"On the Sunny Side of the Street" MHS Valedictorian & Salutatorian

Edgar A. Guest Jr., known for a lifetime as 'Bud', in town last week visiting Bob and Alleen Ross of Bethel Church Road speaking at the Optimist affair and generously sharing his time with us. Such a time it was too, this reporter is bemused, dazed and delighted. A laughing voice, kind heart, and gallantry of a high order from a rare treat in this ordinary world of ours.

Betty and Bud live in Troy, but have a farm in Mayville, Michigan, where one suspects a lot of living goes on, and a lot of laughing too. Eighty acres in the thumb and a place to get away from the city. Bud is semi-retired, not fully active in radio these days, he sometimes surprisingly turns up, as he did recently as a replacement for J.P. McCarthy, but manages to keep on the move, busily fulfilling public speaking engagements.

Betty, of course, is the lady who makes it all happen. Wife, secretary, friend, critic and laughing audience.

A graduate of University of Michigan, school of Journalism, Bud spent 10 years on the Detroit Free Press, did a couple of years in the Navy during the war and broadcast a total of 36 years with WJR, some of those years seven days a week. A staggering record of making people smile, "on the sunny side of the street".

The Manchester Chicken Broil (July 15 this year folks) has had Betty and Bud as guests for many years now, and they tell me they will be here again this year.

We talked a bit of Bud's father, who became famous for writing verse, but thought of himself as a newspaperman all his life. Bud refuses to consider himself a philosopher, or indeed as anything but a humorist. By his definition a humorist, as opposed to a comic, who will always turn a story around so that only himself might be the fool in the story. Seeing the humor, the absurdities of life but never turning the sharp cutting edge outward.

Interviewing Bud Guest is a rare experience, one that could hallmark the day forever. The greatest difficulty is to stop laughing long enough to get a few facts. Sharply intelligent, well educated, traveled, widely conversant with world affairs, cultured yet all of this overlaid with such warmth of manner that one is charmed into conversation as though one had been friends for a lifetime.

During our time together we roamed from local to national affairs, the youth of today and on into education. Having been to Russia fairly recently, Bud commented on the difference between education and training, remarking that it was very noticeable that the people there were well trained, whereas we have considerable less training, but far more education. Asked for advice for young people he stated simply "do your best", which is a simple, honest answer, like the man himself. Coping with near blindness, hoping to always point out the sunny side to people, to make them chuckle, he is "doing his best", and a rare, fine best it is.

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School Board To Request Same Millage June 14

The Manchester Board of Education met Monday, April 26, 1978 and agreed unanimously to submit the same millage request of 16.78 mills at the June election as was requested at the April 19 election. Although the April election saw the defeat of this millage request, the Board of Education sees the need for these funds as absolutely vital. To continue present educational programs this millage is absolutely necessary, and any reduction of the proposed millage would cause serious cutbacks in the overall program. Increased salaries, operating costs and loss of state aid are factors which necessitate asking for a four mill increase over last year's levy.

The Board of Education with the assistance of a Citizen's Committee will, in subsequent weeks, apprise the citizens of the need and answer questions relative to this request.

Nominating petitions are available in the Superintendent's Office. Two vacancies will be filled at the June 14 election.

NATIONAL BICENTENNIAL WAGON TRAIN

Michigan will relive part of its past when the National Bicentennial Wagon Train treks across southern Michigan on historic US 12 (Old Chicago Road) May 15 to May 26.

The wagon train will enter Michigan on M-205 from Elkhart, Ind., to be joined by the Michigan Bicentennial Wagon Train at the border town of Union. Both will proceed together on US-12 across southern Michigan with the national train exit-

ing on Sylvania-Petersburg Road in Monroe County for Valley Forge, Pa.

Departure ceremonies for Michigan's representative covered wagon will be held at 1 p.m., May 4, at the State Capitol in downtown Lansing. The state wagon will then proceed to the Michigan wagon train assembly point on Temporary I-69 (US-27) southwest of Lansing at Mt. Hope Avenue. The Michigan train will depart from the Lansing assembly point 8 a.m., May 5, for Union via Charlotte and Battle Creek on highways M-66, M-60 and M-40.

