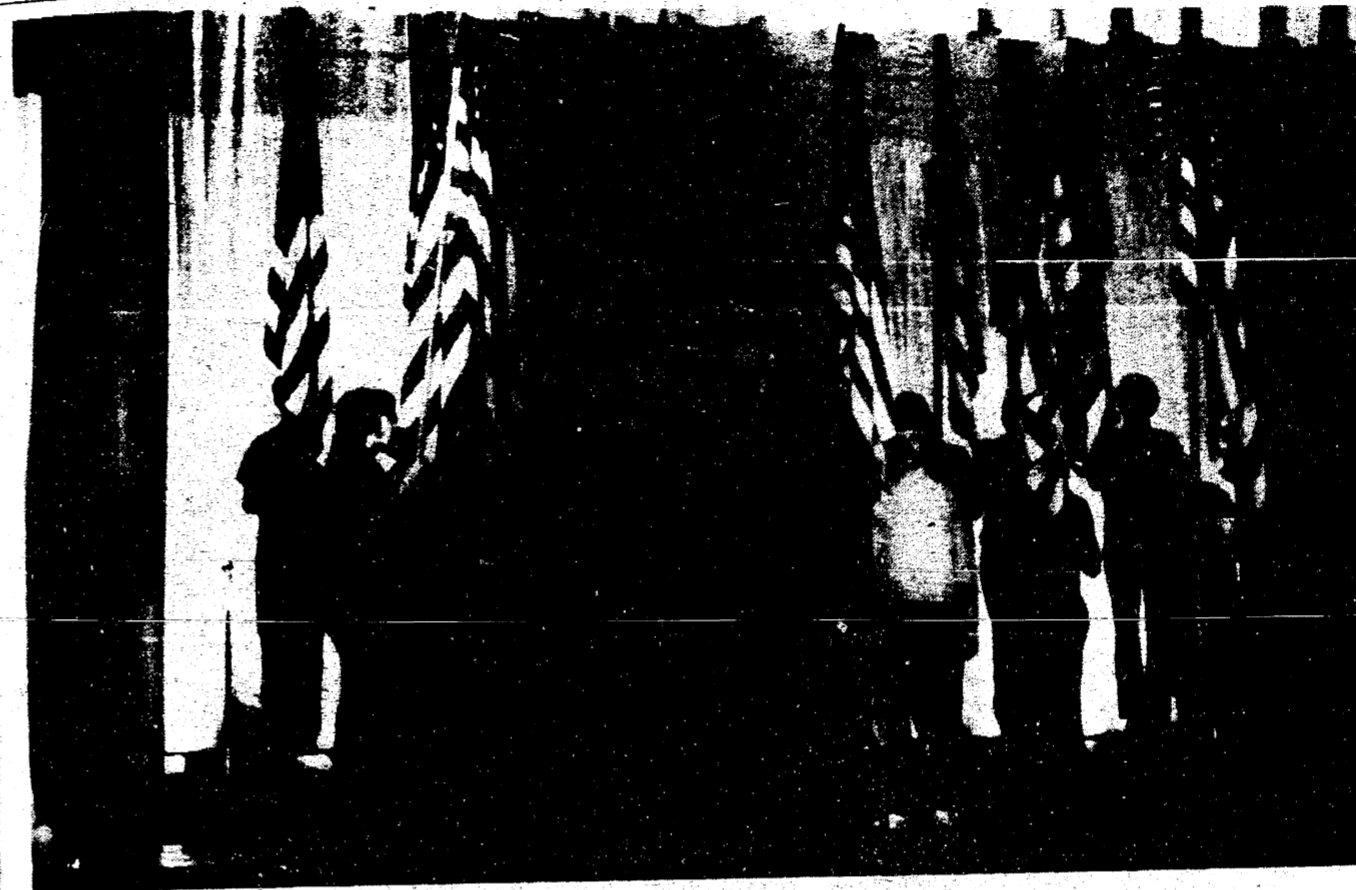

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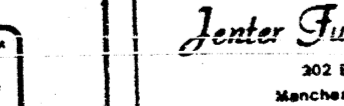

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

May 24, 1976

Council I met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:07 p.m. Present were Daniels, Denhoff, Fitzgerald, Schaffer, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Padley. Minutes from the May 3, 1976 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Schaffer, supported by Denhoff. All yeas, carried. Enter Padley 7:17 p.m.

Fitzgerald reviewed Public Works activities of the previous two weeks which have included mowing Village grounds three times, flushing sewers, repairing some water meters, grading and placing dust control on gravel streets, repairing equipment and painting lines for traffic control.

Little proposed the name of James Duncan to Council as a one year replacement for councilman Mann, who recently resigned due to relocation outside the Village. Moved by Padley, supported by Fitzgerald that James Duncan be appointed to serve out the term of former Councilman James Mann. All yeas, carried. Duncan was sworn in.

James Mann was present on behalf of the Bicentennial Commission requesting five dates for 24 hour permits to sell beer for the dances and picnics scheduled on June 12, 26, July 4, 23, 24. Zsenyuk is in charge of issuing the permits to various organizations which might request them. Mann also advised Council of a public meeting scheduled for June 1 to acquaint people with the Bicentennial Activities and objectives. He inquired if the Council was intending to put in tennis courts and was advised that they had been found to be too costly for installation at the present time.

