Well it's that time of year again! The season of the great Cabbage feast is upon us. Manchester, the center of the universe, is winding up for the astounding annual event, the incredible, delectable, exciting, cabbage eater's delight, Cole slaw, that astonishingly ordinary name for the palate pleasing gourmet's favorite, is the highlight of the event.

July 15, at the Athletic field, we will be closing our stores, turning down the lights, vacating the kitchens and en masse arriving to partake of this extraordinary offering.

As a public service, we felt we should, on behalf of all those right minded people who covet cole slaw, look into the background and do a bit of research on the history of this fabulous feast.

Origins of the recipe seem to be a bit hazy, for after all this feast has been presented for 23 years and some of the stories are vague, but our best sources maintain that Doc Jones secretly obtained the list of ingredients, by what means we shall not enquire. However, suffice it to say that there are three parts, each of which is held in the hand of the three man committee. David Little, Lyle Widmayer, and Del Ludwick and we recommend you remember these names for they become increasingly important as the plot thickens.

Several days before the event these men meet and quietly mix the dressing, a very solemn undertaking, for there have been in the past immensely delicate negotiations, for it develops that the disagreements about certain items have had serious repercussions. Sixty gallons are now refrigerated and left to age properly. Before we forget, I must, in the interest of peace, state that the dressing is compounded of one half store vinegar and one half Bridgewater vinegar. The remaining items must remain a closed affair. We simply could not obtain the list for you.

Each year Earl Koebbe sharpens the knives. Stan Poet has obtained the ton of cabbage necessary and it is selected carefully for if the weather has turned off dry, why then the cabbage will be hotter, and of course the dressing will require to be adjusted accordingly. We come to the great day, and the 26

## Sharon Township Signs Contract With Manchester Police

The Township of Sharon has negotiated a Police Protection Contract with the Village of Manchester.

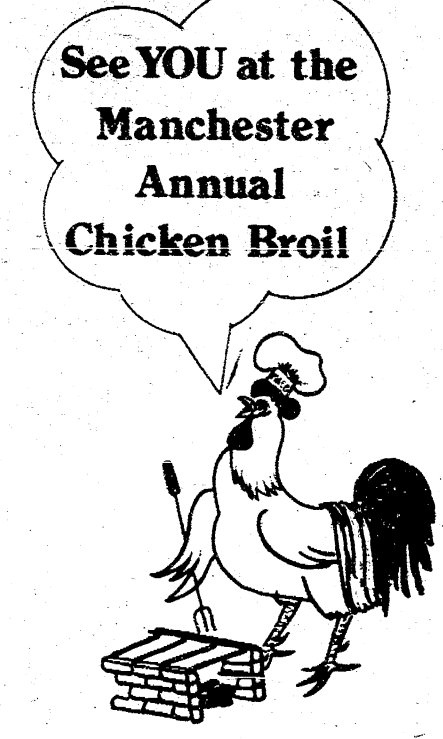
Allen Alber, Township Supervisor, said their board has reviewed several alternatives in Police Protection options, and believe the agreement worked out with the village will afford the best possible protection for the least possible cost. Mr. Alber pointed out that the township does have Washtenaw County Sheriff Protection, but that it is not satisfactory to fill township residence complete needs.

William Zsenyuk, Village Police Chief said the Protection begins immediately and will continue through the Township's remaining fiscal year. Mr. Zsenyuk said we have obtained a very workable agreement, and that we will provide 7 day a week, 24 hour a day on call service. In addition, regular Business checks and some patrol.

Mr. Zsenyuk stated that the Village Police had been providing on call protection to all four townships of Bridgewater, Freedom, Manchester and Sharon free up until February 1st of this year. We notified all Townships about 60 days in advance of February 1st that we could not continue on a gratis basis.

We are very pleased that Sharon has bought our services even though past records indicate they were not the most active crime area outside the Village.

Mr. Zsenyuk said dispatch will be carried through his office daily and the County Sheriff's Department.

Greetings to the citizens of Manchester! First of all permit me to extend to you our appreciation for the warm and friendly welcome we have received from you during my first week as your new Superintendent of Schools. Although my family has not permanently joined me as yet, we have purchased a very fine home and one that we like very much from Jim and Delores Bauer which is very conveniently located on Main Street. We are hopeful that our home in

Gaylord will be soon sold so we can move in and get settled. Our entire family is enamored with Manchester and we know that the challenges presented to us here will be eventually most rewarding.

I am most grateful to Lenore and Ed Steele for their willingness to permit me to write "The Inter-Com" weekly in their newspaper to attempt to keep you abreast of what's going on in your schools, activities, ideas, policies, etc. I would ask that if you have any questions or issues that you wish to have me specifically address myself to through this column that you give Lenore or Ed a call and then they can let me know some of your concerns. Hopefully, the column will become increasingly more meaningful as we get into discussions of basic issues, contrasting education in Manchester.

