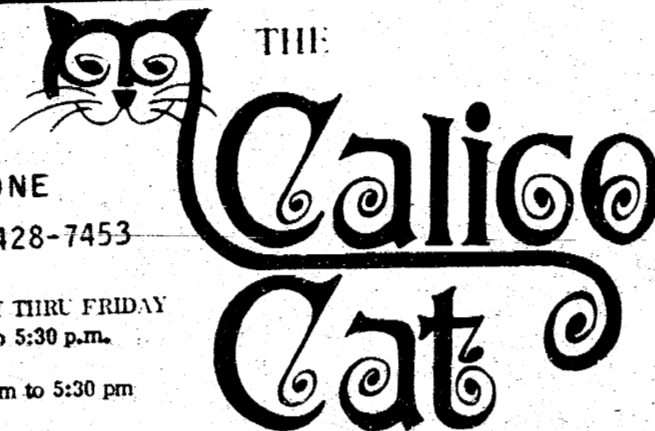

### INTERNATIONAL WELFARE

You may not realize it yet, but most of the rest of the world has decided to have an economic revolution, and you are supposed to pay for it.

The revolution would create the "New International Economic Order". Under this new order, people in rich countries would pay more for what they buy, get less for what they sell, and maybe cut back their standards of living, so as to give the poor nations a part of what they have.

Two researchers in Sweden's government have calculated that this plan to take from the rich and give to the poor would mean the abolition of the private automobile, a 20 percent cut in meat consumption, and a similar shrinkage in the size of a typical home. What the result would be here in the United States you might well guess.

It was almost inevitable that the idea of the welfare state that has taken such a hold here and in many other countries should be proposed on an international scale. If there were such a thing as

world government or an international legislature, the new order would already be on the books. Such proposals have already been railroaded through the United Nations by the so-called Third World countries.

The basis for the claims of the poor countries is that we are rich and they are poor because the present rules of the game were drawn up by and for the rich countries. Now that the poor countries far outnumber the rich ones, it's time that the poor ones get organized and take it away from the rich ones.

Those of you who are willing to reduce your standards of living 20 to 50 percent will please sign up for the new program. The line forms on the left.

### WHAT'S COOKING IN MICHIGAN

It's nearing the end of the season for maple syrup production in southern Michigan. Collecting sap from the sugar maple trees comes to a halt about mid-April and two fun-filled festivals at month-end in Vermontville and Shepherd will officially close the season.

Marketing officials of the Michigan Department of Agriculture say in 1975 Michigan produced 98,000 gallons of the sticky sweet for the second straight year to place fourth among the 50 states. Last year's crop was valued at nearly \$1,100,

000.

American Indians were the first to discover maple syrup. According to legend, an Indian squaw cooking venison in the clear sap of the maple tree, allowed the sap to boil down until it formed a delicious syrup. Afterwards, extensive use was made of maple sap and the custom was passed on to settlers.

While maple syrup production is an American tradition, harvesting techniques have undergone some changes in recent years. Collecting sap in buckets is common in Michigan but many producers are turning to an automated process, using a tubing system with vacuum pump to collect sap. The sap is sucked through clear plastic hoses from taps driven into trees.

It takes about 40 gallons of sap to make a gallon of maple syrup, or eight pounds of maple candy or maple sugar. Only pure, boiled down sap weighing at least

11 pounds per gallon may bear the maple syrup label. Other syrups may legally be sold as mixtures of maple and other syrups but Michigan law requires that these be labeled to show percentages of maple and other syrups.