Mann's final point was an inquiry into the status of the driveway of the old IGA store. After some discussion it was moved by Denhoff, supported by Schaffer not to

sell the property adjacent to the old IGA. Yeas: Denhoff, Schaffer; nays: Scully, Fitzgerald, Duncan, Padley. Motion unsuccessful. Further discussion resulted in the following motion. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Padley to sell the property adjacent to the former IGA building with restrictions detailed for the maintaining of utilities. The property must be used as a non-building site with easement provided for the Annual Canoe Race. A minimum bid of \$500.00 would be set. Yeas: Scully, Padley, Fitzgerald, Denhoff, Duncan; nays, Schaffer. Motion carried. Little was to contact the Village Attorney, so that the property could be put up for bid as soon as possible with the restrictions worded properly in legal terms.

Zsenyuk brought up the transfer request on the property located at 223 East Main Street. Moved by Scully and supported by Fitzgerald that the request from Manchester Enterprises Inc. for transfer ownership of 1975 Class C and SDM licensed business located at 223 East Main Street Manchester, Michigan 48158, Washtenaw County, from Fred Rumlir, be considered for approval. All yeas, carried.

Zsenyuk advised Council that the Clinton Police Post would not be closing as previously announced in the newspapers. Padley reported on a meeting with the Summer Recreation Program Staff indicating that another meeting was scheduled to finalize plans. He asked if further funds would be available from Council with proper verification and approval, should a more extensive program be achieved. Council agreed.

Farm Bureau Insurance Company suggested an updating of values on property of 7-10%. Fitzgerald and Daniels will review the areas indicated.

PROCESS USED TO SELECT NEW SUPERINTENDENT

The following is a brief summary of the process used by the school board in selecting a new Superintendent.

In November the Board met with the placement director from Eastern Michigan University to determine what procedure needed to be followed in hiring a new Supt. and to relate to him the type of person we were looking for. From November through December the Board developed a brochure which would be sent out to potential candidates by the placement centers to which it was distributed. These were sent out in January with a deadline for applicants of mid-March. During that period the board received 111 applications which it reviewed and met with the director of Placement at Eastern Michigan and other schools. Also during this time the board was meeting to de-

velop a thorough interviewing process and a method of evaluating candidates.

The Placement Directors from Eastern Michigan, Michigan State, University of Michigan, Central Michigan, Wayne State and Western Michigan met and screened all of our applicants. They then met with the board and gave to us its top eight candidates. They reviewed each of these people with us giving us their backgrounds and strengths.

After this screening, the board interviewed the eight candidates. The interviews running from two to three hours each. The candidates were then narrowed down to three and then members of the board visited two of the communities where these men were employed. After additional background information was obtained we were able to make our selection.

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HEY! WE'RE GOING TO LIVE!

We're all deeply concerned about reports of the destruction of our environment. Purveyors of gloom and overzealous environmentalists continue to forecast a pessimistic view of continuation of life on this earth.

However, if we take a long, hard look at their pronouncements - optimistically and with a little common sense and research - life can be and will continue to be beautiful.

For example: It was reported that DDT was the worst thing that ever happened to us. Wrong! Dr. Norman Borlaug, Nobel Peace Prize winner, opposed its ban. "If DDT is banned," he said "I have wasted my life's work. I have dedicated myself to finding better methods of feeding the world's starving population. Without DDT and other important agricultural chemicals, our goals are simply unattainable."

According to the World Health Organization, malaria fatalities alone dropped from four million a year in the 1930's to less than one million a year in 1968. Other insect-borne diseases, such as encephalitis, yellow fever, and typhus fever showed a similar decline during this period. It has been estimated that 100 million human beings, who would have died of these afflictions, are alive today because of DDT.

What is the real air pollutant? The late Dr. William Pecora reported that

all man's air pollution during his thousands of years of life on earth does not equal the amount of particulate and noxious gases from just three volcanoes - Krakatoa, near Java in 1883; Mt. Katami, Alaska, 1912; Hekla, Iceland, 1947.

Many say that carbon monoxide will kill us all - listing the auto as the main enemy. While automobiles do add 270 million tons of carbon monoxide to the atmosphere, there is no real concern. Monitoring stations measuring its content show, even though there are nine times

more autos in the northern hemisphere than the southern, there is no difference in carbon monoxide -- and the overall concentration is not increasing.

So, in spite of all this contamination and pollution, we are not on the brink of an ecological disaster. Our oxygen is not disappearing, there is no build-up of poisonous gases, the waters can be made pure again with proper treatment, and a larger part of our pollution would be here anyway -- man or not. What it all amounts to: "We're going to live!"

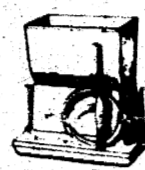

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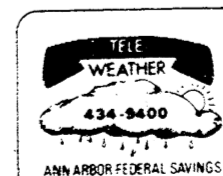
