From Clam Gulch To Manchester

Hello Everyone,
From Clam Gulch to Manchester Glory be, hello, hello.

What a long, long trip. Alaska has always seemed a world away and truly it is. A world of great mountains, rivers, ice, snow and great piney trees. A world also of open spaces, harsh ground and water everywhere.

The Great Oil Pipeline has been in the conversation of everyone for many months and rightly so, for it is an impressive undertaking. Our school history books described to us the building of such things as the Suez Canal, the Panama Canal, and of course, the Alcoa Highway, and now comes the "Big one". The laying of the line from the North Slope at Prudhoe Bay south to Valdez, and the construction of the terminal, from which the oil will be shipped by freighters.

But Alaska is more than a source of oil, it is a natural resource itself. The people are friendly, hardy, adamantly prejudiced toward North Country living and incredibly individualistic. Dedicated to preserving as long as possible a free way of life, they none the less have worked hard to provide good roads and facilities for visitors from other states.

Shall I tell you how my day was yesterday? Perhaps then I can begin to believe it myself. For I am in a sort of dazed wonderment, gladdened with beauty, bemused and silent in the presence of so much that is huge and untouched.

The Sterling Highway runs South of Anchorage, straight to Homer, a small fishing village, where we boarded an authentic fishing boat, headed across Kachemak Bay, surrounded by the Aleutian

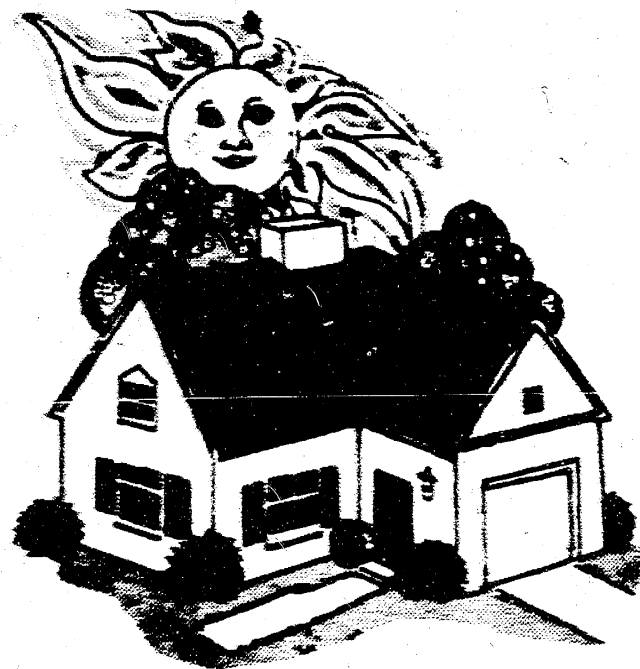

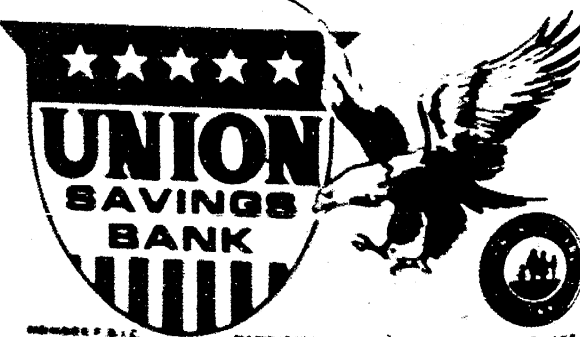
Their leaders would like to take this opportunity to thank the kids for making the last two 4H fairs happier than some we had been to. We had our moments, but here's looking to next year.

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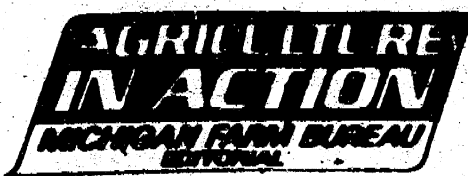
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"NO GREATER WRATH..."

The usual serenity of the Montana prairie has been shattered -- not by coyotes, sandstorms, drought or flood -- but by angry farm and ranch women.

The target of their anger is McCall's Patterns, its director of Women's Interests -- Ma. Marie Thomas, and the woman who organized the beef boycott back in 1973, Barbara Shuttleworth. When the Montana women read in a recent issue of "Carotree Patterns from McCall's" that Ms. Thomas had seen fit to recognize Mrs. Shuttleworth for her achievement in organizing the boycott, they figured that "two could play the game." In protest of the article and what they believe it does to "perpetuate the fallacies and myths that many urbanites hold concerning agriculture and the market place," they've decided to boycott McCall's Patterns.

