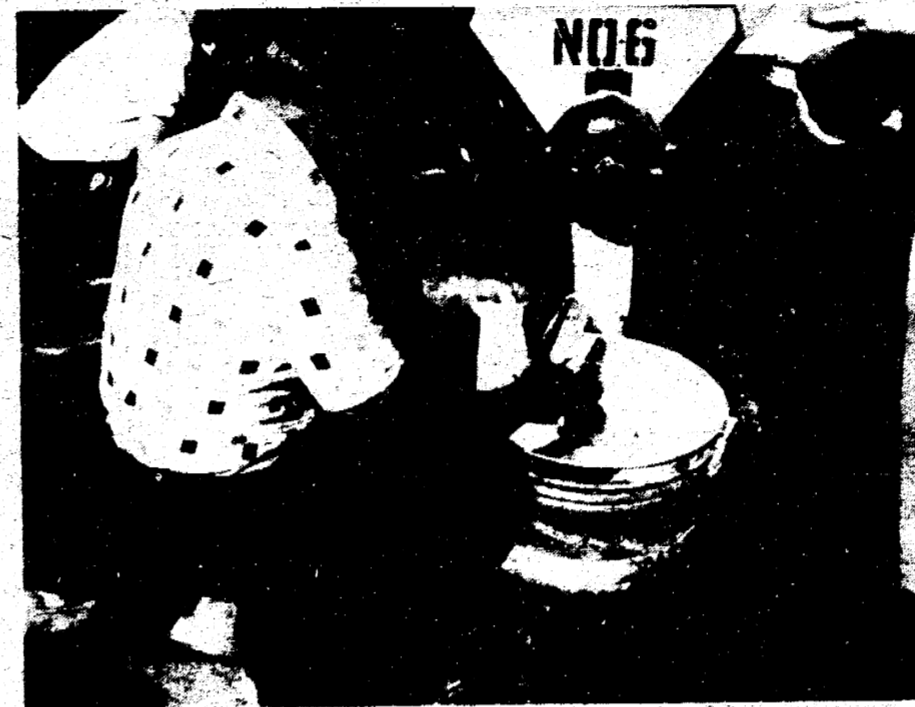

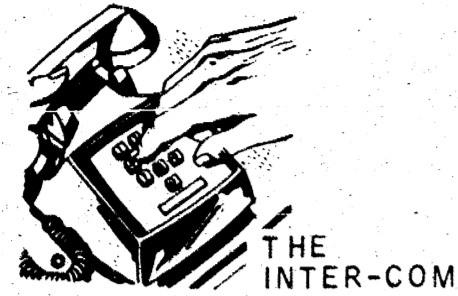

Many of our fine young high school students have been concerned over where and in what direction the school system will go in terms of field trips and the Germany and New York Senior Trip. There have been unfounded rumors that it is the intention of this administration to recommend to the Board of Education that these trips be discontinued. THERE IS NO TRUTH TO THE RUMOR THAT ANY SUCH INTENTION IS IN THE MIND OF THE ADMINISTRATION. It is my own personal belief and philosophy that any worthwhile extension of an educational experience beyond the confines of the classroom is to be encouraged and supported as we work to build coping skills and life role competencies in our entering adult population.

The concerns I have are based upon letters I have received and concerns exhibited by parents, hotels, citizens, and members of the Board of Education as to the image that our young adults present to others with regard to a positive or negative image of the taxpayer and citizen of Manchester and, personally, to us as responsible and concerned parents.

It would be a great injustice to our student body to assume that all of them are involved in drinking, abusing substances, and show general belligerence toward others during certain field trips and I would expect that really it is a minority of students really involved in such behavior.

Parents and students alike must know that any consumption of alcohol or the

illicit use of any substance on school property or during any school sponsored activity is illegal as mandated by the Michigan School Laws. For us to permit this or make some flimsy excuse that we, as adults, cannot enforce the rules is an outright abdication of our responsibility as parents and professional people.