Together, the Michigan and national trains are expected to total a mile in length, occupying the eastbound lane of US-12 weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Because of the number of participants in the train, sightseers and traffic associated with train activities, all motorists, truckers and transporters normally using US-12 are urged to seek alternate routes around the train during the period May 15-26. Local participants will be allowed to join the train only at regular rest stops.

Traffic control around the train will be under supervision of the Michigan State Police assisted by the Department of State Highways and Transportation and sheriffs of counties through which the train passes. Regular reports on traffic conditions around the train will be transmitted to local radio stations for public broadcast.

Host for the national train in the state is the Michigan Horse Council.

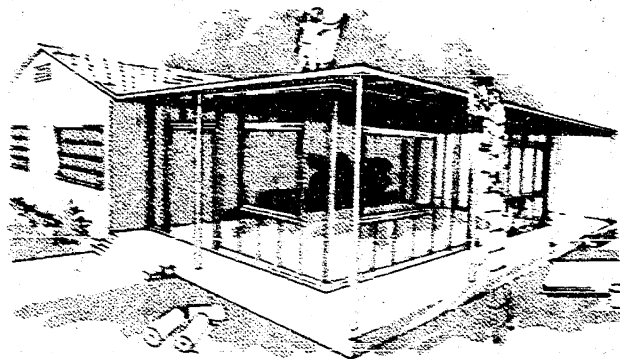

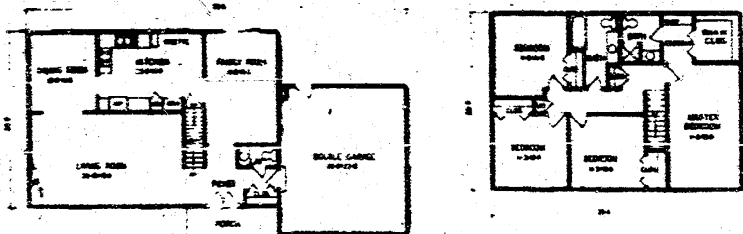

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

DOUBLE-TIME FOR SUNDAY SHIPWRECKS

During the boycott of grain shipments to Russia, union leaders claimed that American consumers were their concern. Allan Grant, California farmer and president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, thinks it's high time the public understands how they will "Benefit" from the union's concern.

Under our laws protecting the Merchant Marine, a certain percentage of cargoes must be placed aboard American ships—even though their rates are not competitive with other available shipping. This year, U.S. taxpayers will help pay \$80 million in subsidies to the Merchant Marine for its handling of the grain shipments to Russia.

Through a personal experience, Grant tells why he questions whether the value of our Merchant Marine fleet equals the subsidies poured into it -- and whether unions have organized the industry to the point of monopoly. Grant was escorting some cattle -- the gift of California dairymen -- to orphan homes in Japan. It took 15 days to get there and during that time, they were hit by a typhoon.

"There were 8 feet of freeboard from the ship deck to the water, and the deck dipped clear under the water on each side 16 feet of elevation change -- two times per minute, like a chip on a wind-struck pond," Grant relates. "The cattle were in stalls on the top deck and they plunged about as the ship rolled. Obviously they were going to tear up the stalls and go over the side if we didn't do

something. "I asked the first mate if we couldn't turn the ship so we'd pitch fore and aft instead of rolling. He said he'd talk to the captain about it. He reported we had only one functioning boiler, were making only 3 1/2 knots per hour instead of the normal 17; that it would take a half-hour or more to make the turn. Could we hold out? Well we did. "Later I talked to the captain and learned that one of the tubes was blown on the dead boiler. There were boiler-

makers on the ship so I asked why they couldn't repair the boiler. It isn't that they can't, he said -- they won't. Why not? Well, he said, if he had the seamen do anything they hadn't signed on for, they'd have to go before the union board when they got back to San Francisco. "You mean they won't even fix the boiler to protect themselves? Nobody knows what a typhoon is going to do, what strength it has or what direction it is going to blow. What happens if we're capsized?"

