## Remedial Speech and Language Services

Although it is one of the lesser known services provided to public school children in Michigan, Speech and Language therapy (or Speech Correction, as it is commonly known) has been in the schools for well over 20 years. The Public School speech therapist serves a percentage of the school population who, for various reasons, have difficulty communicating. These difficulties can be divided into four main categories. The number of children falling into each category and the type of treatment program needed varies from one to another. The two smallest categories are voice and rhythm disorders. Voice disorders result from misuse of the voice box either because of physical or emotional factors. This produces various types of vocal patterns resembling laryngitis. Habitual misuse of the voice in this way can lead to severe difficulties and combined treatment of a doctor and speech therapist is often needed. Rhythm disorders are known as stuttering or stammering, and cluttering. No single cause has yet been determined for those impairments, although it is known that emotional factors play a large role particularly in stuttering. Working with a speech therapist can be of help to both the child with this problem as well as his parents and teachers. The largest number of children seen by the average speech therapist are those with articulation disorders or omissions of the various sounds we have in our language, (such as saying wed for red or thoup for soap). Having these difficulties can be a painful experience for a child. With the aid of the speech clinician these problems are usually easily rectified. The last category is one which has received much attention recently. The area of language disorders is one in which clinicians are discovering much more needs to be done. Many children having difficulty in academic areas are those

### PACK 421 CUB SCOUTING NOTES

When a boy reaches the age of eight, he is eligible to join and is placed in a group of boys known as a den. Here, with the help of an adult leader known as a Den Mother, the individual boy learns crafts such as rope making, basket weaving, etc. After earning his first pin, known as a bobcat badge, he may start work on a Wolf badge which consists of doing twelve achievements from the Wolf book. Many of these can be done at home which brings Mom and Dad into the picture as they sign each achievement upon completion. After earning his wolf badge, he can go for silver and one gold arrow points. Our next rank and quite a bit harder to come by is the Bear badge.

After earning both Wolf and Bear badges the Cub Scout has usually attained the age of ten years and is ready for the final phase of his Cub career, known as Webelos. ## THEY EVEN TOOK HER BULL AWAY

With the approach of June Dairy Month, it seems a good time to evaluate man's treatment of the cow. This "foster mother of the human race" turns herself inside out to please man, converting inedible plant materials into nature's most perfect food. And yet, if her milk production falls below assigned quotas, man ships her off to hamburger heaven. Today, the dairy industry supplies more than 25 percent of all the meat eaten in America.

Mechanized dairy farming has replaced much of the tender loving care formerly given to cows. First, the warm, familiar hand of the dairy farmer was replaced by the automatic milker. Then, along came artificial insemination with the local vet making barn calls to save bulls' traveling time.

Man has prodded and pushed and analyzed and psychanalyzed cows. He has improved their breeding and feeding techniques, investigated the effects of temperature and played music to milk by his choice or her's. Cows have been fed everything from corn cobs to newspaper pulp to orange peels. They can utilize

energy and protein sources that humans cannot, and convert them into nutritious milk and meat.

Man is now investigating ova transfers, making methane gas from manure to ease the energy crisis, drying cow pies for fertilizer or fuel, and using chlorophyll to make a sweet-smelling feed for the cow that started the cycle.

Man has been unfair to the cow in developing language, too. "Cowbane" is a poisonous plant; a "cowbird" lays its eggs in the nests of other birds; to "cow" is to intimidate, and to be a "coward" is to show disgraceful fear.

Even though there isn't any record of cows mooing their displeasure with man's treatment, let's remember to pay tribute to this very unique animal during June Dairy Month. If you can't take a cow to lunch, do the next best thing. Drink milk and make her happy.