Along with letters of protest to McCall's, the Montana women are enclosing flaps from previously-purchased patterns to prove they were regular customers. In addition, they're appearing on TV talk shows to share with the public the reasons for their wrath.

One Montana farm wife, Mrs. Frances Donohoe, expressed her sentiments with pointed candor: "Most agricultural economists will agree that there is no evidence that the meat boycotts had more than a minimal, short-term and localized effect in reducing retail meat prices to consumers." All the boycotts did, Mrs. Donohoe told McCall's, was to aug-

ment the plight of the cattlemen. "The incident wreaked havoc with the entire cattle industry, pushing many ranchers and stockyards out of business and placing many others in a critical financial crisis which most are still struggling to overcome."

Charging that the article "glorified" the meat boycott, the farm wife asked: "Is this the kind of reactionary thinking that McCall's attributes to American Women? I am sure the responsible, rational and well-informed women of the U.S. deserve better representation."

She couldn't resist twisting the needle once inserted... "As far as increasing consumer prices go, I find it quite startling to be paying from \$1.50 to \$1.75 for a McCall's pattern when we used to pay a little more than a quarter."

As other farm wives across the nation, many of whom sew their families' clothing, pick up their copies of "Carotree Patterns," McCall's public relations people will have a fulltime job putting out the "brush fires" that started out on the prairie.

PUBLIC INVITED TO HELP PLAN CONSERVATION DISTRICT'S FUTURE

The Plan is a pattern to follow for the year-

ly-year actions required by the SCD to carry out their responsibilities and objectives.

The public's assistance is requested in developing this Plan to assist the Board of Directors in delineating priorities and determining soil and water conservation needs in Washtenaw County. Comments and suggestions are encouraged on areas that will make the SCD program more meaningful and effective.

A preliminary version of the Plan has been sent to various agencies, groups, and individuals for their comments. In addition, County residents are encouraged to stop by the District's office to review the proposed Plan and offer suggestions.

 1 tblsp. unflavored gelatin 1 tspn. vanilla
 1/2 cup cold water 4 cups prepared dessert topping
 1 (3 oz.) pkg. vanilla pudding mix (not instant) 2 to 3 cups frozen or fresh sliced peaches, sweetened (optional)

Cut two dozen of the lady fingers into 2-inch lengths and stand them upright, top crust side toward pan and cut side down, around edge of a 9-inch spring form pan. Line bottom of pan with lady finger halves. Soften gelatin in cold water. Prepare pudding mix as directed on package label. Add gelatin to hot pudding, and stir until dissolved. Stir in 1 1/2 cups toffee pieces and vanilla. Chill mixture until it starts to thicken.

Fold 2 cups prepared dessert topping into chilled toffee mixture. Fill center of pan with alternate layers of pudding and remaining lady finger pieces, making pudding the top layer. Chill until firm.

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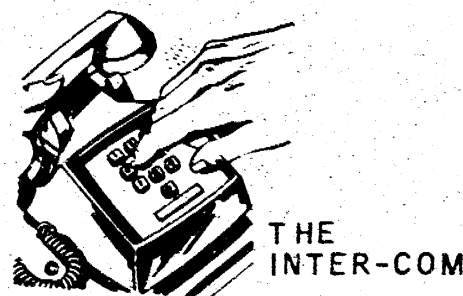

By now, I hope you have been able to find time to study the status report of the Manchester school district given you by the Board of Education through the courtesy of the Manchester Enterprise. It is further hoped that you can see that there are no threats involved and realize the gravity of the situation facing the future of the schooling of our children. Working together closely with the Board of Education, we have agonized over the necessity of cuts in the program that will have a profound effect on the programs to which youngsters in the community have become accustomed. 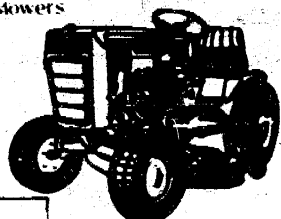

