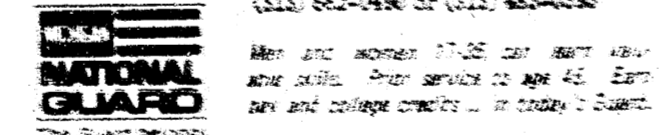

Remember, admission to the Saturday evening dinner theatre is by reservation only. So get your tickets early!

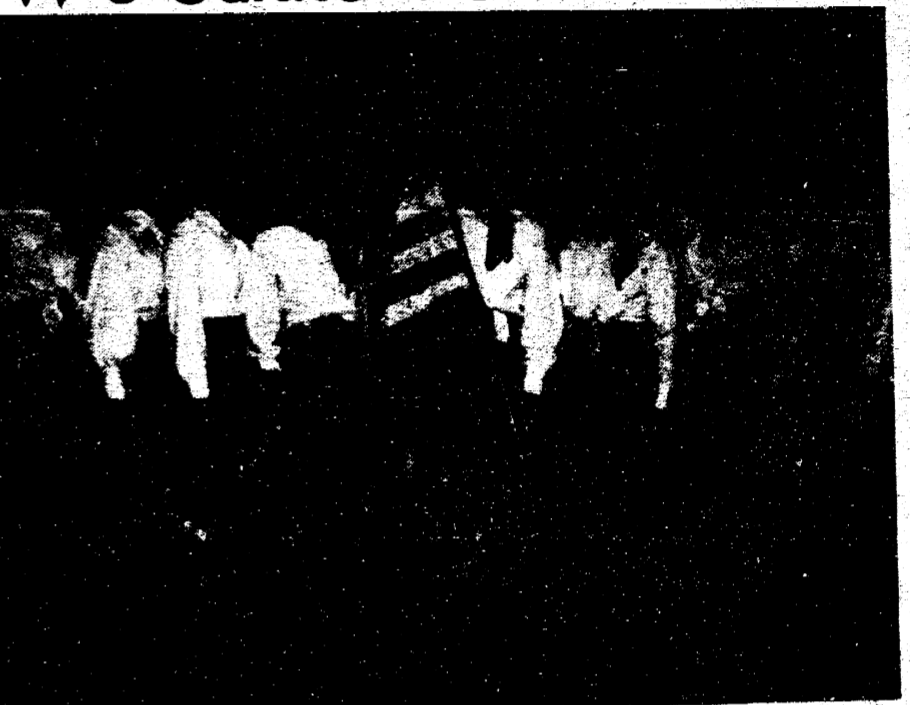
Saturday May 15 - Exhibition of traditional rug hooking at Bicentennial Headquarters Store, 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

MANCHESTER VILLAGE PLANNING COMMISSION
April 1, 1976

The regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission was held at the village hall, with members present: Broucek, Leeson, Daniels, Krauss, Tracy, and Mann.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m., by Ch. Broucek.

Minutes of the last meeting were read, and on the motion by Tracy, seconded by Mann, were unanimously approved.

Member Mann reported the reappointment by Council of Members William Broucek, Cecelia (Mrs. Robert) Chapin, and Ronald Whittington, for terms ex-

piring March 1979. The other incumbent members of the Commission are Laurin Leeson, Bruce Daniels (March 1978), John Althouse, Harry Krauss, Clifford Tracy (March 1977), and Jim Mann, Council Representative. Our professional advisor is Mr. Sang Nam, Senior Planner with the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission.

Chairman Broucek read a letter from Mr. C.G. Nixon, President, Double A Products Co., expressing their appreciation to the community of Manchester for their support of the Company's application for the establishment of the Double A Industrial development area.

Dr. Glenn Miller was present to explain his tentative plans for converting the existing separate building at 516 West Main St. into a one-bedroom, single level apartment. He also showed a layout of the property.

Daniels moved to recommend to Council that suitable improvements be continued, and that the planned building conversion be allowed, as a non-conforming use. The motion was seconded by Tracy. A call for show of hands indicated four in favor, two opposed. The motion was declared passed.

Due to the conflict of opinions, further study of the existing (new) Ordinance was given, with particular consideration of the reasons for its stipulations, such that the requested change would not be advisable either as a zoning change to R-3, nor as a variance, nor as a non-conforming use.

Broucek then moved that the prior recommendation be nullified, and Dr. Miller's request be denied. The motion was seconded by Krauss, and the show of hands indicated four in favor, two opposed. The motion (to deny Dr. Miller's request) was declared passed.

Continued review of the Preliminary

Subdivision Ordinance covered page 23, Article 409.3 to page 26, Article 411.0. Changes and parts requiring clarification were noted.

The meeting was declared adjourned.


ducts will stop this month at Brown & Sharpe. The machines should be in our plant in April. When complete, this will provide between six and eight new jobs.