IT IS MY INTENT TO RECOMMEND THE CONTINUATION OF TRADITIONAL FIELD TRIPS, but, only upon assurance on the part of parents and students alike that the trip will have resultant positive effects on the participants that we want it to have. In any trip, the following policies will be accomplished prior to students leaving the district:

1. A complete plan of the trip will be outlined for parents, Board of Education, and the administration for approval.  
2. A written permission slip authorizing participation will be filed by the parent or legal guardian regardless of whether or not the participant has reached the age of majority.

3. A waiver of responsibility and intent that any participant on a field trip under school sponsorship, who consumes any alcoholic beverage, uses any illicit substance, or created disruptive behavior will be immediately returned to Manchester at the expense of the parents.

4. A medical assistance form giving all insurance numbers, emergency phone numbers, permission to provide emergency medical treatment, etc. will be signed by parents to enable the sponsors to procure medical emergency aid for any participant in the event of an injury, illness, or accident. Without this permission and with malpractice contingencies, life preserving authority must be given to the school to protect the life of a student.

Total fault or responsibility cannot be imposed on the student body either and as adult sponsors we must exhibit our concerns and willingness to abide by the same rules and regulations. Any sponsor who is in the employ of the Manchester Schools who consumes alcoholic beverages or abdicates the responsibility for supervision of participants, will be con-

sidered operating under impaired ability and will be suspended from their position until a just cause hearing can be conducted between the professional associations, the administration, and the Board of Education.

This next year's senior class has worked very hard to earn money toward their senior trip. I respect and admire their stamina and hard work and also the efforts put forth by their parents to provide them a potentially unforgettable educational experience. Very soon we will want to meet with parents of the senior class and the seniors themselves in early planning for the senior trip. We want each of them to have equal opportunity for participation and equal opportunity to earn money toward the approved trip.

As an appropriate footnote, I would

like you to know that the last years budget reflects a deficit in use of buses for field trips of approximately \$4,500 which is 9.7 percent of the total budget. It does raise a question in my mind as to whether we can afford to underwrite every bus trip requested without some remuneration from the groups using the buses. The State Transportation Department has established a rate of 62¢ per mile for school bus usage and it may be necessary for us to break that out and charge for certain trips on a break-even basis to insure payment of the driver, gas and oil, and depreciation on the vehicle itself. In working with the Board of Education, I will want to have their direction as to how to cut costs in that area.