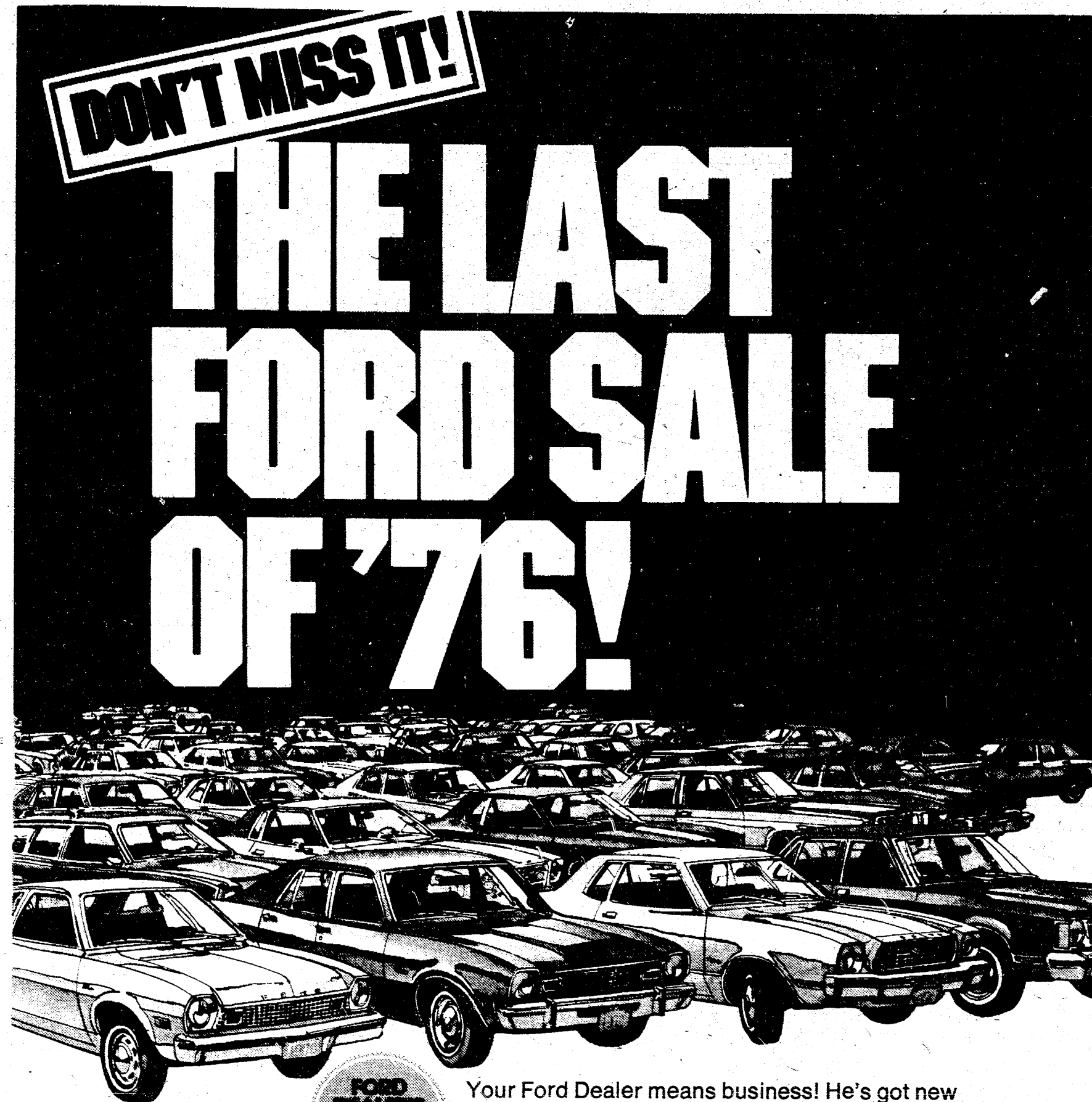

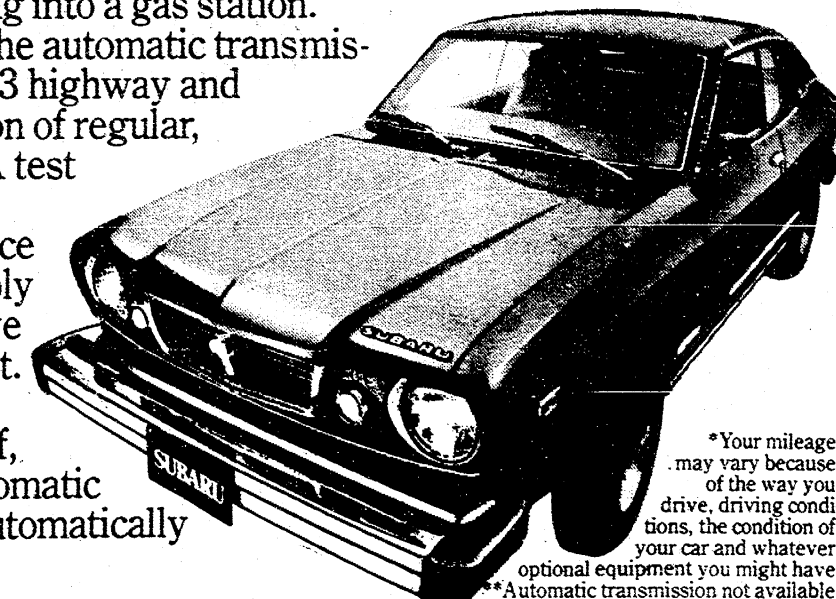

An ordinance to regulate the setting of fires, and to provide penalties for the violation thereof, and to provide a method for the collection of costs and expenses of the township caused by the setting of fires.

**THE TOWNSHIP OF SHARON ORDAINS:
 SECTION 1. Applicability.**

This ordinance is adopted in the interest of public safety and is designed to promote the general peace, health, safety and welfare of the Township of Sharon.

SECTION 2. Permit-Hours to Burn.

This ordinance provides for the control of fires, burning of trash and rubbish, obtaining of permit, hours to set fires and the prevention of foul odors caused by burning.

SECTION 3. Permits-Where to Obtain.

No person, partnership, firm, association or corporation shall, within the limits of the Township of Sharon, (when the ground is not snowcovered), start or have an open fire, except for domestic purposes, or set or cause to be set, burn or cause to be burned at any time, any structure, debris from structure torn down, brush limbs, or trees on any lot or parcel of ground within the Township of Sharon notwithstanding burning for domestic purposes unless such person shall first obtain from the fire chief of the district wherein the burning is proposed, a permit for such fire or fires. (See Section 8, Domestic Fires.)

SECTION 4. Permits-Request for.

Any person, partnership, firm, association or corporation designed to set a fire prohibited by the above provisions shall make application to the fire chief, as aforementioned, which application shall state the name and residence of the applicant, the location of the lands and premises where such fire is to be set and the time contemplated for setting such fire. Such application shall also state the reason for setting such fire and such other information as the township board may, from time to time, require. If such application is approved, said fire chief shall issue a permit to said applicant.

SECTION 5. Permits - Special.

Said fire chief may grant permission to authorized persons for the burning of trash, rubbish or similar waste material in open, supervised burning areas.

SECTION 6. Foul Odors.

No person shall burn garbage, animal carcasses, refuse, trash, rubbish or like material giving off foul odors, at any time. This section applies to domestic, commercial and industrial fires.