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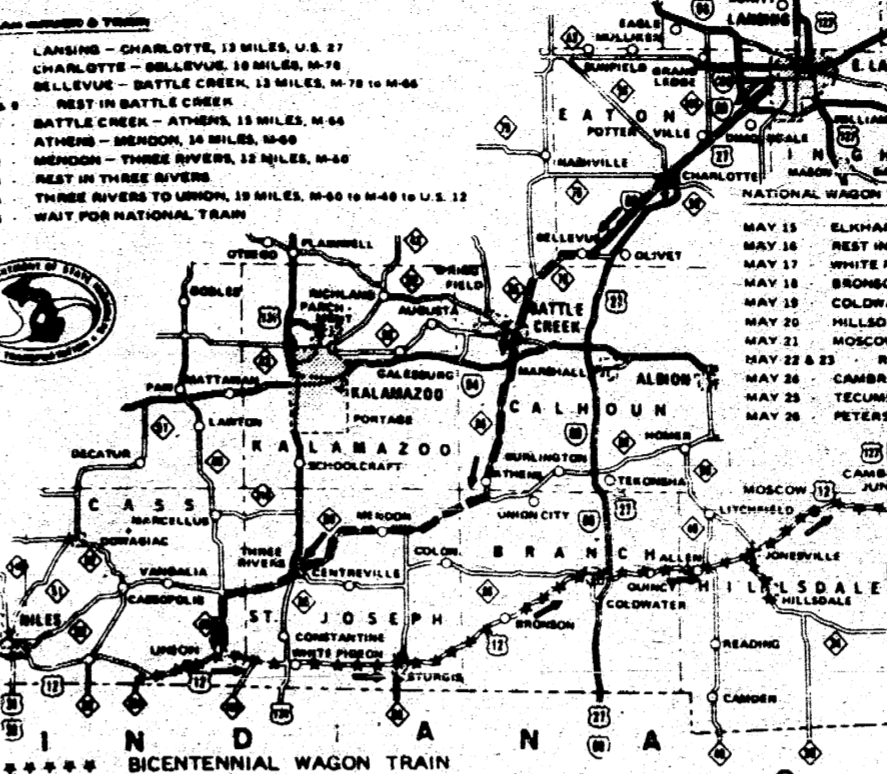

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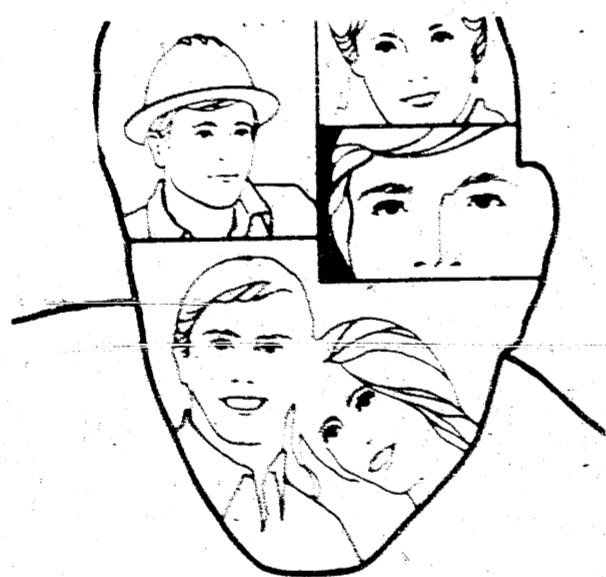

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DEATH AND TAXES

The farmer is a pretty tough individual. He has the fortitude to "hang in there" after a crop failure and the courage to gamble on the weather, consumer demand, production costs and market prices. As long as they're on earth, farmers will continue to overcome odds and obstacles to provide food and fiber for themselves and those of us involved in other pursuits. It's after he leaves this earth that the farmer is concerned about—not where he will be going to collect his reward—but what will happen to the family farm into which he, his father and perhaps his

grandfather before him, poured a lifetime of effort, hopes and dreams. It isn't that his son isn't interested in taking up the reins; like many young farmers, he has chosen, rather than just inherited, agriculture as his career. The problem lies in whether the son will be able to pay his father's "death duty" without having to sell all or at least part of the farm. Sadly, outdated estate tax laws are causing this heartbreak to many farm families.

Inflated land values is part of the problem, for example, farms purchased 50 years ago for \$15 to \$30 an acre may now be valued at \$350 to \$3800 per acre. Inheritance taxes can range up to 70 percent, depending on the estate's value and the heirs must pay those within nine months, unless an exception is granted by IRS. Supposing a farmer dies and leaves his wife a \$500,000 adjusted gross estate.

The wife is eligible for a marital deduction of 50 percent and a standard deduction of \$60,000. For taxable purposes, the estate is now valued at \$190,000. The federal estate tax would be \$47,700.

Several years later, the wife dies leaving the farm to her only son. The farm is still valued at \$500,000 (perhaps more because of inflation), but this time there is no marital deduction to be claimed—only the \$60,000 standard deduction. So the taxable value is now \$440,000 and the inheritance tax would be \$125,000. Aside from a miracle, the son sees no way to come up with \$125,000...and so he sells the farm.

Farmers are working now to get legislation passed which would alleviate this kind of situation. Hopefully, their Congressmen will agree that action must be taken to end the "sell the farm to pay the taxes" tragedies.

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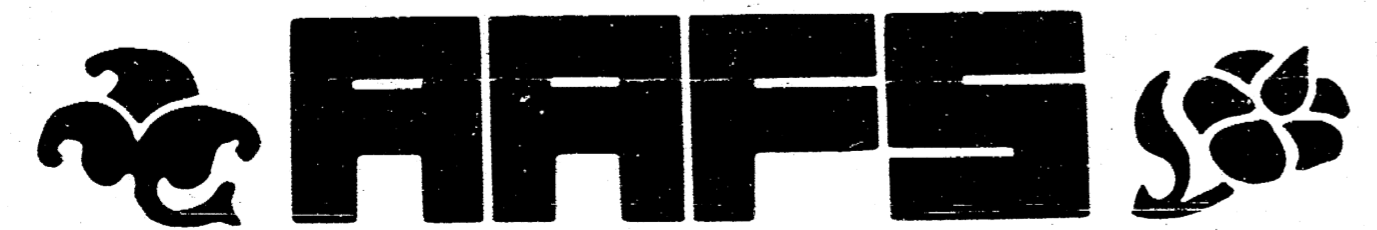

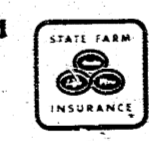