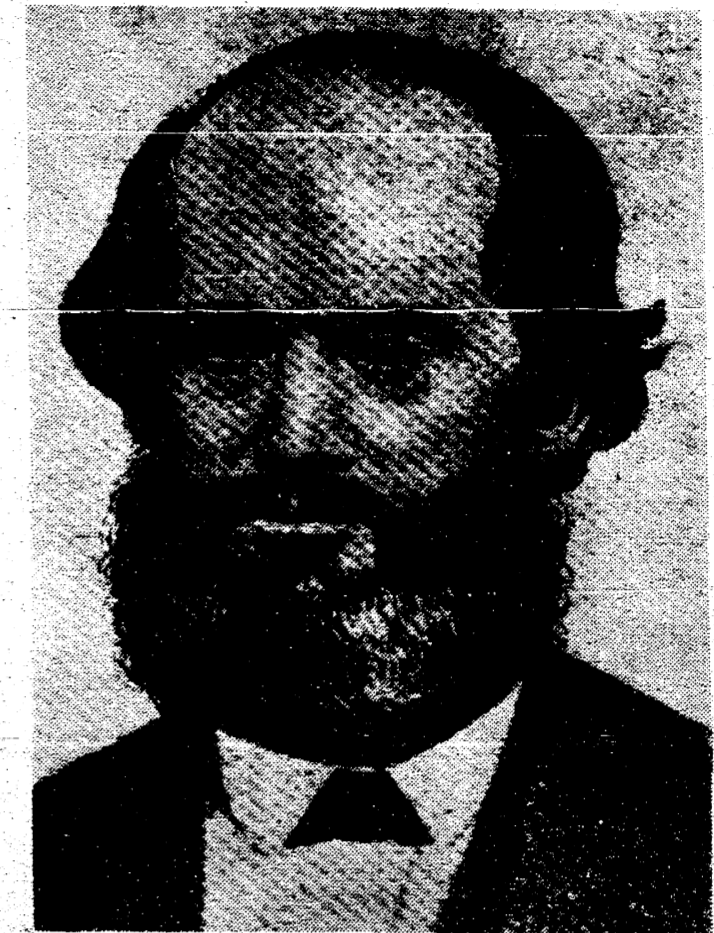

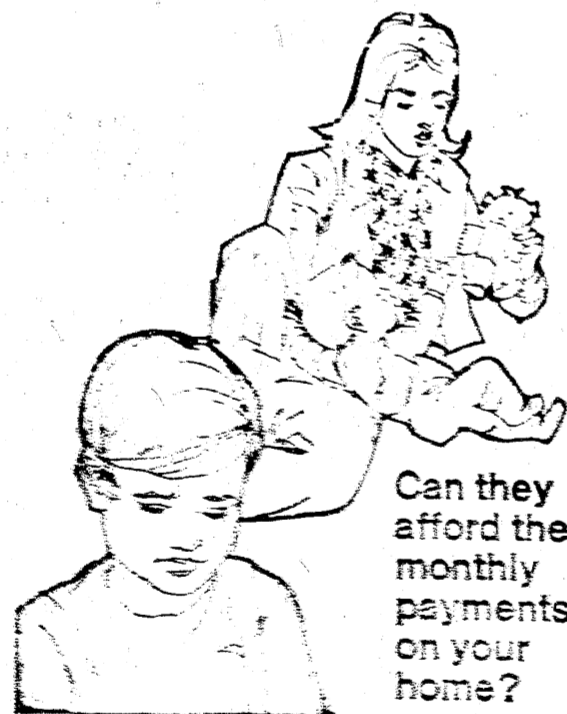

**To the Citizens of Washtenaw County:**

Crime in Washtenaw County has been increasing each year for the last decade. And of the four largest policing agencies in the county, the Sheriff's Department has been the least effective in dealing with crime.

**Fact.** Attempted burglaries have increased 157%.

**Fact.** Rapes have increased 58%.

**Fact.** Armed robbery has increased 25%.

**Fact.** This increased crime rate has occurred despite a 127% increase in manpower in the Sheriff's Department.

As a Command Officer with the Ann Arbor Police Department, I've learned over the past 15 years that we cannot rely on yesterday's solutions to meet today's growing crime problems. While no one can guarantee a drastic reversal in our crime rate, I believe that new approaches must be undertaken.

First, the suppression of crime in Washtenaw County should be our top priority. For years we have been attempting to lock the criminal out of our homes without success. The time has now come to lock up the criminal instead. Wishing, predicting, and even asking that crime statistics be lowered is a pipe dream until the career criminal is punished rather than returned to the streets to prey upon us again and again.

Second, we cannot afford to wait for ill-defined and long-range social reforms to bring down the crime rate in this county. We must re-establish the principle that criminals are accountable for their crimes. While it is true that man's environment may help to explain a man's crime, it does not excuse it.