SECTION 7. Permits - Commercial and Industrial.

No person shall set or cause to be set, burn or cause to be burned, any papers, trash, rubbish, leaves, cut grass or weeds, unless confined within a fireproof container constructed of metal or masonry with an approved spark arrestor with openings no larger than three-fourths of

an inch. Hours of burning shall be from sunrise to sunset. Burners of the metal drum or portable type shall not be located less than fifty feet from any building or less than five feet from the adjoining property line. Masonry or heavy metal constructed burners or incinerators shall be constructed to withstand the heat of twelve hundred degrees Fahrenheit and shall be located not less than fifty feet from a combustible building or property line, except as provided in Section 8. Masonry or heavy metal burners or incinerators shall be constructed with or attached to a suitable stack, the top of which stack is to be at least three feet above the eave line of adjoining building. All stacks are to be properly capped with approved spark arresters.

SECTION 8. Domestic Fires.

A "domestic fire" is any fire around the home, within the curtilage of the dwelling where the material to be burned has been properly placed in a debris burner constructed of metal or masonry with an approved spark arrestor with openings no larger than three-fourths of an inch. Burners of the metal drum or portable type shall not be located less than fifty feet from any structure or less than five feet from the adjoining property line. No permit shall be required for domestic fires.

SECTION 9. Penalties.

Any person, partnership, firm, association, or corporation who shall set or start an open fire without a permit as required by this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of \$500.00, or by imprisonment in the County Jail of Washtenaw County not to exceed ninety days, or both such fine and imprisonment; or who sets an open fire which necessitates calling any fire department. And the Township of Sharon may sue in any court of competent jurisdiction for civil damages and may recover such costs and expenses incurred by them from any person, partnership, firm, association or corporation who sets such an open fire.