"His answer: Well, if it's Saturday, they get time and a half. If it's Sunday, they get double-time for launching the boats."

Next year, the Maritime Commission will pay \$400 million in subsidies to our Merchant Marine to keep it going -- outmoded work rules, arbitrary union decisions and all...Grant is asking, "Who will benefit? -- The public or the unions?"

Kindergrarten Round-Up for children in the Manchester Public Schools will take place on Wednesday and Thursday, May 12 and 13. During hours 8:30-9:30 a.m. and their children will have an opportunity to meet with the hearing and vision technicians, speech therapist, reading specialist, physical education teacher, social worker and nurse. Information explaining the program is more helpful now in the mail and should reach parents before the weekend. Any parent with a child entering kindergarten in September who does not receive this information should call the Kluger Office, 428-4321, right away. Also, all parents with children entering kindergarten are reminded that before starting school all children must have a tuberculin test and the school must see the child's birth certificate.

Q. How much would a property owner pay in taxes for operation of Manchester Schools on property with a state equalized valuation of \$25,000 at a tax rate of 24 mills? (1975-76 levy)
A. The property owner would pay \$600 in taxes for operation of Manchester Schools on property valued at \$25,000 if the millage rate were 24 mills.

Q. How much would the property owner pay on the same property if the rate were increased to 26 mills for operation? (Proposed 1976-77 levy)
A. The property owner would pay \$650 in taxes for operation of schools if the millage rate were 26 mills. This would be an increase of \$50.00 per year.

Q. Will the school district receive more money to operate from an increase in state equalized valuation?
A. The school district will receive

more money from taxes for operation, but it will receive less money in state aid for membership. The total money received from both current taxes and state aid will remain the same.

Q. Why won't the school receive more total revenue from an increase in state equalized valuation?
A. The school won't receive more total revenues for operation because the state pays aid for membership on the difference

between the local state equalized valuation per pupil and the guaranteed s.e.v. per pupil as set by the state.

Q. In Manchester School District planning on additional programs for next year?
A. No, Manchester Schools will be operating the same programs next year as they are currently offering.

Q. If the same programs are being

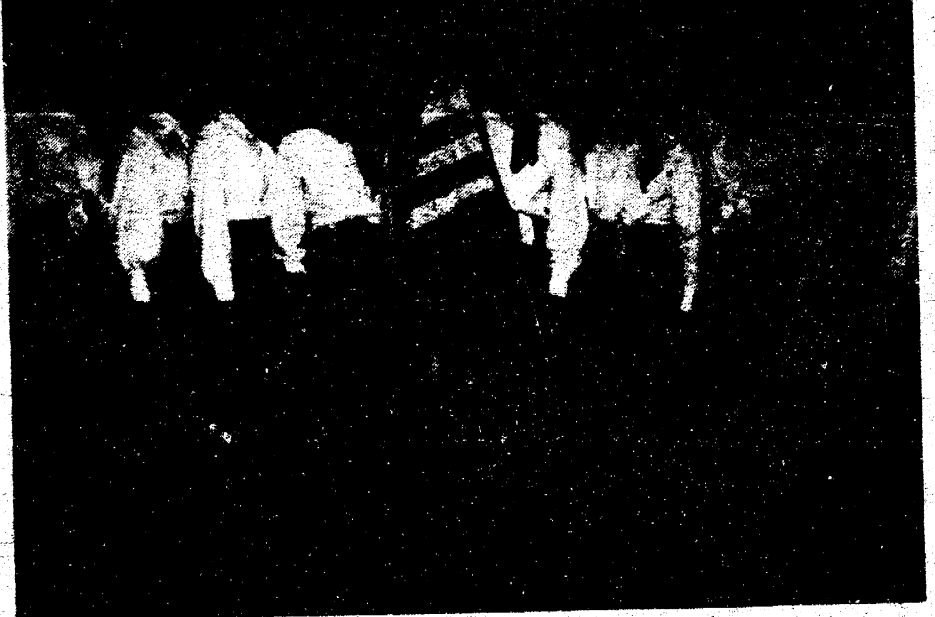