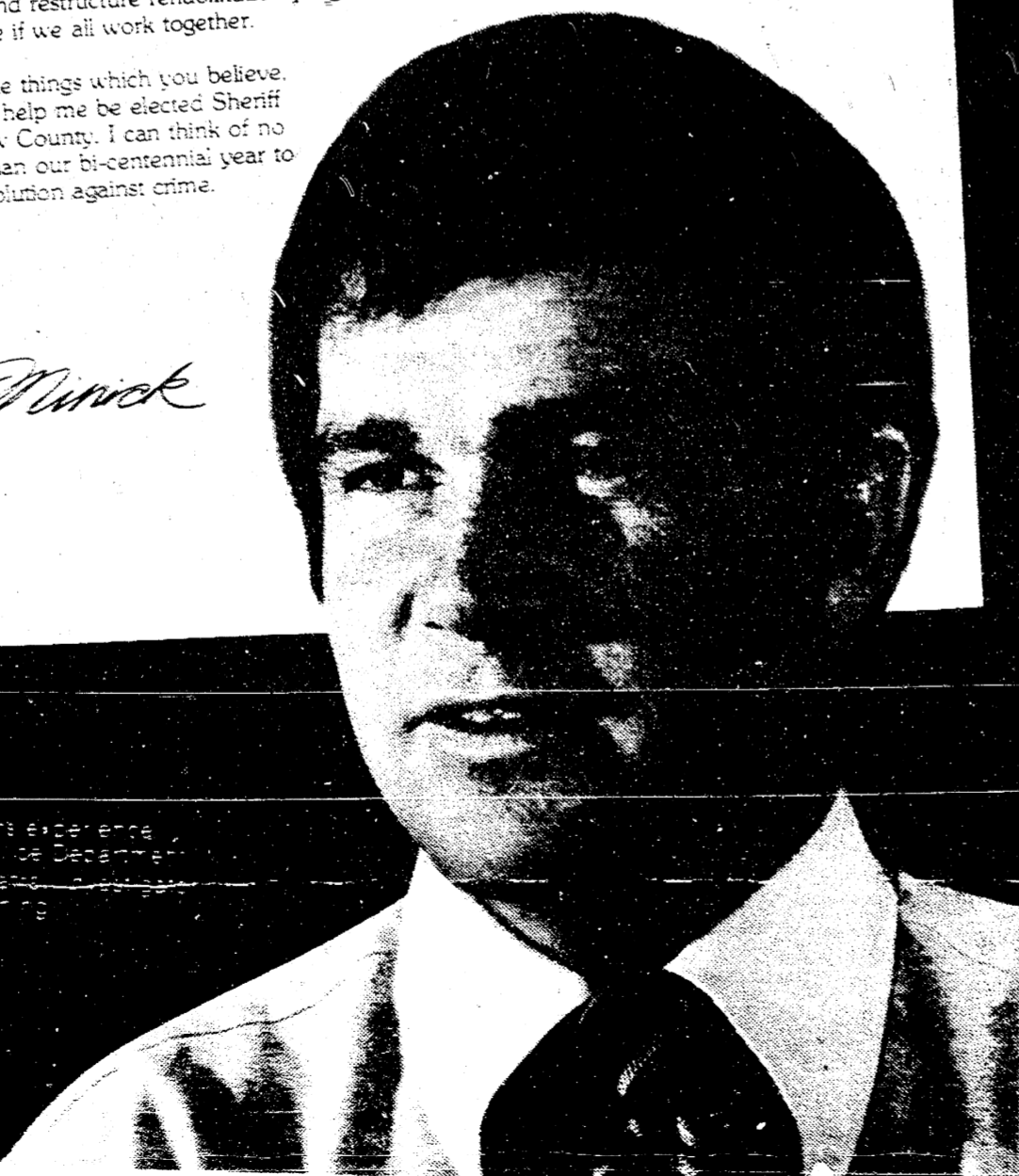
And third, we must abandon the idea that more money means better law enforcement. This has been proven false in the past, as evidenced by our spiraling law enforcement budgets. We need a well-managed, effective, and diversified program of crime control. We must restore road patrols and restructure rehabilitation programs without taxing ourselves into bankruptcy. It can be done if we all work together.

If these are the things which you believe, I urge you to help me be elected Sheriff of Washtenaw County. I can think of no better time than our bi-centennial year to launch a revolution against crime.