SECTION 10. Effective date.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its publication in the Manchester Enterprise, effective date September 11, 1976.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 5 ENTITLED "ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT TRESPASS UPON PRIVATE AND PUBLIC PROPERTY", BY REVISION OF SECTION II ENTITLED "SPECIFICALLY ENUMERATED TRESPASSES".

The Sharon Township Board of Trustees hereby ordains as follows:
SECTION II. SPECIFICALLY ENUMERATED TRESPASSES.

Without constituting any limitation upon the provisions of Section I hereof, any of the following acts by the person, firm or corporation shall be deemed included among those that constitute trespasses in violation of the provisions of said Section I and appropriate action may be taken thereunder at any time or from time to time to prevent or punish any violation or violations of this ordinance.

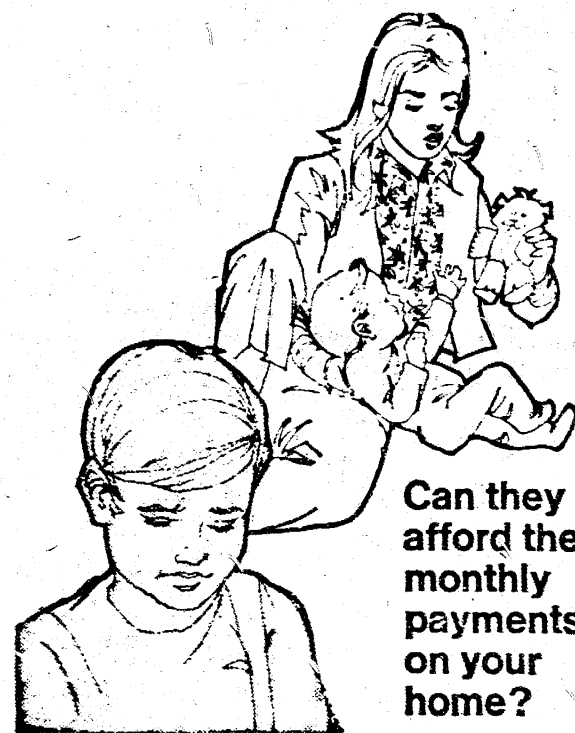
The aforesaid enumerated act shall include:

- (a) Any entry upon the premises or any part thereof or another, including any public property in violation of a notice, posted or exhibited at the main entrance to said premises, or at any point of approach or entry or in violation of any notice, warning or protest given in writing by any owner or occupant thereof; or
- (b) The pursuit of a course of conduct or action incidental to the making of an entry upon the land of another in violation of a notice posted or exhibited at the main entrance to said premises, or at any point of approach or entry or in violation of any notice, warning or protest given in writing by any owner or occupant thereof; or
- (c) A failure or refusal to depart from the premises of another in case of being requested by any owner or occupant thereof; or
- (d) Any entry into or upon any vehicle, aircraft or watercraft made without the written consent of the person having the right to possession or control thereof or failure or refusal to leave any such vehicle, aircraft or watercraft after being requested to leave by the person having such right.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its publication in the Manchester Enterprise, effective date September 11, 1976.

Manchester Township Purchases Site For Fire Department

A site for the Manchester Township Fire Department future housing and township offices was purchased this week by the Township Board.

Since 1878, the village has provided space for housing the township fire department. Over the years with increasing population in the township and the village, it has been necessary at intervals to acquire new equipment until, at the present time, with four fire trucks, two jeeps, and other sundry gear, it not only takes a "shoe-horn" to get the equipment into the building, but lots of luck to keep the plank floor from sagging. The village also needs more space at this point in time.

The purchase of the former Schaffer Lumber Company property, a little over two acres, for \$31,500, money which we have been appropriating over the past six years, is the first step in what is considered to be a long range up-dating of the township facilities.

Early in 1975, a Citizens Committee spent several hours in session, trying to

assess the present and future needs of the township. The fire chief was also part of this committee.

Their first recommendation was to add on to the present fire hall, but because of the lack of parking space and because the cost of tearing down present structures was prohibitive, the Schaffer site was selected as the best alternative.

In November, on election day, when the local voters enter the fire hall to cast their votes, we suggest that they take a good look at the surroundings and especially the flooring.

Agenda items pertinent to the results of the millage election will be acted upon by the Board upon receipt of the election results.

The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. in the study auditorium of the high school. The public is cordially invited to attend.