I'm sure you can understand our disappointment at having the millage vote defeated again. However, I want you to know that we are not discouraged and will continue to attempt to interpret to you the critical needs of the educational system honestly and openly and with candor. In defeating the millage, we not only lost our request for an increase of 12.78 mills, but also our renewal of 12.78 mills for continued operation, which leaves us with a 11.22 mills on which to operate the school system for the 1976-77 school year. The loss of the renewal millage will necessitate a cutback in educational services to children of approximately 1,000,000 dollars. This represents over 50% of our total educational budget and we could not operate even a minimal school program without that renewal. If we had received the renewal alone, without the additional 4 mills requested, we would still have had to cut approximately \$250,000 from next year's budget. Without elaborating further, you can see we have some very difficult times ahead. We will be presenting some recommendations to the Board to allow for trimming even minimal fat off the budget and I'm certain you will be receiving a great deal of information from the Board regarding

their desires as they represent you, their constituents.

In order that I might open communications with any interested citizens or groups, I am planning effective next Thursday evening, and every Thursday evening through the summer to hold office hours in my office from 8:30 - 10:00 p.m. for any parents, citizens, or groups who wish to meet with me about specific concerns or ideas they may have regarding the school system. Naturally, I am available to meet with any of you anytime during the day from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. We can also make special arrangements if none of these times are compatible with your schedule and I would just ask that you call Maxine or Joan here at the office 428-7300 so that I can plan our time together equitably.

In addition, I would like to extend to the community an invitation to attend any one or all of three open, community-wide discussion forums which will be held here at the high school on the evenings of Tuesday, July 6, Monday July 12 or Monday, July 26, beginning at 7:30 p.m. I am hopeful that we have good turn-outs at these meetings so that any and all questions and concerns can be addressed.

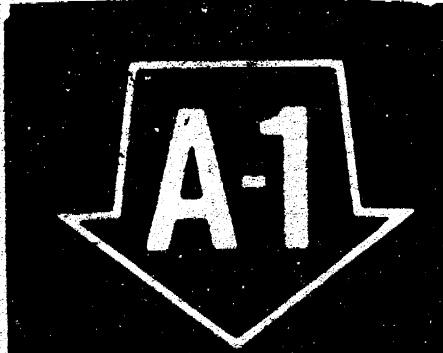

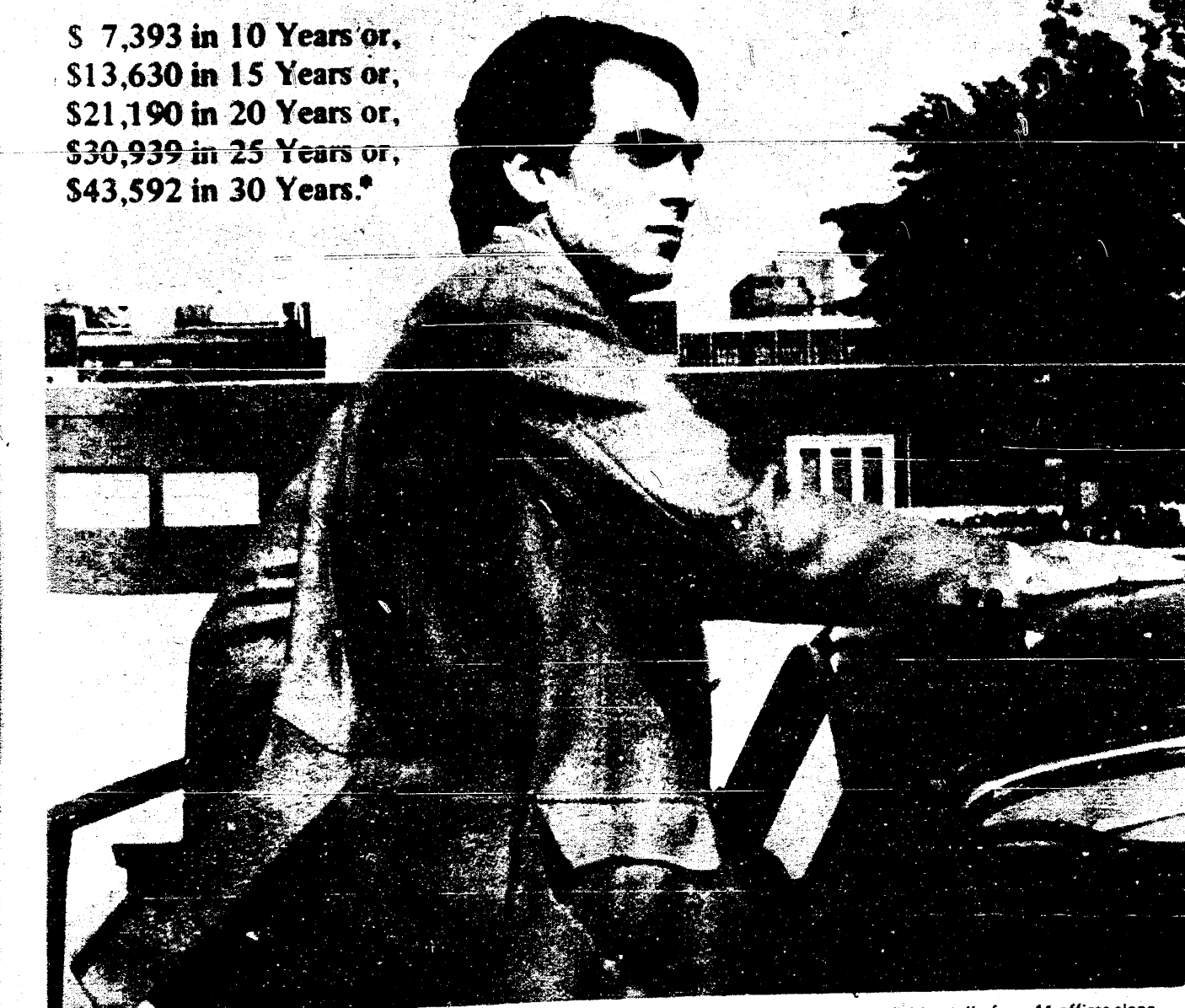
Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Sharon United Methodist Church. Rev. Wayne Ferrigan officiated. Burial followed in the church cemetery.

## AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

### WE DO HAVE GRAIN RESERVES

For those individuals who talk about the idea of a grain reserve—we've got one!

According to Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz, farmers today are growing tremendous quantities of grains and this increased production is not just disappearing into thin air. Excess grain today is held in reserve by farmers, their cooperatives, processors and private traders instead of the government.

"Just because the government doesn't have its finger in the pie, certainly doesn't mean that the United States suddenly has no system of reserves, or that there is no cushion of grain stocks in this country," he said.

"The government doesn't stockpile automobiles either, but that doesn't mean our highways are empty, or that dealers' showrooms are about to run empty," he said.

The Secretary of Agriculture has championed the cause of private enterprise in agriculture since he took office and a lot of farmers are happy with the plan. This gives individuals an opportunity to make a profit. Most producers like the system based on cash incentives in the marketplace.

Here is an example of how the system works: In 1974 we had a short feed grain crop that occurred at the same time the total world grain production was down. The market system made adjustments

quickly and automatically. "The price of feed went up and the margins for grain-finishing livestock, particularly beef, went down. Cattle feeders placed fewer cattle in the feedlots, hog producers finished less pork."

Butz explained that the availability of meat was not affected and consumers felt very little impact of the shortage. Beef simply moved directly from the pasture to the supermarket—a little less fat but no less nutritious.

Even with the lessons learned about agriculture and the grain reserve policy in the past three years, there are strong pressures from many sectors to return to the old, out-moded system of high price supports and government-held stocks.

You would think people would learn after a while. But then the reason history repeats itself is because we weren't listening the first time around.

### PREP RESULTS IMPRESSIVE

The Parent Readiness Education Project (PREP) has completed six weeks of classes at Pleasant Lake School this year. Preschool children enrolled in the project were tested at the end of the program, and their scores increased from an average of about 25 to 40 out of a possible 64 on the Caldwell Co-operative Preschool Inventory. Some individual children's scores increased as much as 25 to 30 points. The results of the post-testing and plans for continued progress over the summer were shared with par-

ents at individual conferences with the teachers, Mrs. Linda Hiest and Mrs. Linda Koch.

Dr. Virginia Resnikowski, Director of the Project, said, "These children and parents who attended the PREP program and did the suggested home activities regularly were rewarded by large increases in the child's knowledge. This indicates that the PREP concept of helping parents to be the primary teachers for their preschool children is extremely effective."

Parent comments at the end of the project were also positive. One mother said "I ask more questions to myself and others trying to understand my children's needs in learning habits and I participate more in things relating to learning skills." Another parent said of her daughter: "She is proud to know the answers to questions. She goes around the house naming colors. I forced myself to give her attention and it is so rewarding. Where have I been all her life?" Another parent said: "My outlook has changed and I understand him better. It is much easier handling him now."

PREP screening for the 1976-77 school year will take place in early September. Parents of all 3 1/2 and 4 year olds will be contacted for an appointment for the screening next fall. "We are looking forward to a full year of programming next year," Dr. Resnikowski said, "with classes beginning in October. The success of the program with only six weeks of classes is exciting, and the staff is

eager to implement the complete project next year. Parents of very advanced young children, not yet old enough to attend school, also could benefit from some assistance in enriching their experiences. A section of PREP for this group may be discussed next year also. The support of the Board of Education, the community, school personnel, and parents has been invaluable in the initial implementation of the project, and we sincerely thank all who have participated."

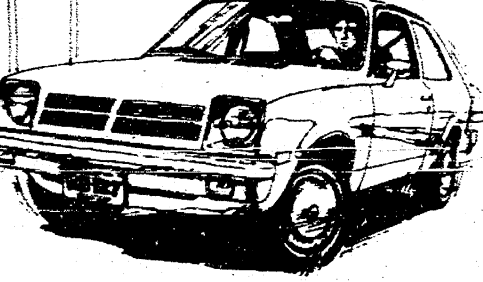