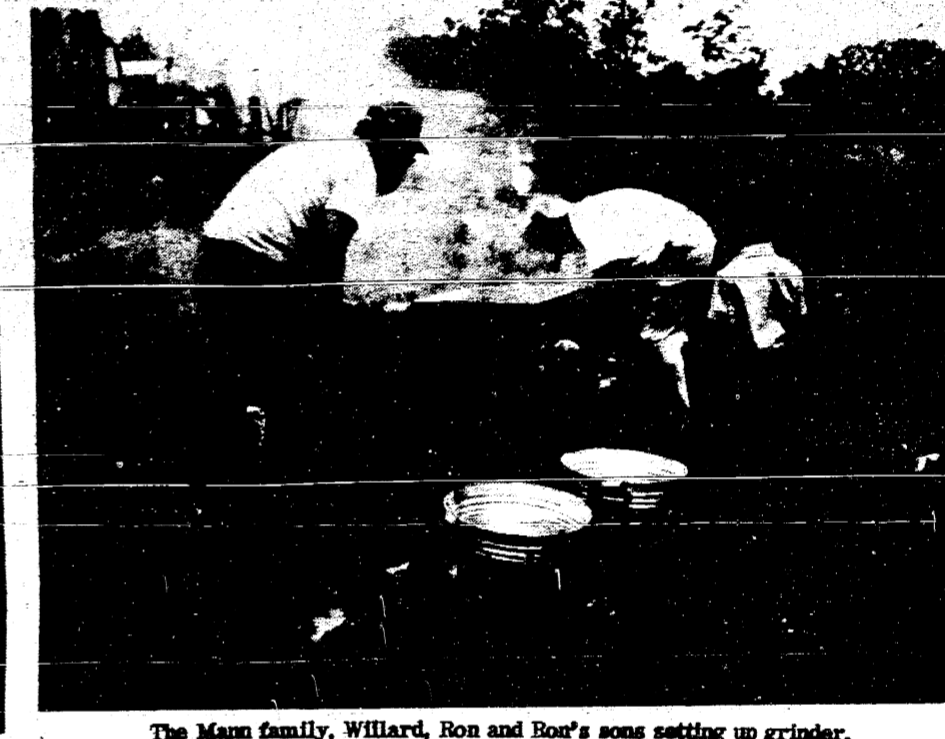

## Manchester Township Library Oldest In State

A bicentennial gift has been received by Manchester Township Library from the National Film Board of Canada -- a most delightful "picture book" for all ages and generations to come "Between Friends/ Entre Amis". Because Manchester Township Library is the oldest Township Library in the State of Michigan - tax supported since 1838 -- it was selected to receive this beautiful gift from M.R. Bursey, Consul of Canada. The volume was produced to honor the American Revolution Bicentennial and is presented as an enduring expression of the friendship of Canadians for the people of the United States of America 1776-1976.

In 1975 the National Film Board of Canada sent 32 photographers to examine the United States Canadian Border. They were to interpret the border, to photograph the land and document the places on both sides no further than 20 miles away in the sparsely populated areas. The Foreward by Pierre Elliott Trudeau, Prime Minister of Canada, states "This

book is about people....it is also a celebration - a joyful recognition of that striking triumph of human spirit reflected in the atmosphere of peace and friendship which pervades the many relationships between two proud and free nations." For the French buff, as the title of the book indicates, one will enjoy the bilingual titles and explanations of the numerous photos. It is a book that everyone can enjoy.

## Children's Book Exchange Program

Manchester Public Schools Board of Education announced today plans for a children's book exchange program to be held during the week of August 9th to the 13th. The collection of books will be held between the hours of 9 a.m. to noon beginning Monday, August 9th and ending Thursday, August 12th at the Luther Klager Elementary School. Each child or adult bring 1 or more books for the exchange. Will be given a receipt for the number of books brought to the school in order that the child can return on Friday, August 13th, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and select the same number of books that he has received a receipt for earlier in the week. Persons in the community who would like to donate books for the exchange to broaden the selection are gratefully invited to do so at the Klager School. The books should be in good condition and aimed at reading levels between Grades 1 to 6. Pre-School picture books, etc. are also welcomed and pre-school children can select their books from a special pre-school book selection that will be available. Parents are asked to use discretion in the type of material brought in for exchange and the school system reserves the right to remove any material considered to be inappropriate for children. "Significant research has shown that much of the regression which occurs during the non-school months of summer can be significantly reversed if children are encouraged to read. The opportunity to exchange books with other children provides in many cases an additional motivation to want to read for pleasure during the weeks just preceding the re-opening of school", stated Bill Green, Superintendent of Schools. In addition, parents are invited to enroll children new to the district in the elementary school during that week whether they will attend Klager or the Pleasant Lake School. Each elementary child being enrolled during that week will receive a brand new book and Kindergarten children will receive a free coloring book and crayons.
